



The 8th Air Force February 20-25, 1944-"Big Week"

In five massive daylight raids during "Big Week", the 8th Air Force sent 3300 heavy bombers from its bases in England over aircraft plants in central Germany. By coordinating with the RAF and the 9th and 15th U.S. Air Forces, the raids were extended to an around-the-clock assault. The targets received more than 10,000 tons of bombs. Fighter planes from the 8th flew 2500

sorties in support of the

attacks.



"Big Week" bombings were credited with forcing the almost complete dispersal of the German aircraft industry and denied the enemy hundreds of vitally needed planes. The raids, which established Allied air superiority over Germany, destroyed 600 Nazi aircraft in the air and on the ground.



They have led the way in improving the mechanics of Sesame harvesting, and were the first farmers on the Plains to design, build and use a metal harvesting platform on their self-propelled Model 55 John Deere combine. Wilson says he believes they can continue to improve the harvest machinery, thereby reducing cost and

labor at harvest. "The Texas Sesame Seed Growers organization at Paris, Texas, has been a lot of help to us all the way through from planting to harvesting and marketing." Wilson reports This association of farmers has served as the marketing agent for the sale of all of his seed and more than 90 per cent of all the Sesame produced i Texas and neighboring states the past three years.

"I like the way the Texas Sesame Growers have worked right along with us out in the field," Wilson says," and the complete set of records and receipts they furnish to show us exactly how our seed is hand-

Wilson farms 500 acres of good land, but some of it has onsiderable slope for irrigasome extent, has limited his Sesame production. However, he planted 47 acres of his best land to Sesame, and this acre age produced an average of 1.180 pounds of clean seed per acre with no fertilizer. During the past year his 160 acres of cotton grossed about \$217.50 and 47 acres of his Sesame grossed \$118; 30 acres grossed \$92, and 30 acres of essentially dıyland Sesame grossed \$55 per acre. His 233 acres of milo grossed \$66.50 per acre.



In order to speed up action on applications, Johnson's bill would require action, either affirmatively or negatively, by the VA on each application for direct loan at the same time that efforts to obtain private financing are being made. If private financing should be available within a 20-day period, it would be preferred and used. If not, the VA would be in a position to make qualified loans much faster than at pres-

A number of other Senators have joined Senator Johnson in sponsorship of his bill.
