

# All Roads Due For Improvem't, Formby Says

Marshall Formby of Plainview, a member of the State Highway Commission, told a Floyd County highway committee last Friday that all roads in Floyd County are due for improvement, and that it was just a matter of when the Commission could get to the roads with the money to do the job.

"We just get so much money each year and we use it as best we can on the roads that need improvement," he said. "Of course the roads that carry the heaviest traffic and need improvement are the ones we try to work on first."

Formby said emphatically that in Floyd County, the first road due for improvement would be the road from Floydada west to the Hale County line. This road has a traffic count of some 3200 cars per day, which is much higher than any other road in the county. He said the second road due for improvement would be the road south of Floydada to the Crosby county line where the traffic count is around 1800 cars per day. The road east of Floydada to the Motley county line is third in line and has a traffic count averaging from 800 to 1200 cars per day.

Of course, all road improvement in this county will be dependent upon the county purchasing right-of-way, Mr. Formby said.

The road west of Floydada will be a 4-lane divided highway all the way, according to present plans. South of Floydada the Highway department is figuring on a single lane highway, 24 feet of heavy pavement with 8-foot paved shoulders on either side, on the same order of the pavement east of Plainview toward Floyd County. It may be that they can work out a 4-lane road for a round three miles out of Floydada on this road but Mr. Formby said that he could not promise anything on it at present.

Also east of Floydada Mr. Formby promised to see if a 4-lane road could be worked out for around 4 miles but indicated that the remainder of the road would be a single lane highway similar to the one south of Floydada.

Work could start on Highway 70 west of Floydada as soon as the county can furnish the right-of-way since the State Highway Commission has set aside \$50,000 for this job, Mr. Formby said. Funds for the other roads would be set aside in later highway programs. However, he said that unless Floyd County intended to furnish right-of-way, the money set aside for this county would be moved to another county where right-of-way was furnished.

"The longer you wait to start the longer it will take to get to the other roads," Mr. Formby said.

Mr. Formby emphasized that the State had never paid for any right-of-way and that there is no probability of them doing so.

The problem of the county's buying right-of-way for the county highway improvement program has been under consideration for some time. The Commissioners Court estimated

Two men of this area each paid fines of \$200 and costs in county court last Friday after pleading guilty to charges of assault and contributing to the delinquency of a minor. The charges came out of indictments returned by the Floyd County Grand Jury last Wednesday and Thursday.

**Forgers Sought**  
The sheriff's department is investigating the forging of a number of checks on a South Floyd County farmer. The forgers have not been apprehended and no charges have been filed as yet. The guilty parties are negroes, officers said, and have left a trail of forged checks from Estaline, through Crosbyton and into Floyd County. All the checks are marked for labor and are in the amount of \$39.50.

## J. H. FOWLER, 95 YEARS OF AGE PASSED AWAY FRIDAY

J. H. Fowler, age 95 years, passed away at the Lockney General Hospital last Friday at 1 p. m. after an illness of about a week.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Lockney Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. G. C. Applewhite of Lone Star, Rev. H. B. Coggin, local Methodist pastor, and Rev. G. A. Elrod, Baptist pastor of Silverton. Interment was in the Silverton cemetery beside the grave of his wife who passed away in 1952. She was 82 years of age at the time of her death.

Mr. Fowler was one of the pioneers of Floyd County, coming to this area in 1905. He was born February 20, 1861 at Starksville, Miss. The family moved to Montague County, Texas, and he was married there to Miss Carrie E. Fry on January 1, 1888. Soon after their marriage the couple moved to the Indian Territory, near the present Graham, Okla., where they lived until 1905. Mr. Fowler came to this area in 1904 and bought land and moved

his family here in 1905, settling on a place 15 miles north of Lockney where he farmed and ranched for many years. He and Mrs. Fowler moved into Lockney a number of years ago.

When a young man Mr. Fowler worked on the SUGGS Ranch near Henrietta as a cow hand, and drove cattle up the trail to Dodge City, Kansas.

He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and had been a member of the IOOF Lodge for 62 years. The Lodge was in charge of graveside rites.

