## Fires Take Toll In This Area

Fires took their toll in this area the past week, with several different fires doing damage but none causing large losses.

Most damage was done by a fire at the farm home of Mrs. Mary Simmons last Friday at noon. A brooder house was destroyed and with it 140 baby chicks, a quantity of grain, a cotton trailer loaded with bundles of feed.

Mrs. Simmons said that origin of the fire was unknown unless the electric brooder shorted out and started the fire. She estimated the loss at least \$1,000.

The home is located four miles north and a mile east of Lockney.

On Tuesday morning a fire at the Lockney Trading Post here destroyed a chicken house, a brooder house and a barn with a large quantity of used furniture, used clothing, bedding, etc. Mrs. Mary Hutton said Wednesday that she was unable to determine the loss but estimated it at several hundred dollars.

A dog and several chickens were burned to death in the barn and the high winds caused the fire to threaten nearby buildings until it was brought under control by the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department. Origin of the fire was undetermined.

A fire at the home of Mrs. Pearl Prickett in West Lockney last Saturday afternoon burned a fence and burned part of an old barn but caused no material damage, Mrs. Prickett said. The fire was started from a cigarette thrown along the fence row. Mrs. Prickett thought.

**Cretney Loss \$75,000**  
Lockney wasn't the only town suffering fire losses however. A big fire at Cretney Drug in Plainview Monday night did \$75,000 damage to the building and stock and also damaged adjoining stores, it was reported.

This is the first year for these students to submit material, Mrs. Zeigler said. Additional interest in the work is being shown by students now writing in preparation for next year's entries.

Value of the missing grain is estimated at between \$450 and \$500.

## Deposits Are Up Nearly 2 Million

Total deposits in the First National Bank of Lockney are up nearly two million dollars over a similar period last year, according to the statement of condition published by the bank in this issue of The Beacon.

Total deposits as published in the statement at the close of business on April 11 were \$5,361,514.38 as compared to \$3,778,735.72 at the close of business on April 15, 1954. This represents an increase of \$1,582,778.66 over the previous year.

## 193 Given Polio Shots Tuesday

The new Salk polio vaccine was given to 193 first and second grade pupils here Tuesday morning. Drs. W. J. Mangold, G. A. McClelland and K. O. Crum and members of their staffs worked in the clinic set up by School Nurse Mrs. Ethel Miles and completed the job in a short while. Other local people assisted also in the vaccine project.

Mrs. Miles said Wednesday that "co-operation was wonderful" and that "everything went like clockwork." Barry Barker, who was chairman of the March of Dimes drive last January and is a member of the county polio committee, went to Floydada Monday and brought back the vaccine for this part of the county. Barry was on hand also Tuesday morning and handed each student a "polio fighter" balloon after they had received their shot. Mrs. Miles said that there were very few tears among the students. One little boy fainted but was quickly revived.

**Another Chance**  
Children in these two grades who did not receive a shot Tuesday due to their parents failure to fill out a request slip will have one more chance to receive this first shot on Friday morning of this week, Mrs. Miles said. Local doctors have agreed to come back to the school between 9 and 11 a. m. and give shots to the ones who missed them Tuesday. The school nurse is expecting "about 25" she said.

However this will be the last opportunity for first and second graders to receive a shot from vaccine furnished by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis and if they fail to receive it Friday they must thereafter look to their family physician to receive it.

Of the 193 receiving shots here Tuesday, 18 came from the Providence school, 13 came from Lone Star and 13 came from the colored school here. These rural pupils in the first and second grades which failed to receive a first shot Tuesday may also come in Friday and get it. Mrs. Miles said.

**Second Shot In Two Weeks**  
The second shot of the famed vaccine will be given the local children in two weeks, probably about May 3rd or 4th Mrs. Miles said. The final shot will be given seven months following the second which will be next December.

Mrs. Miles said that one second grade section in the local school had received the shot 100% but that each of the other rooms had several students who had not received it.

