Canyon and Randall County are on the eve of the big opportunity.

Saturday and Sunday the president and secretary of the State Park Board, on which the eyes of all Texas are centered, made a preliminary inspection of the available sites for a state park in this territory.

Co-operating with them were the mayor, the local park committee and the Chamber of Commerce, but if the plans being worked out through these agencies succeed, not only their cooperation, but that of every citizen of the county will be needed.

Canyon can become the Colorado Springs of Texas, the Boulder of the Panhandle, the base from which hundreds of thousands of tourists will tour the great state parks proposed for the Palo Duro Canyon. Just as the Colorado towns have grown wealthy and nationally famous, so Canyon can and should do.

Short-sightedness and selfishness will spoil the plans of every conscientious public worker in the community. They will slay the goose that lays the golden egg. Canyon must be united if the great opportunity is to be realized upon.

Every man and woman in Canyon, no matter of what station of life, should think, talk, and work, for the next three weeks at least, for the consummation of this big enterprise. A mass meeting attended by ALL citizens should greet the board on its arrival, and there should be ready a real offer to the State. Upon what Canyon does in the next three weeks may hinge its success or failure as a city of vision.

One of the greatest things in selling a city is, of course advertising. C. J. Blackburn of the Amarillo Ad Club at the recent retail merchants' convention here pointed out that attractive window displays give greatest returns of all kinds of advertising available in business.

Why should not Canyon "dress its windows" as attractively as possible?

The show windows of Canyon are its cross-town highways, its main streets. A white way system on Fourth Avenue will set off the city to its best advantage. It will make the tourist feel that he has arrived at a "live" place, where he can spend his money in satisfaction.

This advantage of a white way is in addition to the increase in value to the property it fronts. The cost is nominal. Let us have a white way as soon as possible.

Failing to co-operate with the Chamber of Commerce you are maintaining is like employing a specialist and then refusing to take the medicine he prescribes. Don't pay him his fee and then throw his prescription in the wastebasket the minute his back is turned. It is not only unfair to you, but to him and his professional reputation. If you have no faith in your physician, get one in whom you have faith. If you are simply too lazy or selfish to follow his advice, or too miserly to pay his fee, let him go where he can do some good.

## IOWA SCOUTS NEW TIRE

Editor Finds Balloon Casing Received Skeptically by Older States.

Texas is progressive mechanically and backward politically. C. W. Warwick, editor of the News, finds on his vacation trip to his old home town in Iowa.

In a letter just received, Mr. Warwick declares that while the Iowans are still cold-shouldered toward the balloon tire, they have a real cure for run-off complications. The text of his letter follows:

"Eleven hundred and fourteen miles in thirty-eight hours and thirty minutes driving time is the record we made in our trip to Montezuma, Iowa. The roads were exceptionally good all the way. We hit mud just one hour of the time, this was not exceptionally bad. The rest of the way was over very fine roads. For hundreds of miles through the Panhandle, Oklahoma and western Kansas, the old boat was held at from forty to forty-five miles per hour, with nothing to stop progress. The first day we covered 362 miles; the second day we made 346 miles. We had then struck eastern Kansas and Missouri where even though the roads are excellent there is a sharp turn every quarter mile. It is impossible to make time, even over the paved roads. The third day we took things a little easier and made 285 miles. This is considered good driving time, as we passed through northern Missouri, with more sharp turns, and it was then that we hit the only mud on the trip. We were in rain for an hour on the paved highway, and in mud for an hour after leaving the highway, both of which cut the driving time down to 15 to 25 miles per hour. We arrived Sunday noon—the fourth day out.

"We had one puncture on the way—in the evening of the second day. Mighty glad that puncture came in the dusk, as it was very hot driving thru Kansas. Since arriving in Montezuma, we have had three punctures in driving less than a hundred miles around town and to neighboring towns. Neighboring towns up here mean a drive of five to seven miles. When people get forty or fifty miles away from home in this country, they have traveled some distance.

