Mitchells Saluted In Progressive Farmer Magazine

The Chester W. Mitchell family, south of Lockney, is saluted as a Master Farm Family in the May issue of The Progressive Farmer magazine. Their story is told in the article "He Used To Be A County Agent—Now He's A Master Farmer."

Although he once gave advice to farmers as a county agriculture agent in Oklahoma, Mitchell likes being a farmer best. He began his farming operations near Lockney in 1946.

Mitchell is a strong believer in soil conservation. He was designated outstanding soil conservationist of Floyd County in 1952.

To improve the fertility of his soil, Mitchell started a fertilizing and legume plan as part of a rotation system. Cotton-milo-alalfa-irrigated pasture with vetch as cover crop in 8 to 10 years makes Mitchell's rotation system. He has covered his entire place with alfalfa since 1946.

Mitchell has found deep plowing breaks up hardpan and helps water absorption and the control of weeds.

A believer in quality, Mitchell produces and sells certified milo seed. He believes the extra investment in his registered Duroc hogs and beef Shorthorns is justified. They take no more space than common quality livestock. They convert feed into animal products more efficiently and pay off better at the market.

A complete set of records helps Mitchell keep a close eye on his business.

Mitchell runs his 348 cultivated and irrigated acres with the help of one man. His young sons Warren and Neil will help take over in a few years. Mrs. Mitchell and daughter, Shirley Ann, keep the home running smoothly.

SATURDAY OF THIS WEEK marks the 60th anniversary in business here for Mrs. Alice Baker, pioneer of all Lockney business people. Mrs. Baker and her late husband, J. A. Baker, founded the Baker Mercantile here on April 24, 1894. He passed away in 1917 and Mrs. Baker, with the help of her children, has operated the store since that time.

The Bakers were living on a farm 5 miles south of Lockney in 1894. Riley Davis was postmaster of the Lockney post office and he wanted to leave. The post office then was located southeast of the present business section of Lockney about a mile and a half. He came down and wanted the Bakers to take over the post office. Since they wanted to move to Lockney anyway to put their children in school, they took the post office and installed a small stock of merchandise along with it. Mr. Baker did freighting and Mrs. Baker kept the store and post office. They built a two story frame building 40x60 on the site now occupied by the First National Bank. They had their bed rooms up stairs and cooked in the rear of the building.

Mother Of Sheriff Earl Cooper Dies

Mrs. Mary Ida Cooper, mother of Floyd County Sheriff Earl Cooper, passed away in the Peoples Hospital at Floydada at 8:30 p. m. Saturday after suffering a stroke at her home. Mrs. Cooper was 86 years of age but had comparatively good health up until her last illness.

Funeral services were held at the First Baptist Church in Floydada Monday morning at 10:30 with Dr. R. Earl Allen officiating. Burial was in the Matador Cemetery under the direction of Harmon Funeral Home.

Mrs. Cooper had been a resident of Floyd County since 1918. She had resided in the Cedar Hill and Lakeview communities before moving to Floydada 12 years ago. She was born in Tennessee March 30, 1868 and previous to moving to Floyd County had lived in Oklahoma and Arkansas. The family moved to Collin County, Texas in 1885 and to Flomot in 1913.

She was a member of the First Baptist Church at Floydada and had been active in church work until her health prevented.

Survivors include one daughter, Mrs. Bada Phillips of Plainview; six sons, Earl and Jack Cooper, both of Floydada; Alvin of Matador, Tom of Denison, Elmer of Ballinger, Arthur of Mulshoe. Also surviving are 22 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren and 5 great-great-grandchildren.

The front, of course, was the store and postoffice.

When the College came to Lockney business picked up and the store has enjoyed a good patronage for most of its 60 years. For a time they handled groceries, hardware and dry goods, but now Mrs. Baker handles dry goods only. Her son, Robin, has an interest in the hardware store. They do not handle groceries at all.

Mrs. Baker's store is the oldest single business institution in the Panhandle operated continuously under one owner. Although she is 86 years of age she still actively manages the business and is on the job every day. Her daughter, Mrs. Lee Seaman helps her in the store. Mrs. Grace Byars also works in the store.

