#### WATER REQUIRED FOR CROPS.

It is astonishing to find, even among farmers, how much ignorance there is as to the amount of water required to make crops. People talk very glibly sometimes about irrigating from windmills as tho it was a very small matter and, so it is, as the facts will show--but contrary to the general belief. Prof. Widstoe and Merrill, in Bulletin No. 91 of the Utah Agricultural Experiment Station, pages 80, 83 and 84 says: "In Europe and the Eastern States, it has been found that to produce one pound of dry plant substance requires nearly 500 pounds of water. That is, one ton of absolutely dry lucern hay grown in a humid climate, is produced at an expense of 500 tons of water. "In the drier climate of Utah, more water is ordinarily required to produce one pound of dry matter. Experiments on this subject, not yet published, indicate that on the arid farms about 750 pounds of water will be required to produce one pound of dry plant substance.

The chief arid farm crop is wheat. Grown without irrigation nearly one-half of the wheat consists of the seeds or wheat kernels. Knowing that 750 pounds of water are required to produce one pound of dry matter, it may be calculated that it will require 50 tons of water to produce one bushel of arid farm grain.

This seems a very large amount of water, yet when compared with the amount of water that falls upon our soil in the form of snow or rain it is very small. For instance, a rainfall of one inch amounts to over 113 tons per acre, or more than enough, if it could be used by the plant, to produce two bushels of grain. Twelve inches of rainfall amounts to 1356 tons of water per acre, or enough to produce 27 bushels of grain."

The plant food is in the soil; the water dissolves and carries it to the growing plant, which, retaining the food, its carrier, the water, passes off into the air. Here is where the Campbell system of conserving the moisture comes in--to prevent all evaporation save the one mentioned, through the plant itself.

The average Plains rainfall is ample for crops, and good crops, if coupled with intelligent farming.

#### Burning Ashes With Coal.

How to economize is a question that should concern all of us, at times, it becomes necessary with most of us provided we would stand square with the rest of mankind. A plan to do on half of the coal we now use should, therefore, be of some interest to Plains people. How to successfully burn slack coal is known to most of us now, but how to burn ashes with coal "is a secret just out," says a Pennsylvania paper, describing the process in this way:

John Ellmore's secret of burning ashes with coal is out and nearly every householder in Altoona is now using it with great saving in coal bills. Common salt, one pound, Oxalic acid, two ounces, water, one gallon. Mix and moisten a mixture containing one part of coal and three parts ashes. This mixture will, upon being placed upon a burning fire, fuse into a cokelike mass and deposit but little residue.

The compound is now being used in several large industrial and mercantile places here, and it is claimed for it that it has reduced the fuel item more than half.

**SPECIAL SESSION WORK.**

The Legislature special session  
closed a little after midnight  
Saturday.

According to the Dallas News  
of Monday the important bills  
passed are as follows:

That increasing charter and  
permit filing fees.

Gross receipts tax bill.

Intangible assets tax bill.

Delinquent tax bill.

Fourteen-hour railroad labor  
amendment bill.

That increasing franchise tax  
on corporations.

Inheritance tax bill.

Mr. Stratton's bill providing  
for service of individuals and co-  
partnerships doing business in  
Texas.

The general land bill.

That legalizing tax assessments  
made at special sessions of Com-  
missioners' Courts.

The Revenue Agent's bill.

That requiring full assess-  
ments.

The telephone connection bill.

Senator Looney's bill exped-  
iting and simplifying contests of  
local option elections.

The general textbook bill.

The official court stenogra-  
pher's bill.

Mr. Faust's bill requiring writ-  
ten testimony in examining tri-  
als before payment of fees to offi-  
cers conducting same.

The automatic tax bill and a  
number of others not of State-  
wide importance and a few local  
school district measures.

Among the more important  
bills which failed to pass were  
the following: Senjeer bill pro-  
viding for the codification and an-  
notation of the laws and recom-  
mendation for changes in the en-  
tire judiciary; fraud on the pub-  
lic revenue bill; the private cor-  
poration, or book value, bill; that  
taxing bonds of all kinds; defin-  
ing and taxing peddlers; that re-  
quiring Assessors to put prop-  
erty on the rolls at full value; Mr.  
O'Brien's oath bill; the nine hour  
juror bill; Mr. Robertson's bill  
taxing mortgages; Mr. McDon-  
ald's bill authorizing Tax Assess-  
ors to go into banks to ascertain  
amounts deposited, etc., besides  
numerous bills regulating the  
practice in Texas courts from  
the lowest to the highest; the  
two-cent fare bill, the beer in-  
spection bill, the liquor inspec-  
tion bill and that making a viola-  
tion of local option laws a felony.

