Census Bureau To Conduct Farm Survey In County

The 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will be conducted in this county during the next several weeks, it was announced today by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce. The 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will collect information on ownership and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, and livestock production and inventories. Information will be collected also on farm equipment, farm income, construction of new farm buildings, farm contracts, and farm operator debts. This survey will supplement information collected in the 1959 Census of Agriculture. Farms in the county which will be covered in the 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture were selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section of all farms in the country. Information collected locally will be combined with that collected in other areas of the country to provide national estimates. Local interviews for the 1960 Sample Survey of Agriculture will be conducted by Dempsey W. Sims, Jr. Mercury will freeze at 38 degrees below zero — and may be easily cut, about like soft cheese.

Earning Rules Changed For Social Security

You do not have to completely retire to draw social security benefits, and under recent changes in the social security law, many social security beneficiaries who work in 1961 and later years will have less of their benefits withheld than they do now. As before, however, a person is considered retired if he or she is not earning more than \$1200 per year. A beneficiary who earns more than \$1200 uses only \$1 of benefits for every \$2 that he earns between \$1200 and only \$1 of benefits for earnings above \$1500, he loses \$1 of his benefits. Under the rules in effect before 1961, a beneficiary who earned over \$1200 in a year would lose a whole month's benefit check for every \$80, or fraction of \$80 by which his earnings exceed \$1200. So, if his earnings were over \$2080, he would lose all benefit checks for the year. However, under both the old and the new rules, a beneficiary can be paid his full benefit check for any month in which he neither works for wages of more than \$100 nor renders substantial services in self-employment. It does not matter how high his total earnings for the year may go, he will still be paid his checks for those months. If you are a man age 65 or older, or a woman, age 62 or over, and are still working part time, you may be entitled to social security benefits for some of the months in the calendar year. If you're past retirement age, but have not yet applied for your social security benefits because your earnings are too high, get in touch with your social security office now. The new rules that go into effect in 1961 may make it possible for you to collect some benefits even though you are working.

Farm Bureau's Membership At All-Time High

Waco. — The Texas Farm Bureau wound up its membership year with the largest membership in history — 80,992 farm and ranch families, according to Millard Shivers, organization director. This represents a gain of 1,578 members over last year and marks the eighth consecutive year that the state farm organization has shown an increase in membership. In the past eight years, the organization has grown from 48,650 to its present membership, a gain of 32,342. The official membership year in the TFB is from Nov. 1 to Oct. 31. A last-minute deluge of memberships in the state office delayed the official count for four days, Shivers said. The 80,992 memberships assures Texas a place in the top five states in the American Farm

Bureau Federation, the organization director said. Only Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, in that order, ranked ahead of Texas last year. Ellis County now has the largest county Farm Bureau in Texas, with 1,545 members. A total of 111 of the 199 organized counties in the state exceeded their quotas this year, Shivers said. The top ten counties, in terms of membership, are: Ellis, 1,545; McLennan, 1,540; Hidalgo, 1,463; Williamson, 1,347; Hale, 1,274; Lubbock, 1,231; Bell, 1,221; Milam, 1,188; Ft. Robert Lee Smith Is Drive Chairman For Floyd County

Robert Lee Smith, Lockney, has been named as Floyd County chairman of the Lubbock Christian College 1960 Financial Campaign, according to Dr. F. W. Mattox, president of the college. Campaign goal has been set at \$2,077,000.00 with the Floyd County goal set at \$19,300.
Lubbock Christian College, now in its fourth year of operation as a liberal arts junior college, has an enrollment this fall of approximately 380 students. Total campus assets amount to \$2,000,000.00 including the Auditorium-Administrative Building, a 60-room women's dormitory, and 14 semi-permanent buildings. A giant field house, 382 by 182 feet, now under construction, will be one of the largest in the nation.
The campaign is designed to complete the financing of the two present permanent buildings, provide for erection and equipment of the field house and build a dormitory to house 130 male students. It also aims to make available a three-year operational fund of \$300,000.00 to assure continued high level academic standards, more teachers and an improved salary level.
A three-year fund of \$120,000.00 to sustain the student work program and provide scholarship aid to gifted students with limited means also will be set up. Another aim is to purchase the additional 100 acres required according to the master plan for campus expansion.

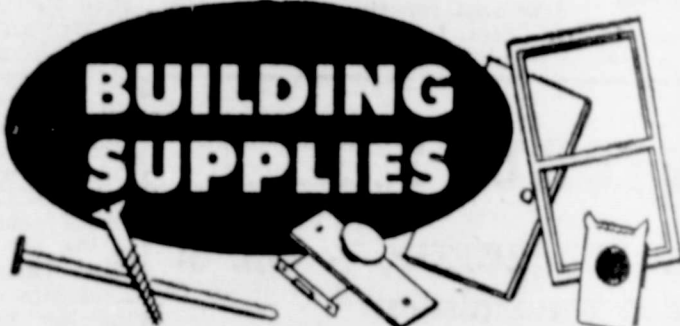
