

## New Chevrolet On Display Today And Tomorrow

Lockney Auto Company, local Chevrolet dealers, will be proudly displaying several models of the new 1955 Turbo-Fire V8 Chevrolet today and tomorrow, according to their announcement made this week. The new Chevrolet will be featuring not only a new V8 motor but also a complete "new look" in body design.

To enhance their welcome for people of the area to see the new Chevrolets, the auto firm will serve refreshments both Thursday and Friday and will have favors for the ladies and the kiddies.

On Friday a music program will be presented in the show rooms featuring The Cordettes, Lockney High School girls trio and also Wayne Bybee, the singing cowboy.

Four models of the new Chevrolet will be on display. These will be a Bel-Air V8 4-door sedan, a Bel-Air 6 cylinder 2-door sedan, a 210 series V8 4-door sedan and a Bel-Air V8 Sport Coupe.

Some of the outstanding features of the new Chevrolets are these:

All roofs have been visibly lowered with a corresponding reduction in hood and belt lines to accentuate a longer, fleetier appearance. At the same time, passenger room has been increased.

First V8 engine offered on a Chevrolet in 35 years. Named the "Turbo-Fire V8," the V8 delivers 162 horsepower.

Higher horsepower ratings and new quietness and smoothness in two "Blue Flame" sixes. Engines are of the traditional valve-in-head design, which in the last few years has won virtually 100 per cent acceptance by other makes. A 123-horsepower engine is available with the manual gearshift. The six built exclusively for the Powerglide automatic transmission now develops 136 horsepower.

Integrated body and frame design. An important reduction in vibration has been effected and weight saved. The frame is more rectangular and twist-resistant. With a scientific repositioning of mounts and the utmost application of rubber insulation, the body is isolated from road shocks to an unusual degree.

Front and rear suspensions revamped. Added riding comfort and roadability, Chevrolet states, are assured by vastly improved suspensions. At the front, a modern version of the ball-joint design aids car handling and steering as well as comfort. One improvement new to the industry is a control arm geometry that cancels out most of the objectionable "dive" that often accompanies brake stops.

Increased safety through greater visibility. Every car window of safety plate glass — front, rear and side — is larger in 1955 Chevrolet bodies.

Optional overdrive. An overdrive installation will be offered for the first time. Engine speed reduction of more than 20% is accomplished by the overdrive which automatically cuts in when the foot is lifted off the accelerator above 31 miles an hour.

Tubeless tires for increased safety. The casing remains the same, but instead of an inner tube, interior surfaces are coated with a butyl "skin" for sealing. Blowouts are resisted and deflation slower with punctures.

Smother power application. The torque tube drive is replaced by a hotchkiss drive to deliver power more smoothly to the rear wheels and to provide a "fatter" ride in combination with the longer springs.

Easier steering. From power steering, an improved version of which is available on 1955 cars, Chevrolet has adopted the recirculating ball-nut gear and combined it with a relay type of linkage that increases smoothness and reduces driver effort. A more rigid wheel coupling and truer geometry is also claimed.

Most distinguishing mark of the new Chevrolet bodies is their low-slung silhouette and vertical windshield pillars. Broad, flat hood and trunk lids are approximately three and one-half inches lower than last year while the high, straight crown of the fenders enhances an impression of fleetness and agility. The design gives the cars the appearance of much greater length although wheelbases remain un-

## Henry Schacht Is Injured Saturday

Henry Schacht, farmer living two miles west of Lockney, was injured seriously last Saturday morning when struck by the blade of a stalk shredder which he was operating. His left arm was broken between the elbow and the shoulder and the elbow was badly broken and mangled. He is receiving treatment at the Medical-Surgical Hospital here.

Members of the family said Wednesday afternoon that the condition of the arm had improved greatly in the past 24 hours and attending physicians said that he would have a usable arm when the wounds healed. Both hands were cut and bruised but not badly injured in the accident.

Mr. Schacht, accompanied by his son, John Paul, was operating the stalk shredder in a field on the Schacht farm. The belt was slipping and Mr. Schacht was applying belt dressing to the belt when in some manner his arm was pulled into the blade.

John Paul quickly shut off the machine which probably saved his father's life, it was said.

Mr. Schacht, who has been active in school, church and community affairs in this area for many years, was unable to have visitors Wednesday but his condition was improving.

## Trick Or Treat Callers Seek Money For CROP

The young people and intermediates of the two churches will meet at the Baptist Church and leave from there while the primary and junior boys and girls will meet at the Methodist Church and go from there. They will each carry an empty milk carton labeled "CROP" in which donations may be made.

## Putting Up Rig For Wildcat Oil Test

Work is underway this week erecting a drilling rig for a wildcat oil test on a plot two miles east and two miles north of Cedar Hill. The test, known as the No. 1 E. B. Howard, was spudded to 300 feet several weeks ago and set and cemented 13 3/8 inch surface casing.

Ralph Abbey and Associates of Dallas have the lease and Three-way Drilling Company of Midland is moving in a rotary rig. The project will go to 9,500 feet or a test of Mississippi.

The test is located on the northeast corner of section 23.

## Cotton Harvest Is Estimated 35-40% Complete

The cotton harvest in North Floyd County is estimated to be between 35% to 40% complete with 16,700 bales ginned up to Tuesday morning. This total was from gins at Lockney, Aiken, South Plains, Sterley and Lone Star. In Lockney the four gins had turned out 7,200 bales Tuesday.

Some areas were ahead of others in the harvesting operations. In the Aiken area probably between 40 and 50% of the crop is in while the late cotton in the Lone Star area is probably not more than 25% harvested. The immediate Lockney area may be about average for the north part of the county or between 35 and 40%.

With this estimate as a basis, North Floyd County is expected to gin in the neighborhood of 40,000 bales compared to approximately 53,000 last year.

Harvesting operations were proceeding at a steady pace this week despite cold weather and some dampness in the air. No moisture had fallen late Wednesday but dampness had brought a decrease in the percentage of lint turnout due to the increase in weight of burs and trash in the cotton. Also grades have started to decline in most cotton in the area.

Whether or not the cold weather of Tuesday night killed the cotton was still a question Wednesday. Some said yes, some said no. The low temperature was about 32 degrees here which is one degree colder than a previous cold spell. If still colder weather comes on Wednesday night it is pretty certain to finish the cotton off.

Some farmers are anxious for a killing frost or cold spell so that they can start stripping their cotton.

## Murder Attempt Charge Is Filed

A negro, V. Z. Hall of Floydada, has been charged with attempted murder after he allegedly shot a Mexican in the right arm with a .410 shotgun early last Sunday morning in the flats at Floydada. The Mexican, Tillford Garza, was seriously but not critically wounded. He is an itinerant farm laborer and has been working for a farmer in east Floyd County.

Hall was arrested at Lawton, Okla., about 5 p. m. Tuesday and Sheriff Earl Cooper went to Lawton Wednesday afternoon to return him to this county. Hall is under a 5-year probated sentence given on another attempted murder charge several months ago.

Two other negro men, J. C. Collier and Johnny Curry, both of Floydada, are in jail at Floydada charged with aiding Hall to escape arrest. The two men were alleged to have carried Hall to Hollis, Okla., following the shooting.

**Two Break-Ins Sunday**  
Thieves continued to take a toll in this county as two Floydada stores were broken into Sunday night. These were Owens Texaco Service Station, where between \$78 and \$79 was stolen and the Vickers Gulf Station where about \$5 was taken.

## VOTERS FACED WITH 4 ISSUES IN GENERAL ELECTION TUESDAY

Floyd County voters will find themselves faced with four separate issues in the general election Tuesday of next week. A better-than-usual vote for general election is expected due to interest in issues other than the party ballot.

First issue, of course, is the general election ballot carrying names of the party nominees for various state offices for the Democratic and Republican parties and a few for the Constitutional party, among them being E. E. Wells of Floyd County, a candidate for the office of State Commissioner of Agriculture.

