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### EDITORIAL

For Thou, Lord, wilt bless the righteous; with favor wilt Thou compass him as with a shield.—Psalm 5:12

SATURDAY is the day for the first Democratic primary as well as the Democratic precinct conventions but there doesn't seem to be a great deal of interest in either. Precinct 2 in Floyd Co. doesn't have a local contested race to vote on so the vote will probably be light. As for state races, there are a couple we have generated an interest in. Since Jack Cox has been revealed as a registered lobbyist for an oil company, we think it would be better for us common people to reelect Price Daniel as governor of Texas. We're not as interested in Governor Daniel's race as we have been in the past but we don't believe we need a registered lobbyist as governor of Texas. The other race we're especially interested in is the one we mentioned last week, in which Judge Lloyd W. Davidson is running for reelection as judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals. According to our information Judge Davidson is a legalistic hair splitter and we would like to see Jim D. Bowmer elected to that office.

**WHETHER** you're for him or not, you must admire Senator John F. Kennedy's courage in "laying it on the line" regarding the religious issue in the presidential race. He faced the issue squarely and stated his position clearly. But one wonders whether he can state his position and stay with it in the light of his past performance. In recent months he accepted an invitation to meet with Protestants but a member of the hierarchy of the Catholic Church forbid him to go and

he didn't. Thus we wonder whether he can govern his own actions or will he be subject to the rules of his Church.

**WE'VE HEARD** of people saying, "I'd hate to be so narrow minded that I would vote against a man because of his religion." This kind of statement, when referring to a member of the Catholic Church, shows a lack of information on the part of the person who makes it. Those who oppose Senator Kennedy don't do it because he believes differently than they do. They do it because the rulers of the Catholic Church use every means possible to gain advantage, to force their will in matters pertaining to government, to inflict their beliefs and dogmas on others when they have the opportunity to do so. We do not believe in questioning the religion of a candidate for public office because of his religion so long as he is not apt to mix his religion with the duties of his office. When he is apt to do that, however, it becomes the concern of everyone because the principle of the separation of church and state has been proven many times to be the fair and right principle. Needless to say, it has been demonstrated many times that the hierarchy of the Catholic Church do not believe in the separation of church and state. A little investigation of affairs in Spain, in Italy, in South America and some other countries will prove this point.

**ETERNAL** vigilance is the price of liberty today as it was back when this statement was first made. American people are jealous of their liberties and they are quick to challenge any attempt to deprive them of such. Their love of personal liberty to worship as they please or not to worship at all if they please is the reason for opposition to Mr. Kennedy. There is no other reason.

**THREE PARENTS** at Plainview were jailed for not sending their children to school. Some people do not know that the state school law requires all children from 6 through 16 years of age to attend school when the school is in session. The law is not fully enforced but certainly should be. It is a crime against a child when he is not kept in school.

**MOST PEOPLE** deeply regret the actions of some in the South who bomb the homes of colored people and use other violence in order to force them to comply with their wishes. Such action can only delay the peaceful settlement of the racial problem, and serves to create more hatred and bitterness. Only the very ignorant participate in this type of violence.

**IDENTICAL BILLS** which would peg Rural Electrification interest rates at the rate currently paid by the Treasury to borrow money have been introduced by three California Congressmen. The bills also call for an administrative charge of one-fifth of one per cent of the loan.

#### RACIAL EQUALITY

Equally as important as the primaries are the precinct conventions to be held the same day. This is the only means by which the individual voter can participate in the selection of the presidential nominee.

**NEW HIGHWAY SIGNS DUE** — New highway signs, bigger and more colorful than any used before, will begin appearing soon on the interstate highways in Texas. Highway Commission has ordered the posting of route markers and guide signs on 707

miles of interstate highway now completed or under construction in the state.

Conspicuously absent in this marking system will be stop signs. Completion of the 41,000-mile system of controlled access roads will make possible coast-to-coast and border-to-border driving without a stop sign or traffic light.

Motorists soon will become familiar with the interstate marker—a red, white and blue shield. Texas Highway Department designed the shield which later was adopted for the entire national system.

All markers and guide signs will be larger than usual. Advance exit signs will be placed about two miles ahead of interchanges to give motorists plenty of time to plan their next move.

Guide signs will have white letters and symbols on a green background, and signs for rest and service areas will have green letters on a reflectorized white background. Warning and yield signs will remain in the familiar yellow and black but will grow in dimensions.

