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





Mr. Sherman pointed out the soil and water loan has increased the gross farm income to approximately 70% which has permitted him to tear down the old house and rebuild out-buildings. Jack Kassahn, County Supervisor of Farmers Home Administration in Floyd County has said his office has loaned \$146,275 since the inception of the new program. Of the amuont loaned there has been \$27,771 maturties due and \$25, 014 has been met.

The interest rate is 41/2% and the loans are generally 5 to 15 years. Up until now, all loans have been made by insured money put up by private investors who draw 31/2% on their motes. The government receives 1% for handling and servicing. There are two banks in this area who have put up a portion of the money that has been loaned.