Mrs. Baker told The Beacon editor this week that "I ought to quit but I don't want to." She says that she feels good in the mornings but tires badly before the day is through.

Mrs. Baker has 12 children but only three of them live in Lockney. The remainder are scattered over the southwestern states. Those in Lockney are Mrs. Seaman, Mrs. L. M. Honea and Dorsey Baker.

George Graham Succumbs To Heart Attack

George Graham, Floyd County resident since 1918, died at the Lockney General Hospital last Thursday morning as the result of a heart attack.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the First Methodist Church here with Rev. Burgin Watkins, the pastor, and Rev. Louie Schultze of Plainview conducting the services. Interment was in the Lockney Cemetery with Carter Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Graham suffered a heart attack on Monday evening preceding his death. He had attended the funeral of his son-in-law, Atkins Phillips, Monday afternoon and had spent some time the week prior with Mr. Phillips in his last illness. Mr. Graham suffered another heart attack on Wednesday morning and death came Thursday.

Mr. Graham resided in the Irick community, 6 miles southwest of Lockney, for 30 years. He moved to that community from Crowell in 1918. In 1948 he and Mrs. Graham left the farm and moved into Lockney to make their home.

He was born January 4, 1878 at Banner, Ark., and was married to Mattie Elizabeth Brock at Concord, Arkansas on August 8, 1898.

Mr. Graham had spent most of his life farming although he was a cement contractor also at one time. He was a member of the Methodist Church and the Woodmen of the World.

Survivors include his wife, three sons, Warren Graham, Lockney; Clayton Graham, Los Angeles; Parker Graham, Plainview; three daughters, Mrs. Ruth Shadix, Floydada; Mrs. Ester Phillips, and Mrs. Bill Williamson, Plainview. Also surviving are four brothers, four sisters, 11 grandchildren and 9 great-grandchildren.

J. H. Carothers Dies Of Injuries

J. H. Carothers, Lockney tourist court and service station operator, died in the Lockney General Hospital late Tuesday of injuries received in an auto accident Monday afternoon. Carothers was injured when the new Chevrolet car, which he had purchased just three hours earlier, overturned at a dip on a country road a mile east and two miles south of the Irick schoolhouse. He suffered a basal skull fracture, a broken jaw, a broken hand, and multiple bruises. A brain hemorrhage was the primary cause of death. He never regained consciousness after the accident, attending physicians said.

Buck Fields, who was riding with Carothers at the time of the accident, was only slightly injured.

The body was at Carter Funeral Home Wednesday and will be carried to Denton, Texas Thursday. Funeral services will be at the Schmidt Funeral Chapel there at 2 p. m. Friday. Burial will be in the Krum cemetery.

The accident happened about 4:30 p. m. Monday. Carothers had traded for the new Chevrolet sedan at the Lockney Auto Company here just after noon. He was traveling south at the time and came upon the dip in the road where it crosses the White River draw. The road is very rough and drops sharply going south, observers say. Carothers apparently lost control of the car or applied his brakes too quickly and the car overturned one time, landing on its wheels and headed into an embankment on the east. Fields pulled Carothers from the car and Mrs. Frank Probuso came along and at Fields request called the Carter ambulance.

Carothers was lying in Fields' lap when the car stopped rolling, friends report, and this probably saved Fields from serious injury. The car was not badly damaged, body men estimating that it could be repaired for \$400 or \$500. Only two glasses were cracked, the top was dented in two or three places and the body had other small dents in it. The speedometer showed that the car had traveled only 30 miles.

Mr. Carothers was born at Clay Pool, Oklahoma on July 29, 1913. He was married to Miss Corene Koier at Marietta, Okla., on March 14, 1939. The couple had lived in Grapevine, Fort Worth and Bakersfield, Calif., before coming to Lockney in 1948. They built a service station and tourist courts on Highway 70 in South Lockney.

Survivors include his wife, his mother, Mrs. Maphy Smith of Muskogee, Okla.; one brother, Billy Joe Carothers of Sherman; one sister, Mrs. Henry Bentley of Muskogee; and a half brother, Charles Smith, now serving in the Navy.

Mr. and Mrs. John Bilberry, Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Hodel and possibly others from Lockney plan to attend the services at Denton Friday.

