Commencement.

Friday afternoon, the crowning event of the week came off—the graduating exercises. The school hall was beautifully decorated with the class colors, class motto, and fragrant flowers.

The program was well prepared and every number rendered to the pleasure and profit of all present. The music, both instrumental and vocal, was pronounced of a high grade.

As the Board of Education required one more grade for graduation, the class this year was small. Nevertheless the commencement exercises were interesting and inspiring. The crowded hall proved the interest of our citizens in their school. Canyon City has reasons to be proud of her schools; for they are abreast with the times in all their lines of work. Here, every boy and girl who puts forth the effort can be well prepared for life's duties.

The next feature of commencement was the lecture on the "Model Citizen" by Rev. J. Winford Hunt, the proceeds of which were to defray the expenses of commencement.

A fair audience greeted Mr. Hunt. By all present, the lecture was pronounced fine, beyond expectations. It was highly educational, with a vein of humor running through the whole lecture. He is certainly entertaining in his language and in his manner. Our people need educating along the line of good lectures. Any kind of a show, at any price, gets a good crowd; but a lecture, which is inspiring and elevating, often fails to get the proper support.

More Railroad Talk.

A special of very recent date to the Fort Worth Record says: "Agents representing the Santa Fe railroad have been in the territory northwest of Brownwood for several days contracting for right of way privileges along the survey made for the Abilene & Northwestern railway some eighteen months ago. The right of way agents did not come into Brownwood, but it is understood that with the possible exception of a very few tracts, the right of way has been secured all along from Abilene to within seven miles of Brownwood. The matter of securing the right of way was so quietly transacted that nothing was known of it until parties from the country came in and reported the matter.

Other maneuvers give rise to the belief that the Santa Fe cut-off will be built within the next eight months."

The Hesperian of Floydada, gives an account of a railroad meeting held in that town in which H. T. McGee, in behalf of his road, the Santa Fe, makes a proposition to bring the Texico cut-off by there.

The News feels safe in saying this because not a syllable of complaint has come to the ears of its editor. 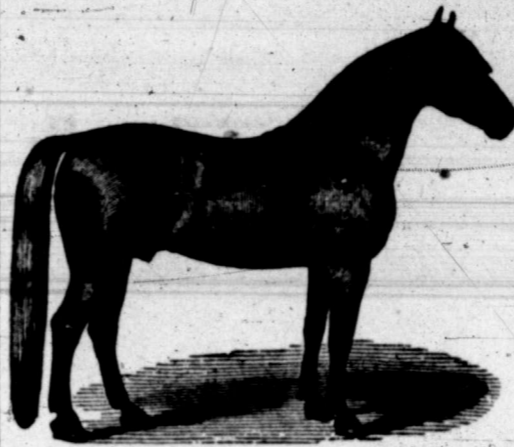

