# Clear Weather, **Ideal Frost Speeds Harvest**

Grain harvesting operations were going at full speed and the cotton harvest was slowly gaining momentum this week spurred on by ideal weather conditions and a light frost last Monday morning which was described as 'just what we needed" by most farmers.

The frost came just at the opportune time for cotton and was accompanied by a very light freeze, not enough to damage soft bolls but enough to kill vegetation. The weather has been clear and warm this week and farmers have been taking advantage of this situation to harvest as much as possible.

Combines were running at full speed Wednesday and elevators were doing a land office business. The moisture content of the grain is down to an acceptable level in most cases and fields are dry enough to hold up combines. Elevator men's estimates ranged from 50 to 65 percent of the crop harvested. If the weather holds most of the crop will be in by this week end.



# 4-H'ERS GEAR FOR OFF-THE-FARM JOBS



Prepared by National 4-H Service Committee, Inc.

Economists now predict that only one out of nine farm youth will make his livelihood by own-

ing or operating a farm. When this ratio is applied to 4-H Club members who are brought up on farms and ranches, several hundred thousand each year will choose off-the-farm occupations. To better prepare these young people for jobs in industry, education and elsewhere, the Cooperative Extension Service of every state landgrant college or university is keying 4-H educational programs to current trends in jobs.

"The 4-H projects serve as apprenticeships to career ex-Aiton of the Federal Extension Service, addressing a group of business men and women whose firms contribute about a million dollars to 4-H work each year.

"Club leaders are placing more emphasis on vocational guidance," he said. Only two out of 10 high schools today offer vocational counseling, and most of these schools are in large cities. Extension workers are teaching boys and girls to "convert the complex cluster of 4-H experiences to day-to-day events," he added. A recent report states that

there are now three jobs await-ing every agricultural college graduate. They relate to research, industry, business, education, communications, conservation, service, and farming. More than 50 business firms, educational foundations and in-

#### CATHOLIC PERSECUTIONS - 1960

'In the past eight years in the South American nation of Colombia, with a Catholic dominated government, 49 Protestant churches have been destroyed, 34 have been confiscated and 89 Protestant leaders have been murdered. Because of the restricted policies

of the Roman Catholic dominated government in Mexico it is most difficult to teach the word of God. We are not allowed to preach the gospel on radio or television in Mexico; we are not allowed to advertise in newspapers as we do in the United States. And our workers have been subject to intimidations and threats over a number of decades. As a result mission work in Mexico has been very limited and has accomplished almost nothing.

Following is a letter sent to the Houston Post by an American Catholic, who had spent several years in Catholic dominated Spain. It was printed on April 8. 1960 in the Houston Post.

'We should pressure Franco to permit more religious freedom for the Protestants and Jews. In present-day Spain, Protestants:

(1) Can practice their faith and teach it to their children, but only behind closed doors and in places not readily accessible to the general public.

(2) Can have places of worship, but these places cannot outwardly appear as church edifices, i.e., no steeple, no church tower, etc. There cannot be a sign or arrow indicating its location.

(3) Cannot publish the schedule of Sunday services in Spanish public newspapers.

(4) Cannot have or operate schools, hospitals, orphanages, etc. of benefit to the general public.

(5) Cannot hold public office.

(6) Cannot marry among themselves without permission from the local Catholic bishop.

I eye-witnessed all this for three years in Franco's fascist regime. This especially bothers my conscience because I am a Catholic." - Name withheld by the







The game will get underway at 7:30 p.m. in Plainview's Bulldog Stadium. Admission will be \$1 for adults and 50 cents for students. All seats will be general