That the Democratic nominees will be elected is a foregone conclusion and for that reason the voters will be 11 constitutional amendments proposed by the legislature. A definite campaign has been made in favor of some of these amendments and it is expected that some of them will be approved by the voters.

The amendments include these briefly: 1. Increasing the maximum amount that may be paid under the old age assistance law, and aid to dependent children; 2. Authorizing exchange of credits between the teacher retirement system and state employees retirement system; 3. Authorizing an agreement to obtain social security coverage for certain state employees; 4. Authorizing transfer of Confederate pension fund money to a fund to build a state office building; 5. Authorizing the legislature to fix salaries of state officials and raising pay of legislators; 6. Prohibiting the state's credit being used for toll roads; 7. Requiring women to serve on juries; 8. Providing for four-year terms of office for elected officials instead of two-year terms; 9. Authorizing creation of hospital districts in counties more than 100,000 population; 10. Authorizing persons in military service to vote; 11. Authorizing elections in counties of less than 10,000 population to provide for an assessor-collector of taxes.

**\$325,000 Bond Issue**  
Perhaps attracting more interest than any other issue facing Floyd County people is the proposed \$325,000 bond issue which would provide right-of-way for a four lane highway through Floyd County east and west and also from Floydada south to the Crosby county line. The bond issue also provides for paying

for some right-of-way on the farm-to-market road northeast of Cedar to the Motley county line.

The bond issue has been discussed in open meetings in the county and there is definitely a divided opinion on the issue. Leading the fight for the bond issue is the Highway 70 Association, headed by Parnell Powell of Floydada.

Creating opposition to the issue in this immediate area is the Highway Department's plan to cut through in South Lockney, leaving the old highway to the north and requiring the purchasing of some houses and other private property in that area.

The bond issue must carry by a two-thirds majority and for that reason there is some doubt about it being approved.

**Tax Re-Allocation**  
The fourth issue, which apparently has no opposition to speak of, is the Commissioners Court's plan to re-allocate some county taxes. This move is to lower the tax rate for some county funds and raise it an equal amount for others in order to better prorate the county tax money.

