

Floyd County Men Attend Weed Meeting

Robert Lee Smith, chairman of the Floyd County Noxious Weed Control District and Douglas Degge, supervisor of the district returned last Thursday from the 21st Annual Weed Supervisors Conference at McPherson, Kansas. Reports were given on the latest methods of control and results of experimental work with the newest chemicals which are now on the market. With 21 years of experience behind them the Kansas supervisors still advocate that the best and cheapest method of control is prevention, by use of good clean seed and clean equipment.

With spring coming on, and weeds emerging by the end of this month, the Board of Directors in a meeting Tuesday, authorized the hiring of an equipment operator to take care of an accelerated treatment program. Farmers are urged to locate infested areas and make application for treatment as soon as possible so that a schedule for treatment may be set up and the services of this man may be utilized. Milton "Moe" Mickey, 6' star center of the Longhorns this season, has been named honorable mention to the Class All-State team. A senior honor student at S. Mickey scored 427 points 20 tilts this season for an outstanding 21.4 average per me. Injuries kept the Longhorn star from attaining an even higher average. "Moe" moved here from Denison before his sophomore year. School Board Elects Teachers, Calls Trustee Election April 4

The trustees of the Lockney Independent School District, in a long session Monday evening, elected teachers in the local system and issued an order for a trustee election to be held on Saturday, April 4. All members of the board were present.

In other actions during the evening the board accepted the resignation of Miss Pauline McReynolds and named Mrs. Hugh Marble to complete this school term in the third grade section. Mrs. C. H. Cheves, wife of the Junior High principal, was elected to fill the position next school year.

The board ordered the installation of a fire escape on the north end of the present high school building. They also approved the Senior Class trip, allowing the class eight days, including five school days, starting May 1st. The class will go to Colorado.

The board authorized a football camp to be held in late August, probably starting August 24.

Six names have been filed for trustee of the Lockney Independent School District following the calling of an election by the school board last Monday night. The terms of three trustees expire with the election on April 4th.

Terms expiring are those of Lavon Johnson, W. B. Cates and Robert Lee Smith. Filing for a place on the ballot are Cates, Smith, W. J. Mangold, Kenneth Wofford, G. B. Johnston, and Owen Thornton. Johnson would not consider running again.

The six names were filed by a nominating committee appointed by the board and composed of R. L. Knox Jr., chairman, Boyce Mosley and Hubert Frizzell. Other names may be filed for a place on the ballot at the office of the superintendent of schools, The Beacon was told.

Mrs. Lula Woodburn was named judge of the election, which will be held at the high school building. Mrs. Frank Jameson and Mrs. Austin Meriwether are clerks. County Trustee The name of Hubert Frizzell has been filed for county school trustee from Precinct 2. Ewald Quebe is the present trustee but has refused to accept the place again, friends said. Milton Evans, present trustee in Precinct 1, will be a candidate to succeed himself, according to County Judge J. D. McBrien, with whom the names of candidates are filed. These will be the only two vacancies on the county board this year.

Farm Bureau President To Speak Friday

J. H. West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, will speak at Rogers Restaurant in Floydada at noon on Friday of this week concerning the grain sorghum support prices and related farm matters. All members of the Farm Bureau and others interested are invited to attend, according to L. B. (Buddy) Brandes, president of the county organization.

Lunch will be "Dutch treat" for those who wish to eat at the meeting. Farm Bureau officials said. Mr. West has been on a round of speaking engagements in West Texas this week speaking at Lubbock, Olton, Muleshoe, Dimmitt, Brownfield and Levelland. He will speak at Tulsa on Friday also.

