



"Life To The Soil"

B. B. Wilkes of the Aiken community is really sold on alfalfa for giving "life to the

Mr. Wilkes keeps his cotton and grain sorghum yields up by rotating with alfalfa. Last year he averaged 5,200 pounds per acre on grain sorghums following alfalfa. He averaged about two bales of cotton per acre for three successive years following alfalfa. For these reasons Mr. Wilkes has just recently seeded 235 acres of

alfalfa. Alfalfa is the best soil improving crop that we have. It gives "life to the soil" in three major ways. First, it opens the soil so that water and air can get in. Second, it takes nitrogen from the air and stores it in the soil, when properly innoculated. It also places much needed organic matter in the soil, as the last growth is incorporated.

Alfalfa grown in the proper sequence with cash (soil depleting) crops gives needed "life to the soil." It should be included in the crop rotation often enough to keep the sil very productive. Once in four to six years has proven very effective under irrigation on our "tight" soils. The alfalfa should be left from two to three years, at least, to give opportunity for the root system to penetrate deep into the soil. Used properly, alfalfa helps increase the yields of the crops following by 50 to 100 percent. There is still time to seed alfalfa this fall. Use this excellent soil improving crop, and concentrate on fewer acres, producing bumper cash crops.

Mr. Wilkes claims it takes no more irrigation water to grow alfalfa that for cotton or grain sorghums.

Begin now giving "life to the soil" by seeding alfalfa. Many farms in this area needs new life to help them produce the maximum of which they are capable. Wouldn't you rather produce 112 bales of cotton on 75 acres as 100 bales on 100 acres? This is just a 50 percent increase. It can be done by proper use of alfalfa.

THE RESURRECTION OF THREE THOUSAND

Fifty days after the resurrection of Jesus Christ there comes the day of the resurrection of three thousand disciples on Pentecost. The picture of his death and burial was vividly in their minds. Peter arose and preached to them that this Jesus whom they had helped crucify and had seen buried in the tomb of Joseph of Arimathea was not raised from the dead. "Let all the house of Israel therefore know assuredly that God has made him both Lord and Christ, the Jesus whom you crucified."

Thus they had clearly before them the story of the death, the burial, and the resurrection of Jesus Christ. No wonder they were cut to the heart and cried out: "Brethren, what shall we do?" Surely they must have understood the profound significance of the command to repent and be baptized unto the forgiveness of their sins. They understood that Peter was telling them to reenact, as it were, the very death, burial, and resurrection they had so recently observed. They were to die to sin, to be buried in water as Jesus was buried in the earth, and to be raised again in the likeness of his resurrection. "Know ye not, that so many of us as were baptized into Jesus Christ were baptized into his death? Therefore we are buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we also should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together n the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection.

Can you think of any act which more beautifully represents the experience of our Lord. These first Christians were so close to the scene that it must have had a poignant meaning for them. Consider the joy in the hearts of the first three thousand who became obedient to the gospel. There was no question in their minds about changing the form of baptism. Its meaning was too clear. They eagerly participated in this act of faith in Christ and each one who was baptized proclaimed to all the city that this Jesus was raised from the dead.

Soon five thousand men had been buried and raised, and this was multiplied over and over again. Thus through the ages millions of disciples of the Lord in every land where the gospel has been preached have obeyed this form of doctrine. Whereever the seed of the kingdom is planted in good and honest hearts, this experience is re-enacted and men and women are born again "not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth forever" (1

But birth is of little value unless the newborn baby continues to live in Christ and to drink the sincere milk of the word and exercise itself in godliness. Baptism is just the beginning. Let us walk in the light as Christ is in the light growing in the grace and knowledge of our Lord. Then at the end of the way we shall participate in that glorious resurrection to live forever.-Selected.

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
