

# Local elections on tap Saturday

Local voters will let it be known Saturday who their choices are for city, hospital board and school board positions.

Polling places will be the Dimmitt city hall, Farmers State Bank in Hart, and the Nazareth High School homemaking classroom. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Poll workers will conduct three separate elections at each voting site — city, school board and hospital board.

The Dimmitt Board of Aldermen has three full-term positions open, with six candidates seeking the posts. Ben Holcomb, C. O. "Dutch" LaRue, Larry Gonzales, incumbent Ann Armstrong, David Behrends and Joyce Hunter are the candidates.

Hart has one place available on the City Commission. Incumbent Ronnie Truelock is seeking re-election to that post.

Nazareth has no one running for mayor. The city will have a blank ballot, allowing for a write-in

election. Incumbent Carroll Gerber filed for re-election to the only position open on the City Commission.

The Castro County Hospital District Board has two places open, and two candidates. Incumbents Jerome Brockman and Marguerite McLain filed for the positions.

Four candidates are running for two positions on the Dimmitt School Board. They are Robert Benton,

George Lamberth, Glenn Odom and incumbent Charles Wales.

The Hart School Board has three places open and three candidates. They are Jim Purcell and incumbents Larry Lee and Elias Martinez.

The Nazareth School Board has three places available. They are for two three-year terms and for one year of an unexpired term. Those who filed to fill the positions are Rita Book, Allen Dobmeier and incumbent Denis Huseman.

# Local bank changes hands

The First State Bank of Dimmitt, one of the oldest family-owned banks in Texas, has a new owner.

He is Bill Loyd, who owns the First National Bank of Clovis and formerly held banking interests in Plains and Muleshoe.

Loyd has purchased the First State Bancorp, a holding company, from the McLean family, which has owned the bank since it was founded here 75 years ago.

The change of ownership became official Monday with the signing of final legal documents and contacts. The transaction followed necessary approval by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., the Federal Reserve and the Texas State Banking Commission.

Loyd, 52, has been in the banking business almost 30 years, including 12 years as president and board chairman of the Muleshoe State Bank and the past 10 months as owner of First National in Clovis.

A native of Snyder, Loyd

graduated from Hubbard High School, then worked for the Santa Fe Railroad, Security State Bank in McCamey and the State Banking Dept. before attending college.

After graduating from Louisiana State University's School of Banking in 1956, he was associated with the West Texas State Bank of Snyder and the Citizens State Bank of Roby. Then, in 1957, he organized the Plains State Bank in Plains — his first bank ownership venture.

He operated the Plains State Bank 12 years before moving to Muleshoe in 1969. He sold his stock in the Muleshoe bank before buying the First National Bank in Clovis last May.

Loyd said he will retain ownership of the Clovis bank, but will live in Dimmitt.

"I'll probably spend half a day or a full day a week with the Clovis bank, but otherwise I'll be on duty at this bank fulltime," Loyd said. "My wife and I are anxious to move here and become part of the community."

He and his wife, Nelda, have two married daughters, D'Linda Evans of San Antonio and Pamela Stockard of Ruidoso, N.M. The Loyds are members of the Church of Christ, and he has long been active in the Lions Club. He also is a former director of the Texas Bankers Association.

Loyd succeeds Robert McLean as president and board chairman of the First State Bank. McLean had served as the bank's chief officer since the death of his father, Bob, last October.

McLean said he and his brother, Charles, will both remain with the bank "to help the new owners get acquainted with the community."

Loyd said there will be no changes in the present staff of the bank.

James Horton, executive vice-president and trust officer, was appointed to the bank's new board of directors this week, Loyd announced. Members of Loyd's family will make up the remainder of the six-person board, he said.

will move here with his family from Clovis, where he owns the First National Bank. Until he assumed control Monday, the local bank had been owned by the McLean family since its founding 75 years ago.

Both were chosen for the Amarillo Globe-News Class A All-State Teams, chosen by consensus of sportswriters and coaches. Roxane was named to the first team as an outside player, and Karen was picked for the third team, also as an outsider.

The Nazareth seniors were both previously named to the Class A All-State Tournament Team following the Swiftettes' lopsided victories over Krum and Dime Box for their record-setting sixth consecutive state championship.