"This is Mr. West's first visit to Floyd County and we hope a good crowd is present to hear him," Mr. Brandes said. Following the sharp reduction in price supports on grain sorghum by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Benson recently, Mr. West sent a telegram to the Secretary protesting the cut. A copy of that telegram has been released as follows:

"The cut in price supports to 75% of corn came as a shock to sorghum growers in Texas. Farmers are hurt. Sorghum growers realize that milo must compete with corn and that adjustments have to be made when prices are out of line. However this cut in support prices in one year makes adjustment difficult to producers and imposes severe hardship on him. It also fails to take into account the past policies of the department. It will encourage the production of corn in uneconomical areas which is contrary to your philosophy. Also it will reverse the normal flow of corn from corn belt. I urge you to reconsider this action. Signed: J. H. West."

Hub King of Brownfield, area Farm Bureau service man, in a speech made recently to Area II presidents at Lubbock said, "If Farm Bureau recommendations had been enacted into law, this cut would not have occurred. Farm Bureau asked that the support of feed grains be tied to corn taking into consideration the relative feeding value, normal price relationship and storability. However, Congress added five other factors and these factors are apparently the ones used

Branum Gets 99 Years In Quick Trial

Robert "Cotton" Branum, 37-year-old laborer, was given 99 years in the state penitentiary in a quick trial in 110th District Court at Floydada Wednesday morning Branum was charged with the murder of Mrs. Mary Ellen Bryson of Hollis, Okla., on Sunday, December 28. Judge L. D. Ratliff presided.

Branum and the woman had been living here as man and wife and he was employed at Paymaster Gin, Aiken. The two went rabbit hunting with a borrowed shotgun and the defendant shot the woman at a close range on a rural road near Lockney, officers said. He carried her body to a point near Hugo, Okla., where he threw the body into Red River.

Branum pleaded guilty to the charge when the case was called at 10 a.m. Wednesday. The jury was selected in 10 minutes, the first 12 persons called being accepted. The case went to the jury at 11:30 a.m. with both District Attorney John Stapleton and Sheriff Walter Hollums recommending the 99-year term. The jury returned their verdict and set the sentence at 99 years within 15 minutes.

Only four witnesses were called, these being Milton Branum, brother of the defendant; Horton Kenady of Lockney, Sheriff Walter Hollums and Texas Ranger J. P. Lynch of Memphis. District Attorney Stapleton introduced Branum's written confession as evidence.

Two Junior Livestock Shows Are Scheduled

Lockney Junior Show Saturday

The Lockney Junior Livestock Show, sponsored by the Lockney Chamber of Commerce and Board of Development, will be held Saturday of this week at the fair building in Southeast Lockney. Eligible to make entries in the show will be any Future Farmer member attending Lockney High School or any 4-H club member attending school here and at Providence.

M. L. Brewer, Lockney vocational agriculture advisor, said Wednesday that it appeared entries would break all records. "We may have 200 or more entries and if we do we'll have difficulty finding a place to put them all," he said.

Animals must be in place by 10 a.m. Saturday and judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. The judge will be Gene Barnett, vocational agriculture instructor in Plainview High School, who has judged the local show the past several years.

Almost \$600.00 in cash prizes is being offered by the Chamber of Commerce. Placings run up to 10th in all three divisions, swine, lambs and steers.

Prizes in the swine division are \$7 for first place in each class, \$6 for 2nd, \$5 for 3rd, \$4 for 4th, \$3 for 5th, \$2 for 6th and \$1 for 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th places. The classes are light barrow, medium weight, heavy weight, pen of three and open gilts. In addition the grand champion barrow gets \$15 and rosette and the reserve champion \$10 and rosette.

In the lamb division the prizes are \$8 for 1st, \$7 for 2nd, \$6 for 3rd, \$5 for 4th, \$4 for 5th, \$3 for 6th, \$2 for 7th and \$1 each for 8th, 9th and 10th places in the classes of fine wool, medium wool and Southdown and cross. In the pen of three class the prizes are \$7 for 1st, \$5 for 2nd, \$3 for 3rd, and \$1 each for 4th and 5th.