Who knows but what Governor Hogg's suggestion with respect to a monument may be the beginning of a great and necessary reform in that line? Governor Hogg will live in the memory of Texans for many years to come because of his faithful service to the people so long as the pecan tree and walnut tree that are planted at his grave give forth seed, in order to make Texas "a land of trees," and rising generations will be reminded of his good deeds. It may be true that after a while thinking men and women will bring about some other essential reform with respect to the dead. Many people are impressed with the idea that we have all too long adhered to the mourning customs which prevail today but which properly belong to the dark ages. No service can be rendered the dead by this outward display of grief, while those who at the moment need all the relief that is within the power of humans to bestow are not aided by the somber display attended upon our funeral ceremonies. Sometime in the not distant future the band of crepe on the man's hat and the heavy black in the widow's apparel will be abolished. Instead of the black ribbon on the door-knob there will be a wreath of flowers and in every particular the ceremonies will be robbed of that outward display which, if it represents anything at all, indicates an utter hopelessness directly at variance with the faith most of us profess. 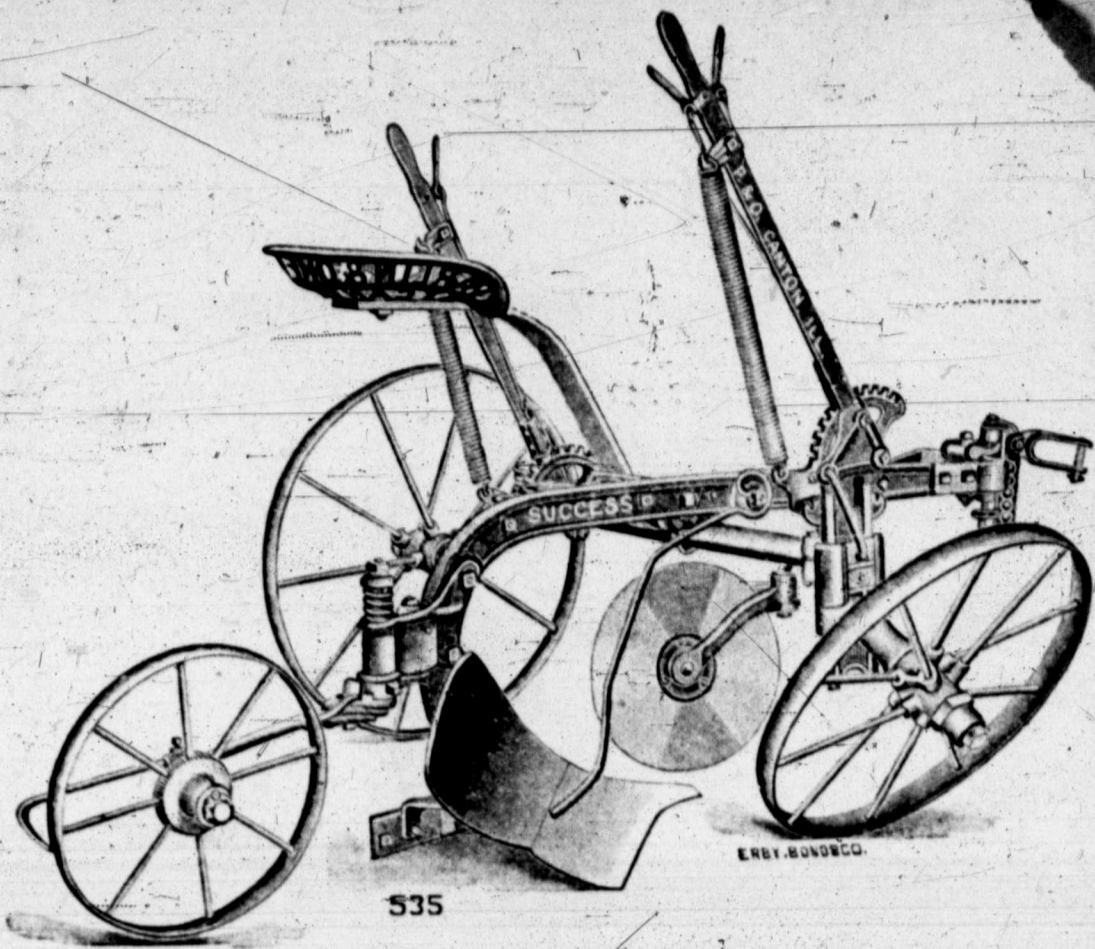

Commencement Exercises.

Many high schools in this State make their closing exercises elaborate in detail and much in quantity. Frequently a whole month of the term and perhaps six weeks is taken up in "getting" and practicing pieces, gymnastics, and the attempt on the part of some of the advanced pupils to acquire a portion of Paderweski's wild breaks at the piano. This makes a great show, to be sure, but it takes up valuable time at expense of both patron and pupil. It is amusing to the pupil admittedly, but it is undoubtedly lost motion in the great realistic game of life. It is impracticable and therefore entirely unsuited to the great majority who send their children to school, often at great inconvenience, to fit them for the useful avocations of life. The News is glad to say that little time is lost in this respect in the Canyon City School. Here, within the school room the rule is to fit the young mind for grappling with the serious problems of life, and the play part comes where of right it ought to be, during vacation. And so the closing exercises of the Canyon City School were not extensive in a dramatic sense. Enough, however, was given to prove interesting and pleasing to all who attended.

THE ALUMNI BANQUET.

Quite a number of our citizens went to Amarillo Monday to hear Bob Taylor. It is estimated that some 800 persons were present at the lecture. He is the Jim Hogg of his State—a jolly good fellow and the idol of the "mudsills."

It will go up with the Masonic hall and the work is to begin as soon as the material can be put on the ground.

Randall County Crops.

The acreage in small grain is much larger than usual and its condition at this date is all that could be asked for. Another rain between now and June 15, will finish up this crop in so far as required moisture is concerned. With this rain at the proper time a large yield in bushels is practically assured as well as the grade which promises to be No. 1.

The corn, Kaffir corn and maize crops are just being "pitched," that is, some of it, a good many of our farmers preferring to wait until next month so, as they say, "not to be bothered with weeds." The ground set aside for these crops ought to have been in fine condition—much of it is not however, as the owners, 'twould hardly do to call them farmers, have permitted it to go to weeds. Of course, as one of them remarked to our reporter, "these will be killed at the time of planting in June," but as all thorough farmers know, much is lost by this method of doing things. The season has been ideal for crop making and for crop preparation and if the operator had done his part up to date, one-half the battle for a big crop would have been over.