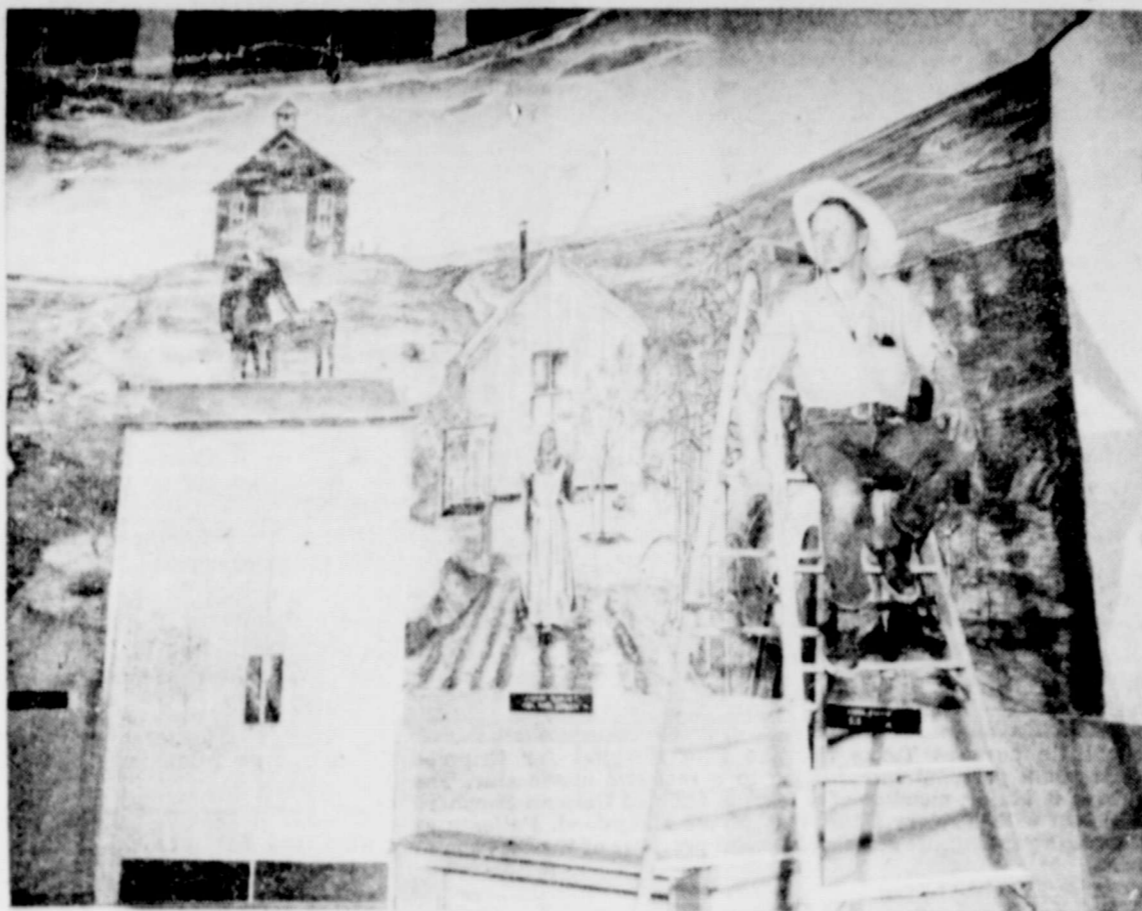
**Floydada Takes District Lead**

### Floyd Polio Victim To 'Keep Date He Couldn't Break'

Floydada. — "You have a date with me you cannot break," the young woman said to the young man who was in a respirator fighting for his life against polio.

The words of his bride-elect proved an inspiration to Curtis Meredith, 20-year old Floydada man, who was stricken with polio but two days before his planned wedding to Miss Shirley Harper, also of Floydada.

Today, Meredith is making plans for the future as he continues on his long road to recovery in West Texas Polio Center at Plainview.

Those plans certainly do include a new wedding date with Shirley Harper, as soon as doctors will permit.

Meredith also talks of reentering college.

"Only the dates of my plans are changed," he said recently. Meredith, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Meredith, entered the polio center Aug. 27 of this year. Things looked dark indeed. He was almost completely paralyzed with the exception of his left hand at that time. Since, he has regained use of his right leg and partial usage of the right hand and made other progress.

According to relatives he is able to walk with aid and is to be fitted soon for leg and body braces.

Doctors believe these will enable him to walk unassisted.

So Curtis Meredith looks forward to a future — one that will perhaps give him a few days at home for Thanksgiving and more — the marriage to Shirley and college.

### Gonzales Foundat'n Plans To Expand Its Treatment Service

Gonzales.—The Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children, acting on the assumption that polio will be a rarity within five years, Monday announced plans to expand its services for treatment of many other crippling diseases.

Dr. Odon Von Werssowetz, chief of staff of the institution, said one type of treatment which also needs attention is the increasing number of paralysis cases resulting from automobile accidents.

Others are cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, arthritis and cases of stroke.

"Time was," Von Werssowetz said, "when the stroke patient was treated at home by being put in a back room and left there. With proper treatment, the average stroke patient can be walking in 60 days."

The new \$900,000 Midland building at the Gonzales foundation was dedicated Sunday with Von Werssowetz the speaker at the ceremony.

The new building will be used as the institution's administrative unit, thus releasing space for 40 extra beds in other buildings.

## Soil Conservation District News

### Water Conservation Increases Cotton Yields

Data collected by the experiment station at Spur, Texas show that yields of cotton have been substantially increased by contouring and terracing. The studies cover a 27 year period, 1927 to 1950. These practices increased water retention and caused deeper penetration of moisture in the soil. They also reduced soil erosion and decreased the likelihood of poor crops and failures in dry years.

The experimental work covers field areas having: Rows with the slope, contour rows, and contour rows with closed level terraces. The three field areas were planted continuously to cotton for 24 years. The soils were largely Abilene clay loam.

which are very similar to our hardland soils here on the High Plains, and were considered fertile but droughty.

An annual record was kept of the rainfall, runoff, yield, value of lint and cottonseed and acre returns for each of the practices.

Contouring alone increased the yield of lint cotton from 122 pounds per acre for straight row farming to 151 pounds, an increase of 24 percent. Annual runoff was reduced by contouring from 2.75 to 1.95 inches. The annual per-acre return in terms of lint and cottonseed for contour farming exceeded that from straight rows by \$6.60.

The use of closed level terraces increased the yield of lint 57 percent over straight row farming. The annual yield of lint on this area was 192 pounds per acre, which is 70 pounds more lint per acre than was obtained from straight rows. The larger yield represents an annual increased value in lint and cottonseed of \$15.47 per acre. There has been no runoff from this area.

Moisture samples to a depth of three feet, taken May 20 of each year from 1930 to 1950, show that the average moisture content on the area with straight rows was 2.54 inches of water available for plant use. On contoured rows, 2.73 inches of

## Soil Conservation News

### Stubble Mulch Farming

Stubble mulch farming is the practice of leaving as much stubble as possible on the surface of the ground from grain sorghums, wheat, etc. This practice has been shown to accomplish its intended purpose of protecting the soil from erosion by wind and rain. Yields have been increased 10 to 15 percent over the one-way plow.

The ideal implement for stubble mulch tillage is a sweep-type blade, at least 30 inches wide. Allow a 6 inch overlap between sweeps, which gives a spacing between shanks of 24 inches and vertical clearance to permit stubble to pass. Use a coiling coupler ahead of the shank. The implement should be heavy and durable enough to stay in hard ground at a level position to sweep setting and equipped with a power lift.

Either tool-bar mounted sweeps or field cultivators may be used. The larger the sweeps, the more effective for leaving residues on the surface.

The first tillage after harvest on wheat land should be made at the greatest depth, from three to five inches. Succeeding cultivations should be made at a shallower depth to avoid the compact layer called a plowsole or tillage pan which occurs when plowing continuously at the same depth. Varying depths also firm the seed-bed. Tillage at a constant depth, especially when the soil is in a wet, plastic condition, smears the individual soil particles together, destroys pore space, and inhibits replenishment of oxygen in the soil air.

A good practice for handling land in fallow is to use delayed fallow, which is cultivation not commenced until the first crop of weeds develops in the spring following harvest. This eliminates about 35 percent of the expense of cultivation, in comparison with the usual way of fallowing, and has been found to give just as high yields. The undisturbed stubble, plus fall weed growth, gives the best possible protection during the winter blow period and places the soil in a remarkable receptive condition for moisture.

Only as a last resort, should the points of the blades be pointed slightly downward to hold the plow in the ground. Extremely hard ground may warrant a setting to keep sweeps plowing instead of riding out.

Rains do not generally reset weeds unless they come within a 24 hour period after cultivation.

In most years wheat can be drilled with any type drill desired. In years when there is an exceptionally large amount of straw, a disc drill will become clogged, and it will be better to use a deep-furrow type drill. Wheat drilled under the mulch will be less bothered by crusting if rains occur between seeding and emergence of the crop.

In preparing row crop land, the stubble mulch sweep implement can be used for all pre-planting operations up to that time the crop is listed. Where sorghums are planted with a grain drill, surface residue can be maintained, throughout the growth of the crop. Stubble mulching of irrigated land is just as important as on dryland. It speeds up water intake and reduces evaporation. This is one of the most important soil and water conservation practices in use today.