The vaccine for the first and second grade students is furnished without charge by the National Foundation from March of Dimes funds.

**No Vaccine Available Here At Present**

A check with local physicians Wednesday showed that no polio vaccine was available here at present through regular channels. One local doctor received a small amount but it was gone quickly. Physicians were not sure when they might receive the vaccine but were hoping to have some in soon.

## Christy Suffers Broken Leg Sat.

F. A. Christy of Plainview, who is operating an asphalt paving project here, suffered a badly broken left leg Saturday of last week when a Ford tractor driven by one of his employees backed into him. The draw bar on the tractor crushed his leg against a wall when the operator accidentally threw the tractor into reverse.

The right leg was badly bruised but attending physicians did not think the bone was broken. He is receiving treatment in the Medical & Surgical Hospital here. Mr. Christy's crew has been working on paving projects at the Methodist Church and on North Main Street during the two weeks.

**FLY-BY-NIGHT SOLICITORS** and salesmen continue to take their toll in this area. Residents both in Lockney and the rural areas are falling victims to slick talking salesmen who promise much more than they deliver most of the time. It shouldn't take grown folks too long to learn that the way to buy anything you may need is to purchase it from an established merchant or professional man. Then if something is wrong with the product you can carry it back for adjustment. The person who is here today and gone tomorrow is a poor risk with your money regardless of what you may be buying.

**IF LOCAL BUSINESS** people, and both town and rural residents will demand to see a letter of recommendation from the Lockney Chamber of Commerce and Board of Development before they purchase from traveling salesmen or solicitors then they will probably save themselves from being defrauded. The C. C. has a committee set up to investigate solicitors and salesmen as to the value of their cause or product and those which are unworthy will not receive a letter from the committee. Too, this practice will force all solicitors to contact the committee before they start work and thus prevent the salesman from offering his wares unless he has submitted proof of their worth beforehand. Co-operation will wipe out this sort of thing.

**USEFULNESS—A YARD STICK.** The workman who enjoys his work and gets part of his pay out of a job well done, is a success. 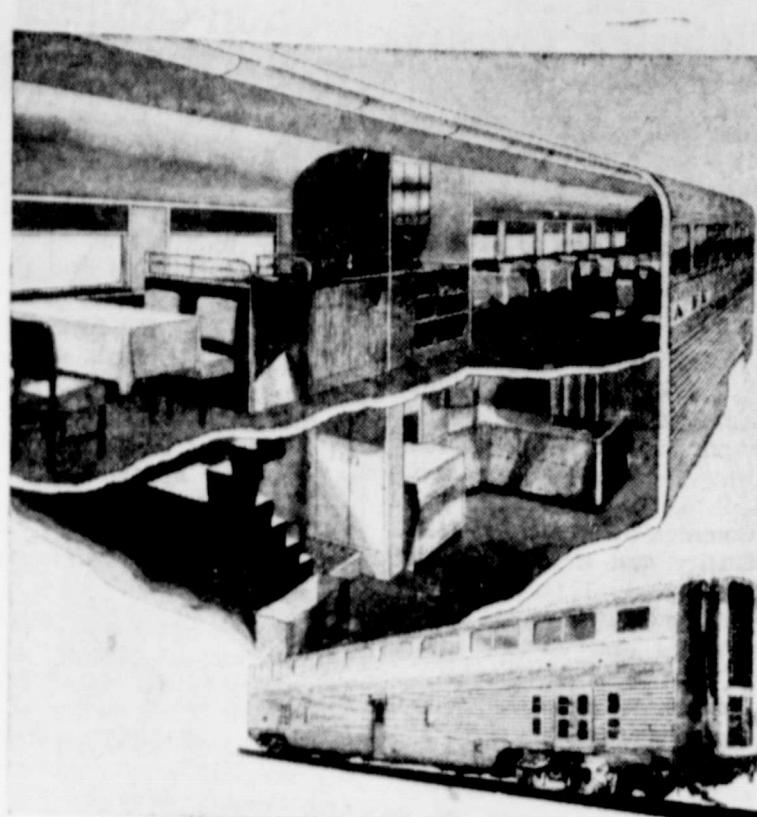