## Two locals injured in three-car pileup

Two local women were injured in a three-car pileup at Lubbock early Saturday. Sherry Ann Kay, 24, and Shelley Nan Barton, 22 are sisters.

Miss Barton is still in serious condition at Lubbock General Hospital. About 80 percent of her windpipe was severed. Surgery lasted between four and five hours Saturday. In addition to the windpipe damage, Miss Barton may have suffered nerve damage to the vocal chords.

Mrs. Kay was treated and released from Lubbock General. She is home, now, with about 20 stitches in her face and with several cracked ribs.

Both women are the daughters of Melvin and Violet Barton, also of Dimmitt.

According to police reports, Paulino Garza Leal, 30, and his passengers, Francisco, 17, and Armando Flores, 16, all of Lubbock, were traveling east on the Clovis Road, while the other two vehicles were westbound on the road.

Apparently, Leal lost control of his car, skidded and slid more than 170 feet before striking a pickup head-on in the westbound lane. In the pickup were Guillermo, 25, and San Juanito Ramirez, 27, both of Lubbock.

In turn, the two women's car crashed into the rear of the Ramirez pickup, police stated. Mrs. Kay was driving. The women were on their way home, to Dimmitt.

All three vehicles ended up in the westbound lane on the north side of the roadway, police said. The fire department was called to the scene when smoke was seen coming out of Leal's car.

Leal died at 3:45 a.m. at Lubbock General Hospital from massive head and chest injuries, about 1 1/2 hours after the 2:16 a.m. accident.

Francisco Flores died at 5:25 a.m. at Lubbock General from multiple trauma.

A sixth person walked into Lubbock General Saturday afternoon, saying he was injured in the accident. He was Joel Sendejo, 25, of Lubbock.

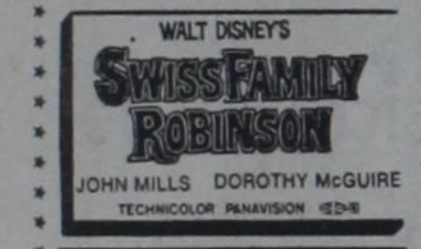

### Farmers may adjust reports

F. W. Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Office Director for Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, announced recently that farmers in Texas who have already reported their acreage of All-Risk Crop insured barley, oats and wheat for the 1982 Crop Year can adjust that report if they participate in the ASCS Acreage Reduction Program.

Producers who have questions concerning that program should contact their ASCS office," continued Crouch. "Insured producers who choose to participate in the Acreage Reduction Program through ASCS can reduce their crop insurance premium liability by reporting the acreage reduction to their All-Risk Crop Insurance agent no later than April 16, 1982."

Producers who do not have their acreage reports revised will be obligated for the premium established by their original acreage report," he added.

### Farmers must sign up soon

Producers have until April 16 to sign up in the 1982 acreage-reduction programs for wheat, upland cotton, corn/sorghum and barley/oats.

Deciding not to sign up, means that the producer will not be eligible for loans and purchases, the farmer-owned reserve, if authorized, and possible deficiency payments for that crop. After April 16, farmers cannot change their minds and become eligible. However, if producers sign up in the program, they preserve their options.

Final participation is determined by the acreage report as of the final acreage reporting date for the crop. If conditions change, there is no penalty for withdrawing.

### Swine shortcourse goes to producers

Concerns confronting today's swine producers will be addressed during the annual Swine Shortcourse of Texas A&M, April 5-7.

This year's course will be presented as three one-day seminars at College Station, April 5; Fredericksburg, April 6; and Plainview, April 7. This was done to make the course more convenient to the producers, requiring less travel and time away from home, said Dr. William B. Thomas, swine specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Topics for the course were suggested by producers, Thomas said. They range from grain pricing systems and expected costs to grain utilization of the pig, from money costs to expected hog prices, and include swine health programs and programmed products.

The Swine Shortcourse is part of the annual Texas Animal Agriculture Conference conducted by the Extension Service. The conference also provides shortcourses for dairymen, cattlemen and horse enthusiasts.