Texas leads the nation in the number of miles of interstate highways completed and under way. Texas' allotment is 3,033 miles of which 697 are finished and 259 are in some stage of progress.

**Herbicides**  
The use of 2-4, D and other herbicides for weed control come under the Miller Bill. The use of them at the present time prevents some of the hazards. 2-4, D for weed control in wheat should not be used 50 days before harvest. This same law applies to barley and rye. It can't be used where the small grain is to be grazed after application. The way the law reads at the present time 2-4, D for weed control in grain sorghum can be used only for pre-emergence weed killer or applied 120-150 days before harvest which prohibits its use on grain sorghum. We are hoping that this situation can be worked. Any residue on grain sorghum from giving into normal channel. When using herbicides always check the label and follow directions on the label. If any further development appears we will try to keep you informed.

**4-H Club Work**  
Many 4-H club members are busy working on 4-H demonstrations for district contact. The boys and girls are working up Safety, Tractor Maintenance, Electric, Field Crops, Cooperative Demonstrations and a Insect Identification and control team. These members are working hard so that they might be eligible to attend State 4-H Round-Up.

**SCHOOLS' SHARE DOWN** — Texas is spending a smaller proportion of its tax revenue on education now than it did 10 years ago.

This statement was issued by the Texas State Teachers Association in support of its drive for enactment of the Hale-Aikin program for school improvement.

In 1958-59, says the report, Texas spent 29.67 cents of each tax dollar for public school education. In the last completed school year the percentage was 27.68 cents of each dollar.

During that period public school spending more than doubled — from \$156,000,000 to \$322,000,000 to keep pace with a 51 per cent increase in students and 49 per cent increase in teachers. But spending for other purposes increased faster.

Gov. Price Daniel again has said that he would like to call a special session after the elections to erase the deficit

and raise teachers' pay. But he also said it would depend on getting agreement from legislators.

**PROFIT PREDICTOR** — When everything is finally cleared up, the state will come up with a profit of \$50,000 — perhaps more — on land involved in the Veterans Land Board scandals.

This prediction was made by Land Commissioner Bill Allcorn who called \$50,000 a "conservative figure."

He said that \$1,725,000 has already been recovered from fraudulent land deals and that \$1,679,000 more is outstanding but fully secured.

When the entire \$3,404,000 is recovered, said Allcorn, the state will have a comfortable margin above what was involved in the original transactions.

**COSTLY ERROR** — Texas Supreme Court has returned to district court for re-trial a case involving a \$100,000 mistake in arithmetic.

An employe of an Arlington contractor made the error in submitting a bid of \$534,175 instead of \$634,225 to the local school board for a school building job. After the bid was accepted by the board, the contractor discovered the error and refused to carry out the contract.

Board then awarded the bid to the second low bidder and sued the first contractor for the \$36,278 difference between the second low bid and the bid they had first accepted.

Supreme Court members disagreed on the case, wrote three different opinions, but all agreed it should be re-tried.

**HOW BIG THE GROUNDS** — State Building Commission is awaiting an attorney general's opinion before putting in sidewalks to the new state buildings.

Reason for the precaution is that the Legislature passed a bill in 1957 stating that nothing — absolutely nothing — could be built on the Capitol grounds without specific permission from the Legislature. And the Legislature did not provide for sidewalks.

**WHO OWNS THE OIL?** — Another question under consideration by the attorney general's department is "who owns rights to the minerals under county roads?"

Request for an opinion was submitted by Jack Cook, county attorney of Kleberg County.

Ultimately to be decided is whether state and local government can claim the right to mineral development of the right of way of some 228,000 miles of streets and highways in Texas.

**SCHOOL FUND ADVISORS** — A 19-member advisory committee of prominent business and professional men is helping the State Board of Education develop investment policies for the \$415,000,000 permanent school fund. 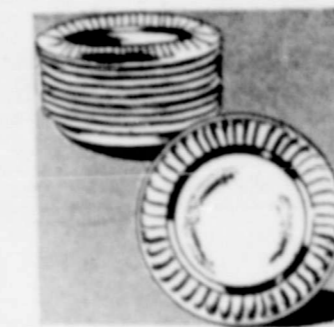

**Farm Bureau Opposes Poage's New Farm Bill**

Waco. — J. H. West, president of the Texas Farm Bureau, has called on county Farm Bureau leaders to muster opposition to a farm program advocated by Congressman W. R. Poage of Texas.