Prizes are much higher in the steer division with these cash awards being offered in each class: 1st, \$15; 2nd, \$12; 3rd, \$10; 4th, \$8; 5th, \$5; 6th, \$3; 7th, 8th, 9th and 10th, \$2 each. The classes are light drylot, heavy drylot, light milked, heavy milked. In addition the grand champion steer will win \$15 and rosette and the reserve champion \$10 and rosette.

Showmanship awards of \$2.50 will be given in each division. Hogs may be weighed in at the showbarn as they are entered and calves may be weighed at local elevators, show officials said. Each calf exhibitor must bring his weight slip with him. Calf classes will be made up after the weights are all recorded.

R. C. Mitchell and R. L. Knox Jr., representing the Lockney Chamber of Commerce, are working with Mr. Brewer in making preparations for the show.

County Junior Livestock Show Starts Monday

The Floyd County Junior Fat Stock Show begins Monday, March 9, and closes out with the auction sale on Wednesday at 1 p.m. County Agent Cecil Lewis, show manager, estimated that some 360 animals will be scheduled.

The show schedule calls for weighing in to begin at 7 a.m. Monday and requires that all animals be in place by 12 noon the same day. Sifting of animals will begin at 1 p.m. Monday.

Judging of the animals will begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday with swine division first. Lamb judging will begin at 1 p.m. the same day and steer judging will begin at 3 p.m. Calvin Holcomb, county agent of Gaines County, will judge the steers while Euel Linder, veterans training instructor of Lubbock will judge the swine and Melvin Gregg, a farmer of Plainview, will judge the sheep.

Merchants and others of Lockney, Floydada and possibly other places will bid on the winning animals at the auction Wednesday afternoon. Auctioneer will be Raymond Aiken of Plainview.

Cash prizes will be awarded through fifth place in each class. Prizes are \$5 for 1st place, \$3 for 2nd and 3rd places and \$2 for 4th and 5th places. In addition the grand champion gets \$5 and banner and the reserve champion gets \$3 and banner. Ribbons are awarded for 6th through 10th places. In the swine division the classes are barrows 180 to 210 pounds, barrows 211 to 240 pounds, pen of 3 barrows fed by one boy, and grand reserve champion. In the sheep division, the classes are fine wool wether lambs, medium wool wether lambs, Southdown and Southdown crosses, and group of 3 wether lambs fed by one boy. No grand champion lamb will be selected but first place winners in each of the first three classes will receive banners as champion lambs.

In the steer division, the classes are drylot steers, 900 pounds and under, drylot steers, 901 pounds and over; milked steers, 900 pounds and under, milked steers, 901 pounds and over. Grand and reserve champions will be selected in this class.

Special awards will be given grand champion steer, barrow, and champion lamb in each class. Also showmanship awards will be made in each division.

Various swine record associations offer special prizes at the Floyd County show to any barrow registered with that particular association. These include the American Berkshire Association, the United Duroc Swine Registry, the Chester White Swine Record Association, the Poland China Record Association and the Hampshire Swine Registry.

When the **PLUMBER** makes a mistake he charges twice. When the **DOCTOR** makes a mistake he buries it. When the **PRINTER** makes a **MISSTAKE** it's there for the whole world to see.

TWO STOCK SHOWS within

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The week will keep the club boys and FFA members busy and will draw interest from a large number of other people. Seems that the number of entries this year bids fair to break some records. These stock shows are worth while projects and deserve the support of all.

RAYMOND MOLEY writes in Newsweek: "Those who are advocating greater and greater government spending should realize the simple facts of economic life. For every billion appropriated by Congress beyond a reasonable expectation of income from taxation must be supplied by selling Federal securities. If people are doubtful about buying, interest rates on these securities must rise and ultimately add to the burden on the budget. The end result must be that a spending Congress will burn its own household. For when the nation's credit falters, an embittered public will fall upon those who have destroyed public credit."

