The new automobile plates have been received at the office of W. C. Black, sheriff and tax collector, and automobile owners must provide themselves with new plate to be placed on their cars January 1st, or be subject to a

Car owners must bring to the collector's office last year's receipt, and in case they do not have this receipt, they must furnish the engine number and the figures shown on the present number plate. The new plate cannot be issued without this information, and it would take an unlimited amount of time to dig up this information from the records in the collector's office for each car in the county.

A new plate is issued this year in stead of seals. The plate is of dark brown with six figures in raised white, with a star separating groups of three, as in the old plates. At one end of the plate is the word "Texas," and at the other end "1925."

Eagles Keep Record Clear by Suffering During Two Years.

The Canyon Eagles closed a most successful season Thursday by defeating the Floydada Whirlwind team by a score of 19 to 7. on one lake near the city. On Thanksgiving Hud and Sherman Prichard, T. S. Maxwell, Ed Mickle


and Sanford Black killed 17 geese on the lake, and Monday Ed Mickle and Grady Oldham got 10 geese.





Reid Favors Increase of Gasoline Tax and **Lowering Auto Tax**

Austin, Texas, Nov. 29 .- J. W. Reid of Canyon, Senator-elect from the Thirty-First District was in Austin Saturday and announced that he will favor a bill increasing the gasoline tax from 1c to 2c per gallon and make a corresponding reduction in the motor vehicle license fees. Senator Reid also favors a strict law regulating grade crossings so as to reduce the number of accidents.

WHEAT EXPORT MAKING NEW HIGH RECORD

Total wheat exports and flour durng the present crop year are likely to run in excess of 200,000,000 bushels, says the United States Department of permitted to enter. Agriculture in an analysis of available export figures. Exports last year were

The department's estimate is based on the increased exports over last year since the beginning of the crop year July 1 and up to the end of October. Preliminary returns from the Department of Commerce indicate experts of 118,000,000 bushels during the four months this year, as compared with 73.800,000 bushels in 1923 which was 47% of the total exports for that year. Exports during the same period in 1922 were 115,000,000 bushels or 52% of the exportable crop in that year.

Wheat exports during October promise to exceed those of any preceding month since August, 1921, the Department of Agriculture says. Estimates pased upon preliminary returns give the exports from the principal ports during October at 41,800,000 bushels, compared with 32,662,000 in September. Exports of flour during October are estimated at the wheat equivalent of 8,-200,000 bushels. Total exports of wheat and wheat flour are estimated at 50,-000,000 bushels compared with 39,000,-000 bushels in September.

President Hill Criticises | Baptist Students **Treatment of Teachers** Colleges by the Survey

During the session of the State Teachers Association at San Antonio President J. A. Hill criticised the finding of the State School Survey Commis sion, in regard to its treatment of the Teachers Colleges of the state.

Dr. George A. Works' reiteration Friday of his criticisms of Texas' educational system brought a statement from J. A. Hill, president of the West Texas State Teachers College. Dr Works was director of the survey.

The survey, Mr. Hill said, assigne a very small niche in the Texas educational system to teachers' colleges and it does not, he declared, properly evaluate the work they are doing.

"We are not going to stand for it, he declared, at the same time asserting that he spoke for most of the State teachers' college presidents.

At a meeting of the State teachers' college section Friday both Mr. Hill and R. B. Cousins, president of the new Texas Teachers' College at Kingsville attacked the findings of the commission. Mr. Hill pointed out that the sur vey asserted the Agricultural and Me chanical College at College Station and the College of Industrial Arts at Denton each needed dormitories and other buildings but did not mention the needs of the Teachers' Colleges, which, Mr. Hill said, were much greater than those of the two just mentioned. He asserted that no investment in any teachers' college in the state equaled the State appropriation for the upkeep of A. & M. for this year.

He disclaimed any intention of at tacking either of the schools. He wanted, he said, to see them get all the support they needed, but he could not refrain from saying that the teachers' colleges wanted what they needed.
