

WHY COMMUNISM MAKES PROGRESS

Recently a Communist group in New York purchased a church building that a local Protestant community could not keep up. The minister in that area questioned one of the Communists after the sale was completed. Here is what he said:

The Gospel is a much more powerful weapon for the renewal of society than is our Marxist philosophy, but all the same we shall beat you. We are only a handful and you Christians are numbered by the millions. But if you remember the story of Gideon and his three hundred companions, you will understand why I am right. We Communists do not play with words. We are realists and are determined to achieve our objectives. We know how to obtain the means. Of our salaries and wages we keep only what is strictly necessary, and we give up the rest for propaganda purposes. To this propaganda we also consecrate our free time and a part of our holidays.

You, however, only give a little time and hardly any money for the spreading of the Gospel of Christ. How can anyone believe in the supreme value of this Gospel if you do not practice it, if you do not spread it, and if you do not sacrifice time nor talent for it? Believe me, we shall win, for we believe in our Communist's message and we are ready to sacrifice everything . . . even our lives . . . in order that social justice shall triumph. But you people are afraid of soiling your hands."

It is not unusual to find sinful men more zealous for sin, than some Christians are for righteousness. This brief article should cause Christians to take inventory. How much of our time do we spend in actual service to God? What percent of our income do we invest in spiritual matters? What sacrifices have we made to follow Christ? 



Nation's 4-H'ers Seek to Cut Death Toll of Farm Folk on Rural Highways



Look out, young feller!

CHICAGO - (Special) - "Make | Safety Your Number One Crop," the slogan of several million rural boys and girls throughout the nation since its introduction in 1945, continues to be fostered by more than 615,000 4-H Club members. They are taking part in the 1954 National 4-H Safety Program being conducted in 46 states for the tenth consecutive year. Participants receive training in farm accident and fire prevention, which includes checking and removing hazards of every conceiv-

safety experts as being a valuable contribution to the nation-wide campaign to reduce the tragic annual toll of 15,000 lives and 1,225,000 disabling injuries to farm folk.

In conducting their surveys, the 4-H'ers look for such safety hazards as loose or floppy clothing worn about moving farm machinery, cluttered stairways, oily rags, frayed electric cords, broken ladder rungs and sharp tools.

What is becoming an increasingly serious problem is that accidents to farm people caused by motor vehicles now account for nearly one-fourth of all deaths and injuries that occur on rural highways. Also, 700 of the fatal farm accidents reported last year involved wheel tractors. One-third of the fatal tractor accidents reported involve persons under 20 years of age. One case in ten was a child under 5.

To help correct this problem, 4-H'ers are giving highway safety demonstrations before farm groups and over local radio stations, as well as putting window displays in town stores and booths at county fairs.





The Facts About Governor Shivers' Big Real Estate Deal

1. May 21, 1946, Lloyd Bentsen, prominent Hidalgo County politician, bought for \$10,000 an option (right to purchase) 13,-500 odd acres of wildcat Hidalgo County land at \$75.00 per acre, the option to expire December 15, 1946 at 12 noon.

2. May 31, 1946, Shivers, then State Senator and candidate for Lieutenant Governor, signs an agreement to pay Bentsen Development Co. \$25,000 for the option, giving his note for that

3. November 5, 1946, Shivers was elected Lieutenant Governor.

4. December 15, 1946, at 12 noon, the option expired and became legally worthless.

5. December 16, 1946, Shivers sold the expired and worthless option to Texas Realty Company, a thousand-dollar corporation organized by the Bentsens, for \$450,000, nothing having been done to the land in the meantime.

6. The \$450,000 was paid in installments AFTER Shivers took office as Lieutenant Governor in January 1947.

7. In 1949, less than one month after Shivers became Governor, the Board of Water Engineers, after refusing for 20 years to grant further Rio Grande water permits for the reason that no surplus water was available, reversed itself and granted a permit for the benefit of the 13,500 odd acres, limited to surplus waters and for practical purposes worthless.

8. On the strength of the phony water permit, Texas Realty Company unloaded the land at an average price of \$500 per acre, as citrus land with water rights, to victims all over the country, including a number here in the Panhandle. 163 of such victims were foreclosed upon, and 20 of them brought suits for fraud, all of which were settled out of court without

9. Why were these facts not publicized sooner? Because the facts as to Shivers' connection with the transaction were not known until he was compelled to give his deposition in the fraud suits in 1952, and because such facts were not available to the general public until Shivers' deposition was published. over his frantic protests, only a few months ago.

10. What did Shivers sell for \$450,000? Not the land, for he never owned it; not the option, for it had expired. Where did the \$450,000 come from — not Texas Realty Company, for it had only a thousand dollars capital. Ask the Governor maybe he can tell you.