**Cotton Ginners  
Keep Pace With  
Improvements**

College Station. — Texas cotton ginners today are operating plants designed and equipped to give cotton producers the best possible grades. But fifteen years ago, says E. H. Bush, extension cotton gin specialist, 25 percent of the state's cotton was docked by buyers because of rough preparation. In the past few years, he adds, this figure has dropped to less than half of one percent for all cotton ginned in Texas.

Bush believes the widespread interest among ginners in the Seven Step Cotton Improvement Program is a big factor in this record. One of the seven steps in the program covers harvesting and ginning practices. Ginners during this same time, points out the specialist, have faced new problems brought on by the rapid spread of machine harvesting and regulations to control the pink bollworm.

These problems have been met by the installation of additional seed cotton cleaning and conditioning equipment and through educational training meetings for gin operators and employees. During the past year Bush used 93 7-Step and Ginners meetings in presenting his information aimed at further improving the ginning job and cutting costs. He made recommendations to individual ginners for machinery improvements totaling almost a half million dollars.

It has been estimated that work done by the extension cotton gin specialists amounts to an additional three million dollars each year for Texas cotton

The 1740 cotton gins in Texas have an estimated value of \$147,445,000 and a modern plant equipped to gin cotton under almost any condition may rep-

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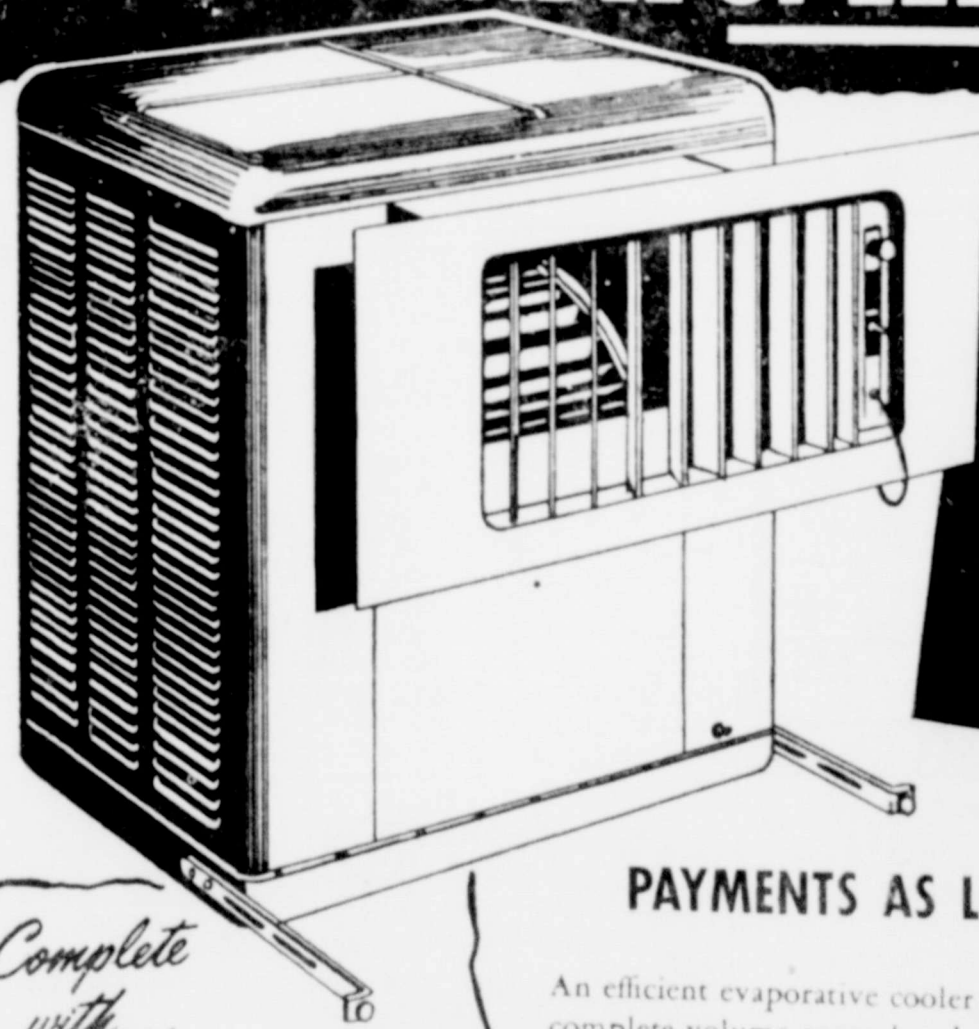

