



"God is greatly to be feared in the assembly of the saints, and to be had in reverence of all them that are about him." (Psalm 89:7).

The purpose of true worship is to exalt and praise God Almighty, to edity self, and to proclaim to others our faith in the Bible. Services conducted with this in mind have a potent influence for good in the lives of

God is present in the assembly. Many gather with the saints and do not see him; nevertheless, he is there. His divine presence makes the place holy. When people are ever mindful of this, reverence and awe will pervade the various services. Some actually show more regard for a funeral than they do for the Lord.

Each member of the church should give the text for this lesson prayerful consideration. Some of our assemblies are characterized by an unusual amount of noise and disturbance. Special emphasis needs to be placed on the importance of striving to develop the proper respect for divine things. Church gatherings are not occasions for confusion, disorder, and commotion; they are occasions for veneration and worship. It is believed that a few suggestions will aid materially in obeying the language of Paul, "Let all things be done decently and in order." These suggestions are submitted in the interest of the cause of Christ, they are offered also

1. Come early and spend a short time in meditation before the service begins. This produces a frame of mind appropriate for the occasion. Then, too, coming in late detracts from what is being said and done. Habitual tardiness reflects an unhealthy condition spiritually.

2. Seats near the front should be occupied first. Back seats ought to be left for visitors and mothers with small children. It is especially commendable for young people to sit on the front pews. This removes temptation to talk and play.

3. Those who are entrusted with the responsibility of directing the services should speak distinctly and aloud. Attention to this ought to be given by those who make the announcements, serve at the Lord's table, and




