



#### At Washburn's Call.

Saturday morning in the district court room a well attended I. C. PIPKIN mass meeting of citizens was had to see what action should be taken, if any, in response to a call from Armstrong county citizens asking for aid against the move of Amarillo to take up the railroad between Washburn and Panhandle. Judge Henson was elected chairman and R. A. Sow. der, Esq., secretary. Letters from Washburn were read and also from Panhandle, and several rousing speeches were made with results as follows:


