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## TAYLOR SERVICES ARE SET FOR THURSDAY MORNING

Funeral services for C. J. (Jack) Taylor, 38, will be held this (Thursday) morning at 10 o'clock at the Lockney Methodist Church, Rev. H. B. Coggin, the pastor, and Rev. N. S. Daniel, former pastor, will officiate. Interment will follow in the Lockney Cemetery with Carter Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Taylor, a prominent farmer of this community, died suddenly early Tuesday morning at Eagle Pass, Texas. His death was believed to have been caused by a heart attack or a blood clot. He had left Lockney early Monday to go to Eagle Pass to secure Mexican Nationals for labor on his farm here. He spent the night in a hotel there, arose early Tuesday and ate breakfast at a restaurant near the hotel. He had returned to the hotel and started up the steps when he collapsed. He died before medical aid could be summoned.

He had been laughing and talking with acquaintances and apparently felt good. Local relatives said that he had been in reasonably good health and as far as they knew had not been troubled with a heart ailment since about 1933 when he was ill for a time.

A Carter ambulance left for Eagle Pass Tuesday at noon returning early Wednesday morning with the body. Making the trip were Ben Wood, Robert Thomas, Floyd Jackson and James Taylor.

Mr. Taylor owned considerable land in this area and had previously been engaged in the grocery business here. He was also active in farm affairs and served as the Floyd County director of the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1 when it was first organized. He at one time was director of the First National Bank here.

He served as a state bank examiner in his younger years and was a veteran of World War I. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge and the Methodist Church.

He was born July 23, 1898 at Cumby, Texas, and was reared there. He was married to Miss Grace Edmonds in 1920 at Cumby, and she passed away in 1930. The couple had one son, James, who lives here. Mr. Taylor moved to Lubbock and in 1931 came to Lockney where he established the Taylor Grocery Store. He sold this about 1934 and started farming, buying the farm just north of Lockney.

On July 2, 1933 he was married to Miss Jessie Martin of Rayland. They have two children, Joe and Charlotte Ann, both at home.

Survivors in addition to his wife and three children, are his mother, Mrs. J. H. Taylor of Sulphur Springs, Texas; one sister, Mrs. Jack Ardis of Sulphur Springs and two grandchildren.

Active pallbearers will be Frank and Robert Thomas, George Webster, Charles Baxter, Floyd Jackson, Lester Carter, Paul Cooper and Hershel Carthel.

## Cucumbers May Start Coming To Grader Today

The harvesting of cucumbers in this area may start today or Friday, Chamber of Commerce Manager Dick Whiteley said Tuesday. The harvest was scheduled to begin Monday but it was decided that the crop was not quite ready.

Grading machinery has been set up under a shed belonging to National Alfalfa Mill in south Lockney and the contracting company, Dalton's Best Maid Products, is ready to grade, pack and truck the cucumbers to Fort Worth for processing.

Some 125 acres of cucumbers have been planted here with a contract price of \$6.00 per hundred offered by the company for No. 1 cucumbers.

Onion Harvest  
Meanwhile the onion harvest in this area is moving along but is slowed some by the lack of grading machinery. The machinery operated in the Arlon Miller barn in the Sandhill community the first of this week and it was reported here that Mr. Miller shipped five carloads of onions from the Barwise siding this week. Miller had 22 1/2 acres of onions in all. It was reported.

Dick Stovall gathered some 4000 sacks of onions from six acres on his place eight miles northeast of Lockney recently, and averaged \$3.00 per sack for them. Reports from neighbors said that Mr. Stovall cleared around \$1200 per acre over cost of producing and harvesting the crop.

No. 1 white onions are running about \$3.50 per sack this week on the market with the harvesting deducted, it was said. Harvest and sacking are running 20% leaving the farmer a net of \$2.80 over cost of harvesting.