The Hereford Brand on account  
of increased demand for adver-  
tising space has been compelled  
to increase its size to sixteen

The Hereford Brand reports  
that the contract for the first fifty  
miles on the Panhandle Short  
Line was on Tuesday awarded to

early in September."

Thursday evening of last week  
the Legislature passed a bill  
granting the Rock Island an ex-  
tension of the charter for the line  
from Amarillo to Tucumcari pro-  
vided said company complete  
one-third of the distance this  
summer. Work is to begin at  
once, so 'tis said, and it is be-  
lieved it will go clear through to  
Tucumcari by fall.

**A City Election Likely.**

News readers will remember  
that there was a difference of  
opinion among our citizens as to  
whether or not an entire city  
ticket should be elected in April.  
They are also aware of the fact  
that Mayor Jasper N. Haney  
held that such an election was  
not required by law and that in  
this opinion he was upheld on two  
distinct occasions by the At-  
torney General's department. It  
was thought by some that this  
ruling would settle the question.  
It fell short of doing so, how-  
ever, as a considerable number of  
our best citizens, including a ma-  
jority of the lawyers, still contend  
that such an election should, un-  
der the law, have been held. The  
mandamus case, referred to else-  
where, is an outgrowth of this.

Now, waiving entirely the ques-  
tion of law involved, such a con-  
troversy, if long continued in,  
can but have one effect—two fac-  
tions, one for and the other  
against the present city govern-  
ment. Seeking to obviate such  
deplorable conditions it has been  
proposed that the present Coun-  
cil resign and that another elec-  
tion be held as soon as possible.  
This proposition, submitted in  
the interest of harmony and for  
the further purpose of settling  
forever at rest all questions  
touching the validity of future  
acts of the city council, is now  
being considered favorably by  
the contending parties and from  
present appearances will likely  
result in an election at which, it  
is hoped all past differences will  
be buried for all time.

Should this election be ordered  
the present city government  
will resign to take effect on the  
election and qualification of its  
successors.

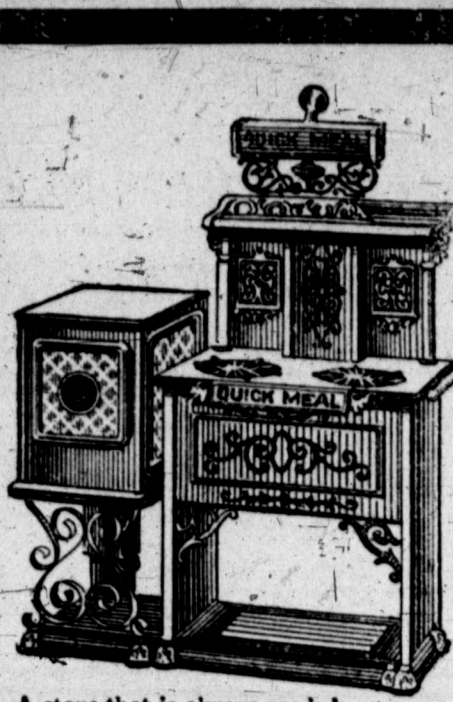

**Sam I. Keiser's Death.**

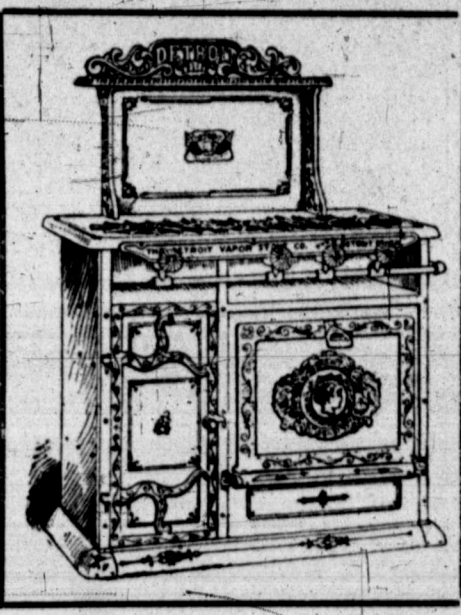

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Establishment of a Home for Confederate Widows.**

Joint Resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives of widows and Confederate soldiers and

sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers anterior to March 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose herebefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided the grant to aid said homes shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said homes shall be entitled to any other aid from the State; the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, 1907.