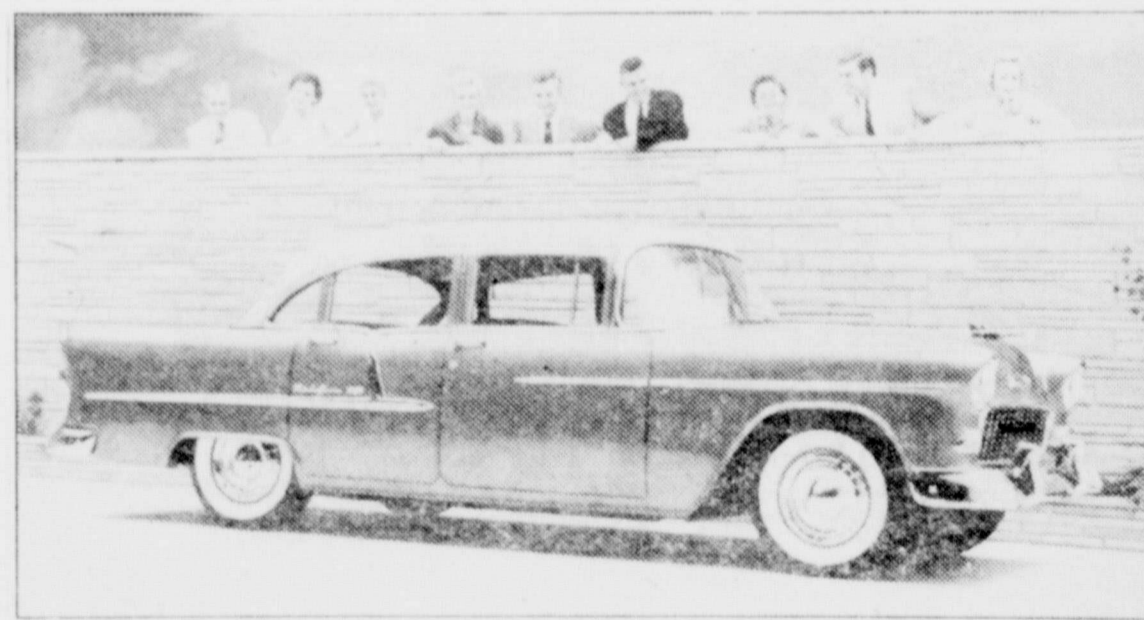

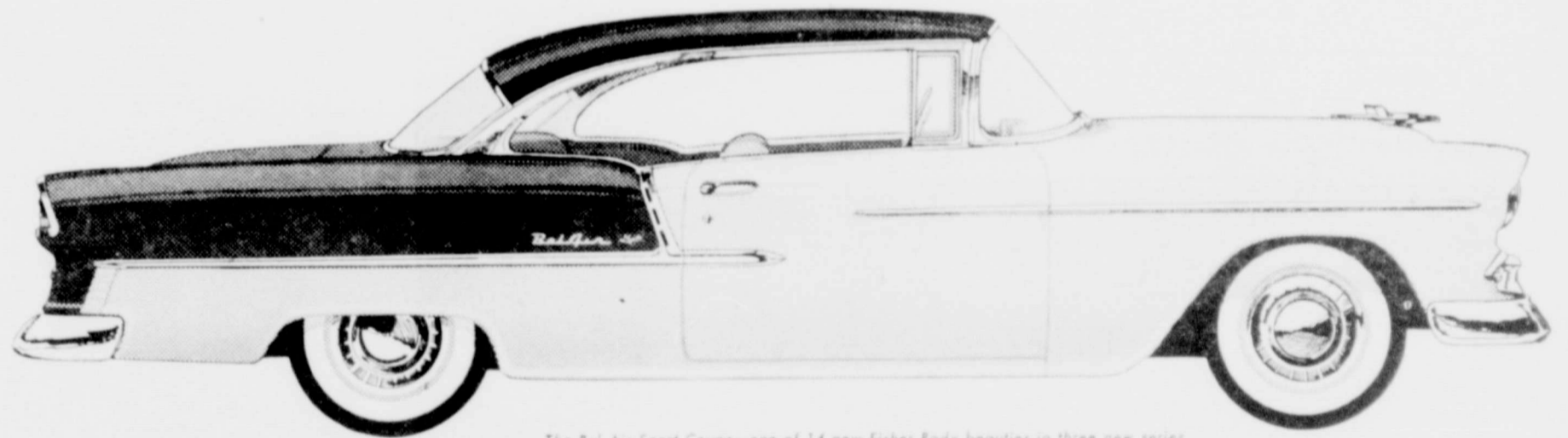

## Minute Editorials

Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself. — Matt. 22:39.