The swine session at College Station will be preceded by a meeting Sunday by boards and committees of the Texas Pork Producers Board and Texas Pork Producers Assoc.

Registration will be from 8:30 to 9:30 a.m. At College Station the fee is \$17 and includes the Texas Pork Producers Assoc. annual meeting and banquet at noon. At Fredericksburg and Plainview, the fee is \$10 with lunch provided.

The morning session begins at 9:30 a.m. Dr. Roland

Smith, Extension grain marketing specialist, will discuss the outlook for feed and hog prices. Dr. Danny A. Klinefelter, assistant professor of agricultural economics at A&M, will discuss emerging trends and the outlook for ag credit.

An evaluation of immunization programs and products, will be presented by Dr. LeRoy G. Biehl, Extension swine veterinarian of the University of Illinois, Urbana, Ill. Randy George, general manager of Fentress Farms, Fentress, will discuss programmed production and facility utilization.

After lunch, Biehl will present a veterinarian's view of ways to correct swine herd health problems. Planning and implementing a swine nutrition program will be discussed by Dr. T. D. Tanksley, Jr., professor and Extension swine specialist, and Dr. Darrell A. Knabe, assistant professor of animal science, both at A&M. Thomas will review new equipment and facilities in the swine industry.

Registration forms may be obtained from county Extension agents or from Dr. Thomas, Room 212, Kleberg Center, Texas A&M University, College Station, 77843.

The Swine Shortcourse is sponsored by the Extension Service in cooperation with the Texas Pork Producers Association, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Gillespie County Extension Swine Committee, Hale County Extension staff, A&M College of Veterinary Medicine, and A&M departments of Animal Science and Agricultural Economics.

### Windbreak seedlings available today

The Running Water Soil and Water Conservation District was recently notified by the Colorado State Forest Service that the Windbreak Seedlings ordered for Castro County would be delivered Wednesday and would be available today (Thursday) at the Soil Conservation Service office at 3rd and Bedford.

This booklet has been published by the Colorado Forest Service and has many answers to the questions concerning the planting and care of the tree seedlings.

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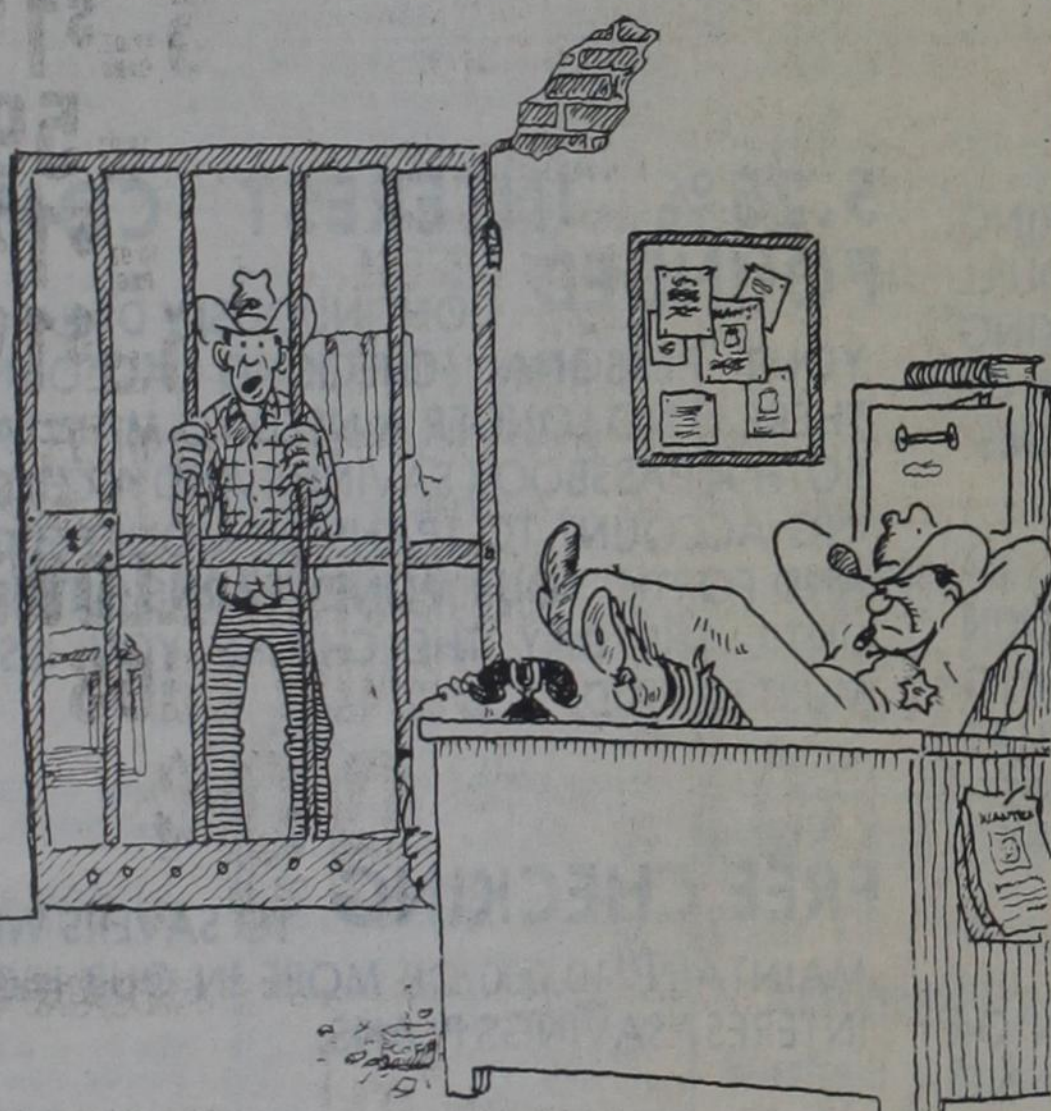

