## In Death Hits 22

## CLEAN-UP AT SILVERTON IS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS

The job of cleaning up debris following the disastrous tornado at Silvertown last Wednesday is making good progress, a report from that city said Wednesday.

Some 15 men from the Aiken community took trucks and pickups and worked at Silvertown Tuesday of this week. L. L. Scott reported. The men met at the Baptist Church there and went to Silvertown in a body.

Last Saturday a group of Lockney men went to Silvertown and re-roofed one house also contributing the material. In this group were Brad Hardy, Henry Rowell and son, Lawson, Lewis Busby and Butch Hancock, Monroe Smith, E. J. Rogers, Clyde Hill and Leon Wolford. Other groups plan to go and help in the near future. It was reported to The Beacon.

Groups of carpenters have also been or plan to go and help from Plainview, Lubbock and Amarillo.

Rebuilding has begun on some residences already and plans are being made to start on others right away. The Tony Burson home is being rebuilt and the J. K. Bean home is also being reconstructed.

The American Red Cross and Salvation Army have both been active in aiding those in need in the Silvertown area. The Red Cross opened disaster headquarters in the Methodist Church there early Thursday morning and assisted in feeding some of the workers. They also assisted in handling long distance telephone calls and relaying information concerning those who were injured or killed in the tornado.

The debris is being hauled away or burned on the spot, whichever is most convenient. The Tomlin and Fleming Gin which was destroyed with loss around \$150,000 is being salvaged and reconstruction will begin soon.

The path of the storm was charted by Lynn Pittard, Floyd County assistant county agent and a First Lieutenant in charge of the Army Reserve Unit at Floydada. Lt. Pittard end his unit tracked the path of the storm from the Lone Star community in a straight line across the country some 15 miles.

It was reported to have first knocked down a television aerial at the Norman Caldwell home in the Lone Star community. It came down again just in time to wipe out the E. E. Puckett home 16 miles north and 2 miles east of Lockney. It went on across the country, narrowly missing several houses, among those being that of Leo Comer just south of Silvertown on the highway. Mr. and Mrs. Comer and children took refuge in the basement of their home. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sumner Comer of Lockney.

The funnel struck the southeastern part of Silvertown, destroying scores of houses, and then traveled on northeastward hitting at least one house four miles northeast of Silvertown.

The width of the tornado path of destruction was estimated from 600 to 900 feet. Schools at Silvertown resumed classes on Monday after taking a holiday since the tornado. Families who were made homeless are still being cared for by friends and relatives.

## Donations For Tornado Victims Passes \$3,000.00

Total cash donations from Lockney and community for victims of the tornado at Silvertown and vicinity passed the \$3,000.00 mark this week and more was being added every day. In addition used clothing and used furniture in large quantities were being collected by various groups.

Various other communities on the plains have also contributed cash and clothing to the Silvertown community victims. It was reported here that other communities in Floyd County, including Floydada, had contributed something like \$2,000 to the fund, which would bring the Floyd County contributions to more than \$5,000.00 in cash.

Total contributed by various individuals, business houses, churches and organizations and left at the First National Bank here reached \$1603.68 up to Wednesday afternoon. In addition a committee composed of Connie Reed, C. L. Anderson and W. E. "Cap" Carbel have collected a total of \$685.00 up to Wednesday afternoon. All of this money will be turned over to the Silvertown Disaster Committee, composed of county officials and prominent citizens of that city, to be distributed as that committee sees fit.

The Main Street Church of Christ at Lockney collected and sent \$600 in cash this week direct to the Silvertown Church of Christ to be dispensed by that body.

In addition to the above donations, various individuals began a volunteer fund for the E. E. Puckett family early this week and that fund totaled \$200.00 up to Wednesday afternoon. The Pucketts lived 18 miles northeast of Lockney and their home was completely destroyed and Mrs. Puckett killed by the tornado. A similar fund has been given to the Pucketts by Paducah friends; it was reported here. The Pucketts lived at Paducah previous to moving here December 28, 1956.

Also in addition to all the above contributions some local people have made donations direct to the Silvertown Disaster Committee. It was reported to The Beacon but no record of those donations was available here.

The Seale Drive-In Theatre was scheduled to run a special show for the tornado victims Wednesday evening of this week with all proceeds going to that cause. The amount collected there was unavailable at press time.

A considerable quantity of used clothing and used furniture has been donated by various individuals of this area and some of it is being stored here until the victims are in position to use it. Organizations assisting in this effort included the I. O. O. F., Lodge, the Rebekah Lodge, the Legion Auxiliary and possibly others. Connie Reed took a semi-trailer truck load of clothing to Silvertown last weekend and another pick-up load was taken later.

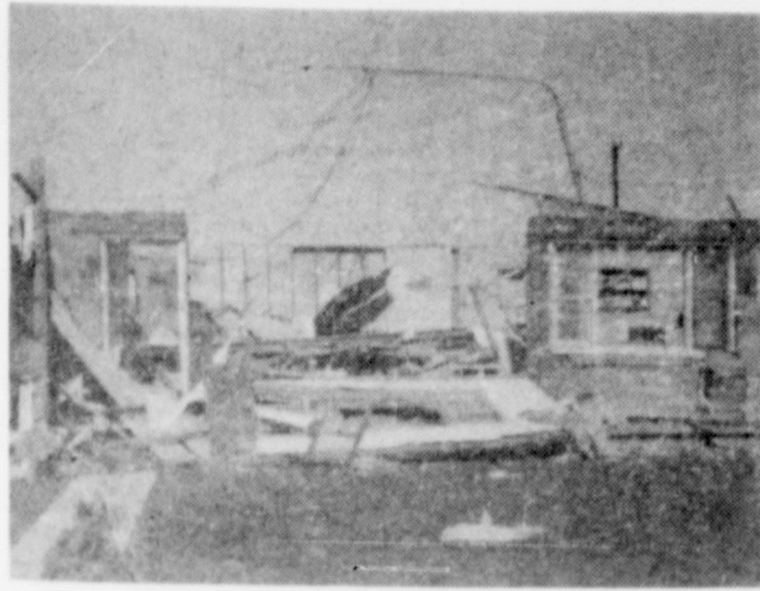
## Mrs. Mary Johnson Surgery Thursday

Funeral services for Mrs. E. E. Puckett, killed last Wednesday night when a tornado struck her farm home, 16 miles north and 2 miles east of Lockney, were held at the First Baptist Church in Paducah Saturday afternoon. Conducting the services were Rev. H. H. Segel, pastor of the Lone Star Baptist Church and Rev. W. N. Stout, pastor of the Missionary Baptist Church at Paducah. Burial was in the Paducah cemetery.

Mrs. Puckett was born Billie Joyce Moore on January 18, 1927 at Duke, Okla. The family later moved to Paducah and she was married there on July 4, 1944 to E. E. Puckett. The couple lived at Paducah until December 28, 1956, when they rented the farm north of Lockney and moved there.

Mrs. Puckett was a member of the Lone Star Baptist Church and was active in church work. Survivors include her husband, E. E. Puckett, two children, Pat, age 10, and Linda, age 8; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Moore of Lockney; one sister, Mrs. Esco Roberson of Altus, Okla.

## Crosby Official Is Indicted

Roy W. Karr, 46, Crosby County Precinct 2 Commissioner, was indicted by a 72nd District Court Grand Jury Monday on charges of felony theft of public funds. Karr resigned his post Friday.

The six indictments allege thefts by false pretext involving more than \$10,000 in checks cashed on the Crosby County Precinct 2 road and bridge fund. District Judge Victor H. Lindsey set bonds of \$1,500 for Karr on each of the six indictments.

The grand jury returned its report to Judge Lindsey Monday after five days of deliberation.

## Wiley Case May Go To Jury At Lubbock Today

The trial of Maury Wade Wiley of Lockney in United States District Court at Lubbock may go to the jury today (Thursday) it was indicated late Wednesday. Wiley, former president of the First National Bank, is charged with 11 counts of embezzlement between October 29, 1951 and December 31, 1954.

The prosecution completed its testimony Wednesday and the defense was expected to complete its testimony sometime Thursday.

Witnesses for the prosecution included Joe Wilson, cashier of the bank; Charles Haner, national bank examiner from Dallas; Revis Harris, Charlie Boedeker, R. D. Spruiell, W. W. Blair, Bob Merrell, Roy E. Brown, C. H. Hastings, T. O. Thornton, all farmers; R. E. Patterson and Gilbert Bean, elevator men; C. E. Coleman, former Aiken business man; T. T. Hamilton, Floyd County tax assessor-collector; Mrs. Wayne Bybee, assistant cashier of the local bank; and Edgar Branch, a former employee of the local bank.

Testimony generally followed the line of Wiley's first trial in which the jury failed to agree upon a verdict. The bank examiner told of a "non-ledger asset fund" from which Wiley made loans to worthy individuals. Other witnesses told of loans received from the bank and the amounts of interest paid.

Representing Wiley are E. A. Simpson, Amarillo, and Ernest Langley, Hereford. Prosecutors are U. S. District Attorney Heard L. Floore and his assistant, Cavett S. Binion, both of Fort Worth.

## National Cotton Week Observed

Austin. — Texas will participate in a week-long program designed to stimulate the sales of cotton products.

Proclaiming the week of May 20 through 25 as National Cotton Week, Governor Price Daniel pointed out that cotton accounts for more than 38 per cent of Texas' farm marketings and brings an income of more than \$730 million annually at the farm level.

