## Addition Begun For School Ag And Music Hall

Work has begun on a 30x50 addition to the Lockney High School agriculture and music building. The concrete foundation has been poured and construction is expected to proceed very soon on the remainder of the building.

Supt. W. C. Irons said that the 30x50 addition was being built to house a shop department for the Lockney Vocational Agriculture Department. When this is completed the present shop will be moved out of the old building, the partition removed and the 22x30 room added to the present band room, giving that department an additional 660 square feet of floor space. The entrance to the band hall will be changed from the north side to the east side, storage space for uniforms will be built in the hall as will be cabinets for music.

The entire building will receive a new layer of wood siding, the windows will be weatherstripped and walks will be run to make the buildings easily accessible. The entire program will give both the agriculture department and the band department much better places in which to meet as well as considerable more room.

School maintenance men are doing the work on the building and the school district will be able to pay for the construction from the regular budget this year, Mr. Irons said.

### Grade School Paving

An improvement program is also underway on the grade school play grounds. An area 123 feet by 90 feet is being covered with an asphalt paving. The area is the one on which the old school building which burned some years ago stood and the old foundations have been in the way for some years as it has the rock and broken tile which filled the basement of the burned building. The area has been a highly unsatisfactory play ground and for that reason the old foundations have been broken off below the ground, the rock and tile covered and a 6 inch layer of caliche laid over the area. Two coats of asphalt were run over the caliche and the area laid to drain south and west. This project will do away with an unsightly and unsatisfactory play ground area as well as provide a dry surface for playing during wet weather, Mr. Irons said.

## Rev. Sidney Johnston Dies At Floydada

Floydada. — Funeral services for the Rev. Sidney T. Johnston, 54, pastor of the Calvary Baptist Church here, were conducted Wednesday in the Calvary Baptist Church.

Burial was in the Floydada Cemetery under the direction of the Harmon Funeral Home.

The Rev. Mr. Johnston died Sunday night in the Peoples Hospital of Floydada following a long illness.

He had served in the pastorate at Calvary Baptist Church more than two years. He resided in the McCoy community where he also farmed.

A native of Hollis, Okla., he moved to Shamrock when he was three years old. He attended Wayland College and came to Floyd County in 1938.

Surviving him are his wife, two sons, Carrol of Plainview and Seth, who is stationed at Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock; one daughter, Mava Janece of the home; his father, Bryant Johnston Sr., Shamrock; three brothers, Bryant Jr. of Shamrock, Everett of Lamar, Colo., and E. K. of Guyton, Okla.; three sisters, Mrs. L. S. Shipley of Pampa, Mrs. Melvin Asberry of Groom, and Mrs. Milford Harris of Wellington; and two grandchildren. Pallbearers were L. B. ## Mrs. Brown Was Oldest Person At Annual Reunion

Mrs. Fannie Brown of Lockney, 93 years of age, was the oldest person to register at the 28th annual Floyd County Pioneers reunion Saturday at Floydada.

A total of 541 persons registered as old timers, indicating they had been in the county 25 years or longer. Many of them have been in the county since the latter 1880's and early 1890's.

Registration started at 9:30 a. m. Saturday followed by a talk by H. A. C. Brummett, pioneer Dickens County attorney.

Brummett traced the history of this pioneer settlement from the early 1860's and 70's, when Indians were a problem to settlers, to the days when the first cotton was grown and ginned.

"Cotton grown in this area then had to be taken to Dickens to be ginned, then to Childress to be sold, and brought the great sum of from 2 to 3 cents a pound," Brummett recalled.

The pioneers adjourned to the American Legion Hall for lunch after Brummett's address and the big pioneer parade got underway at 1:30 p. m.

A beautiful float of an old time bonnet and hat, entered by White's Auto Store took first place in the commercial division. Radio Station KFLD's "This is No Bull" float won second place.

