**2 Are Burned In Accident**

John Pigg and his employee, Frank Yeary, were both painfully burned Monday afternoon on the Pigg farm in the Lone Star community when sodium bichlorate which they were spraying on Johnson grass, caught fire.

Yeary had the most serious burns. According to reports from the Medical & Surgical Hospital here where he is under treatment, he suffered second and third degree burns over 30 per cent of his body. The most serious burns were on his right hand and his left thigh. He was reported to be improved Wednesday and resting well. However he will be hospitalized for some time.

Pigg is at Lockney General Hospital where it was reported he had some third degree burns on his thigh and second degree burns on his hands. He is also improving.

It was reported here that Yeary struck a match to burn a patch of grass and his clothing, which had absorbed some of the spray, ignited. Pigg went to his aid and his clothing also caught on fire.

The two men were brought to the local hospitals by Norman Caldwell and Bob Merrell.

**Frank Thomas Works On Gov. Daniel's Water Committee**

Frank Thomas of Lockney was one of the 150 men from over the state who attended the meeting of the Governor's Water Planning Committee at Austin on Monday of last week, September 9th. The committee spent the entire day going over proposed legislation which would bring about the establishment of a state-wide water study and planning agency.

Also discussed at the meeting was the \$200 million dollar water bond amendment which will be voted on in November. The committee approved the proposed legislation and also the constitutional amendment almost 100 per cent, Frank said. Only one man on the 150-man committee dissented.

Others from this area who worked on the committee were H. S. Hilburn of Plainview and Tom McFarland of Lubbock.

Pointing out that the state is 25 years behind other western states in water conservation, Governor Daniel has set up this committee with the purpose of doing something about the conservation of water resources.

Frank says that the money for carrying on the work will be available by transfer from special funds which will not be used otherwise and therefore no new taxes will be required for this water legislation.

Frank pointed out that the proposed legislation specifically states that nothing in the Act shall affect or disturb any vested rights in underground water or other water rights vested under existing law, and also excluded from control the building of a dam or reservoir to impound not more than 200 acre feet of water for domestic or livestock purposes.

As pointed out by Governor Daniel, state-wide planning for future needs as to water resources has been recommended for years by practically every person and organization interested in water development. He proposed such a measure to the last session of the Legislature but the bill was not enacted.

Texas is one of the few states in the nation without an active state-wide water planning agency. If the state continues to neglect this matter, Governor Daniel says that one of two things will happen: The

federal agencies will write a Texas master plan and hand it to the state on a "take-it-or-leave-it" basis, or Texas will have no plan and authorization and construction of necessary projects will be further delayed. "Short on water and long on floods" is a symptom of neglect, the Governor pointed out, and a sign that something must be done at once.

Texas welcomes the operation of the Federal agencies in solving the water problem but the state must take the initiative and furnish the leadership in cooperation with local and Federal agencies, the Governor said.

Senator Lyndon Johnson sent a request on last July 17 to the U. S. Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation asking that these two agencies begin immediately to work on a master plan for water conservation in Texas, asking further that they work in cooperation with state agencies. Both indicated a willingness to work on the matter but asked that the State take the lead in the matter.

This makes it all the more imperative that the State approve the water amendment in November and that the legislature approve the measure providing for a state planning committee.

**Foundation Run For Lettuce Cooler**

The foundation for a lettuce cooling tube has been run near the Lockney Vegetable Growers packing shed in South Lockney. Installation of the tube and equipment will take several days.

The lettuce harvest may start here around Sept. 25, vegetable men say but the peak of the harvest won't be reached before early October.

Howard was born Dec. 1875 at Spencer, Indiana. His family came to Texas, where he lived at Jacksboro around 1900. He came on to Floyd County in 1902, being among the first of this area.

Howard attended the Lockney Christian College, completing his education there. He taught school for 12 years in this county, teaching at Star, Meteor, Starkey, New (South Plains). He served as deputy sheriff of the county for a short time. He was a trustee for many years.

He served Lockney as postmaster from 1905 to 1914. He was in the military service from 1921 to 1933, and was the longest of his age who ever held the office. Howard was married to a Miss Massengale at Jacksboro in 1902 and she passed away in 1901. He was married to Essa Baxter in November 1922 at Lockney and she passed away in 1943. In 1947 he married to Eleanor Harris at Beach. She is among survivors.

Howard was a member of the Westminister Church at West Minister, Texas at the time of his death. He was a member of the West Side Church at Lockney. He was a member of the Lockney Masonic Lodge for more than 50 years. He was a member of the I. O. O. F. and the W. M. A. Funeral services were held at Beach, Calif. Tuition for the service on Saturday will be membership in the Lockney Masonic Lodge. His widow will accompany him to Lockney.

Survivors include his sons, Oscar of Keokuk, Iowa; Lewisville; Joe of Beach and Homer of Anaheim, Calif.; three daughters, Mrs. T. S. # LONGHORNS ROUT TULIA, 39-13

The Lockney Longhorns won their third straight game of the season, 39-13, Friday night at Tulia.