"Programs aimed at increasing consumption of cotton, cottonseed, and their products benefit millions of people who share in cotton's prosperity," the Governor said.

National Cotton Week, now in its 27th year, is sponsored by the National Cotton Council. More than 17,000 retail stores across the nation are taking part this year.

Cotton planters were straining at the bit Wednesday, and farmers are anxiously awaiting dry ground to plant cotton. That is, some of them are. Others have already started planting, doing some "mudding in" hoping to get a good stand in spite of unfavorable conditions.

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## Minute Editorials

THEREFORE if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things become new. — II Cor. 5:17.

THE QUALITY that makes this country great has been exemplified since the disaster at Silverton and vicinity. A spontaneous expression of concern and sympathy for those affected has been in evidence. In addition to the more than \$1800 in cash raised here up to Monday several truck loads of clothing and used furniture has been sent to those in need. Everyone has joined in to help with several different organizations adding their efforts to those of individuals. Everyone is concerned. Everyone is sympathetic, especially to those who lost loved ones. Everyone wants to help. Not only in the Lockney community but all over the plains and elsewhere are similar movements underway. It is comforting, we know, to those affected that they do have the sympathy and assistance of their neighbors.

FARMERS ARE concerned about planting cotton. Very little has been planted in this community and now it appears (Monday) that if no more rain falls, it will be the last of this week before planting can begin. But, as we remember it, some mighty good cotton crops have been made when planted the latter part of May so there is still time.

WE BELIEVE that organized labor is a necessity to the welfare of the nation as a whole. If labor wasn't organized some employees, probably a lot of them, would force their labor to work at starvation wage and exploit the working man in every way possible. Labor organizations generally speaking have done a great thing in making it possible for the lab-

oring man to earn a decent wage. But organized labor has some weaknesses and one of them, as we see it, is their determination to defend their officials and their actions even when it is obvious that wrong has been done. If Dave Beck had been working for someone other than a labor union he wouldn't have lasted as long as a snowball in you know where but since he is a labor boss then some laboring men contend that he can do no wrong even though they stand to lose more than anyone else by his wrong doings. Wouldn't it be better for organized labor just to admit that Beck did wrong, kick him out, try to clean up the organization and start over. Why try to defend a man who has by all standards of decency betrayed your confidence and hurt the organization he works for? Looks foolish to us.

WE'RE GROSSING MORE and netting less than ever before." Business men all over the country are complaining about the same condition. It's a condition that has come about within the past two years and appears to be getting worse. And it's not a condition that is affecting just the smaller places. One local business man reported that he had given away \$100 in one month to various causes, most of which were of little value to the community. Be considerate of the business men and don't expect him to pick up the bill for every community project. There are other ways of raising money.

YOUR MAIL SERVICE will be poorer starting July 1, so it is reported. Mr. Summerfield, the Postmaster General, is going to show Congress that he is running that department. The Congress cut his budget and he is unhappy about it. So he is going to take it out on the Poor Public who will howl so much that Congress will be forced to restore the cut. Mr. Summerfield knows how to put the pressure on. It would be a shame if Congress could find some way to throw him out of office.

### FARMERS BEWARE

Farmers had better get behind their farm organizations and push them into a better job of public relations or they may soon find themselves holding the snipe sack. More and more magazines are turning their "big guns" on the farmer. Never in the history of man has the farmer been so villainized and if it continues the farmer may be forced to let the nation starve via refusal to produce, to show these pencil pushers that the farmer deser-

ves a share of the national prosperity.

In last week's Life magazine, an editorial was devoted to the National Budget. A part of that editorial reads:

"Sacred Cows. Some \$3.5 billion, or 5%, is for farm subsidies of various kinds. Never has so much money been given away to so few 'unneeded' people as our farm subsidies give to American farmers. If there is any economic monstrosity in the budget, this is it. Some \$1 billion of this sum is for modern Republicanism's efforts (via the soil bank) to reduce the problem itself. But the rest is a built-in vested interest that Congress ought to root out but doesn't dare."

What the editorial does not mention or even advocate, is the cutting out billions in subsidies to big industry, steam shippers, aviation, oil companies, and related fields of our economy. Nor does it mention high tariffs on imported goods and low or no tariffs on imported farm products. — Cecil O. Waggoner in Claude News.

Willie Frances Rea, age five years, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. T. J. Rea of Lockney, died at the family home at 1:45 Sunday morning. Funeral services were held at the Methodist Church Sunday afternoon. She is survived by her parents, three brothers and two sisters.

Homer Howard, postmaster here, attended the Postmasters Convention at Wichita Falls last week.