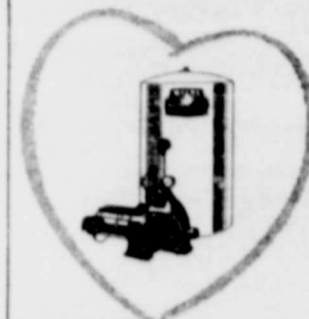

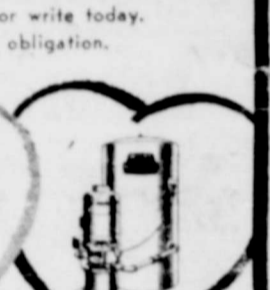
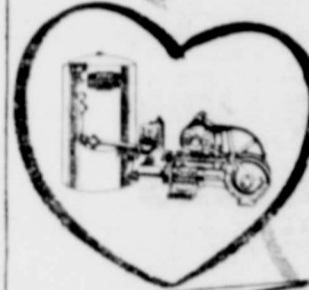

Items of interest from the files of The Lockney Beacon.

April 21, 1916

A wedding that came as a surprise to many friends was solemnized in Plainview Thursday afternoon when Miss Eula Burns of Lockney and Tom Patton of Plainview were united in marriage. The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Burns.

B. B. Cousins, president of West Texas State Normal at Canyon will deliver an address to the graduating class of the high school here Monday evening.

Financial statement of the City of Lockney since April 27, 1915 is as follows: Money on hand April 27, \$708.73; Received from taxes, \$1,486.50; Received from other sources, \$65.44; Total, \$2,260.47.

Total receipts at Lockney post office for 1914 was \$3,777.45, total receipts up to March 31, 1915 was \$5,068.09 with an increase for 2 years, \$1,290.64.

April 24, 1924

L. B. Hooten, age 61 years, died at his home near Tulla Sunday. He formerly lived at Lockney. Mr. Hooten is survived by his wife and nine children.

J. W. Mullins from Missouri who recently moved to his place he purchased here 12 miles north of town is planting 800 acres of cotton and five planters and five weedeaters are running night and day getting seed in the ground.

Adrian Blankenship, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Blankenship who live four miles south of Lockney happened to a serious accident during the rabbit drive at Pleasant Valley Wednesday afternoon. His gun accidentally was discharged and shot off his right hand at the palm necessitating amputation of his hand at the wrist.

Another accident happening at the rabbit drive at Pleasant Valley Wednesday took place when Floyd Tear; was accidentally shot in the face and right leg. The wounds are not of a serious nature.

April 24, 1942

Although the sun has scarcely been seen all week only .55 of an inch of rainfall was reported up to Thursday morning. The total for the month thus far is 3.59 inches.

Hints On High Plains Gardening

(The following is the ninth in a series of garden hints to home gardeners on the Plains. The series, written by Dr. George Elle, professor of horticulture, Texas Tech, is in the interest of better home gardens.)

The most troublesome insect pest of shade and fruit trees in West Texas is the tree borer.

Several species attack different types of trees under somewhat different circumstances. They have succeeded in killing many orchards and an even greater number of fine shade trees.

The popular tree borer has rung the death bell of most of the fine, old Lombardy and Bolinana poplar trees in this area. Many more are so riddled with the borers that their days are numbered.

The big, clumsy, black and white, inch-long adult lays its eggs around the bases of the tree. After hatching, the grub bores through the bark and begins to tunnel through the cambium and important inner bark. Later, drills into the wood.

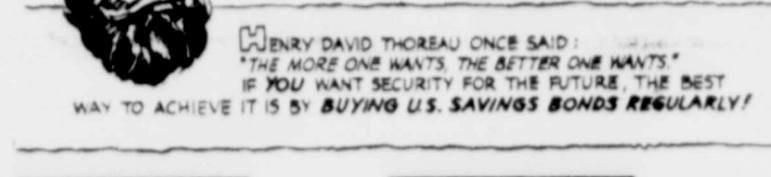
Result is a girdling of the tree causing it to die. Often the grub operates just below the soil level.