No accidents happening we are going to have a fair crop of fruit on the Plains and the quality will be excellent.

Those who gave proper attention to it are having home raised vegetables to grace the table and good vegetables too.

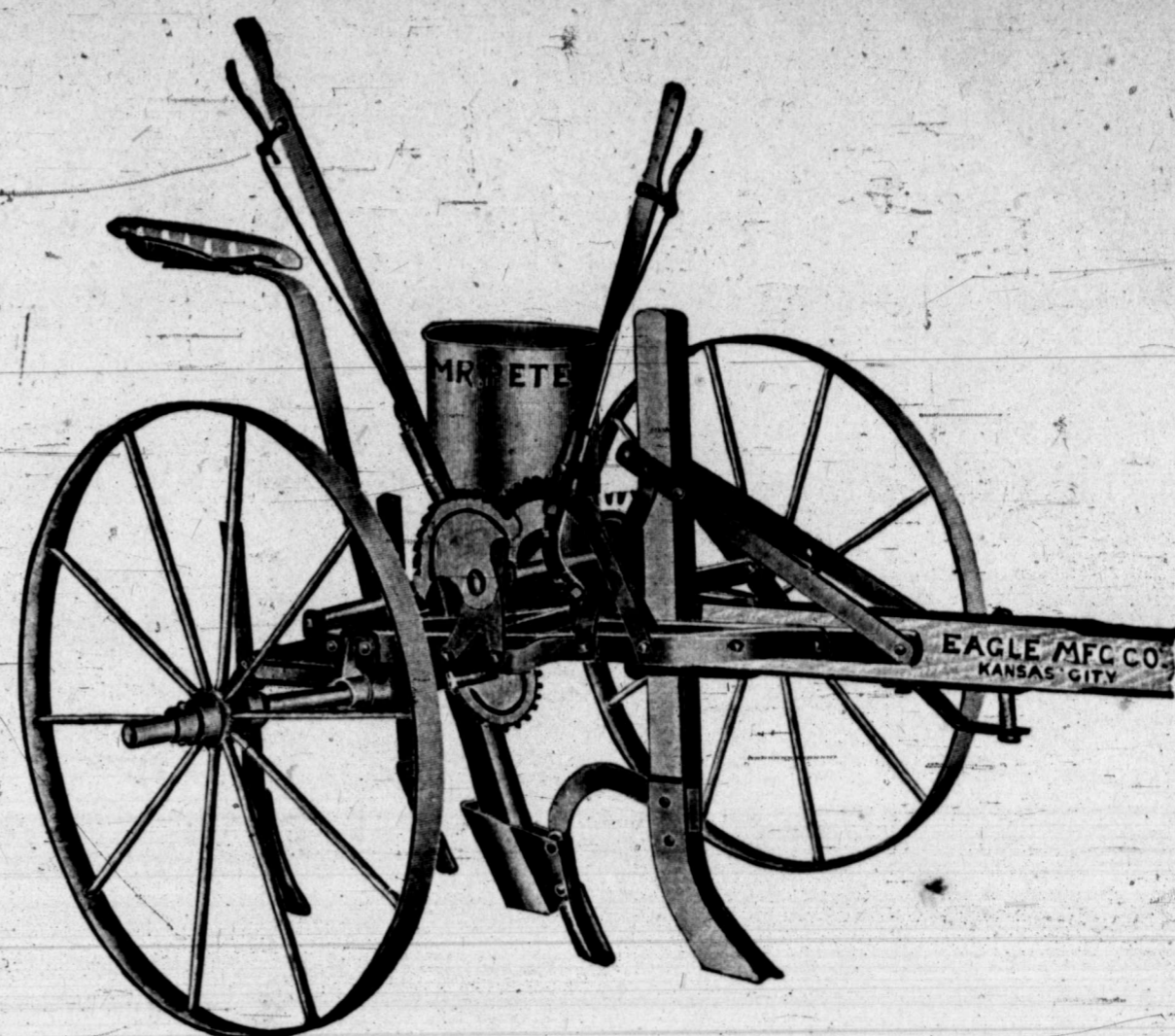

Clouds and sunshine. Toward evening heavy clouds gathered on the western and northern horizon and during the night a fine rain fell here. It extended all over the county, as far west as Boyina, and south to Plainview. It will come very near to if not quite giving the finishing touches in so far as rain is concerned to a magnificent small grain crop.

THURSDAY

Muddy and pools of water standing all about town. Strong breeze from the course the principal rain came from the preceding night—the southeast—with scurrying clouds that remind one of South Texas after a storm on the gulf coast.