May 25, 1945

Pvt. John B. Reeceer was killed in action in Germany February 8, according to a telegram received by his wife in Plainview Wednesday morning. He is survived by his wife and two sons of Plainview, his

parents, Mr. and Mrs. Rev. Reeceer and one sister, Charlie Cross, also of Lockney, and another sister, Mrs. Hanna, Floydada.

Approximately 2500 have been pledged toward the construction of a lighted field for Lockney High School.

Commemoration exercises were held Thursday night on boys and twenty girls Terry Perkins was valedictorian and Miss Fannie Lee Mason was salutatorian.

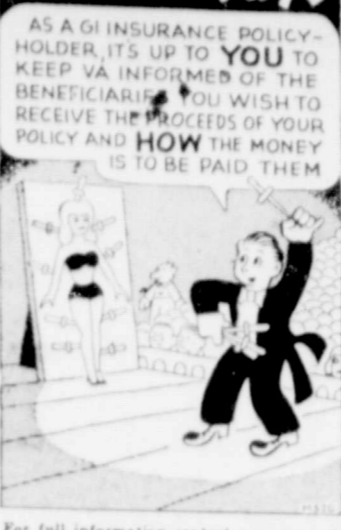

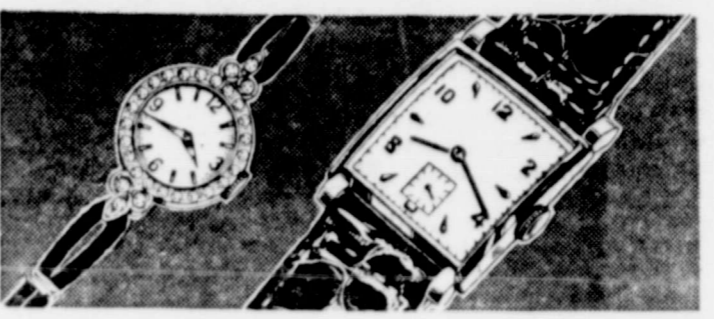

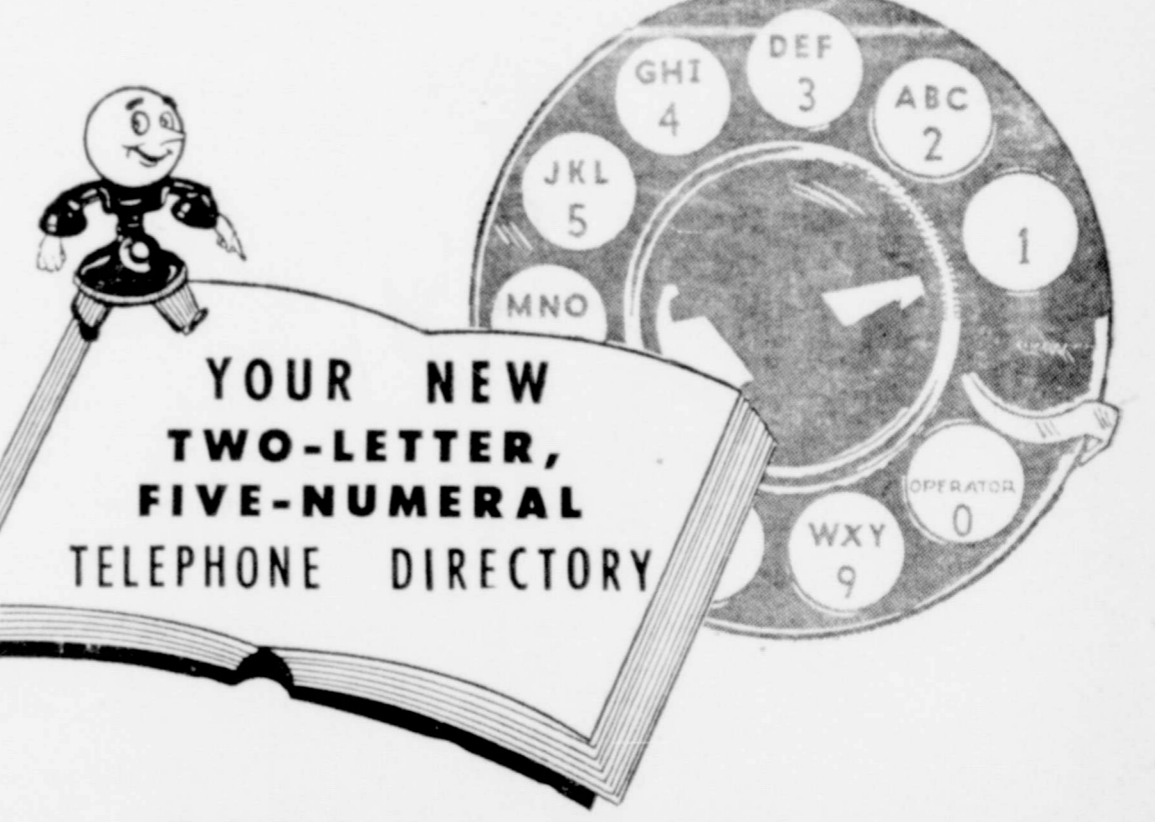

## Citizen Group Hears Bond Man

The Citizens School Committee along with trustees of the Lockney school system heard discussions on the school's finances in a meeting held Monday evening. Present and speaking to the group was Bob Davis, representing an investment banking firm of Amarillo.