**YOU BETTER GO VOTE** if you don't want to wake up the morning of November 3rd and find that your fellow voters have approved something you're not in favor of or have disapproved something you wanted to be approved. The fact that most folks stay away from the polls on general election day shouldn't be such a habit that you'll stay away this year. Especially in old Floyd County people go to the polls because we will not only vote on the various party candidates for office but will either approve or disapprove 11 constitutional amendments and do the same to a \$325,000 bond issue. Also there is a proposition to re-allocate taxes.

**SO WE SAY** that if you don't go to the polls next Tuesday and vote your sentiments on the various questions that face the people of this county, then you have no right to complain about the results of the elections. The matter of party candidates will be a minor one, it appears, since it is a foregone conclusion that the Democratic party candidates will be elected. However, you might be at odds with one or two party candidates and want to voice your objection and if so,

this is your opportunity. The 11 constitutional amendments have been discussed in The Beacon and in other newspapers. By now you should have enough information concerning the amendments you know about which ones you will vote for. Don't take the blind prejudice way out and vote against all of them. Some are important to the welfare of our state government and should be approved.

**THEN YOU MUST DECIDE** whether or not you will approve the \$325,000 bond issue to provide right-of-way for a 4-lane highway through the county and some other right-of-way on farm-to-market roads. The matter has been discussed and explained through the county newspapers and at open meetings in the county. If you are not informed on the bond issue you should be, and you can still get the information you need to make up your mind as to how you will vote. The Beacon will not propose to tell you how to vote since you are as capable of knowing about this issue as anyone.

**THE LAST MATTER** to be decided is the re-allocation of taxes. This is a plan whereby some tax money now going to one fund in this county will be allocated to another fund. There will be no change in the county tax rate. Since the Commissioners Court is handling the business affairs of the county, they probably are better informed than anyone else on the tax needs of the county and we can see no reason why we should not heed their request and vote approval of this re-allocation plan.

**SPEAKING OF THINGS POLITICAL.** The Beacon is in the wrong congressional district to campaign on some paid political advertising this fall. Up in District 18, one Mr. Pete LeMaster is running for Congress on the Republican ticket against Mr. Walter Rogers, the Democratic candidate and he is really going after the job. Mr. LeMaster is a very nice personality. He used to be a Democrat but couldn't stomach the Dem's socialistic leanings during the Truman administration and changed his party affiliation. While we would like very much to get on Mr. LeMaster's advertising schedule, we realize that we're in the wrong district. And while we're a firm believer in newspaper advertising we still doubt if it is effective enough to elect a Republican to congress from the Amarillo district. Anyway it was a nice try.

A land deal was consummated last week in which W. T. Bickley of Electra and J. F. Bickley of Hunt County purchased from Wm. McGehee nine hundred and sixteen acres of farm land near Lockney. The consideration was

\$34 per acre or an aggregate sum of \$32,000 all cash. These men were friends of W. F. Nance, who bought here a few months ago and was instrumental in interesting his friends in this section of the Plains.

#### October 30, 1924

Funds have been raised for placing of the Willie Landrum memorial in Lockney cemetery. Arrangements are now being made for unveiling program to be held at the cemetery Sunday, Nov. 9 at 2 o'clock Willie Landrum was the only Lockney soldier to fall on the battlefields of France.

#### October 30, 1942

## THIS PERSUASION COMETH NOT FROM ABOVE

It is a common saying that one name in religion is as good as any other, and that a "rose by any other name would smell as sweet." In direct contradiction of that, the Bible says salvation is in the name of Christ, and in that name alone. "Neither is there any other name under heaven given among men wherein we must be saved." (Acts 4:12.)

