

Wheat Vote Set For July 20th

College Station. — How wheat farmers vote in the July 20 referendum on wheat marketing quotas will actually affect only two parts of the 1957 wheat program, according to R. G. Shrauner, Chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee. Whether or not quotas are approved, acreage allotments will remain in effect for the crop, the chairman declared.

The two points at issue in the vote are: (1) whether marketing quotas shall be in effect with penalties on "excess" (not with more wheat from farms (with more than 15 acres of wheat harvested as grain) not in compliance with the acreage allotment; and (2) the level of price support available to those who comply with their farm acreage allotments.

If quotas are approved by at least two-thirds of those who vote in the referendum, the quota and penalties for excess production will be in effect, and price support on the crop will be available at a level between 75 and 90 percent of parity to those who comply with the farm wheat allotments.

If more than one-third of the voters disapprove the quotas, there will be no marketing quotas and no penalties for excess production, and the available price support will drop to 50 percent of parity, as provided by law.

Whether or not quotas are in effect, acreage allotments will remain in effect for the 1957 wheat crop.

Chairman Shrauner explained that wheat marketing quotas and acreage allotments operate only in commercial wheat states, including Texas. Since the quotas affect only those growers in the commercial area who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on a farm in 1957, these growers are the only ones eligible to vote in the referendum.

Cucumbers Are Being Harvested

The cucumber harvest in this area has begun but the cucumbers are coming in slowly thus far and the peak of the harvest is still two weeks away, Chamber of Commerce Manager Dick Whiteley said Wednesday.

Jerry Dalton, son of one of the owners of the Dalton Pickle Company, is here operating the grading machinery, which is set up under a shed belonging to National Alfalfa Mill in south Lockney.

So far only 50 to 75 bushels per day have been gathered. When all the growers start gathering the amount will increase considerably.

Despite the slowness of the harvest the market price is good. The Dalton company, which has a contract on 125 acres in this area, is paying \$7.00 per hundred for No. 1 cucumbers, which is \$1.00 per hundred above the minimum contract price.

Some cucumbers have come from the farms of Orba Miller, Herman and Owen Thornton, Gerald Sams, Kenneth Moody, J. T. Spears, Zack Cummings Jr., and Chuck Holmes. Whiteley said.

Onions Quoted At \$5.25 Sack Here Wednesday

Onions were quoted at \$5.25 a sack here Wednesday, with the possibility that the price may go higher. Lloyd Readimer, who was harvesting his crop in the Lone Star community, said that he was promised a minimum of \$5.25 per sack for No. 1 yellow onions which were being graded Wednesday. This is the highest price paid for onions in this area this year.

From another source, some local farmers were offered \$5.45 per sack for No. 1 yellow onions delivered to Hereford.

Readimers crop was running between 300 and 400 sacks per acre and were grading 80% No. 1 onions. Joe Foster is also harvesting some onions on his place in the Prairie Chapel community.

The F. H. Vahsing Company has grading machinery set up now at the South Plains Gin at Sterley where they began grading Wednesday morning Calvin Duncan, who is in charge of the grading, told The Beacon that he expected to grade 15 carloads and truck loads Wednesday and expected to complete the grading of all onions in this area within 10 days. He said that his company wanted to get the onions on the market while it was good and therefore he would rush the grading operations as much as possible.

The Vahsing machinery has been operating at Barwise for the past two weeks where other crops in this area were graded. Some 28 cars were shipped from Barwise. Duncan said.

Duncan told The Beacon that yields in the area varied considerably running from 120 to 650 sacks per acre. His company is sacking the onions under the Lime Stone brand name, which he says is well known for quality onions. Home office of the firm is at Laredo.

Duncan was working around 60 hands at the grading plant Wednesday. Some of the onions were being loaded on to railroad cars while others were being loaded into trucks. His machinery could grade a car in 20 minutes if sufficient help and onions were available. Dan can said.

**Floydada To Have
Dial Phone System**

Floydada's new dial telephone system will be placed in operation at 12:01 a.m. July 22, announced J. C. Oakley, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company manager.

Dear Editor:

I promised my friends that when I was settled here in Canada I would let them know how I made out and something about the fishing.

We departed from Plainview about seven o'clock in the morning and had a very nice trip all the way. We stopped at Cheyenne, Wyo., Great Falls, Mont. and then to Edmonton, Alta., arriving here at seven-thirty in the afternoon. When I say afternoon I mean just that as the sun has just passed the one hundred thirty-five degree orbit (reference to the full daylight hours) and it is light until much later.

The temperature is surely great as compared to the hot weather on the Plains of Texas. We have had some days that were on the cool side, days in or near seventy to eighty degrees. The nights are nice for sleeping with the cover well up around the chin (thirty to forty-five degrees).

The fishing as you may know is my favorite pastime, and it is all that anyone could desire. We went out to one of the many lakes that they have here and settled for some twenty or more great northern pike, and three days later I went to another lake that has nothing but perch and we had sixty or seventy in slightly more than one hour. Now don't accuse me of handling the truth in a careless manner as I have witness to prove my numbers. We fished this perch lake at another time and three of us were able to catch two hundred seventy odd in less than three hours. Just as fast as you can get the fish off the hook and it back in the water. Now I call that good fishing. The walleye pike are just as fast but it takes a little coaxing to get them to come in so you can net them. The great northern pike can sure give you plenty of exercise too. In fact you hesitate to throw out the line for you know that you will have a tussle on your hands. (This after you have fished for 30 minutes or so.)

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

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