**Farm Bureau Pay 50% Dividend**

Announcement of a 50 per cent dividend on auto insurance premiums by the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance Company means a savings of \$20,017.50 to farmers of Floyd County, according to President Chester Carthel of the Floyd County Farm Bureau.

The farm leader said that 725 Farm Bureau members in the county would receive dividend payments. The amount each receives will be half of the amount of his premiums paid during the one-year period ending March 31, 1955. Dividends will be paid in semi-annual payments, as policies come up for renewal.

This is the second year that Farm Bureau members in Texas have received 50 per cent dividends on their auto insurance premiums. W. R. Puckett, service agent for the County Farm Bureau, said that the dividends were made possible because farmers and ranchers were found to be preferred risks.

Since the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Company began providing low cost insurance for Farm Bureau members in Texas, the premium rates for all farmers have decreased 20 per cent, he said. The company was able to declare a dividend again this year in spite of the fact that the premium rate to farmers living on the farm was lowered by 15 per cent a year ago, he added.

The 50 per cent dividend totals \$1,600,000 for the entire State. Some 37,000 policy holders in Texas will reap this savings. The dividend became effective April 1, 1955.

Texas is one of six Southern States served by the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance Company. The others are Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina. The Farm Bureau in these States own and control the Company. Assets of the Company at the end of 1954 totaled \$12,128,401.54.

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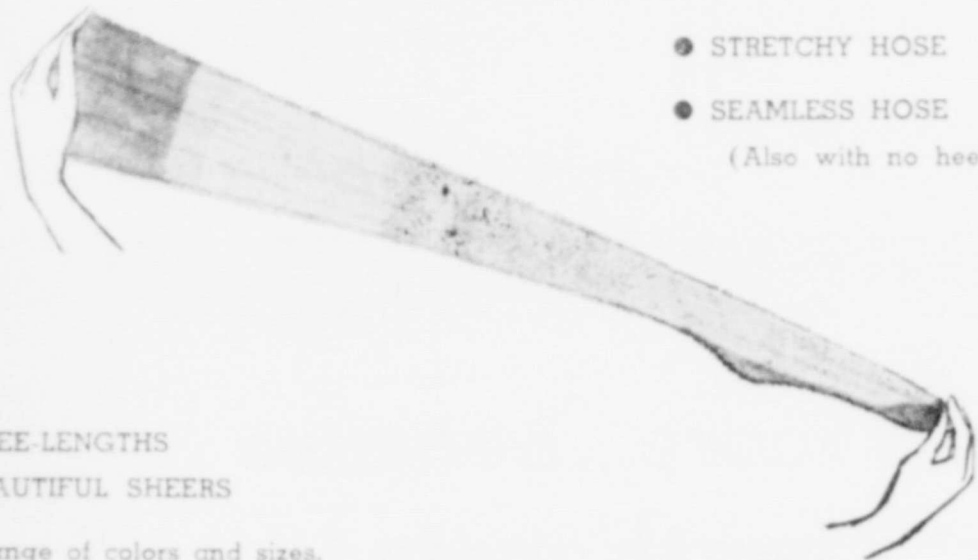