Board Secretary Robert Lee Smith first gave the group a report on present financial condition of the school. He said that the present bonded indebtedness of the school district is \$344,000.00 which does not include one \$11,000 bond and another bond in the amount of approximately \$1200 from the South Plains school district which the Board is in process of paying off. Total amount in the interest and sinking fund at present is \$49,723.00. This money is used of course, to pay off bonded indebtedness as it comes due.

Total valuation of the district now stands at approximately \$7,484,000. He compared this with Floydada which has about \$10,000,000. Abernathy, which has \$13,000,000 and Tulla which has \$12,500,000. The local tax rate is \$1.50 with \$1.00 of that amount for maintenance and 50 cents for retiring indebtedness.

Regarding valuations, he said that the better irrigated land is valued at \$125 per acre while dry land runs from \$30 to \$40 per acre. Lake land is valued at \$5 per acre and pasture land at \$15 per acre. The land is taxed on the basis of 40% of the above valuations. Brick houses are valued at \$3.75 per square foot while frame houses are valued at \$2.25 per square foot.

If 100% of the taxes were collected the amount would run approximately \$105,000 per year, Mr. Smith said. He said collections usually ran around 95 to 96%.

Mr. Davis discussed Senate Bill 116 which was passed by the last session of the legislature. This bill gives school districts more freedom in handling their finances and enables them many times to get better interest rates on bond issues, he pointed out.

Mr. Davis also answered numerous questions concerning bond issues, and told of procedures used by other schools in voting bonds.

## V. F. Lambert Asks For Co-Operation

V. F. Lambert, who is in charge of hauling trash from barrels in the city, asks that residents keep grass out of their barrels if they want him to haul off their trash. "Sometimes we find a barrel packed solid with grass," he said, "and we can't unload the barrel or get the grass out." Hereafter we won't empty the barrel if it has grass in it."