Survivors include four sons, Luther of Lockney, Clay of Silverton, J. H. Jr. of Pasadena, Texas, and Dr. R. G. Fowler of Dumas; two daughters, Mrs. Susette Fox of Ocean Springs, Miss., and Mrs. J. W. Reid, Canyon; and a half brother, Will Suddeth, Mississippi. Fourteen grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren also survive. Another daughter, Mrs. Carl Daniel, died in June of 1942, and an infant son, Patterson, died in 1889.

## Fire Department Buys Boat, Trailer Motor And Jackets

With a total of \$268, donated by local citizens last week to the Lockney Fire Department for the purpose of buying a boat for water emergencies, the department was able to buy a boat, trailer, outboard motor and several life jackets.

Fire Chief Audvie Barnett said Tuesday that they had made a fortunate buy in a 14-foot flat bottomed Lone Star aluminum boat, with air tanks, almost like new at Hereford. They bought the boat and a trailer for it for a total of \$100. The outboard motor is five h. p. and capable of handling the boat very well.

The project to buy a boat and motor came out of the drowning of two negroes here last week. The department was called upon to recover the bodies of the two and had to borrow a boat and motor with which to operate. The fire boys then decided that they needed this kind of equipment since it was the third time in the past few years they had been called upon in this kind of emergency.

A fund was started soon after the drownings and by the week end a total of \$268 had been given, most of it a dollar or two at a time.

Fire Chief Barnett said Tuesday, "We certainly appreciate the response of the people to our request for funds to buy this equipment. It is badly needed at times and it will be a big help to us to have it on hand in times of emergency. Every donation is appreciated."

## Court Action May Follow In Acreage Fuss

It was indicated to The Beacon by reliable sources Wednesday that court action will probably follow a cotton acreage review committee's rejection of a number of applications for increased acreage last Friday.

The review committee, in a decision issued last Friday following a hearing the previous week, upheld the county ASC committee in its acreage allotments. In notices mailed to the various farmers who had filed applications for review, the committee said in substance that it found the County ASC committee had followed proper procedures in their acreage allotments, denied that adverse weather conditions had prevailed in 1955 to affect the wheat acreage, and concluded by saying that they could find no reasonable basis for changing the county committee's decision.

Counsel for the farmers, Nelson and McCleskey of Lubbock, presented their case to the review board and will represent the farmers in any further action in the case.

The review committee, composed of Henry A. Hayes of Plainview, Richard T. O'Daniel of Tulla, and Fred W. Mercer of Silverton listened to appeals of some 11 farmers in an 8-hour hearing March 14 at Floydada.

Those farmers whose appeals were heard by the review committee were: Fred Jackson of Sand Hill, R. C. Day of McCoy, Clyde H. Farish of Lone Star, Horton Howell of Sterley, V. H. Kellison of Irick, Doyle Moore of Lakeview, H. B. Johnson and C. C. Nichols of Floydada, Rene Yearly of Cedar, James Z. Scott of Harmony, Chas. W. Pierce of Lubbock, John Holmes of Irick, Chester Mitchell of Pleasant Valley.

Some 60 other appeals for review were turned down by the county ASC office as having filed "too late."

## Minute Editorials

For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord.—Romans 6:23.

**FLOYD COUNTY'S** two cities too many times work like a balky team. When one pulls the other holes back and vice versa. So it seems like the case with the highway improvement program for this county. In the first two votes on bond issues to pay for right-of-way for the highway program, Lockney held back because among other reasons they weren't satisfied with the highway department's route through town. The plans called for practically by-passing the town and leaving present businesses completely off the new route. It appeared to most of us that such drastic measures weren't necessary.

**NOW THE** highway department has made the concession of allowing the new 4-lane road to stay on the old route in Lockney and apparently the sentiment has turned in favor of the highway improvement

program here. But people of Floydada have become skeptical of the proposition now. Apparently they are afraid that it will be too long before roads south and east of that city are reached in the improvement program or the program doesn't call for enough road to suit them. At any rate as we understand it, the highway proposition has lost favor in the capital city and so it goes. It would sure be better for all of us if that balky team would learn to work together.

