TEXAS UTILITIES **COMPANY TAKES OVER LIGHT PLANT**

DEAL MADE MONTH AGO FALLS DOWN-NEW SALE MADE.

New Owners in Charge and Will Carry Out All Provisions of Former Sale -Arnold Continues Manager.

The sale of the Canyon Light Power Company a month ago finally fell through with before the final papers were signed, and on Thursday A. J. Arnold closed a sale of the plant to the Texas Utilities Company.

The Texas Utilities Company is one of the big operating companies in the Southwest. Kelso & Wurdack of St. Louis are the owners of this big concern, and they own plants in a large number of towns. On the Plains, the company owns plants at Plainview, Lubbock and Slaton, and furnish the power for Idalou, Ralls, Lorenzo, Floydada, Lockney, Hale Center and Aber-

With the purchase of the Canyon plant it is understood that the company intends putting in a large plant in this city, and branching out, the first step being a high line to Happy.

It is stated that the Texas Utilities Company had virtually closed a deal for the Canyon plant with the Abilene men who were trying to buy it a

The improvements at the plant will be made, and the ice plant installed y was guaranteed by the previous parties considering the purchase.

No change will be made in the management of the local plant. A. J. Arnold has been employed by the new owners to manage the business, and all employes will continue with the plant.

A deed to the property was given by Mr. Arnold Thursday, and the new company took immediate possession.


Citizenship Restored to J. W. Turner by Order From Governor Neff



NEW ENROLLMENT FIGURES HAVE SLIGHT REVISIONS

Since the entrance examinations lowered the temporary standing of twenty seven students, the college attendance has been lowered by this number, and the sub-collegiate division increased correspondingly. The total number enrolled, however, is unchanged. There are six hundred thirteen college rank students, distributed as follows: seniors, 41; juniors, 64; sophomores, 155; freshmen, 348; special, 5. Two hundred twenty two students are enrolled in the eighth, ninth, tenth, and eleventh grades, the number in each being 31, 37, 55, and 99, respectively. The training school enrollment is not included in these figures.