In a letter to county Farm Bureau presidents and policy execution chairmen, West also urged them to contact their Congressmen and Senators in support of the Farm Bureau's proposed wheat legislation.

West charged that the Poage bill (H.R. 10355) would change the entire concept of farm program legislation as it is known now.

"Basically, it involves elements of tight government controls with direct payments under nation-wide marketing orders on a commodity-by-commodity basis, and encompasses, with but a few exceptions, every commodity produced by farmers and ranchers.

"If the program should become law, the cotton allotment could be reduced to about 9 million acres and wheat to approximately 23 million acres," West warned.

The present cotton allotment (including choice A and B programs) is about 17 1/2 million acres and the minimum wheat allotment is 55 million acres.

The Farm Bureau leader said adoption of the Poage bill would mean a licensed and regimented agriculture. He pointed out that production cuts of the magnitude that would be required by the proposed stabilization programs — the inevitable regimentation that would be necessary to enforce such a program and the proposed limitations as payments to individuals — would level per family farm income, and reduce even the most productive farmers to a peasant status.

Farm Bureau has introduced proposed legislation dealing with the wheat situation which West termed "the most serious problem in agriculture." The state Farm Bureau president said that no plan will solve the basic problem or serve the long-run interests of farmers unless it encourages market expansion, reduces incentives for the production of unneeded supplies, minimizes economic hardships on wheat growers, and avoids shifting the burden of adjustment to other farmers.

To accomplish these objectives, West said, the Farm Bureau advocates legislation that would:

1. Eliminate acreage allotments and marketing quotas, effective with the 1961 wheat crop.
2. Base wheat supports — beginning in 1961 — on the support level with corn, with upward adjustments to reflect differences in weight, nutritive value and buyer preference; however, wheat would be supported at not less than 120 per cent of corn in 1961.
3. Protect all farmers against the competition of Commodity Credit Corp. sales from accumulated wheat stocks, which now total over 1.4 billion bushels. This protection would be made effective by providing that no CCC wheat stocks could be sold for domestic use or dollar exports at less than 150 per cent of the effective support price, plus reasonable carrying charges.
4. Help farmers make needed adjustments in land use by expanding the Conservation Reserve program to 60 million acres by 1963.

2. Base wheat supports — beginning in 1961 — on the support level with corn, with upward adjustments to reflect differences in weight, nutritive value and buyer preference; however, wheat would be supported at not less than 120 per cent of corn in 1961.

3. Protect all farmers against the competition of Commodity Credit Corp. sales from accumulated wheat stocks, which now total over 1.4 billion bushels. This protection would be made effective by providing that no CCC wheat stocks could be sold for domestic use or dollar exports at less than 150 per cent of the effective support price, plus reasonable carrying charges.

4. Help farmers make needed adjustments in land use by expanding the Conservation Reserve program to 60 million acres by 1963.

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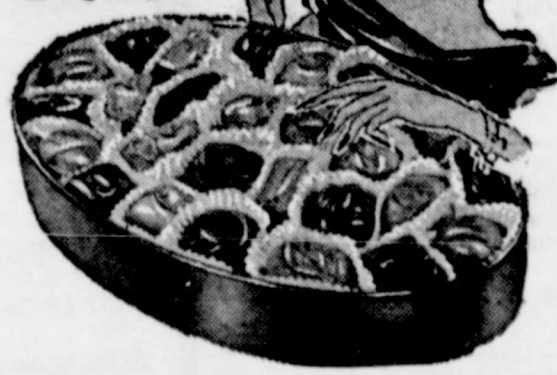

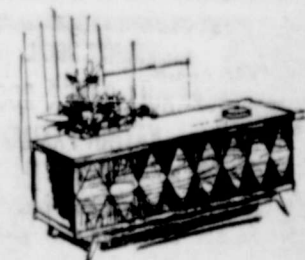

### Co-op Returns \$89,347 To Stockholders

A total of \$89,347 in cash was returned to stockholders of the Lockney Co-operative Gin and Elevator at the annual meeting last Friday evening. The checks included payment for all first preferred stock in the gin, that is the repayment of money loaned to the association to begin operations in 1957, eight percent interest on that money, eight percent interest on money loaned to buy the local elevator, payment of all 1957 earned stock in the gin, four percent interest on all outstanding preferred stock in the gin, plus 50 cents per bale dividend on the 1959 cotton crop, according to Manager Mondell Mills.

More than 400 attended the banquet which was held in the Lockney High School gymnasium. Dr. Henry Rodgers, who was announced as the speaker for the evening, turned out to be Cecil Hunter, the famed "Stuttering Sam" of Tulsa, Okla., who kept the crowd roaring for some 45 minutes.

In the election of directors, Leroy Durham of Plainview and Loyd Widener of Lockney were re-elected. The nominating committee for next year will be James Taylor, John Lee Carthel and Boyce Mosley.

The auditor's report, given by Ken Durbin of Lubbock, revealed substantial margins at both the gin and elevator. At the gin, the gross operating income was listed at \$152,035.32 with operating expenses at \$109,603.44, leaving operating margin at \$42,431.88. Added to this is the net margins from trading, selling seed, etc., totaling \$37,002.63 and dividends from other co-operatives totaling \$33,638.73, less dividends paid on preferred and first preferred stock of \$4,781.28, leaving a net savings of \$108,291.98.

At the elevator, which the association has owned less than one year, the gross income from the elevator operations was listed at \$37,591.27 less operating expenses of \$41,599.27, leaving a net margin of \$15,992.05. Added to this is the net margin from the feed store operations totaling \$3,573.58 for a total net saving of \$19,565.63.

Manager Mondell Mills introduced out-of-town guests and made his report to the assembled group. He pointed out that the local co-op had spent \$66,000 in payroll money in the community, \$46,000 for supplies from local sources in addition to the money returned to patrons in the form of interest and dividends.

The association passed without opposition amendments to the by-laws and charter.

Mills told The Beacon that the next stock certificates to be paid off will be those earned in the 1958 crop year. He also asked that stockholders leave their first preferred stock certificates and also stock certificates dated March 31, 1958, at the co-op office since these were paid off in the checks issued Friday night.



Members of the Lockney Band Boosters Club in a special meeting Tuesday night of this week began a movement to send the band director, Wyatt Burkhalter, to Europe on a goodwill tour for band instructors and educational leaders this summer. The group raised \$195 Tuesday night among 15 of its own members and will be covering the community within the next few days seeking to raise the remainder of the required \$1497.00 which will pay all the band director's expenses on the three week tour.

Wednesday morning the Junior High Band met and voted to give \$50.00 they earned serving at the Co-op gin banquet to Mr. Burkhalter for the trip. The band voted to give the money without the band director's knowledge and made it in the form of a birthday gift.

Purpose of the tour is described as follows: To arrange for a group of music instructors and educational leaders to carry a message of goodwill to the music instructors and educational leaders in other countries. To learn how such people live, work and spent their leisure time so that the group can bring back to their respective local communities a report on the enterprise of the countries we visit. The over-all purpose is to develop better understanding between Americans and the other people of the world. The tour will implement the purposes of the President's "people-to-people" foundation with special visits and meetings with counterpart organizations, institutions and individuals in the major cities of Europe and Russia. 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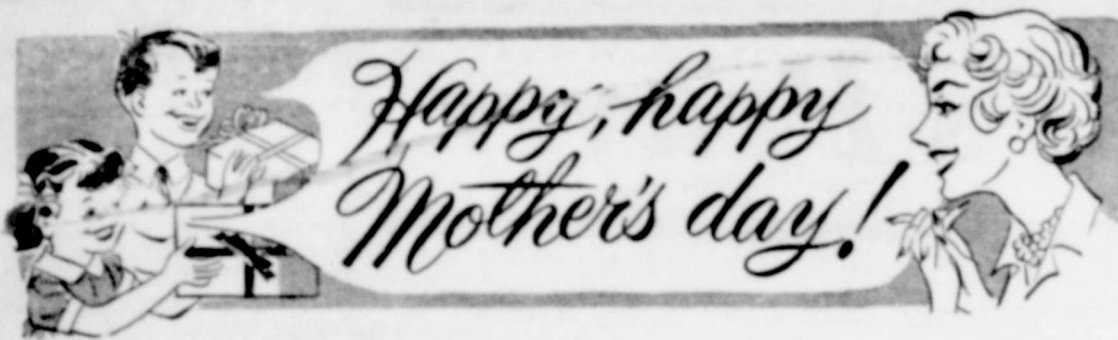
