THE FOURTH ANNUAL Floyd County Fair is history now but it is history that can be pointed to with pride by those who were responsible for putting it on. Despite the fact that the carnival cancelled out at the last minute and the fair officials were unable to get another, we think it was probably the most enjoyable fair thus far. The big singing added a lot to the fair this year. The few kiddie rides that were secured pretty well took care of the children. Other entertainment was provided for other ages and groups and a good time was had by all. It appeared to The Beacon man.

SAME DEPARTMENTS had better exhibits this year and others were not so good but the overall average would indicate that the exhibits were better. The livestock show was good, thanks to The Floyd County Aberdeen Angus Association. Agricultural exhibits were fewer probably due to the lateness of the crop.

PRESIDENT CHARLIE BOEDER said his directors, along with the various department superintendents, assistant superintendents and other workers are due the credit for the success of the fair. They all worked hard and faithfully. The fact that more local people attended this fair than the one

last year indicates the appreciation of the people for their efforts.

MORE AND MORE improvements are being made on the big fair building. Eventually it will be all fixed up and provide ample space for all the fair exhibits and booths. Commercial booth space was more in demand this year than in previous years. This demand will probably grow. One thing The Beacon would like to see built—a permanent building to take the place of the big tent which was rented this year. Maybe it could be built by public subscription. It would be a worthy addition to the fair property.

THE VEGETABLE business has made a definite contribution to the business life of this community this summer. Almost every business man has benefitted to some degree as a result of the thousands of acres of vegetables planted in this area. Capital investments made by those in the vegetable business would indicate that they are here to stay — and if that is true it is likely that vegetable acreage will increase from year to year. We have been told over and over again that the vegetable business is not one to get into one year and out of the next year. We have also been told that there will be high spots and low spots. We have had them both. With the irrigation water available here and the fine soil it would appear that all of us, farmers and business men alike, will profit by this community getting into the vegetable business more and more. As one Floydada man says, why grow \$100 per acre crops on \$1,000 per acre land?

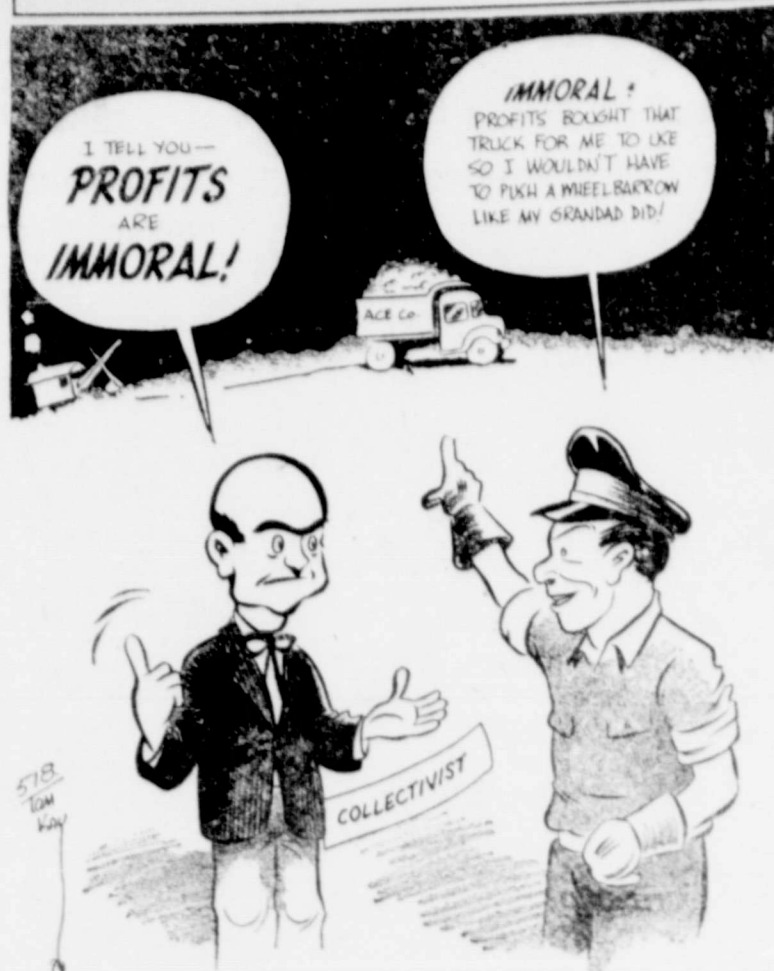

SILLY IS THE WORD
The New York Board of Education has decided to drop Mark Twain's famous story, "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," from its list of classroom textbooks. It does, magnanimously, leave students free to read the book if they care to take it from the libraries. The Board has dropped "Huckleberry Finn" from its textbook list because it considers it "racially offensive." The story deals with a truant boy's adventures in the Mississippi valley in the 1840's.

