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## C-C Committee Opposes Phone Rate Raise

The Public Affairs committee of the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, in a meeting Tuesday afternoon, passed a resolution expressing opposition to the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's request for a rate raise and pointing to the firm's failure to answer repeated requests for extension of their lines in an area north of Lockney.

The resolution was addressed to the City Council of the City of Lockney and urged that the rate increase not be granted. The resolution in part reads as follows: "This committee urgently requests that our Council not grant a rate increase at this time, as we feel that such increase is not warranted either by services rendered by the company or by operational necessity. We know and feel that the Council should give every consideration to this request, and the committee is ready and willing to meet with you and the telephone company for full and complete explanation of the necessity of this request by the said telephone company."

"We further request that you point out to the company our request of some two or three years standing for extended services to the north of Lockney, serving some 15 or 20 subscribers, said request having been taken under advisement but completely stopped either within the Plainview or Lubbock offices without complete action or explanation. We realize this request has no bearing on rate increases, however, it is our belief that if Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. wished to continue requesting rate increases, the citizens of Lockney are certainly entitled the service expansion necessary for our continued growth and development, and the company should, in all good faith, dispose of our request for extending services before asking for this rate increase."

## August 8th Is Date For Aiken Seed Meeting

Thursday of next week, August 8th, is the date set for the 10th annual Aiken Seed Meeting, sponsored this year by the Aiken Elevator and Paymaster Farm. The meeting will be held on the Paymaster Gin yard at Aiken and free watermelon will be served to everyone.

Charles Andrews said Wednesday, starting time is 8 p. m. The program this year includes talks by outstanding soil men of West Texas. Ellis Taylor, seed man with Paymaster Farm will be the master of ceremonies.

Kenneth Porter of the Amarillo Experiment Station will speak to the group on "Wheat Varieties." He will be followed by Jack King of the Lubbock Experiment Station who will speak on "Certified Seeds."

Ollie Limer, Hale County agricultural agent, will tell the group something about crop conditions in Hale County while Lynn Pittard, Floyd County's assistant agent will talk on the same subject concerning Floyd County crops.

Mr. Andrews said that everyone is invited, especially farmers and their families in Floyd and Hale Counties. He asked that those attending bring their own spoons and salt shakers.

## Onion Demand Is Good, Price Low

Although the demand for onions is good the price remains low and was quoted here at around \$1.35 per 50 lb. sack for the Spanish Sweets Wednesday.

The harvest is probably 75 percent complete, according to Al Heskett of the Lockney Vegetable Growers Association.

Planting of lettuce is under way with some already up to a stand. Mr. Heskett said. He estimated that 200 acres was up in this area and thought that probably 1,000 acres of lettuce may be planted altogether.

The Lockney area has an excellent cantaloupe crop which is now maturing. Harvest will probably begin between August 10 and 15. There are some 900 acres of cantaloupes planted in this area.

Some prospects of the building of a lettuce pre-cooling plant here have been heard but plans for the building have been postponed until next year, it was reported this week.

## Stadium Seat Sales Pass Half-Way Mark

R. L. Knox Jr., secretary-treasurer of the Lockney Quarterback Club, said Wednesday that sales of stadium seats had passed the half-way mark and that a total of \$1390.00 was deposited in the fund Tuesday night.

The project is to sell \$2,000 to \$2,500 worth of 5-year reserve seat contracts in the center section of the home stadium at Mitchell-Zimmerman Field here with the money derived from the sales going to make a down payment on a new stadium for the visitors side of the field. The present visitors side of the field has old frame bleachers that have been in use for many years.

One hundred new reserved seats, all between the 35 yard lines in the home stadium are being offered for sale and more than half of them have been sold, Knox said. In addition a three-year extension on the old contracts to present holders of seats is being sold along with the new seats. Although the old contracts still have two years to go, the extensions are being sold now for an additional three years to provide money needed for the new stadium.

Knox said that co-operation of the public is needed to determine who holds title to some of the reserved seats on the old contract. He asked that anyone who has reserve seat tickets which they did not buy from the school originally but acquired them from some other person to contact him or some other member of the selling committee so that they would have a record of the seat owner. Some reserve seats have changed hands once or twice and the school now has no record of the real owner of the seats. This is necessary if the seat owner wishes to continue to use the seat after the termination of the present contract.

Members of the selling committee, in addition to Knox, are Leon Wofford, R. H. Ford, Elmer Lee Stapp, Fred Huggins, and G. B. Johnson.

Present holders of seat contracts on row 1 and row 11 are being given first chance to buy the new seats because of the poor location of their present seats.

The sale of the seats is being rushed in order to let contract on the stadium so that it will be ready for the first home game of the season which will be played with Dimmitt here on September 13.

## BAKED RICE CASSEROLE

A baked rice casserole to serve with chicken or ham is this recipe: Cook 1 1/2 cups raw rice. Sauté 1 green pepper and 1 onion (both chopped fine) in 3 tablespoons butter. Add to rice along with 1 cup chopped parsley, 2 cups milk, 3 beaten eggs, 2 cups grated sharp American cheese, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Mix and bake in a buttered casserole at 350 degrees F. (moderate oven) for 1 hour. This dish can be prepared the day before.

**High Plains Station Has Soybean Project**

Research projects on soy- beans at the High Plains Sta- tion include 10 varieties in 100 foot plots four rows to the plot. Each plot is repeated four times with a total of 160 rows in irrigated plots. One variety is being tested in the dryland area at the station in four plots.

Fifty varieties of soybeans have been planted in observa- tion test plots, 22 feet long. These observation plots are al- so repeated four times.

The fertilizer program for soybeans include 60 plots with

40, 80 and 120 pounds of phos- phate and a standard applica- tion of 40 pounds per acre of nitrogen each.

Forty plots of soybeans have been planted to test the meth- od and rate of planting for this crop. Method of planting in- cludes one row per bed and two rows per bed, with rows in the latter being 14 inches apart.

There are five different rates of seeding with 40, 50, 60, 70 and 80 pounds of seed per acre planted.

These soybeans tests will give some of the answers to

questions raised by farmers on soybeans in the High Plains area.

### Local Firemen Attend Training School At A&M

Connie Reed and J. C. Elliott, members of the Lockney Volunteer Fire Department, returned Saturday from College Station where they attended the annual Texas Firemen's Training School on the campus of A&M. A total of 1028 men attended the week-long event.

In addition to the training in fire fighting which the two men received at the school, their attendance earned a key rate credit on fire insurance rates for the City of Lockney.

The school is sponsored by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshal's Association and is conducted by the Engineering Extension Service of the Texas A. and M. College system.

In addition to the regular firefighting courses, special features of this year's school included training in radiation and radiological monitoring, rescue operations, and field demonstrations of the latest methods of fire control.

Basic courses in firefighting were given to men attending the school for the first time, and advanced courses were conducted for experienced firefighters. Special courses were given for fire marshalls, fire officers, fire department instructors, and military and industrial firemen.

Attending the school were representatives from 373 cities in Texas and 23 other states in 13 states other than Texas. Also 62 represented military bases and installations and there was one representative from outside the continental United States.