Other farmers of the area are anxiously awaiting the arrival of grading machinery at their farms as most onions are about ready to harvest. Other farmers having onions in this area include Wayne Bybee, Mosley Bros., Johnny Moody, Lynn Miller, Joe Foster, Lloyd Collins and Lloyd Readheimer.

The board of trustees of the Lockney Independent School District voted in regular meeting Monday evening to integrate the white and colored schools of this district effective with the start of the next school term.

Supt. H. H. Nicholas said that the board first considered the recommendation made by a special committee of local citizens some two weeks ago which was to integrate the high school and junior high and move the colored grade school to the present grade school building but teach them separately from the white students. The vote on this was 3-3, there being only six members of the board present. Not being able to agree on this proposal, the board then voted on integrating the entire school system and the motion carried. Whether or not the vote was unanimous was not revealed.

The board put one provision into the move to integrate. That was that the two colored teachers release the board from their contracts which have already been signed for next year. The principal, Wavelly Washington, told a local civic club some time ago that if the schools were integrated he would not hold the board to his contract but would be glad to sign a release. No comment on the matter has been heard from the woman teacher at the colored school.

The colored school had 50 students enrolled the past year. Only three of these were in high school and four in junior high. The remaining 43 were in grade school. Mr. Nicholas said that the addition of these students along with those from the recently consolidated Lone Star district would make it necessary to add another section to the first two grades at least and possibly others. The two colored teachers will be replaced with white teachers, providing they release the board from their contracts. If they refuse to do so, the colored school will probably be continued in its present location.

Set Election Date  
The board set the date of July 21st to hold a bond assumption vote in the Lone Star and Lockney districts. This is necessary following the recent consolidation vote.

The board placed an order for 180 seating units for the High School, the desks were ordered from the American Seating Co.

## Minute Editorials

Thou hypocrite, first cast the beam out of thine own eye; and then shalt thou see clearly to cast the mote out of thy brother's eye.—Matt. 7:5

**INTERPOSITION** is described by some as almost an act of treason. In other words, the fact that some of us believe the United States Supreme Court was influenced by considerations other than the law and thus returned an unjust decision regarding the segregation of white and negro school students, is considered to be treasonable thought, therefore something that should not be uttered. Is it the law of the land that is being criticized or the men who supposedly interpret the law? Of course it is the men, the members of the Court who are under criticism. For 75 years the United States Supreme Court has rendered decision after decision upholding equal but separate school facilities. Now this Court suddenly reverses the decisions of all previous Courts and decides that such is not the intent of the law after all.

**THE CRITICISM** is that the Supreme Court is amending the law, not interpreting it. Even as the late President, Franklin D. Roosevelt said upon one occasion: "The Court in addition to the proper use of its judicial functions has improperly set itself up as a third house of the Congress — a superlegislature, as one of the justices called it — reading into the Constitution words and implications which are not there. We have therefore reached the point where we must save the Constitution from the Court, and the Court from itself." Our difficulty with the Court today arises not from the Court as an institution but from human beings within it.

**FROM ANOTHER SOURCE** we are told that the Supreme Court depended upon the advice of eight sociological and psychological experts to reach its infamous decision. Upon investigation, we are told, it was found that one of these experts had ten Communist front citations to his record, another had 18 Red Front affiliations, a third was an employee of the NAACP, a fourth of an official of the American Jewish Congress, and another was a foreigner brought to this country to survey race relations under the auspices of the Carnegie Foundation of which Alger Hiss was formerly president. It was upon the advice of these "experts" that the Supreme Court handed down its decision regarding school segregation. Yet there are those who apparently consider the decisions of the Supreme Court as sacred and above criticism.

**FORMER SUPREME COURT JUSTICE** James F. Byrnes had an article in U. S. News and World Report in May titled "The Supreme Court Must Be Curb-ed," which every person ought to read. It is getting to be more and more imperative that citizens read and keep abreast of what is happening nationally.

**ELECTION DAY** is not far away. Voters must be making up their minds regarding candidates.
