

We didn't say anything, but I know that we were both thanking God for all the blessings he'd bestowed on us. I know that we were feeling, just then, particularly


at peace with ourselves, and with the universe. I was thinking, too, of our kids as they'd come out of Sunday School that morning, with their bright faces glowing, and I gave a silent vote of gratitude to my parents for having raised me in the Church. In this high pressure, jet-propelled age we're living in, we need so much to guide our children in the right way. Without the aid of the Church I, for one, would be at a total loss-and that afternoon I realized it, with particular

I suppose, when you come right down to it, we really didn't do so much, that Sunday. But it was a day that left me with a feeling of family unity, of togetherness . . . I shall never forget.

Sometimes, when things are "at sixes and sevens," a parent needs to take time out to remember just how precious a family is. Whenever I find myself in danger of forgetting-I just dust off my movie and live that Sunday all over again, to myself.




