POST VOTES CONTRIBUTION TO AUXILIARY FUND.

National defense day critics were denounced, \$100 was voted to the Auxiliary's Memorial Fund and a picnic for Friday night was planned at the semimonthly meeting of Palo Duro Post 91, American Legion, at the Legion Club Monday night.

A resolution declaring that the national defenses are so inadequate as to render ridiculous the charge that militarism would be encouraged by a "national mobilization day," as outlined by President Calvin Coolidge, was adopted unanimously. Critics of the president's action were scored as enemies to the country's security, and the assistance of the post was pledged in helping observe the day. Past experience with the instability of international sentiment should be a warning against pacifistic trust in alliances and the exploded theory of the "balance of power," the resolution added.

The contribution of \$100 to the Auxiliary's fund for the erection of a tablet, arch or memorial shaft to the county's war dead was made in recognition of the efforts of that body during the past three years to raise money for the purpose.