This action makes about as much sense as the recent decision of the networks to revise Stephen Collins Foster's famous folk songs because they contained words which might offend members of a racial minority. It seems this sensitiveness of certain groups — or their advisors — has reached a point of absurdity. The books and songs were written in past periods and use expressions current in those days. They do not necessarily have any meaning now. If an effort is made to censor everything that ever has been written which might offend someone, practically all literature will have to be tossed out the window. This modern squeamish attitude goes beyond sensitiveness. It is plain silly. — Lubbock Avalanche.

FOLLOWING THE CROWD
Too many of us, and the writ-

er is no exception, tend to follow the crowd and "conform." However, much of the world's progress has been made by men and women who refused to conform when they thought the crowd, or the majority, was wrong.

It is very easy in life to accept gossip about those one has an inclination to be jealous of. It is a common fault for us to try to pull others down to our own level — if they have outperformed us in life in some way. Moreover, the tendency of too many of us is to belittle things we do not understand, dislike in those with whom we disagree and to close our minds to learning after we have reached a certain age in life. There is usually a high price

to pay when one bucks the majority, or when one refuses to follow the crowd. If everyone around us idles away their afternoon, that is no reason why we should idle away ours. If a certain type of work is frowned upon by the so-called social set, that is no reason why some good, honest sweat should not be expended by any man or woman who puts common-sense ahead of false pride. It is good for all of us to evaluate our lives and our philosophies and give some thought to standing on our own two feet. It is easy to follow the crowd. But remember the crowd is often wrong. — Lamb County Leader.

September 22, 1927

Maurice Ewing, son of Mr. and Mrs. F. F. Ewing of this city, came Monday for a short visit with his parents before his return to Rice Institute where he received his B. A. and M. A. degrees last year. He is now working at the Institute on his PHD degree. He did geological work in Kansas this summer.

"Everything is in readiness for the greatest Fair ever held in Floyd County," are the words of officials of the fair. The event begins at Floydada Thursday at 10 a. m. with eliminations in the South Plains Croquet tournament and horse shoe pitching tournament. At 2:30 the first of a series of three polo games to be played between Wichita Falls and Snyder. Just before the game, two one-quarter mile horse races will be run. At 4 p. m. the Fair building will be open for exhibits. At 7:30 a concert will be presented by Floydada Municipal band.

September 21, 1945

A telegram sent directly

from Pvt. Floyd Horton was received by his parents on Wednesday night. "I am in Manila. See you soon. The parents are Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Horton who reside three miles east of Lockney. Horton was one of the men of Bataan who survived the "Death March" and three months in a Japanese prison camp. He is 23.

First Lieut. Paul Teuton, veteran of the rough fighting in the Italian campaign, has been here the past two weeks visiting his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Teuton and other relatives.

Funeral services were conducted Thursday at 3 p. m. at W. R. Sams at Main Street Church of Christ. Paul McClellan, Mr. Sams' son, was officiating. Mr. Sams was born in Kentucky to Collin County, Texas, in 1882 and in Lockney in Floyd County in 1908. The surviving children are Mrs. Sams, Lockney; Mrs. Frances Bushy, Alpine; Mrs. Frances Hawkins, Quitaque; Mrs. Ed Ayres, Lockney.