In memorial services at 2:30 p. m., tribute was paid to 78 pioneers who died the past year. The tribute was read by John Stapleton. As each name was called out, a red rose was placed on a white cross in memory of the pioneer. Special tribute was paid to Silas E. Duncan, first white child born in Floyd County, and to Claude V. Hall, one of the county's first school teachers. He was a guest speaker at the 1954 reunion.

## Rains Spot Area As Farmers Seek To Replant

Farmers in the area north and west of Lockney were trying to replant cotton this week while rains continued to spot the area and cause another replanting, the third for some.

Rains fell here Monday night and again Thursday afternoon. Some hail fell in the Sterley and Lone Star area Wednesday afternoon but did little damage.

On Monday night only .03 of an inch was measured here, according to Joe Holt, local weather observer, but heavier rains fell north of town. Joe Foster had an inch and a quarter, Durwood Jack about the same amount, Hubert Frizzell reported .8 and Herman Huffman and Leslie Ferguson the same amount.

Norman Caldwell reported an inch and did Charlie Boedeker and reports say that the rain was heavier up in Briscoe County with some getting as much as three and four inches. Sterling Cummings reported .4 in the South Plains area, and C. E. Jarrett at Lone Star reported 1.1 inches. Robert Lee Smith had  $\frac{3}{4}$  at Sterley.

Wednesday afternoon a nice shower fell in Lockney while most areas around reported only a quarter inch. Exception was Sterley where another  $\frac{3}{4}$  inch fell, Robert Lee Smith said.

Mason Davis, who lives east of Sterley, reported 1.2 inches of rain Wednesday afternoon and considerable hail.

Most farmers were busy this week replanting cotton and some have started planting feed where the ground is dry enough. Some have cotton up while in other fields the cotton is just coming up. Some are getting anxious because cotton planting time is drawing to a close and still they have no cotton planted due to wet fields.

## Consumers Will Build Business Building Here

Consumers Fuel Association of Lockney will begin construction probably next week on a new business building, Manager Thurman Davis said Tuesday. The building will be built on the present location of their business.

The Cemetery Association officers are doing a good job. Now if we could manage to get water sufficient to water grass and shrubs at the cemetery, the picture would be complete. We understand a committee is working on this project.

LOCKNEY IS GETTING two new ministers this week. We have a new minister at the Methodist Church and the Assembly of God Church. Preachers are worthwhile citizens of the community and almost always make a contribution to community life that no other professional man can make. Every indication that we can find shows the population of Lockney to be nearing the 2500 mark. That is a magic mark when it comes to town populations. Most big surveys divide towns in the classes of over 2500 and under 2500 population. It will mean much to the town when we reach that mark if we haven't already. Let's get busy on that angle, C-C boys. Maybe a good thorough population survey would surprise us.

THE GUARANTEED annual wage for which Mr. Reuther and his Ford workers are asking is more than apt to affect us all. It can't help but up the price of the manufactured article and when one auto firm gets its the others will more than likely follow suit. What we're saying is that if the guaranteed annual wage comes, we're likely to be paying more for Fords, Chevrolts, Plymouths, Chryslers or any other car we buy than we do now — and maybe quite a bit more. The manufacturing boys have to make a profit just like the rest of us. Speaking for ourselves we're not going to guarantee anybody an annual wage; if we can help it. We figure the auto manufacturers feel the same way.

#### THE JUDGE SCORES A POINT OF TWO

An Associated Press report this week told of a San Francisco judge who ruled "Church Bingo," to be a felony, then added that there appeared to be little difference between social club card games and charity sponsored bingo.

The judge even went a step further and pointed out that he had personally contributed to the violation on some of these occasions. His conclusion, all in all pretty well covers the situation in which many Hereford residents find themselves as the result of frequent bingo games and lotteries sponsored by various organizations over a period of years.

