Minute Editorials

Then I told them of the Hand of my God, which was good upon me.—Nehemiah 2:18.

MRS. FLOYD HUFF is anxious to get some satisfactory water system at the Lockney Cemetery. Spring is here and the time for flowers, grass and shrubs is almost upon us. If we are to have a beautiful cemetery this summer, as Mrs. Huff points out, certainly we must have an adequate water supply there. The Beacon editor is not familiar with the situation but he thinks that the people who have loved ones buried there will provide whatever is necessary to get water to the cemetery if they are told of the need and a good plan is presented. If you are interested in a water system talk it over with Ed Carter, the general president of the Cemetery Association or some other officer. Tell them what you'll do to help. Time is short and something needs to be done soon.

HOUSE BILL 844 is a piece of legislation designed to allow the State Education Agency to provide educational film for the purpose of instruction in the free schools of Texas. The cost of the film program is to come from the Minimum Foundation School Program and each school will be allowed 50 cents per average daily attendance. The value of educational film as a teaching tool has already been proven by the Armed Forces, by industry and business and by schools in

other states. We think that our state is actually a little late in getting into the film method of education and we trust that the State Legislature will pass the bill and make possible the setting up of this type of teaching program.

WE MIGHT SAY, in regard to H. R. 841 mentioned above, that it has the approval of State Board of Education, and the Texas Congress of Parents and Teachers. If you have opportunity it would be well for you to let your representative or state senator know how you feel about the bill.

CROP SURPLUSES have a way of righting themselves at times. Surely the wheat surplus will be lowered considerably this year if the Texas crop is any barometer of national conditions. According to a report from the Texas Employment Commission 11% less wheat acreage was planted this year than last in Texas. This is 28% less than the average per year. To make matters worse, of the 66 wheat-producing counties in Texas, only 10 report wheat conditions as good, 30 report a normal crop in prospect and 26 report conditions very poor. Especially in the Panhandle-South Plains area is the condition of wheat very poor. Insect infestation is adding to the wheat farmers woes and many a farmer will never even get his seed back. In this immediate area The Beacon editor judges this to be the poorest wheat prospects he has seen in his 12 years on the plains.

WE HAVE BEEN HEARING reports for some time that farm land prices are going down. Now comes a report from the Department of Agriculture that beginning in February the farm land prices in the Southwest, Midwest and Pacific Coast regions reversed its downward trend and is now on the rise again. This is attributed to the trend toward larger farms, the experts say, and some are advocating the stopping of farm support prices in order to discourage the trend toward larger and larger farms.

CONCERNING CROP ALLOTMENTS, it may surprise you to know that Texas has 42% of the entire cotton allotment for the nation for 1955. This information comes from Senator Price Daniel's weekly newsletter. In reporting on the defeat last week of the bill to increase cotton allotments he laid it to the adding of an amendment which would increase wheat allotments also. He points out that 18,000 farms in Central and East Texas have less than 5 acres cotton allotments. In West Texas we have nearly 2 million acres of irrigated cotton land, more than California, New Mexico, Nevada and Arizona combined.

HE DIDN'T LEARN

The answer to the oft-asked question, "How silly can they get?" is sometimes found in statements of people in high station in Washington. For example, take the "plea" made to President Eisenhower by Sen. Robert Kerr, of Oklahoma, that atomic weapons be banned if the U. S. is forced into military action to defend Quemoy and the Matsus.

One would think that every person in the country learned through Korea, the bitter lesson that a war can't be fought suc-

cessfully under "ground rules." One of the principal reasons Senator Kerr's own Democratic party took such a shelling in the 1952 elections stemmed from the fact that the Truman-Acheson administration forced American fighting men to face the Reds with one hand tied behind their backs — which stupid, indefensible policy resulted in the loss of the war, dishonor to the nation and, worse, death to many of our young men. But Senator Kerr didn't learn the lesson along with the rest of us. He wants to put other handicaps on our troops if, or when, they may be called to battle further aggression by the Red Chinese.

One of the reasons the Red Chinese haven't already started toward Formosa by way of

Quemoy and the Matsus is because of the threat of our atomic power. Yet the bombastic, voluble Oklahoman would invite them to "come on" by having the President "pledge that we shall use no atomic weapons" in any defense of those strategic islands.

How silly can they get? Senator Kerr's plea offers a sorry answer. — Lubbock Avalanche.

IS BAPTISM ESSENTIAL?