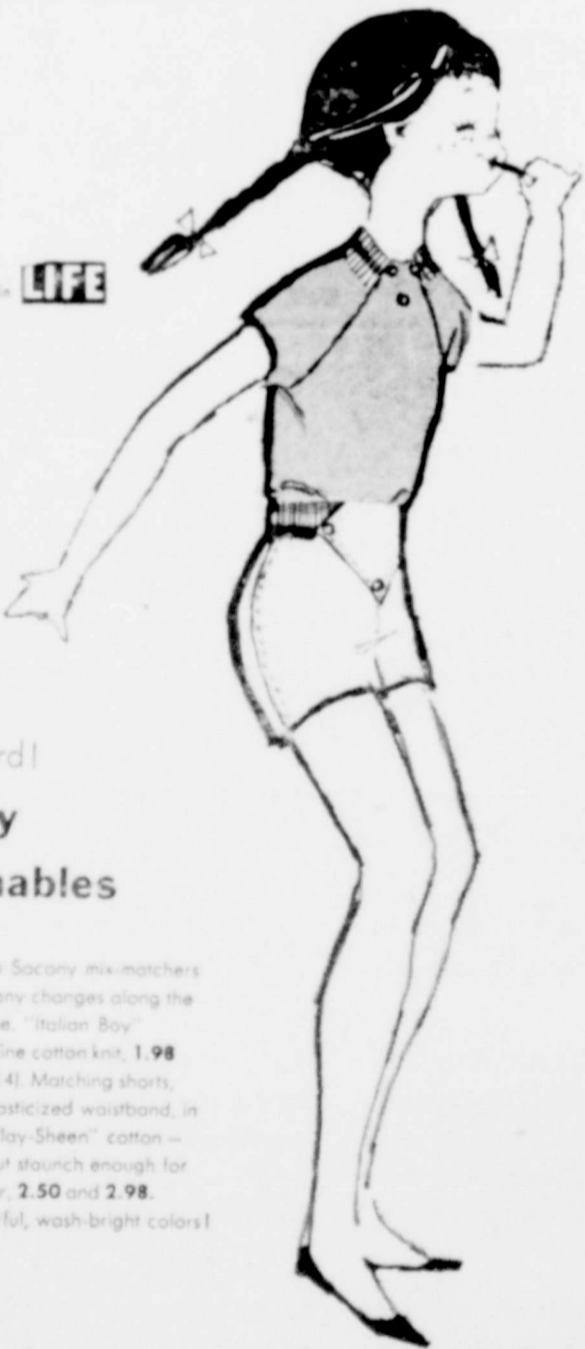

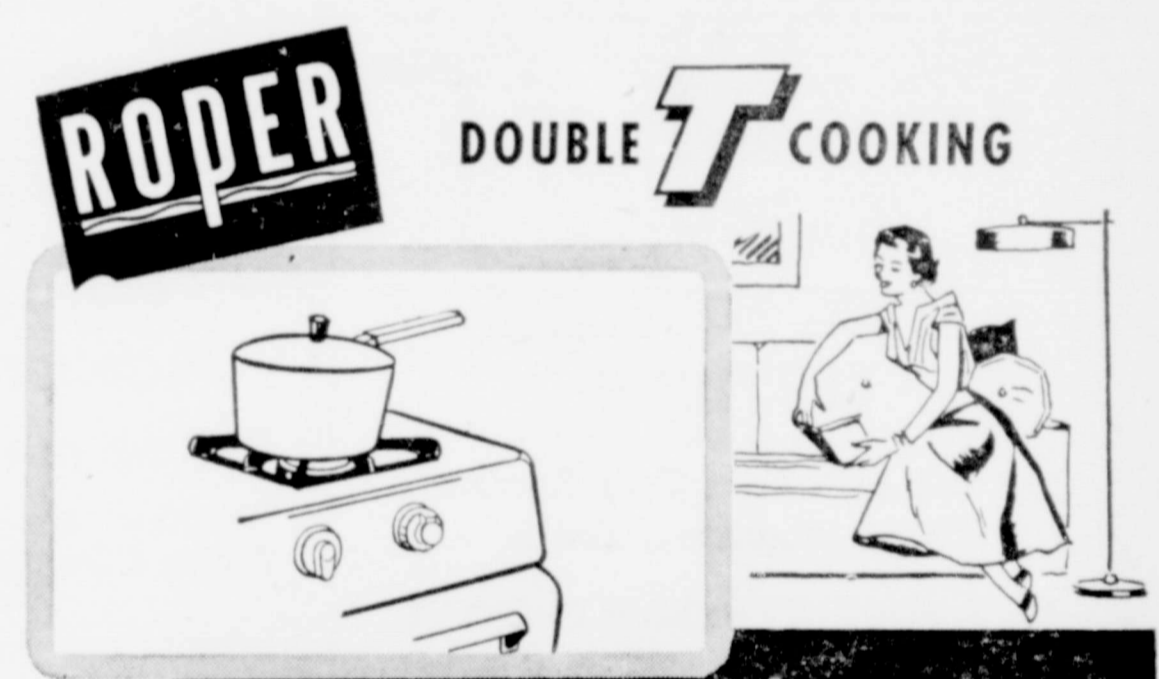

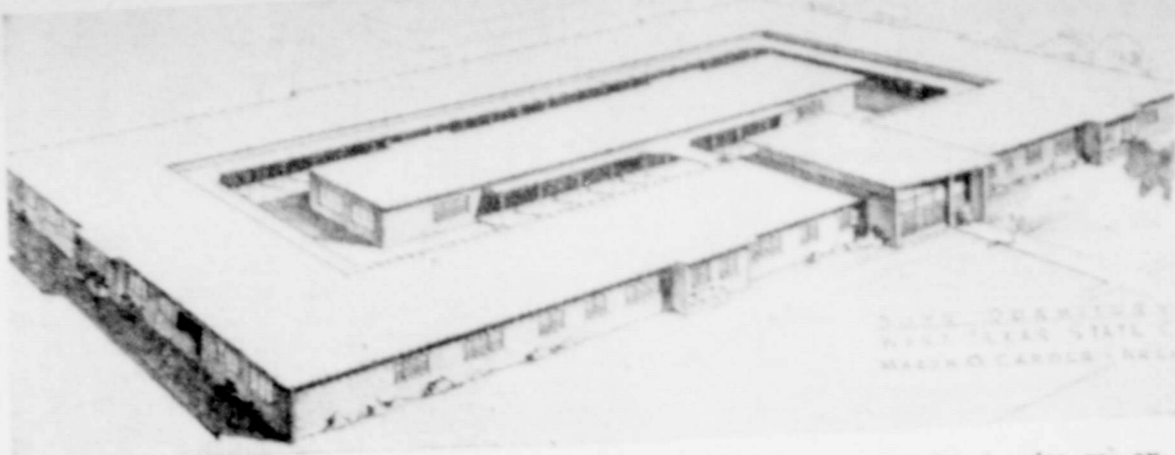
The money along with clothing and furniture has been turned over to the committee at Silverton for distribution. If there should be any donations left they will be given to the Salvation Army.

