The Committee was presented with the figures of the TEC that Floyd County will be short 1,880 cotton pullers during the peak period of the cotton harvest. This shortage will be met by the importation of Mexican National Bracero workers.

The Committee will function under Public Law 78, obtaining facts relevant to the supply of domestic farm workers existing Floyd County and the shortage of workers, if any, which must be met by import ing Mexican Nationals to harvest the cotton crop. Public Law 78, the TEC must supply this information to the Secretary of Labor who must limit the number of Mexican Nationals to be used in this county by granting a "ceiling" The Committee consults with the Local Office Manager to assist him in estimating the number of workers who will be needed, based on current local conditions affecting the cotton

"Ceilings" granted by the Secretary of Labor limiting the importation of Mexican Nationals into this area will be posted in Post Offices in Floylade and Lockney and in the County Agent's Office, and in the County Courthouse.