The sum of \$5000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Levy of a Road Tax.**

Joint Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 9a, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted for the purpose of improving public roads, and to allow counties or political subdivisions of counties by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county, or subdivision thereof, voting at all elections, to be held for that purpose, to adopt same.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. A majority of the property tax paying voters in any county or one or more political subdivisions thereof, in this State, voting at an election held for that purpose may vote a tax for road and bridge purposes not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 valuation of property subject to taxation in such county or political subdivision of such county, or may issue bonds not to exceed 20 per cent of the assessed value of the real property in such district, for such road and bridge purposes, provided that such tax, or proceeds of such bonds, shall be expended in the territory in which it is voted, and no other, and this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be had in the State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified tax paying voters. And the sum of \$2000, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the treasury of the State of Texas for the purpose of submitting this proposition to a vote of the people of the State of Texas.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Creating the Office of Commissioner of Agriculture.**

Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 27, providing for a Department of Agriculture, with a bureau of labor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article four (4) of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 27, when a majority of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature of Texas at an election for that purpose shall vote in favor of the amendment, shall read as follows:

Section 27. The Legislature shall provide for the office of Commissioner of Agriculture, who shall be either elected by the qualified voters of the State, or appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senate, as the Legislature may provide; whose term of office, duties and salary shall be prescribed by law; in which department there shall be established by the Legislature a bureau of labor, when required by the public interest.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of

Texas, as an amendment to the Constitution of Texas, to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 1907.

All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "Against the amendment to the Constitution, providing for a Department of Agriculture and a Bureau of Labor." And the sum of (\$2000) two thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publications, proclamation and election.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Authorizing the Establishment of a State Printing Plant.**

Joint Resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the State of Texas of a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to printing, publishing, stationery, paper and fuel, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. All printing and publishing, and all stationery, paper and fuel for the various departments, and for all offices, whether created by this Constitution or by law, shall be done and supplied as may be provided by law, and for the accomplishment of these objects and purposes the Legislature may provide and establish all requisite means and agencies, invested with such powers as may be deemed adequate and advisable.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "For the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the Constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Fixing the Salary of Members of the Legislature.**

An Act to amend Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to the compensation of members of the Legislature.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 24. The members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not to exceed one thousand dollars for each year in which a biennial session of the Legislature is held under the provisions of this Constitution, and five dollars for each day of any Special Session held during the subsequent year, and in addition thereto, they shall receive mileage in going to and returning from the State Capitol, not to exceed three cents per mile; the distance to be computed by the nearest railroad route, and the Comptroller shall prepare and preserve a table of distances for each county seat now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a Regular or Called Session.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday in August, 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "For the amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution, relating to the salary of the members of the Legislature," and all those opposed, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words, "Against the amendment to Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution, relating to the salary of the members of the Legislature."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the Constitution and

laws of the State, and the sum of \$1000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general revenue of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

**Proposed Amendment to the State Constitution Providing for the Creation of Improvement Districts in Certain Cities.**

Joint Resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for the creation of improvement districts in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants, and charging the cost of certain improvements made therein against the abutting property.

Section 1. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas: That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for road and bridges, and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A. D. 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as in this Constitution otherwise provided; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

In addition to the foregoing, cities of more than five thousand inhabitants may lay out within their corporate limits; improvement districts in which they, by and with the consent of a majority of the taxpayers owning real estate therein, may build sidewalks and charge the cost thereof against the abutting property, and may build sewers and pave streets and charge one-third of the cost thereof against the abutting property on either side of the streets upon which such improvements are made in such district, and the amount charged against all such abutting property shall be deemed and held to be a tax against a lien upon such abutting property, and the Legislature is required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amount properly chargeable against each parcel of abutting property, and providing for the enforcement of its collection.

Sec. 2. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the Constitution to the qualified voters of the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street." And the voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third of the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street."

Sec. 3. The lateness in the session, the crowded condition of the calendars of both houses, and the importance of this proposed amendment, create an emergency and an imperative public necessity demanding that the constitutional rule, and Senate Rule No. 37, requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and the same are hereby suspended.