Two new dormitories for men and women are nearing completion at West Texas State College and will be ready for the fall semester in September. Long one-story brick buildings, the dormitories feature separate housing units for 12 and 16 students

each. Each unit opens into a central court, with one main outside entrance at the front of each structure. The units feature four bedrooms, with central bath facilities and lounges and study rooms. An addition to Stafford Hall for men and an addition to the

college cafeteria also are expected to be completed for the fall, with total construction costs at WTSC running \$1,600,000. Pictured are the men's dormitory already named Terrill Hall, and the entrance to the women's unit, named Brown Hall.

### Maurice Ewing Awarded Medal

Dr. Maurice Ewing, professor of Geology at Columbia University and director of the Lamont Geological Observatory, a division of the University, has awarded the William Bowie Medal of the American Geophysical Union.

The Bowie Medal is the highest honor awarded by the American Geophysical Union. It is given for distinguished attainment and outstanding contribution to the advancement of cooperative research in fundamental geophysics. This is the nineteenth award of the Medal.

Professor Beno Gutenberg, director of the Seismological Laboratory of the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, California, in presenting the citation, said of Dr. Ewing: "He has extended his activities beyond the limits of his own specialty to active work with scientists in other fields, and he has contributed, unafraid of critical review, to research in diverse geophysical fields. He has unselfishly sacrificed time and energy in meeting and correspondence with men in other sciences, even if these cannot be expected to bring tangible rewards in the form of papers by his own pen.

"His main achievement, the

successful introduction of geophysical tools into deep sea exploration, combines research in several different geophysical disciplines. I do not know of any candidate who has a greater amount of cooperative research in fundamental geophysics to his credit than our medalist."

Professor Gutenberg said that Dr. Ewing was the unanimous choice of the Bowie Medal Committee.

The American Geophysical Union, which has a membership of 5,000, was established in 1919 by the National Research Council. It is the American section of the International Union of Geodesy and Geophysics, a union of the geophysical associations of forty-five nations.

Dr. Ewing is a graduate of Lockney High School and Rice Institute at Houston.

Ed Bryant of Fountain Valley, Colo., a Lockney High School graduate, has become an extremely active member in Colorado's District Three PTA Association; over a four year period he has been elected president of the organization three terms and vice-president once.

Bryant, a staff member of Fountain Valley School, is an invaluable member at any task he undertakes. The veteran of the South Pacific campaign in World War II, puts forth his best effort — whether it be to organize a bake sale for the PTA, set up a six months program for the Lions Club (which he accomplished in record time), or take measures to prevent the Fountain Valley School from flooding (which he did during a recent storm). Bryant is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Bryant, Fountain, Colorado, and a grandson of the late Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Bennett, Lockney.

### High Water Causes Youths To Abandon Baptist Camp

Floydada. — Approximately 235 members of the Lubbock Area Royal Ambassadors and their counselors broke camp Saturday morning at Plains Baptist Encampment near Floydada and returned home in the wake of rising waters of the White River.

Saturday's program was canceled and the boys began leaving shortly after reveille.

The encampment is located about seven miles northeast of Floydada and about a mile east of Highway 62 in the canyon of the White River, which divides the camp into two parts.

Boys and their adult counselors located on the west bank were able to get out without any trouble, but those on the east bank had to wait for trucks from Floydada to get them out.

The trucks attached chains to the marooned cars and pulled them across the bridge two at a time. At 8 a. m. when the evacuation began, water was up to the level of car headlights on the bridge according to a camp official. By 10 a. m. the level had dropped about 10 inches however. By then, about 80 per cent of the boys were out of the camp area.

Some of the boys got wet and muddy in the rain and flood but that was the worst that happened to anyone, the official stated, unless one counts the breakfast missed by 118 boys on the west bank who could not get to the mess hall on the east bank.

The convalesce opened at 5 p. m. Friday with registration followed by supper and a camp fire service at 9 p. m. The camp fire portion was called off and the service was moved into the

encampment tabernacle where spoke on the theme of a talk aimed at the el of experience.