### THE VALUE OF A SOUL

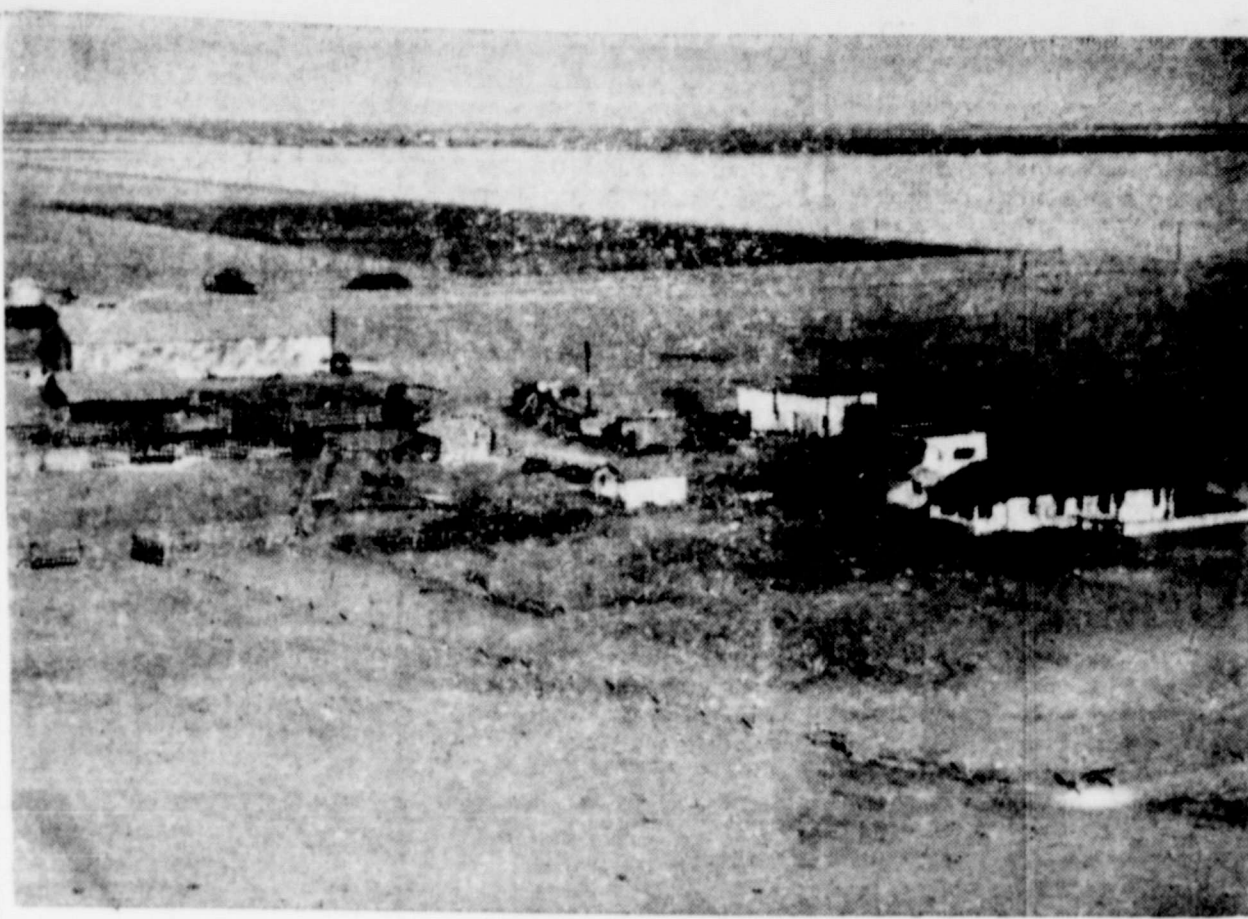
For just a moment think seriously on the value of a soul—your own. The value of a thing may be determined by its relation to something else. In seeking to impress upon the minds of the disciples the value of a soul and to challenge their thinking, Jesus said, "For what will a man be profited, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his soul (life), or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul (life)." (Matt. 16:26.)