**THE THREATENED SUIT** for back pay for braceros in Dawson county is just another indication of the one-sided labor agreement between Mexico and the United States. As far as the farmer is concerned it is a "you-can't-win" proposition too many times. The Mexican government, apparently without consideration for the long range welfare of their citizens, insist upon a one-sided agreement that will eventually make it practically impossible for Texas farmers to use the Mexican laborer. We predict that if the Dawson county farmers are forced to pay the braceros back pay very few of them will be used in Texas this year. It could result in the disruption of the whole bracero labor program. It looks to us like Mexico is trying to kill the goose that laid the golden egg.

**THE DESCRIPTION** of the new farm bill as "a mess" apparently was just about right. It certainly won't work to the advantage of Texas farmers in its present form, and apparently there isn't much hope of the compromise bill being much improved. There is no doubt but that the present administration's idea of a farm bill is not what Texas farmers want. But we're beginning to believe that the Democratic majority in both houses of Congress also have something else in mind when it comes to a farm bill. At least they haven't been very considerate of the farmer thus far. Senators Lyndon Johnson and Price Daniel along with Congressman George Mahon and other Texas Congressmen did what they could but they couldn't outvote the "other side."

**IF YOU'RE** going to get an inspection sticker on your car before the April 15 deadline, you better hurry. Recently it was reported that only about half of the cars had stickers at present. There's going to be a terrible rush at the last minute, we're afraid.

**TUESDAY** is city election day. There are six men on the ballot for the three alderman places. It is your duty to vote if you are qualified. If you aren't then you shouldn't complain if affairs don't go as you think they should. Don't forget to vote Tuesday.

#### AFTER A FIGHT: WHAT THEN?

During the past football season there has been a rash of fist fights following high school games. In a few instances the fans have attacked the game officials, and in other instances the gangs have attacked one of the high school coaches connected with one of the participating teams.

Public school officials are urged to take the following action immediately after the game:

1. Contact the local peace officers and district attorney and

file maximum charges against the parties involved if the event occurred on the school premises.

2. If the attack has been on a game official, press for the maximum penalty and for damages if such have occurred to the official. In some instances there has been damage to the car or to the person.

3. Contact the League office and report the incident, giving details as to what action has been taken by the school against the violator.

4. Do not try to cover up the incident, because that leaves the violators free to try again and will make the school a party to the crime.

When schools follow this procedure plus the other recom-

mendations in the football plan regarding the proper treatment of game officials, no school has been suspended from League competition.

Schools have gotten into trouble with the League when they have tried to avoid proper punishment of the parties involved in these incidents on public school grounds.

School boards should be urged to set up a school policy to be followed when fans and other persons outside the school are involved in fights and drunken brawls on school premises. This policy will prevent any favoritism, and reduce pressure to "cover up," should a prominent local citizen become involved in misconduct at a high school game. — Texas Interscholastic League.

#### SENTERFIT'S PLATFORM

A major plank in Reuben Senterfit's campaign for governor of Texas is a constitutional convention to re-write those parts of our constitution which deal with the structure of our state government at the administrative level. Senterfit, a former speaker of the House of Representatives, asserts that statutory action might be helpful, but that statutory action alone will not solve the basic problem. — Plainview Herald.

#### PARENTS FAULT

FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover had harsh words recently for "softheaded" parents who fail to teach their children "respect for God, the law, and others." Hoover blamed them for the nation's postwar crime wave which he feels "is essentially a youth problem." Children need play grounds, youth agencies, and organizations like the Boy Scouts, Hoover told a House Appropriations sub-committee. But "no one of these can take the place of the mother and father conscious of their responsibility to inculcate in youth respect for God, the law and others." ## Long Ago In Lockney

Items of interest from the files of The Lockney Beacon.

March 31, 1944

This section of West Texas was visited by a surprise snowfall Tuesday and a cold wave that dropped the temperature to a minimum of 15 degrees Wednesday morning. The snow started falling Monday night and by Tuesday morning the ground was covered to an average depth of three or four inches. Drifts were three to four feet deep. The fruit has nearly all been killed although a few late plums might survive.

