Soybeans are becoming nore important crop in our area. Here are a few points on producing maximum yields. Lee variety is the most popular varety at the present time it tends to shatter less. Planting rate should be abou 60 pounds per acre. All soybeans should be nocculated with the Southwest Culture and the dose should be loubled for best benefits. Plantng date should be from June 0th to June 20th

Dependents May **Receive Social Security Payments**

Dependent aged parents of a deceased son or daughter may now receive Social Security pay ments even though the deceased was survived by widower, or child. Mr. John G. Hutton, district manager of the Lubbock, Texas, Social Security office indicated that these addi tional benefits are possible as the result of recent Social Sec urity amendments.

Dependent mothers and dependent fathers in this group should immediately get in touch with their Social Security office

Before a dependent mother at age 62 or dependent father a age 65 can receive benefits, they must file proof of dependency with their Social Security office Generally this proof must be filed within two years after August 1958, when the law was amended, or within two years after the death of the son or