Digging for the borers with a knife often results in greater damage than the grub. Fumigants are partially successful if the damage is at ground level or below. Ethylene is the most practical fumigant. Four one-fourth pint of the 50 per cent solution in a band around the base of the tree one inch away from the trunk of a five and a six year old tree. Build a mound of soil one foot deep around the tree over

the fumigant to confine the fumes.
A more practical method for saving a shade tree from borers is to prevent the infestation by spraying. Mix three tablespoons of a 25 per cent DDT emulsion in a gallon of water and spray over the trunk of the tree. Pull the soil away from the base and make certain the entire bark surface is well covered. Do not spray foliage. Spray monthly beginning the latter part of May.

The peach tree borer attacks the stone fruit trees. This pest works in much the same manner as the shade tree borer, but its damage is easier to spot. Bark of the lower trunk usually turns black and a gummy material exudes. Control is the same as for the poplar tree borer. Remember: Once the borer is in the spray will not reach him.

Another troublesome pest of the fruit trees is the shot-hole borer, a tiny fellow that bores holes about the size of a buck shot in the bark of twigs and branches. This borer causes branches to die one at a time. If you find shot-hole borers, spray the branches just as you did for the peach tree borer; then religiously fertilize and irrigate the tree for good growth to ward off more borers.
A small wood borer works in the trunk and branches of weeping willow trees so effectively that an old weeping willow is a rarity in West Texas. Again use the recommended DDT spray on the branches and trunk. Adherence to this spray program will allow your weeping willow to live.
In all borer control three things are important: (1) Make your first application of preventative spray early in the season before the adult has an opportunity to enter the tree and begin to lay its eggs, (2) Spray at

Texas Leads In Rural Telephone Loans Say Sen. Lyndon Johnson

Senator Lyndon B. Johnson has been informed by the Rural Electrification Administration that Texas has received more loans and more money from the REA for the rural telephone program than any other state.

Twenty-five loans, totaling \$18,029,218, have been made by the REA for the Texas part of the rural telephone program since it was started in 1950. Subscribers to be served in Texas under loans made to date total 34,462.

Senator Johnson said that, throughout the nation, 252 borrowers have received \$162,477,218 to serve 396,325 subscribers under the program.

"The bringing of new and improved telephone service to farms and other rural places is a very important part of the overall REA program," Senator Johnson said.

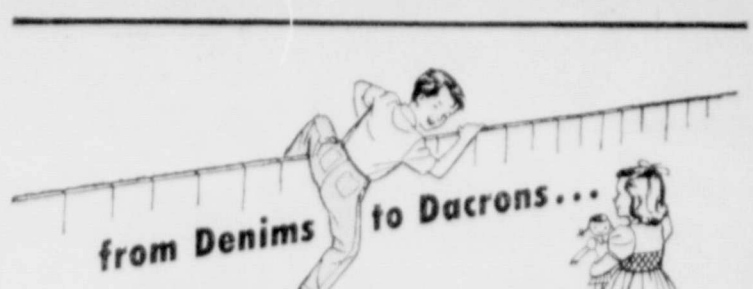

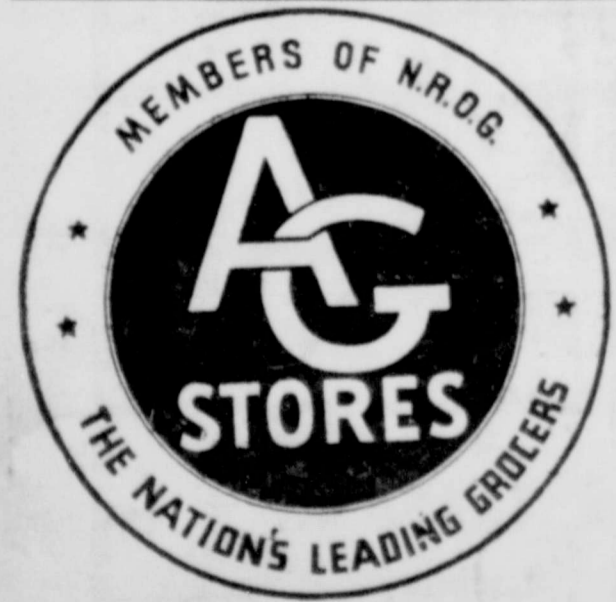