Mrs. W. B. Gilbert of Flomot received a telegram Saturday afternoon from the War Department stating her husband, Lt. W. B. Gilbert, had been killed in action. Lt. Gilbert was in New Hebrides Island the last time his wife heard from him. Mrs. Gilbert is the former Miss Lula Stapleton, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Stapleton of Flomot and is the granddaughter of Mrs. G. J. Stapleton, Lockney.

Supt. H. F. Clemens of the Lockney schools was elected president of Floyd County Teachers Association at a banquet in Floydada Tuesday night. Mrs. Henry Hodel, commercial teacher of the local high school was elected secretary treasurer.

War was brought close to home last Sunday night when an Army Liberator bomber crashed to earth about three miles west of Floydada killing nine men.

A letter carried in this issue from William Stegall in Australia states that he has been working as chaplain assistant recently and he loves the work.

Archie Bybee writes from somewhere in Italy that he'd like to be in good old West Texas again. "There's just no place in the world I'd rather be. It sure would be good to see a

town lighted at night and a civilian car again, or do they still have things like that?"

Lockney schools will begin sessions at 9 a. m. starting next Monday morning instead of the present 10 a. m. All schools in the county will observe the same time.

Irrigation With Concrete Pipe  
Patric W. Neil

Conservation of irrigation water is very important to the irrigation farmer. Loss of water from unlined ditches because of seepage and evaporation can be enormous and probably varies from 10 to 50 percent.

A limited supply of water makes such losses doubly serious. Fewer acres can be irrigated, or crops must suffer from lack of enough water. Concrete pipe is one method to cut seepage and evaporation losses to a minimum.

Farmers are rapidly learning the advantages of concrete pipe. Some of the advantages are: it provides close control of water distribution, it saves time and labor, it permits productive use of all the land; it aids in insect and weed control, it simplifies irrigation of sloping lands, and it requires little maintenance.

Of course, any concrete pipe-line needs to be properly located, so as to fit into a well designed system. Since these lines are permanent, it is well for the average farmer to seek advice on their design and location. Soil Conservation Service technicians are available and able to help with your concrete pipe problems.

Since several contractors are installing and furnishing concrete pipe in this area, no problem should be encountered in obtaining the pipe or the installation. All of the contractors guarantee their installations for one year. Generally, any fault in material or workmanship should become evident during the first year of operation.

Perhaps pipelines will never replace all open ditches but may eventually replace most permanent ditches. When concrete pipelines are supplemented with the use of metal or canvas pipe, no ditches are necessary at all.

While concrete pipelines are expensive, their expected life span should be long. Considering the advantages and the saving through their use, a

real saving may be expected over a relatively short period of time.

Several farmers in the area already have all of their permanent ditches replaced by concrete pipe. Mr. Isaac Holmes, who farms about ten miles Southwest of Hale Center, has about 5000 feet of pipe on his 160 acres of land. Part of this pipe crosses bench leveled land which Mr. Holmes keeps in irrigated pasture. Gated aluminum pipe is used in connection with the concrete pipe for row cropping.

Mr. Frank Gray, who farms several hundred acres just east of Lubbock, has several thousand feet of concrete pipe. Mr. Gray has bench leveled several hundred acres, and he feels that concrete pipe is almost a necessity on land which has been leveled in this manner.

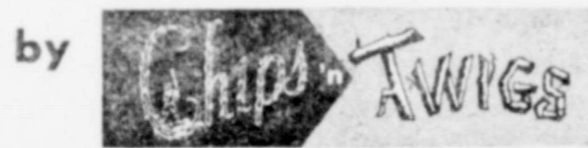

Another \$1,500,000 went to Texas service stations and garages to help keep the company's fleet of 3,529 trucks and automobiles rolling. This included the cost of 2,919,880 gallons of gasoline, as well as tires, accessories, repair parts and \$500,000 in direct labor costs.