By no authority of scripture or reason has this doctrine been passed around that "there is nothing in a name, and one name in religion is just as good as another." This ridiculous teaching runs exactly counter to all that the word of God says on the subject.

The Bible says that we offer our prayers to God in the name of Christ. "If ye ask anything in my name, that will I do." (John 14:14.)

The enemies of Christ knew there is something in a name, so they opposed the apostles' speaking in the name of Christ. "But that it spread no further among the people, let us threaten them, that they speak henceforth to no man in this name. And they called them, and charged them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus." (Acts 4:17, 18.)

There is so much in the name that the apostles were glad that they were counted worthy to suffer for it. "They therefore departed from the council, rejoicing that they were counted worthy to suffer for the Name." (Acts 5:41.)

We are told to glorify God in behalf of the name of Christ, or in that name. "If any man suffer as a Christian, let him not be ashamed, but let him glorify God in this name." (1 Peter 4:12.)

We are to assemble in the name of Christ. "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." (Matt. 18:20.)

So important is the name, this "name that is above every name," that the Bible tells us that we are baptized into this name. "They were baptized into the name of the Lord Jesus." (Acts 19:5.)

Since we find from the plain testimony of the word of God that the name is so important, other considerations arise. We find that salvation is in the name, prayer must be offered in the name, all our service to God is to be offered in the name, we suffer in the name, and for it, and we are told that we are to gather together in the name.

Now here is the point, since all these things are and must be in the name of Christ; how can a man be saved without the name? He cannot be. But how can it be that he does things in the name. He is baptized into it. That is just another reason why a person cannot please God, cannot be saved, cannot enter the kingdom of God without being baptized.

## COLD MEAT TREAT

Here is an interesting sauce to serve with cold ham, tongue or corned beef. Beat one cup of heavy cream until very stiff. Add — and beat in — 1/4 cup drained, prepared horseradish. 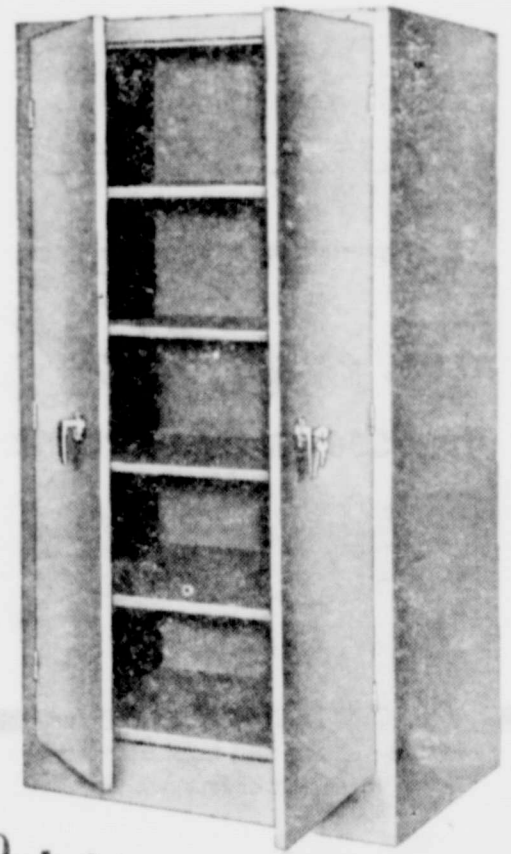

A result of years of research and hundreds of thousands of miles of severe testing, the valve-in-head V8 carries a compression ratio of 8 to 1 and a displacement of 265 cubic inches. The engine is exceedingly compact with a bore of 3.75 and a stroke of 3 inches.

Although Chevrolet has had V8s under experiment since it tried out this design in 1917-19, the "Turbo-Fire V8" entails basic re-design in the last three years. Engineers sought the compactness of a short crankshaft with the power of large displacement.

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
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