"We found that Texas is in its infancy so far as road building is concerned. We struck government highways all the way, which are certainly wonderful. There is more than four hundred miles of paving on the way, and probably more than that of hard surfaced highways. Iowa was one of the first states to take advantage of the federal aid in building highways, and the result is hard surfaced highways everywhere. I am thoroughly convinced that the constitutional amendment must be passed next year by Texas in order that we may get into the real road building program. The little dinky roads that I used to kick up dust in as a bare-footed kid, are now graveled main highways over

which cars run at almost unlimited speed.

"The balloon tire is certainly a great invention when it comes to traveling in comfort. I find that it is practically unknown in this country. People are skeptical of the balloon. After leaving western Kansas, every filling station at which we stopped would ask about the balloon, and wonder whether it was not a rather rough tire for travel. I had a hard time finding anyone here who knew anything about repairing one. Also I am convinced that I made a good trade in getting my present Dodge. We had to shift gears just three times on the trip in order to make hills—and these hills are certainly young mountains. The first shift was made in northern Missouri, when we had to pass a car stalled on a steep hill. Our old boat stalled too, and I had my first real experience in getting it started under difficulty. The second and third hills on which we had to shift were within ten miles of my mother's home. Both of these hills start at very sharp turns in the road, and a car has no chance to get started.

"We have hit right into the middle of the hot weather in Iowa. July was the coldest July in the history of this country, and the farmers were praying for hot weather as the corn was doing no good. It looks like there was going to be plenty of hot weather to save the corn, and incidentally melt us. These fellows look surprised when I tell them we are not used to hot weather in Texas. I have been asked a dozen times if I have met lately another Montezuma man who is located at Brownsville. People away from Texas do not realize the size of our state.

"I have been joked considerably by both democratic and republican friends over the result of the primary. The republicans know the joke that has been pulled on Texas by allowing a rank republican to run the recent campaign, and to put in the lead his candidate in the primary. They ask me why Texas doesn't elect a capable republican to run affairs, rather than let a black sheep of the family run them. The clan is looked upon with suspicion in this country. It is getting some following in the cities, but the rank and file of the citizenship has no time for such things. I note by the Dallas News that a number of the defeated candidates for governor are lining up for Mrs. Ferguson for the second primary. We have about decided to vote for her in the second primary. If the clan would put out a clean and capable candidate, it would not be such a bad thing to vote for one occasionally.

"Iowa has a first primary, and if no candidate receives 35 percent of all votes cast, then delegates go into a state convention and make the nomination. This has saved the state from the humility of having two leading candidates to choose between, such as we are having in Texas this month. We trust that the legislature will make some provision for overcoming this great defect in the primary election law.

"This state is having its trial politi-

cally with Senator Smith Brookhart, who has the farmers bunched. There is not a newspaper in Iowa supporting the Senator. Every business and professional man in the state is fighting him, yet he is leading by the vote of the farmers, who are strong for him. Brookhart now charges that the present increase in farm prices is due to the manipulations of Wall Street in order to insure the election of Coolidge in November. The leading politicians are not much afraid of the La Follette ticket, but are leaving no stone unturned that might let him let Davis and Bryan slip in.

"We will start home about the 17th in order to be there for the second primary.