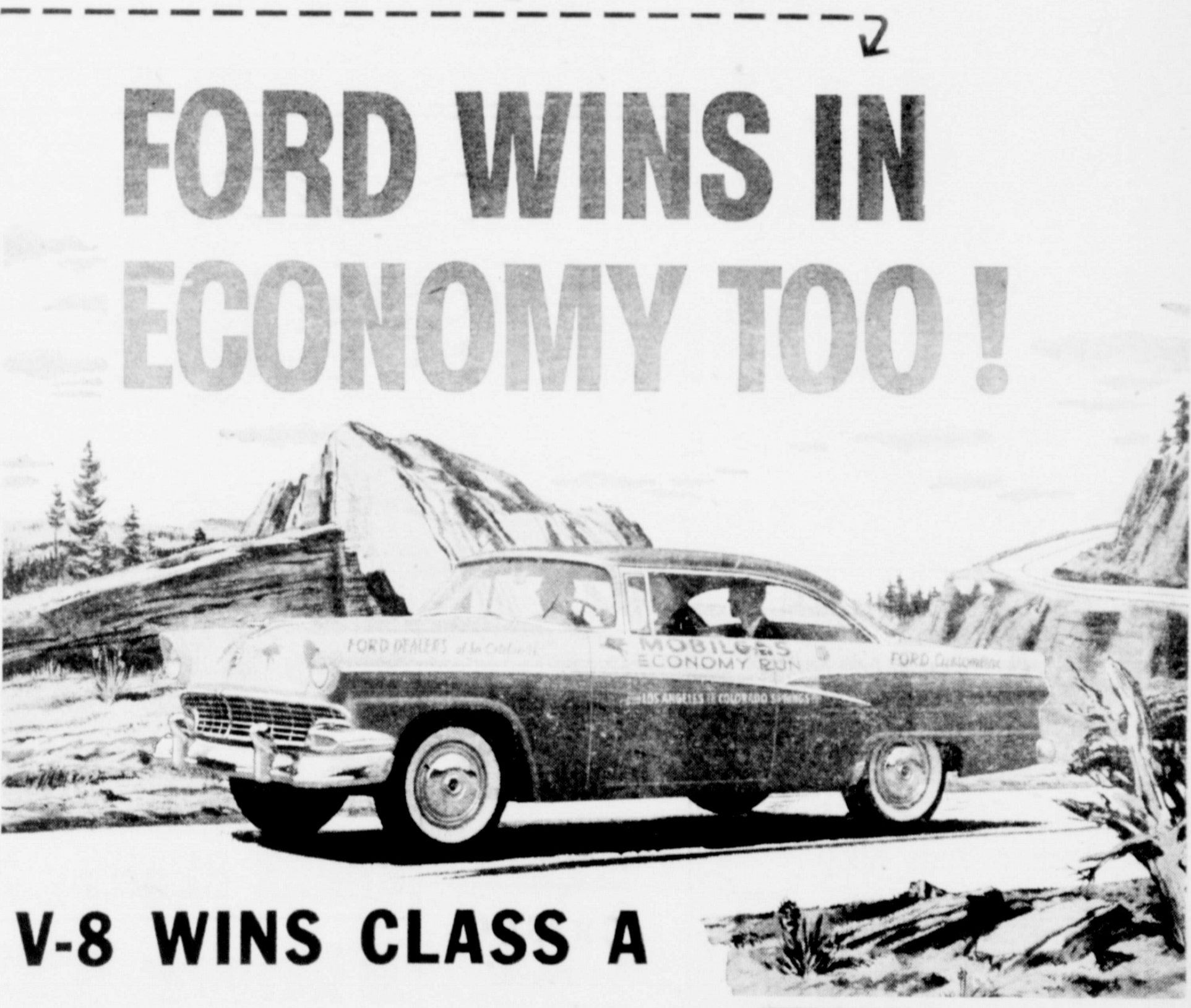

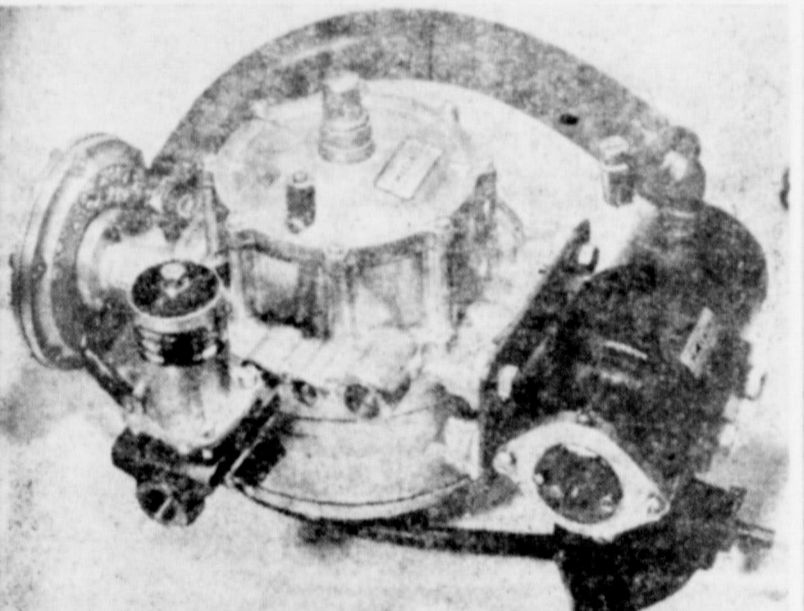

## Heart Disease Not As Bad As Has Been Painted

Austin — Optimistic state health officials don't think the picture of heart disease is as black as it has been painted. "True," says Dr. W. S. Brumage, director of the State Health Department's heart disease control activities, "it kills more people than any other disease. But chinks are appearing in its armor, and research scientists are widening those chinks daily."



Take the old bugaboo of rheumatic fever. A few years ago it used to cripple or kill its victims like a relentless strata.

Today, inexpensive penicillin readily routs the causative organism, a malicious little speck of life known as "hemolytic streptococcus."

Or think about luetic heart disease, a deadly complication of syphilis. Modern penicillin therapy, Dr. Brumage says, has pulled its fangs.

Perhaps the most impressive area of progress against heart killers is modern surgery to correct congenital heart defects. Many babies are hale and hardy today who, had they been born a few brief years ago, would have surely succumbed to heart malformation.

Also, congenital heart deformities can be prevented today by the expedient of preventing expectant mothers from contracting German measles at a critical stage of pregnancy.

"We cannot yet do anything to prevent other forms of heart disease," Dr. Brumage says, "but we can add long years to a heart disease patient's life through patient education — teaching him to live usefully in spite of his heart impairment."

The State Health Department's program of heart disease control consists of:

Giving financial support to

