In summing up the agricultural picture for 1954, McHaney says farm labor appears adequate, but under some circumstances recruitment programs must continue. Farm wages should approximate those of Farm equipment production in

1953 was moderately below 1952 output, but prices in 1954 will differ only slightly from last year, he says. Concessions and trade-in allowances may be more liberal.

Feed supplies are large. Costs. of feed as a whole during the forthcoming months may average 5 to 10 percent below the corresponding 1953 period. This, however, will vary by areas, he

Thirteen percent more com mercial fertilizer will be available for the 1953-54 growing season with only minor price changes expected.

And, adds McHaney, the cost of building materials, supplies and containers probably will be no higher this year than last. There's a possibility prices for these items may be slightly low-

Finally, he says, prices for insecticides are expected to remain on or near the 1953 level.





Fifty-five irrigation farmers rom a sector south of Floydada met in Floydada Thursday night to organize the Floydada Gas Co-operative, which will negotlate a contract with the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. to supply fuel to power irrigation well plants. The gas company, provided 60 farmers sign up, will play a 4inch pipeline extending from its main line, 11/2 miles northwest of Floydada, south of Floydada to an intersection with Hwy. 207. Also the system will include a 2-inch line to spread out and cover 27% miles and serve 60 or more wells.

The pipeline system will ser-Ve area farmers 5 miles south of Floydada, 3 miles east and 6 miles southeast