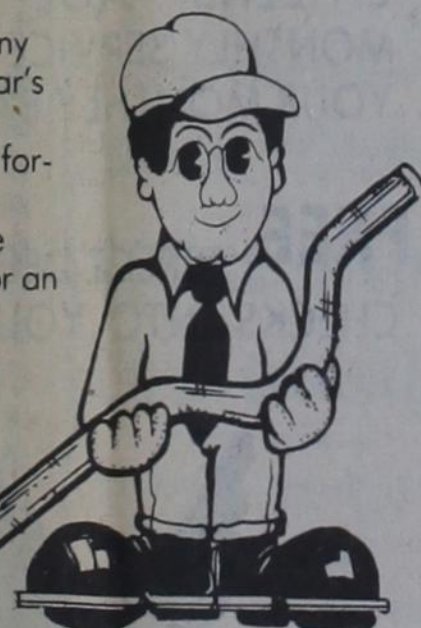
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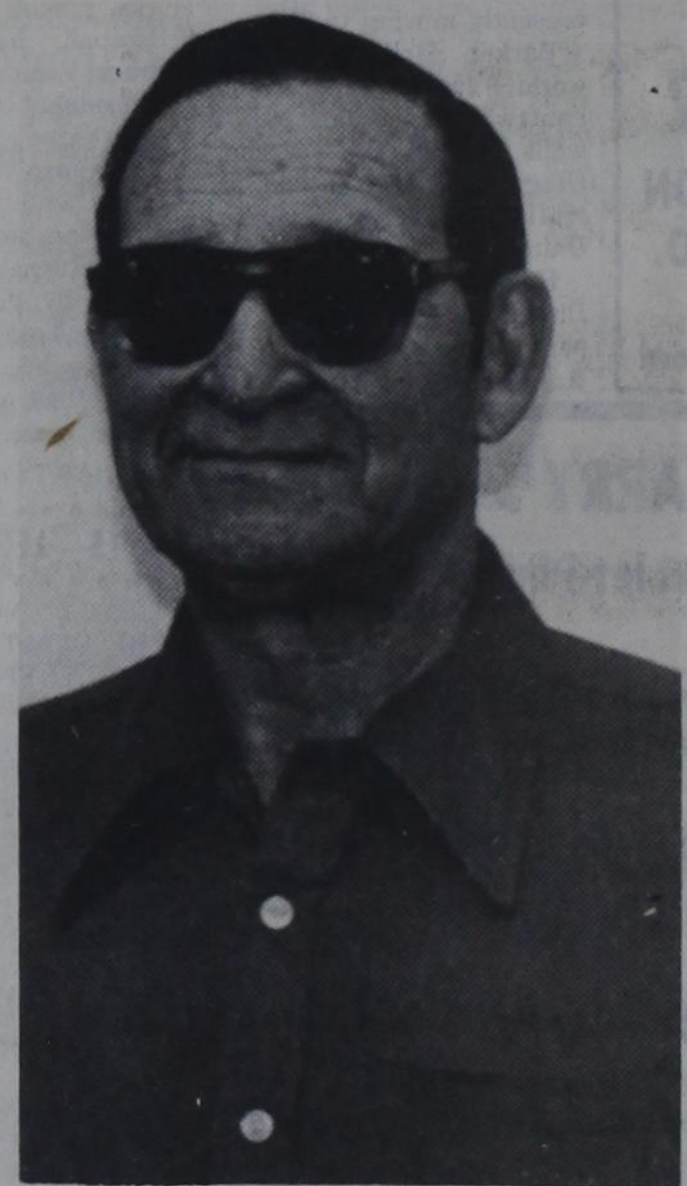