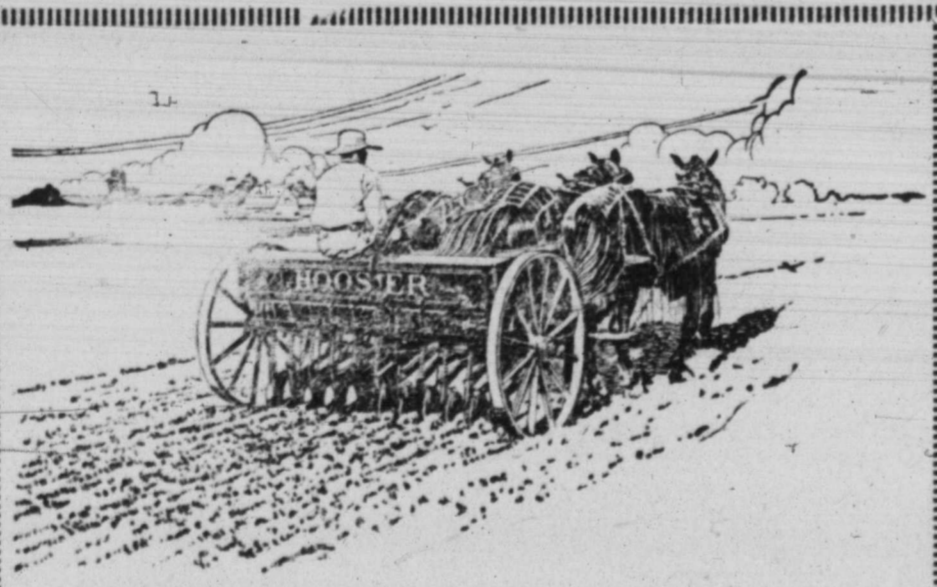

You've heard of England's patriotic exhibition, at Wembley, planned to boost the British Empire and arouse British patriotism.

The best imperial exhibit shows a map of the world of gigantic size, with the oceans, seas and bigger lakes made of real water.

Britsers walking around that map see all parts of the earth's surface owned by them lighted up by red lights from below. They see thousands of British ships moving along through the water on the great world's trade routes. Signs tell them that the British flag flies over one-quarter of all the land on earth.

When the visitor from Canada, Australia, South Africa, sees that he says to himself "Partnership in the British Empire is a pretty good thing."

And other nations including ours are bound to give the Britsers credit for governing ability. You saw the other day a statement by the British Labor Prime Minister MacDonald, that the whole army of the British Empire is smaller than the army of Holland or Spain. That means good management.

The great Everett Cotton Mills of Lawrence, Massachusetts, have closed. "No demand for colored cotton goods." And England is shipping millions of yards of colored cotton cloth into this country. The stores discover that goods sell more easily when labeled "Made in England."

It wouldn't be a bad idea to have at Washington, and in every big city, a patriotic map showing what the United States amount to.

go. The world, and one hundred and twelve millions of pretty intelligent American human beings. It ought to be possible in some way to interest Americans in buying goods made in their own country.

In England, if you buy goods NOT "British made," you are looked upon with contempt. Here, if you insist on buying goods NOT American made, you are considered fashionable.

A new locomotive, just tried in the East, interests you. It is a whole power plant in itself, burns oil, changes that into electricity, and runs by the electricity.

A boy can learn to run it in ten minutes. It has great power, a you are told it uses only ten to fifteen cents worth of fuel per hour. That won't please coal mine owners.

This nation has many valuable crops running up into the billions per year. The most valuable of all, although you couldn't sell it for ten cents or even give it away, is the crop of babies.

In the United States last year, 1,238,000 brand new babies were born. Only 221,000 deaths occurred, leaving out immigration, a population increase of 617,000. That is a great city added to the nation by the nation's mothers.

How fast this country grows, even with limited immigration! Our population is now more than 112,000,000, more than 7,000,000 increase since the census of 1920. That's good news, for what we need is another 100,000,000 people to do work now neglected, and to consume the products of farms and factories.

In England women are beginning to take snuff, tired of cigarettes. That won't last, for snuff makes the nose black instead of pink on the inside. Pink snuff may be invented. Nevertheless, snuff taking won't endure.

But it illustrates the fact that women find it difficult to take their bad habits as moderately as men do. Their intense nervous systems always demand more, more. That's why they should never start anything that can be done to excess, drinking, drugs, gambling or gambling.

More interesting to twenty million farmers than any other news is the birth in Canada of a calf weighing 157 pounds at birth. The mother, of course, is a Holstein. The average weight of a new-born calf is between eighty and ninety pounds.

If "a selection" could raise the average weight of calves to the Canadian maximum, it would mean tens of millions increased profit to farmers.

**THE PASSING DAY**

By Will H. Mayes, Department of Journalism, University of Texas.