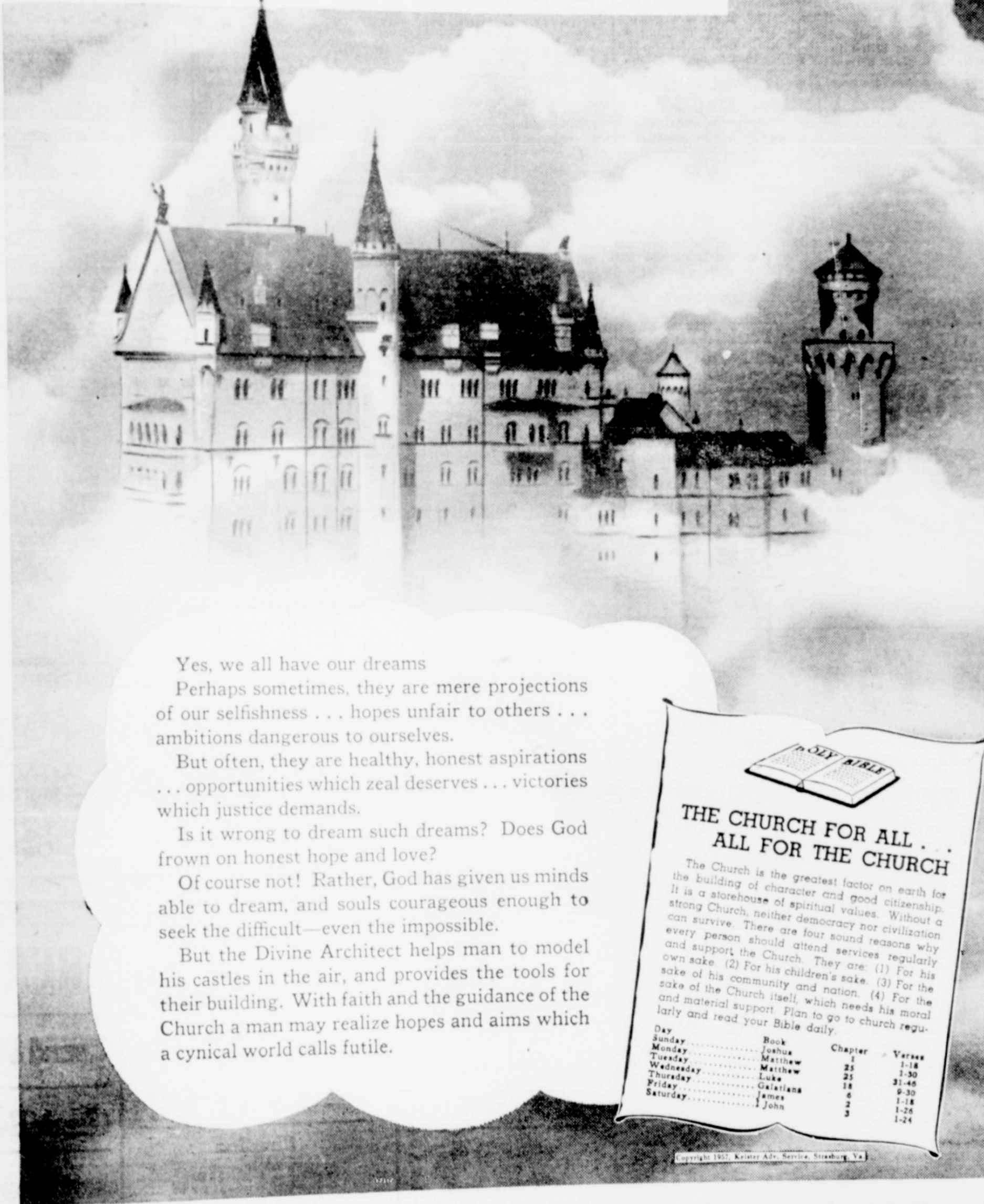

### Pat And Linda Puckett Are Both Improving

Pat and Linda Puckett, both injured in the tornado which destroyed their farm home 18 miles northeast of Lockney last Wednesday evening, are both improving and "doing fine", according to a report from their grandfather, Henry Moore Tuesday afternoon.

Linda, age 8, underwent surgery in Methodist Hospital at Lubbock Monday and her limbs were put in traction. She suffered a broken thigh on one leg and the other leg was broken just below the hip joint. She

also suffered a severe head injury. The little girl must spend 4 to 6 weeks in traction and then 8 to 12 weeks in a cast, her grandfather said. She also had numerous cuts, bruises and skin punctures over her entire body. She was unconscious when found.

Pat, age 10, suffered no broken bones but was badly battered about his entire body. He is in Lockney General Hospital. He suffered two scalp wounds, one of them serious, facial cuts and bruises and probably more than 100 cuts, bruises and lacerations over his entire body. He was found wandering about the place soon after the tornado and was able to lead rescuers to his sister and the body of his mother, who was killed in the disaster. He suffered a light

concussion.

First to reach the scene was W. D. (Doc) Peugh, a neighbor, and his family. They were in a pickup and trying to escape the storm when they saw the Puckett house disintegrate. They immediately went to the aid of the family, bringing the two children in to the Lockney General Hospital for treatment.

Thomas Marr, local rural carrier, A. J. Jester and a highway patrolman went in Marr's 4-wheel drive jeep out after Mrs. Puckett's body, arriving back in town sometime after midnight.

Mr. Puckett was in New Mexico on business when the tornado struck.

Some 40 or 50 men of the neighborhood were reported to have gathered at the Puckett place Wednesday morning to clean up the debris and salvage anything that could be found.