If we could listen to modern theology for authority on the subject of baptism there would be no further need for discussion, but this is not a topic to be settled by theologians. Baptism is strictly a New Testament theme, and to the New Testament we must go for our instruction.

Christ is our exemplar in all matters religious. What was his attitude toward this subject? Then cometh Jesus from Galilee to the Jordan unto John, to be baptized of him. But John would have hindered him, saying, I have need to be baptized of thee, and comest thou to me? But Jesus answering said unto him, Suffer it now; for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness. Then he suffereth him. And Jesus, when he was baptized, went up straightway from the water. . . . Matt. 3:13-17. Could we dare minimize the importance of something Christ himself insisted upon practicing?

Not only was Christ baptized of John in the River Jordan, but he commanded his disciples to baptize others. Just before he ascended back to the Father he gave to his apostles a commission in which baptism is emphasized. "Go ye therefore, and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them into the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I commanded you: and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28:19-20. "And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to the whole creation. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that disbelieveth shall be condemned." Mark 16:15-16.

A third consideration is the fact that Christ not only set the example, and not only commanded the apostles to baptize believers, but that the New Testament church actually practiced it. About three thousand were baptized on Pentecost; the Samaritans, both men and women, were baptized; the Ethiopian eunuch was baptized; Saul of Tarsus was baptized; Lydia and her household were baptized; the Philippian jailer and his household were baptized; the Corinthians were baptized and others.

Baptism is the consummating act that puts one into Christ or that makes one a Christian. Could it be unimportant? "For as many of you as were baptized into Christ did put on Christ." Gal. 3:27. "For in one Spirit were we all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, whether bond or free; and were all made to drink of one Spirit." 1 Cor. 12:13. And Rom. 8:1 states: "There is therefore now no condemnation to them that are IN Christ Jesus." And Paul tells us in Eph. 1:3 that every spiritual blessing is IN Christ.

If it isn't essential to be IN Christ, then baptism isn't essential; but, if we want to avoid condemnation, we must be IN Christ. And we got into Christ through baptism. If it isn't essential to have our sins remitted, then baptism isn't essential. Saul of Tarsus was commanded to be baptized in order that his sins might be washed away. Acts 22:16. Peter says in 1 Pet. 3:21 that baptism saves us. If baptism isn't essential, then salvation isn't essential.

Crazy Uranium Company Finds Bones, Snakes

Floydada. — The Crazy Uranium Company of Texas may never find any uranium, but modern and prehistoric snake business is good.

The company, organized by a group of Floydada men, is paying for bulldozing and coring operations on a 320-acre mineral lease in Dickens County.

Their most promising find, thus far, is the upper jaw bone of a phytosaur, prehistoric reptile that looked somewhat like an alligator.

Yellowish dirt in the phytosaur tooth cavities "makes a Geiger counter go crazy," the prospectors said. They therefore are planning to continue digging, although analysis of ore samples has not been very encouraging.

The first digging on the lease unearthed a big den of rattlesnakes.

The prehistoric bones were identified by a West Texas State College paleontologist.

The Crazy Uranium Company was organized by M. P. Goen, Cecil Hagood, Richard F. Stovall, and G. A. Cardinal of Floydada. They later took in 15 or 20 associates.

U. S. Farm Exports Up 15% Over A Year Ago

College Station. — U. S. farm exports were 15 per cent higher for the period July to February compared with the same period 12 months earlier.

This country's farm shipments for the first eight months of the current fiscal year are estimated at about \$2.2 billion against \$1.9 billion for the July-February period of 1953-54, reports John G. McHaney, extension farm economist.

This is the second straight year that farm exports have exceeded the previous year.

Grains and feeds were the only major commodity groups falling below the previous year's level. The other major groups—cotton, tobacco, vegetable fats and oils and livestock and livestock products were all ahead. Most impressive gains for individual commodities were made

by cotton, cottonseed oil, flaxseed and lard.

Among the grains, larger shipments of wheat flour, barley and grain sorghums offset part of the losses in rice and corn exports, the economist says.

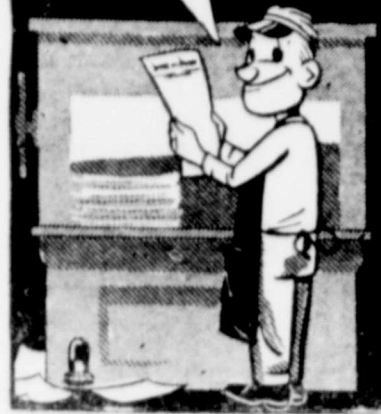