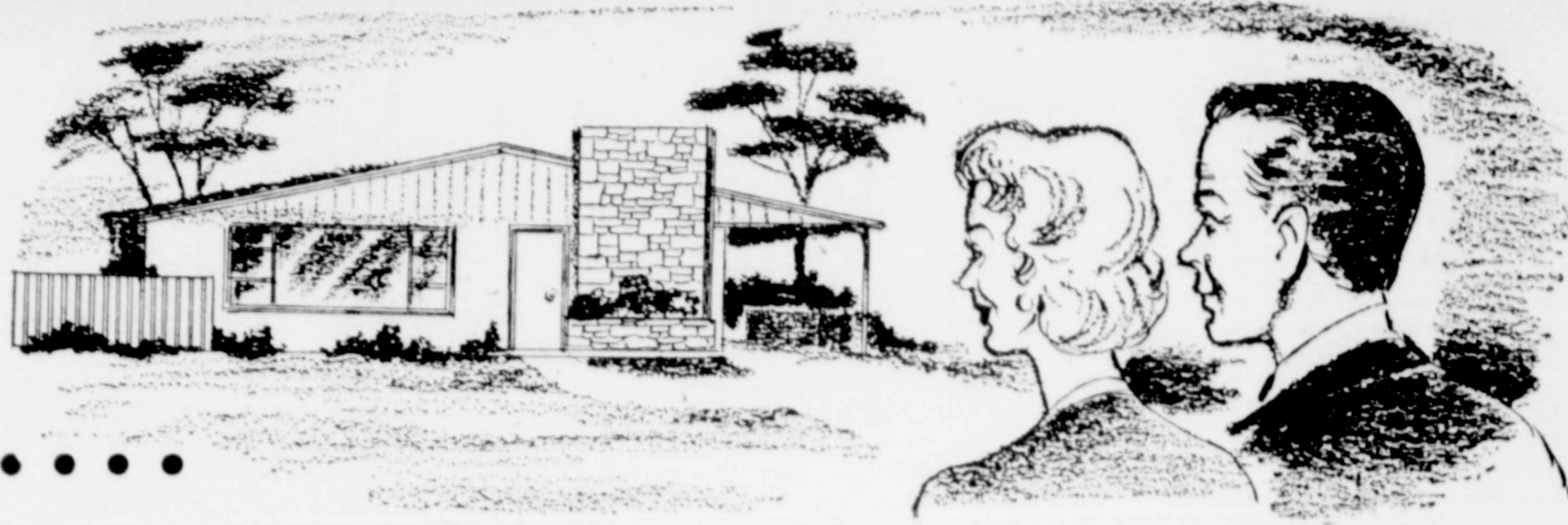



Frank Thomas Works On Gov. Daniel's Water Committee

Frank Thomas of Lockney was one of the 150 men from over the state who attended the meeting of the Governor's Water Planning Committee at Austin on Monday of last week, September 9th. The committee spent the entire day going over proposed legislation which would bring about the establishment of a state-wide water study and planning agency.

Also discussed at the meeting was the \$200 million dollar water bond amendment which will be voted on in November. The committee approved the proposed legislation and also the constitutional amendment almost 100 per cent, Frank said. Only one man on the 150-man committee dissented.

Others from this area who worked on the committee were H. S. Hillburn of Plainview and Tom McFarland of Lubbock.

Pointing out that the state is 25 years behind other western states in water conservation, Governor Daniel has set up this committee with the purpose of doing something about the conservation of water resources.

Frank says that the money for carrying on the work will be available by transfer from special funds which will not be used otherwise and therefore no new taxes will be required for this water legislation.

Frank pointed out that the proposed legislation specifically states that nothing in the Act shall affect or disturb any vested rights in underground water or other water rights vested under existing law, and also excluded from control the building of a dam or reservoir to impound not more than 200 acre feet of water for domestic or livestock purposes.

As pointed out by Governor Daniel, state-wide planning for future needs as to water resources has been recommended for years by practically every person and organization interested in water development. He proposed such a measure to the last session of the Legislature but the bill was not enacted.

Texas is one of the few states in the nation without an active state-wide water planning agency. If the state continues to neglect this matter, Governor Daniel says that one of two things will happen: The

federal agencies will write a Texas master plan and hand it over to the state on a "take-it-or-leave-it" basis, or Texas will have no plan and authorization and construction of necessary projects will be further delayed.

"Short on water and long on floods" is a symptom of neglect, the Governor pointed out, and a sign that something must be done at once.

Texas welcomes the operation of the Federal agencies in solving the water problem but the state must take the initiative and furnish the leadership in cooperation with local and Federal agencies, the Governor said.

Senator Lyndon Johnson sent a request on last July 17 to the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation asking that these two agencies begin immediately to work on a master plan for water conservation in Texas, asking further that they work in cooperation with state agencies. Both indicated a willingness to work on the matter but asked that the State take the lead in the matter.

This makes it all the more imperative that the State approve the water amendment in November and that the legislature approve the measure providing for a state planning committee.