A fired-up Tulia team, using a sharp passing attack, threw a score into Lockney during the first half, but the powerful Longhorn machine got rolling after intermission and racked up 26 points to turn the game into a rout. Fumbles hurt the Longhorn attack the first half.

The lowly-rated Hornets scored first on an eight yard run. Chris Ward and kicked the extra point to hold team in the end zone in the second stanza with Lockney adding the point to bring the half-time count to a 13-13 tie.

Lockney's "Buggar" Barton and Willie Williams were the big ones in the Longhorn offense as each tallied two touchdowns. Big John Hest, Lockney's captain, again turned in an outstanding performance on his tackle and linebacker posts to lead the line.

Following is a summary of the game:

Lockney received the kickoff with Billy Karl Race returning a short kick to the Tulia 46. Williams picked up 7 yards on the second play from scrimmage, Tulia recovered a fumble on their own 48.

The Hornets lost 11, a pass kicked for S. Tulia received a yard offside penalty, made 1 yard and punted from their 39 to the Lockney 28.

Williams made 1 and Tulia again received a fumble on the Longhorn 29.

Tulia made 9 and 2 for a first on the Lockney 18. The Longhorns were charged with a five yard penalty, and a play gained 5 yards and another first on the S. Ward scored for Tulia with 6:45 left in the first quarter. The kick was good and Tulia was ahead, 7-0.

Race returned the kickoff to the Lockney 35, Williams gained 4 and Barton ripped off 26 yards for a first down on the Tulia 35. Barton made 2, Cliff Hardy gained 1, Race made 4 on a keeper, and Barton powered for another first on the Tulia 21. Hardy made 10 yards for another first on the 11, Hardy made 1, Race kept for 4, and Hardy raced into the end zone from 6 yards out to make the Tulia 7. Lockney 6, with 2:50 remaining to play in the first quarter. Lockney's kick for point was no good.

Following a slight delay due to light trouble, Hansi kicked deep into Hornet territory. Tulia committed a clipping foul on the 20 and they were penalized back to their own 5. Tulia gained 4, 1, 1, and punted to the Tulia 45. Race ran the punt back to the 34.

A fumble lost 6 yards and Williams was stopped on the line as the initial quarter came to an end with Tulia leading, 7-6.

Lockney had an incomplete pass and Race punted out of bounds on the Tulia 8 in the

opening moments of the second quarter.

The Hornets gained 2 and punted to a first on their own 20. The home team moved for 2, 3, 3, and punted to the Lockney 40 but Hardy lost 1 yard on the attempted return.

Tulia refused a penalty on a play which netted no yardage. Hardy made 3, Williams 5, and Barton plowed for 2, but Lockney lacked inches making a first and Tulia took over on the Longhorn 49.

Following an offside penalty against them, Tulia passed for a first down on the Lockney 34. Four plays netted another first on the 24, the Hornets made 3, were penalized five yards for delay of the game, gained 4, had two incomplete passes and Lockney took over on their own 24.

The Longhorns lost the ball on a fumble and Tulia again had the ball on the visitor's 24. Tulia had another incomplete pass, gained 7, drew a 15 yard clipping penalty, and passed for another six points from the 30 yard line with 4:35 remaining in the second quarter. The kick was no good and the score stood Tulia 13, Lockney 6.

Williams returned the kick 15 yards to the Lockney 25. Williams made 2 and 5, Hardy gained 2, Barton bulled for a first on the 35. Williams scampers for another first on the Tulia 45 before breaking loose for a first on the Tulia 8. Williams lost 5 and scored from the 13. Barton drove for the point and the score was tied, 13-13, with 1:15 left in the first half.

Hansi's kick was returned 20 yards to the Tulia 41. The Hornets had an incomplete pass, gained 5, had another incomplete pass, and lost 4 as the first half came to an end. Score, Lockney 13, Tulia 13.

Tulia brought the kick back to their 35 to open the second half.

Hansi kicked to the 30 and the attempted return lost 5. Tulia rolled up 7 and 3 yards for a first on their 35 and broke loose for another first on midfield. Nelson Wofford, Longhorn halfback, intercepted a pass on the Lockney 29 and ran the ball back 7 yards.

Jerry Williams continues to lead Longhorn scorers. The speedy little left halfback added two touchdowns Friday night against Tulia which brings his season total to 30 points.

Quarterback Billy Karl Race crossed the double stripe for one touchdown and one extra point Friday night to bring his total to 23 points. Cliff Hardy, right halfback, also added six points against Tulia giving him 18 points for the year.

Fullback Dickie "Bugger" Barton who had not tallied previous to the Tulia contest, found the range Friday night and drove across for two touchdowns and one extra point.

John Hansi, Longhorn captain, has been credited with one touchdown and one PAT. Nelson Wofford and Kenneth Callaway, halfback and fullback respectively, have also accounted for one Lockney touchdown each.

The high-g geared Longhorn offensive has scored 103 points this season for an average of 34.2 points per game.

