

# Average Texas Farm Workday Is 10.1 Hours

College Station. - Texas minutes on June 1, according to more consistent, even in unthe U. S. Department of Agri-

That's a half-hour less than the average for farmers in all states of the nation, more than two hours less than the Wisconsin farm workday, but a full hour more than Nevada and Florida farmers put in.

This was brought out in the farm labor report issued by USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service, based on reports from federal-state Crop Reporting Service offices in each state. The national average was 10.6

Wash and shell the peas or beans and pack them raw to 11/2 inches from the top of pint jars or 2 inches from the top of quart jars. Do not shake or ages. press down. Cover with boiling water, leaving 1/2 inch space a the top of the jars. Close with two-piece jar lids and process at 12 pounds pressure: pints for 40 minutes and quarts for 50

Causes For Failure In Jelly Making

Homemakers are sometimes puzzled over causes for improper jelling, sugar crystall "weeping" and cloudiness in homemage jellies. Some of the causes for these problms follow

Sugar crystallization may be caused by an excess of sugar, nsufficient acid, overcooking or delay in sealing. "Weeping" results when the

juice is too high in acid con-

Cloudiness may be caused by imperfect straining, or by starch in underripe fruit often found in apple and crabapple jelly.

Failure to form jelly is due to improper balance of pectin, balance may be caused overcooking or undercooking the jelly, by undercooking the fruit in extracting the juice using too much water in ex tracting the juice or using fruit which is too ripe.

Mold or fermentation of jelly may be caused by storage in warm or damp places, failure to sterilize glasses, imperfecsealing with paraffin, or no enough sugar,

Make sure of good results in jelly making by following re commended methods. Get opy of the extension bulletin weets for the Family Table" at the extension office. It gives directions and recipes for a varity of jellies, jams, preser-ves, conserves, marmalades and fruit butters.