## 'Tis the season for tornado safety rules

The Castro County Sheriff's Department recently received a special weather statement from the National Weather Service. The timely information gives safety rules for tornadoes:

When a tornado approaches, your immediate action may mean life or death. Seek inside shelter, preferably in a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or a steel-framed or reinforced concrete build-

ing of substantial construction. Stay away from the windows. Also, do not attempt to out-drive a tornado in your automobile. You are much safer in a reinforced building or at home than in your vehicle.

In office buildings, to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to the designated shelter area.

In factories, workers should move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection in accordance with advance plans. Plant managers should consult with civil defense and plant engineering personnel to locate the safest possible shelter areas.

In shopping centers, go to a designated shelter area, not to your parked car.

In homes, the basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In

homes without basements, take cover in the center part of the house, on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Recent research indicates that it is not necessary to open windows and doors. Stay away from them.

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie-down to prevent overturning will minimize damage. A warden should be appointed in mobile-home parks to scan the skies and listen to radio and television for warnings. There should be a designated community shelter where residents can assemble during a tornado warning. If there is no such shelter, do not stay in a mobile home during a tornado warning. Seek refuge in a sturdy building or a ditch, culvert or ravine.

In schools, follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Try to avoid hallways that open to the south and west. Avoid auditoriums and gymnasiums or other structures with wide freespans. If a building is not reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building, or a ravine or open ditch and lie flat.

In open country, if there is no time to find suitable shelter, lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

Keep listening to your radio, television, and NOAA weather radio stations, who will broadcast the latest national weather service tornado watches and warnings and inform you when the danger is over.

Watch the sky, because tornadoes come and go so quickly that there may not be time for a warning. During a tornado watch, be alert for sudden appearance of violent wind, rain, hail, or funnel-shaped clouds. When in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes are often obscured by rain or dust. Some occur at night

and are difficult to detect.

A tornado watch means tornadoes are expected to develop.

A tornado warning means a tornado has actually been spotted. Persons close to the storm should take cover immediately. Those farther away should take cover if threatening conditions approach.