The rugged Longhorn line has allowed only 20 points for an average of 6.7 points per contest.

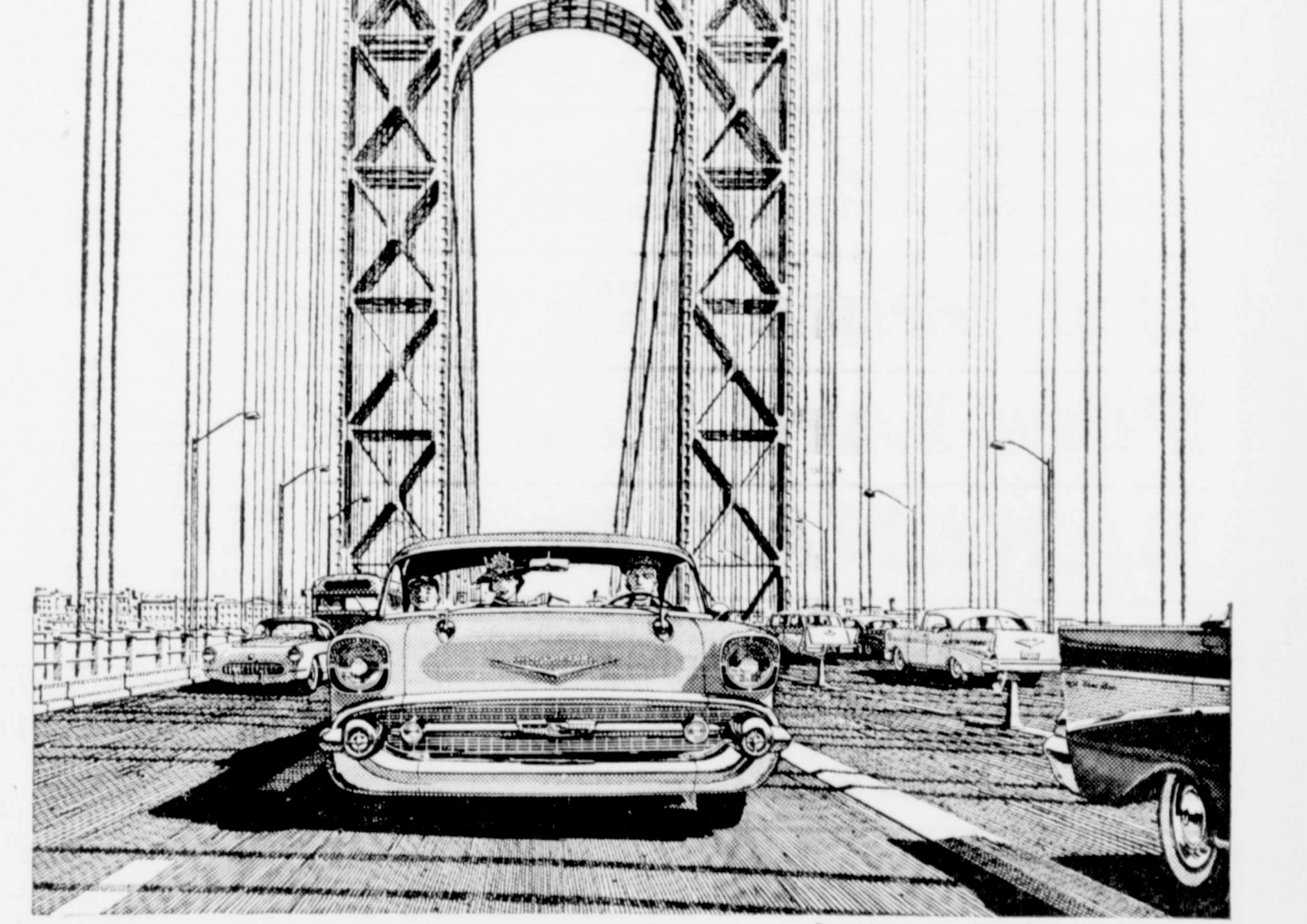

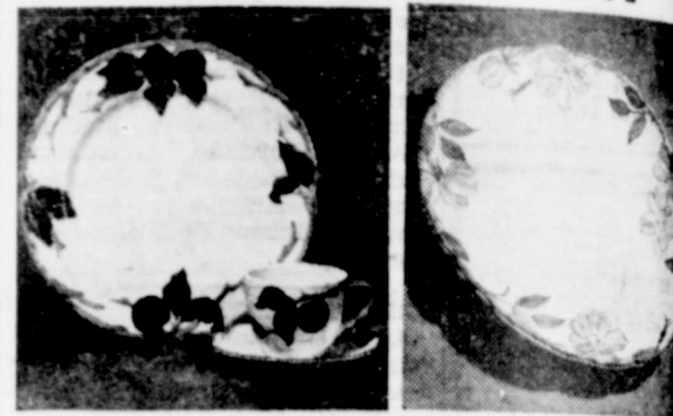