the heart clinic at the Robert B. Green Hospital in San Antonio; sponsoring the "Heart Bulletin," a technical publication which keeps physicians abreast of the most recent developments in the management of heart disease; providing penicillin to all city and county health officers for indigent rheumatic fever patients; and heart disease case finding.

More than 1,000 cases of "suspicious" heart disease were uncovered through the Department's chest x-ray program last year.

"Arteriosclerotic diseases — including the type of attack President Eisenhower had — are our biggest problems, Dr. Brumage says. "They're increasing due to an aging population, and causing almost half of all

deaths due to heart disease." He said the probable future of heart disease research would be in finding out what causes blood vessels to break down, so appropriate preventive measures could be introduced.

### DIVINE GUIDANCE

A remarkable fact, universally attendant on our journey through life, is recited by the prophet Jeremiah in this language, "O Lord, I know that the way of man is not in himself: it is not in man that walketh to direct his steps" (Jer. 10:23). This does not mean that man is so mechanically constructed that he cannot move by his own power — that the Holy Spirit must miraculously fill him with energy before he can act.

The writer does not say that man is incompetent to walk. His language plainly suggests that man can walk, but his wisdom is inadequate to direct his steps. In religion man must do the walking, but God must do the guiding. Unfortunately, the majority of people who walk also want to direct their steps. An ocean-going vessel can travel, but it cannot steer itself. It must have a pilot on board to guide it in a safe course. God does not want men to be derelicts on the sea of life. He wants them to be aboard the ark of safety, steered by his own hand straight toward heaven.