The precarious condition of the cotton crop in many parts of the country is causing the cotton farmers and merchants much uneasiness. Where farmers have made cotton the sole crop there is much need for alarm, for a cotton failure for most of them means either that they will have to go into debt another year or suffer for the lack of those things they could as well have raised on their farms. If this condition were unusual the farmers would deserve much more sympathy; but in some parts of Texas every year the cotton crop is disappointing, and it may be expected anywhere any year. So long as the seasons are variable this will be true and the farmers should profit by this knowledge. In no county in Texas can farmers depend on making a full cotton crop every year.

Even if a fair crop should be made every season the farmers should not grow cotton to the exclusion of other crops, for it is the poorest business policy to exchange cotton year after year for food and feedstuffs that can be grown at home. Where cotton failure may be expected now and then, as it may be in every county in Texas, farmers owe it to themselves and their families to at least make certain of a living at home for themselves and their stock, aside from their cotton crop. There is not a farm in Texas on which this cannot be done if only the farmer will use ordinary judgment in planting and caring for a variety of crops. The poverty of many farms, rich in soils and productivity but poor in crop distribution, is everywhere evident.

Texas farmers will not prosper as they should until they grow on their own farms all the foodstuffs needed to run their farms except those things that experience has shown cannot be produced there. Cotton will always be the staple money crop of Texas farmers, but in time the farmers will learn that they cannot depend on it as the sole crop. Those farmers who have already learned this lesson and have their barns and pantry filled, are not losing sleep over the possibility of a failure of the cotton crop.

The most interesting thing this writer heard at College Station during the Farmers' Short Course was the statements made by a number of farmers' wives as to how they had improved their kitchens at small expense to make their work more convenient and labor-saving. It was interesting to hear how they managed to install so many convenient work-saving devices at such small cost and how much easier their work has been made. Most farm kitchens are wholly lacking in arrangement and in the appliances that lessen the labor of the wife, and yet in most cases a few dollars and a little work will bring about the changes to make the kitchen a real delight. The work of the farmer's wife is hard enough at best and every farmer owes it to his wife to help her make her daily tasks as light as possible. The place to begin is with the kitchen.

Next to the kitchen demonstrations at College Station the best lessons could be learned from the young girls who told how they made their living rooms and bed rooms attractive and comfortable. A number of them told how they worked to make the money with which they added a few attractive pieces of furniture or how they worked over old furniture and painted it in bright colors, how they curtained the windows, made pretty rugs and added a touch here and there to make their rooms liveable and pretty. One young girl exhibited her bed room furniture and explained how she had treated or repaired each piece. The surprising thing was that the cost was so small and yet the transformation from a dingy to a pretty room was brought almost as if by magic.

It is not possible for all the wives and daughters of Texas to go to College Station every year, but every county and every community in the State could have meetings planned along the same lines as those held at A. & M. College, at which experiences in home improvement could be exchanged. People like to see and hear just what others are doing to make their living conditions better, and having seen and heard they always profit by it.

One often wonders why some fail in business while others with less capital, fewer friends, and poorer opportunities, succeed. The failures are usually quitters. They start out well with plenty of money, many acquaintances and bright prospects, but when reverses come or business gets dull, they stop and take a rest. I once knew a prosperous merchant with a good trade

who found his business up against a serious drought that considerably diminished trade. He decided to begin to cut down expenses by cutting off his advertising. He saved some \$80.00 a month in that way, but his business fell away to almost nothing. A young fellow, almost a stranger in the town, doubled his advertising as the drought became worse, and was so on doing twice as much business as any other store in the town. The old merchant had to close his store after two years of unprofitable business, but the chap who wouldn't quit is now the leading merchant in that town.

When the smoke of this political campaign has cleared away, as it will soon clear, we will be left wondering why so many people allowed themselves to get so excited. It is good politics for candidates to arouse the people to a high pitch of political fervor, for otherwise many of them would go through a campaign unnoticed, but it is largely a wasteful pastime for the average citizen. He seems to enjoy it, though, and as it is a harmless sport, no serious objection can be offered. It enables voters to let out a large amount of pent-up enthusiasm in a way that does little or no harm.
