Three to six pounds on dry land interplanted and twelve to fifteen ilone in rows. Mung beans five to eight pounds alone in rows and three to five pounds inter planted.

A good rule of thumb to follow when inter-planting is to use one pound of cowpeas or Mung beans for each pound of grain sorghum planted, if you plant eight pounds of sorghum per acre then plant eight pounds of cowpeas or Mung beans.