David was deeply conscious of the necessity of divine guidance. He prayed, "Teach me thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path" (Ps. 27:11). And again he says, "The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord, and he delights in his way" (Ps. 37:23). Every step that one takes in religion should be ordered by the Lord. We should be careful to take all the steps the Lord has commanded, and we should be just as careful not to take any more than he has commanded.

The right kind of a religious life is described as a walk with God. It is declared of both Noah and Enoch that they walked with God. God does not walk with men. Men must walk with God. The Lord does not conform to man's way — man must conform to God's way. When a man walks with God, the divine will is the rule of his life. Man does not know what he needs, except by what the Lord has revealed to him in his word.

Solomon says, "Trust in the Lord with all thine heart, and lean not unto thine own understanding. In all thy ways acknowledge him, and he shall direct thy paths" (Prov. 3:5, 6). It is folly for men to trust in themselves for guidance — in their wisdom, in their feelings, in their conscience. All of these are deceptive and misleading. The way of the Lord is a strange road to men. They have not traveled it before. God says "For my ways are not your ways, neither are your thoughts my thoughts." To lean unto our own understanding is a sin. "Thy will be done" should be our constant prayer. —Selected.

(Continued from page 1) that it would cost \$350,000 now to buy the necessary right-of-way and some have said that if the county waits another five years the cost will be a half million dollars.

Some talk of calling a third bond election has been making the rounds but no petitions have been circulated as yet. According to E. C. Carter, president of the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, sentiment for the bond issue in that area is dropping and interest is not as high as it once was.

The committee representing the Chambers of Commerce of Lockney and Floydada met with Mr. Formby in Lockney last Friday and went over the problems with him. Whether further action is planned was not known here.

### Treated Seed Provides Insect Protection

College Station. — Texas entomologists report that cotton grown from seed treated with new systemic insecticide has been protected against thrips, aphids, spider mites and leaf miners for four to six weeks from date of planting.

F. M. Fuller Jr. and C. F. Garner, entomologists Texas Agricultural Extension Service, say that the insecticide is compound 3911. A systemic insecticide is one that can be taken up by plants and translocated to all its parts.

Seed treatment such as this will replace the first two early season applications of insecticides, but will not be effective against the overwintered boll weevil. Application of

a recommended insecticide should be made before the squares are one-third grown to protect the young fruits from weevils or other insects.

Individuals can not purchase Compound 3911 because of the hazards involved. Severe toxicity to man calls for extreme caution, and all seed containers must be burned. Farmers must transport their seed to and from the treating plant. There are two companies in Texas equipped for treating seeds, both at Waco. Seeds can be treated at a cost of about three dollars an acre.

Advantages of the systemic insecticides are four to six weeks protection against certain insects, and elimination of the first two poison applications by spraying or dusting. Adverse weather conditions cannot destroy the effectiveness of the poison in the plant's report the entomologist. Loss of time for transportation of seed, and three dollars per acre as com-

pared to two dollars when dusting or spraying is employed, offer some disadvantage.

### Hammond Denies Flexible Support

Waco. — The president of the Texas Farm Bureau has branded as an "inexcusable misstatement of facts" a charge that he testified before the Senate Agriculture Committee in favor of flexible price supports.

J. Walter Hammond made the statement in a letter to Ernest Joiner, editor of The Rails (Crosby County) Banner. Joiner had charged in his paper that Hammond had double-crossed Texas Farm Bureau members by testifying in favor of flexible supports in Washington.

Hammond emphatically denied this. "Had you bothered to check the Senate Agriculture Committee records, which are public property, you would have known that I did not testify as you so stated in your column," Hammond said in his letter to the West Texas editor.

The Texas Farm Bureau leader told Joiner that "The real

tragedy of your prevarication is that you have apparently fallen into the hands of those who would like to set farmer against farmer. This is the old technique of 'divide and conquer.'"

Hammond further stated that regardless of what farm organization farmers belong to, it is important for them "to think for themselves, using facts, instead of blindly following some rabble-rouser whose chief concern is increased circulation instead of increased farm income."