The word "soul" refers to the life of the individual, the whole of his life. Though in a faint message, one can hereby grasp something of the value of his soul as God views it—it is worth more than "all the world."

Another indication of the value and worth of a soul may be determined by the price Christ paid to redeem it. God just as much to redeem one soul as it will all that will be redeemed. The writer of Hebrews said, "But he who hath been made a little lower than the angels, even Jesus, because of the suffering of death crowned with glory and honor, that by the grace of God should taste death for every man" (Heb. 2:9). All the sacrifice involved in leaving His Father's home, all the loneliness of being misunderstood by the world He came to save, all the suffering of humiliation and the cross, is summed up in this passage, and is an expression of the value placed by God upon one soul; for it is the price God paid to redeem it.

Surely, in the face of such an evaluation as that declared by Jesus, and the price paid by the Father to redeem it, one cannot afford to throw away such a precious possession upon the empty and fleeting baubles of this world. In the service of Christ, let the soul be fashioned for fellowship with God, and prepared to spend eternity with Him. — Selected.

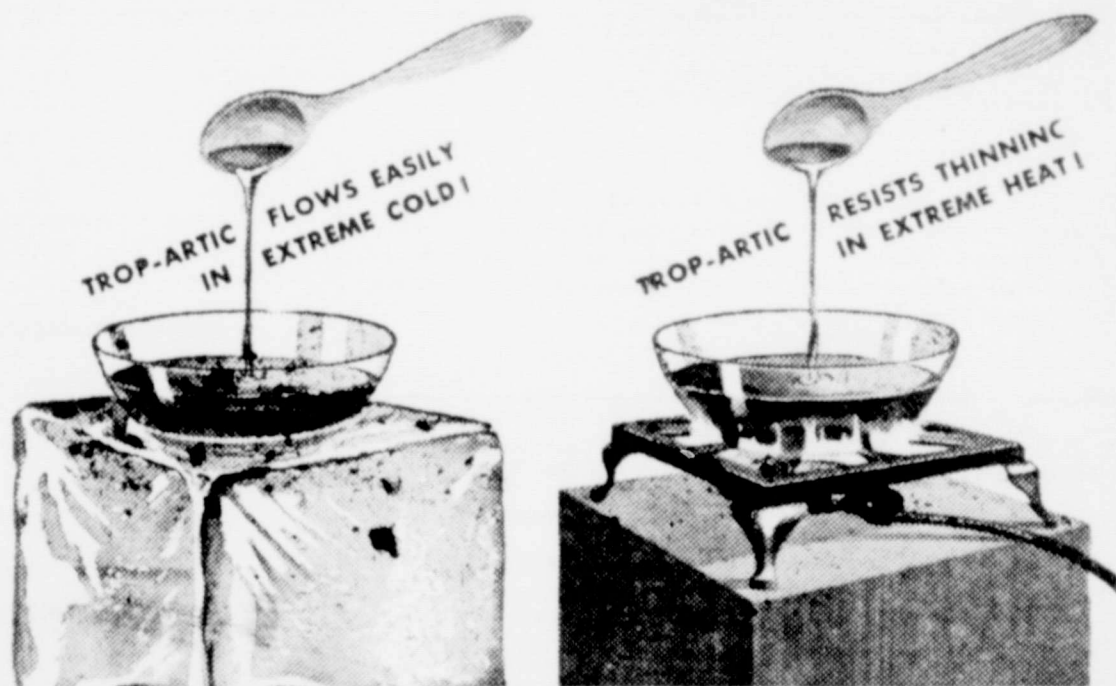