The self-styled voice of protestantism, the National Council of Churches of Christ in America, recently gave the impression that protestants approved diplomatic recognition and admission of Red China to the UN. Some protestant national conventions were also duped in going along with this idea. STATE SCHOOL BUDGET

In connection with the teachers insistence on more pay we have wondered if the State Educational Agency, by whatever name it is now called, has checked through their budget to see that expenses have been cut to the minimum. We do not mean teacher salary cuts, we mean expense cuts, overlapping work, unnecessary officials and offices maintained. Floyd County is an instance where a considerable percentage of taxpayers think the educational system is carrying an unnecessary load by maintaining a county superintendent's office. We are not too well informed on what the department budgets for maintaining a superintendent's office in a county, how much work they get done, what the cost is per pupil, whether the work can be handled more economically. Presumably the amount varies from county to county and there are 254 counties. Since the teachers take it on themselves to lecture the taxpayers for their parsimony,

the teachers in turn should be able to justify the money they do spend at state and county level. All the taxpayer knows is what he thinks he sees. He begins to wonder if he is right in his judgment; wonder, too, if the operation at the county level is characteristic. Chance for the profession to get in a good lick by laying the cards on the table. — Floyd County Hesperian

THOUGHTLESS DRIVERS

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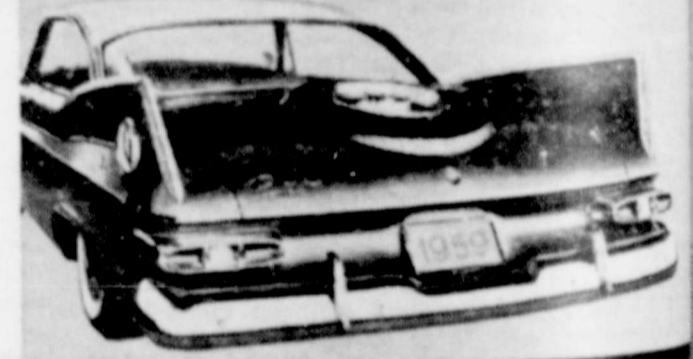

On February 18, 1959, the Secretary of Agriculture announced support loan levels for corn, milo, and other feed grains. In view of the language of the law, it was anticipated that the support price for milo in 1959 would be approximately the same as corn, inasmuch as both have approximately the same feed value. This is not the case, and an explanation is being demanded and ways are being sought to remedy the situation.

Mahon stated, "since the drastic drop in support levels for milo was announced, I have appealed to the Secretary of Agriculture and others in the Department to reconsider the action taken. I have received complaints in regard to the situation from Mr. Frank Moore of Plainview, President of the Grain Sorghum Producers Association, and many others. If the drastic cut in supports remains in effect, grain sorghum producers will sustain losses totaling many millions of dollars. A more effective program for all feed grains is needed, but action is made most difficult by reason of the well known attitude of the Secretary of Agriculture."

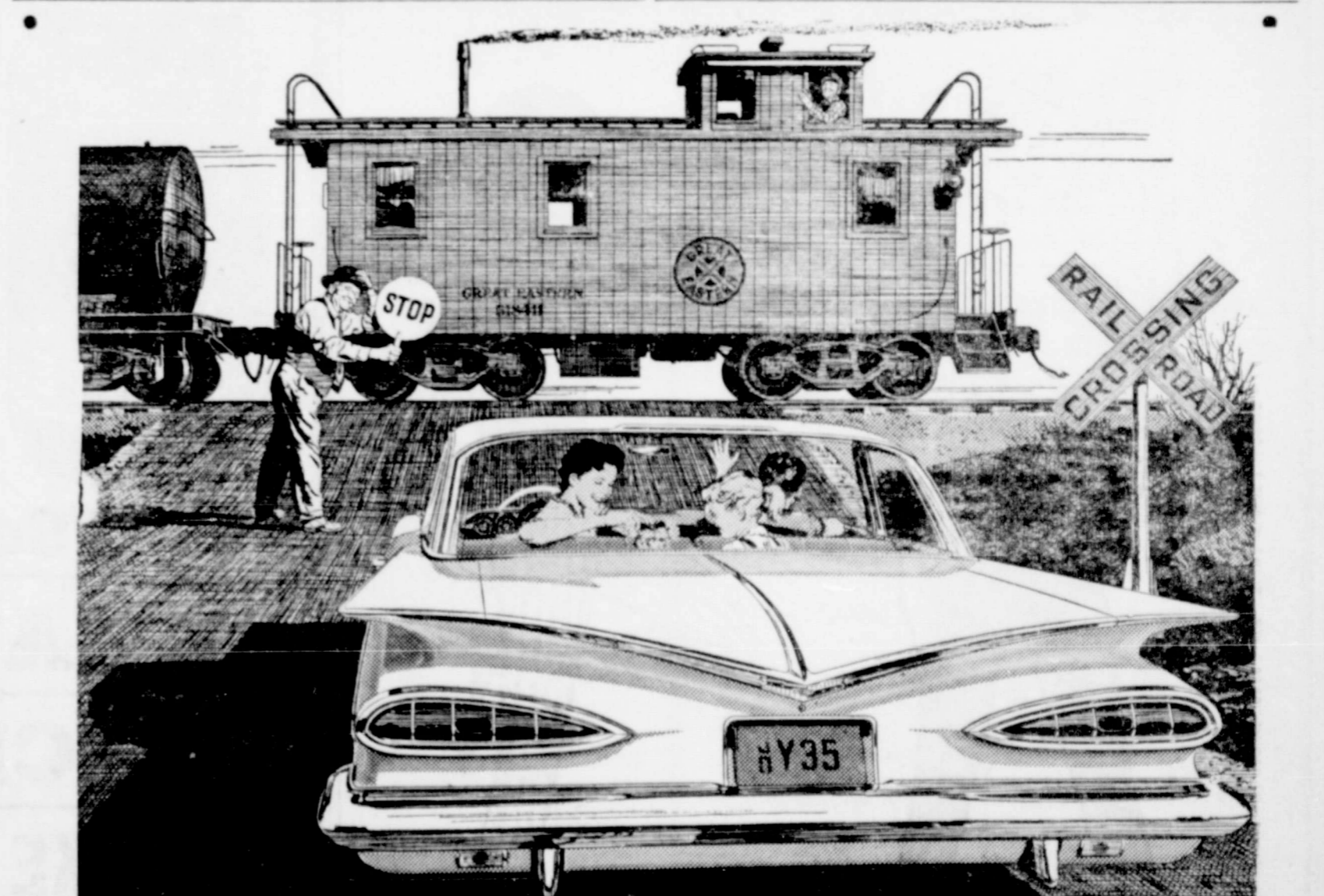

Accessories

For the well-dressed woman of today, a wardrobe of fewer, well chosen clothes is less expensive, easier to care for and helps develop personality better than a large wardrobe with less style and quality. A variety can be achieved with the use of skillfully chosen accessories. Accessories complete a costume and express the personality and taste of the wearer. They include hats, shoes, gloves, purses, scarves, jewelry, belts, flowers and collar and cuff sets.

What is more exciting this time of the year than a new hat that is just right for you and for the occasion? Your hat indicates the purpose of your costume.

The average woman needs hats for these accessories:

1. Street, travel or business.
2. Church and afternoon.
3. Parties and after five occasions.

Your hat for street, travel, or business occasions will likely be made of straw this spring. It may be a sailor, breton, or high crown hat without a brim. The color, size, and shape should be becoming to you and harmonize with the rest of your costume.

Hats for after-five wear are small. They are usually brimless and small enough that they needn't be removed in an auditorium. The hat may be made of fabric with glitter, flowers, feathers, velvets, or silks.

It is not always necessary to wear a hat after five, but never wear a hat without wearing gloves.

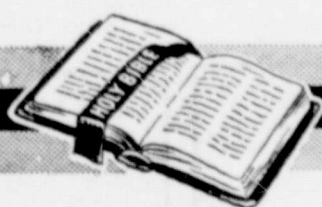
