**Canyon City & Northeastern.**

This is the name of a new railroad projected by citizens of this town and for which a charter is now on file at Austin.

The capital stock of the company is set out at one hundred thousand dollars, and the directors as named in the charter include the following named gentlemen, all of them substantial citizens of Canyon City, to wit:

C. T. Word, L. G. Conner, L. C. Lair, J. M. Black, W. F. Heller, R. W. O'Keefe and J. C. Pipkin. The first four named have been elected president, vice president, secretary and treasurer respectively.

In addition to those named the other stockholders subscribing so far are: W. C. Baird, L. T. Exster, J. M. Cooper, Dr. Stewart, W. E. Bates, J. L. Prichard, D. A. Park, John Knight, R. G. Oldham, Keiser Bros. & Phillips and Henry Shinebarger, in all eighteen. Each one takes twenty shares or \$2,000, making thirty-six thousand dollars already taken.

The charter calls for a distance of thirty-six miles or less and to begin at Canyon City with a destination at or near Yarnell, in Crosby county.

Upon the grant of this charter, which is expected within a few days, the company proposes to open its books for further subscriptions of stock and to proceed in other ways to carry out the objects and plans of the corporation.

The measure is one which, if carried out to a successful termination, means great things for Canyon City and surrounding country and the incorporators trust that our people will, when the tug of war comes, appreciate their efforts for the general good in a substantial way.

**Subscription Price Must Advance.**

The rapid and continued rise in the price of everything that goes to make a newspaper is going to force an increase in subscription rates. Forty per cent advance in stock since last year and still the same old selling price for the finished product is more than any set of business men can stand for long at a time. Other lines, lumber, flour, etc., advance with the markets and why not newspaper stock? It has the same reason for, then once more, why not?

Yes, the subscription price must advance, if the business of running newspapers is to be kept on anything like a living basis.

The News will increase its subscription rates to \$1.25 any way, and maybe \$1.50 per year, before long. It must do so if it would keep up its present standard of quality in stock and workmanship and this, The News is determined to do at all hazards.

Ample notice, however, will be given of the advance and when it will take effect and until such time the old price, \$1.00 per year will stand.

**The Christian Protracted Meeting.**

Is still going on and will, unless present plans fail, continue over next week. Good congregations have been the rule and the interest is growing as well as the number of hearers increasing.

Evangelist J. L. Haddock is a good talker; he gets right down to where people live and applies

He deserves, on his merits, a good audience and close attention at each appointment while here and all who go, regardless of their past condition in life or of their future state, their faith or want of it in the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, can feel assured of receiving some benefit, at least.

Another feature of the meeting is the singing under the leadership of Talmage Stanley. It is good, very good, and all who can should come and enjoy it. Some one has said, "God pity the man whose heartstrings are not responsive to good music," and The News is constrained to believe that such a person would be miserable in heaven itself.

**Improvement of Public Square Suggested.**

**EDITOR OF THE NEWS:**

I suggest that you get after the commissioners' court and have it put the courthouse square in shape to make it attractive. The people of Canyon City want the land in its vicinity cut up into farms and put under cultivation. But to this end scientific, intensive farming is indispensable. The slovenly methods that prevail in regions where the rainfall is abundant are out of the question here. Most of your readers have heard of the Campbell system, in which culture takes the place of irrigation, and the plow, harrow and roller bring good crops on lands formerly deemed incapable of profitable cultivation. The secret of the Campbell system is, work the land must be made fine and kept fine. Clods are a nuisance to be abated at whatever cost. The kind of cultivation suggested by the present appearance of the courthouse square will not suffice. It suggests to visitors that nothing is known here of the kind of agriculture necessary to diminish the magnificent distances between farm houses in Randall county. It might be made to suggest something more conducive to the rapid settlement of the county and the consequent prosperity of the city. It might be made an object lesson. Is it not worth trying? I have not mentioned the obvious benefit to the trees, which respond to cultivation like ordinary field crops, nor to the future grass crop if it should be decided to make a lawn of the square. Q. E. D.

Various places in the State report Saturday, Sunday and Monday as extremely hot. Surgical thermometers at San Angelo are said to have registered as high as 111 degrees, or higher than fever. At Brownwood 110 in the shade is the record for Monday. These two places are 1800 and 1400 feet altitude respectively. Hot winds was the immediate cause and the damage to growing crops, corn, especially, in West and Southwest Texas, is great. Saturday was our hottest day, the thermometer standing 96 between 2 and 3 p. m.

### HINTS ON STORING FRUIT.

Amateurs frequently gather their apples and pears before they are thoroughly ripened. Under these conditions it is impossible to obtain the full flavor of the fruit. An even temperature in the fruit store is important, and adequate ventilation must be provided at all times. Many excellent varieties of apples have been pronounced of inferior quality owing to their being placed in ill-ventilated store rooms. The use of straw or hay should be avoided. Fruit will taste of the flavor of these materials if used. The choicest dessert varieties should be placed on wadding or wood wool in single layers. Take great care in handling the fruit not to bruise or otherwise damage it in any way.—Gardening for Beginners, in the Garden.

### TRIBUTE TO WASHINGTON.

The first public recognition of George Washington's military genius is an appreciation written by an English army officer under the ill-starred Gen. Braddock. This was published in the Scot's magazine of Edinburgh in 1757, a year after the famous defeat. ### Twenty-five Bushels Per Acre.

Mayor Gough on last Wednesday morning invited a Brand man and a number of others to inspect his wheat crop just south of town. When the company arrived they found a harvester at work in the golden field. Three pieces were inspected, two of which had been cultivated by the usual method of farming, the yield of which will not exceed 10 and 12 bushels per acre. The last field inspected had been cultivated according to modern methods, and after a most thorough examination, the entire company decided that the field would make 20 or 25 bushels per acre. The stalks are of good height and the crop can be easily cut and bound by an ordinary harvester; the spikes are large and grains well developed. This crop fully demonstrates what can be done in the Panhandle when proper and scientific methods are used, and our Mayor is to be congratulated for giving this demonstration.—Heford Brand.
