Thrips are being found on cotton in damaging numbers. These insects will delay cotton growth when allowed to go un-controlled. This is especially important on the late cotton. which is in the county. Curling and silvering of the young leaves are indication of thrip in festation.

Fleahoppers will damage cot ton when plants begin to square. When checking for fleahoppers, examine the main stem terminal bred (about 3 to 4 inches of top of plant) of 100 plants at several representative points in the field. Treat ment should begin when 15 to 35 fleahoppers (nymph and adults) are found per 100 ter-minals. Endrin, Heptachlor, Aldren and Dieldrin applied at the rate of 1-1½ pints per acre and Toxaphene 1½ pints to 1½ quarts per acre will control fleahoppers and thrips