Furthermore, we will have to agree with the judge. Just because a felony is sponsored by a charitable organization, a civic club, or some other reputable group, it cannot be considered legal. The situation would be parallel to a man who stole money, and then gave it to his church; he would still be a thief, regardless of where the money went.

Most people, on the other hand, prefer to construe the selling of chances on food freezers, T.V.'s, mixers and the like as a painless method of extracting donations from people who would still give without the incentive of a prize. Due to the nature of the sponsoring agency, they immediately assume the procedure as harmless. Having sold and

bought a few hundred such gimmicks, we are inclined to agree, but what's more important, so does the sheriff.

In fact, we have often thought how nice it would be if the U. S. Income Tax people would give a chance on each dollar paid through withholding taxes on 10 or 15 pots running from \$100,000 to \$250,000. It would give the tax payer a ray of hope — and they would get most of it back in taxes, anyway.

Back to the judge. He is unquestionably right from a legal standpoint. Gambling is gambling, no matter who the sponsor

Churches and charitable organizations, above all others, should lead the way as law abiding citizens. Each "endorsed violation" actually weakens the moral fibre of our community and of our nation. The problem, if seen through its own true light by most sponsors, will vanish of its own accord.

If it doesn't. Well, we are like the San Francisco judge. We've been a "house man" too many times to raise a justified stink. —Hereford Brand.

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
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## South Plains

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



**Early Control Of Thrip, Fleahoppers Pays Dividends**

College Station. — Early-sea- son cotton insect control paid up to \$108.33 per acre at the Lub- bock Experiment Station in 1954. Insecticide tests at the station included pre-square applications for thrips control and post-sq- are treatments for fleahoppers and thrips control. Toxaphene and dieldrin sprays also were compared in two experiments.

W. L. Owen Jr., entomologist at the station, reports that the pre-square toxaphene applica- tions controlled thrips effective- ly for at least one week. Two treatments reduced plant mal- formation but did not protect cotton from thrips injury where infestations persisted after the plants reached the fruiting stage. Where damage was confined to the pre-square stage of growth, controls did not increase yields materially.

Where fleahoppers and thrips occurred in damaging infesta- tions, economical control was gained with two or three appli- cations of toxaphene or dieldrin sprays, Owen says. Although both materials were equally ef- fective in controlling fleahoppers dieldrin was superior to toxa- phene for thrips control since infestations were reduced for longer periods.

Yields of seed cotton were 653 pounds to the acre with two applications of toxaphene while two treatments of dieldrin pro- duced 700 pounds of seed cotton per acre more than untreated cotton. Three applications of toxaphene and dieldrin increas- ed yields of 727 and 934 pounds per acre over untreated cotton.

Owen says assuming the lint from treated and untreated cot- ton was equal in quality the average gross return from con- trol was \$96.46 per acre for toxa- phene and \$108.33 per acre for the dieldrin treatments.

**Wheat Vote Set For June 25**

College Station. — Texas wheat farmers will join with the na- tion's growers June 25 to decide in a national referendum wheth- er marketing quotas will contin- ue in effect for their 1956 crop. The State Agricultural Stabiliza- tion and Conservation Committee urges Texas producers to partici- pate in the vote.

"Under the present surplus situation, we are required to proclaim marketing quotas," Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson said.

"We will have almost as much wheat in the total supply after harvest this year as we had a year ago. In other words, we will have enough wheat to take care of all our domestic and export needs for two full years."

Benson has said that wheat is one of the major problems fac- ing the Department of Agricul- ture this year.

Any producer in commercial areas who will plant more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in '56 is eligible to vote in the referendum. Two-thirds of the vote must favor marketing quotas before they can be put into effect.

Local voting places for the June 25 polling will be an- nounced for each county.

The available supply of wheat for the 1955-56 marketing year is 66 percent above the considered "normal supply." The Secretary must call for marketing quotas when the normal supply exceeds 29 percent.

In the referendum last sum- mer, 73.3 percent of the farmers voting approved the quotas.