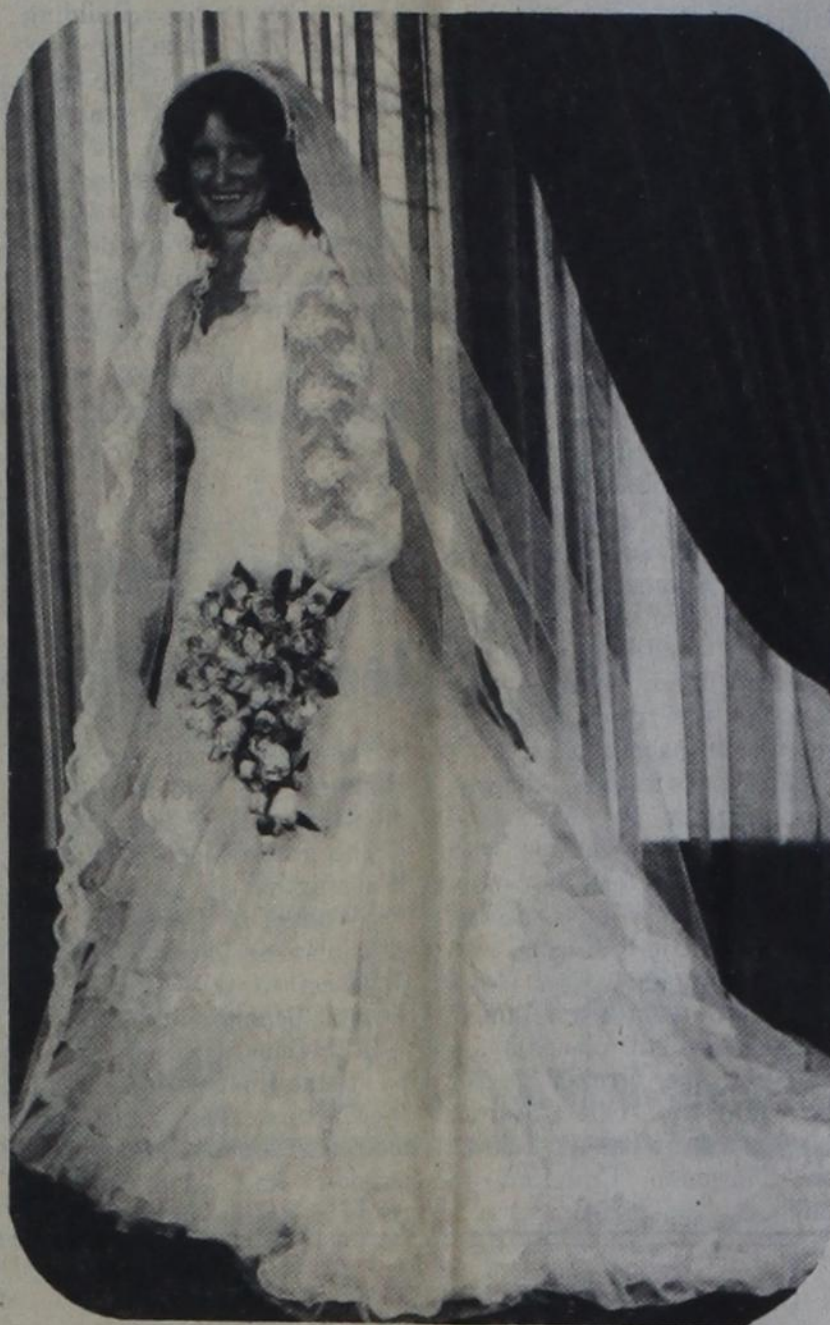

# Beekeeping methods to be discussed Monday

Beekeeping is a challenging, educational, and sometimes, profitable hobby. However, bees and their keepers have a difficult time locally due to the widespread use of chemical insecticides and the scarcity of honey plants, especially in the spring.

In spite of these problems, several dedicated residents have been successful, enjoying the excitement and satisfaction beekeeping can bring.

Everyone is invited to a meeting on beekeeping to be held Monday at 7 p.m. in the assembly room of the courthouse. The purpose of the meeting is to bring together area beekeepers and all other interested persons, to discuss their experiences and to exchange information concerning beekeeping in Castro County.

A detailed slide presentation will be shown explaining the living and caring for a

package bee colony. Information on beginning beekeeping will also be available.

The pollination services provided by honey bees far outweighs the value of the honey they produce. Vine crops, including squash, cucumbers and cantelopes, must be pollinated to produce fruits. Fruit trees and sunflowers often yield better when honey bees are plentiful. Also, the production of hybrid cotton seed depends on cross pollination.

Interest in bees and beekeeping will probably increase on the Texas South Plains as hybrid cotton seed production is centered in this region of the U.S.

While the TABC is "the" organization for boys' coaches, most girls' coaches belong to the Texas Girls' Coaches Association; virtually no girls' coaches in North Texas are TABC members. More comprehensive all-state girls' teams are the ones announced for each UIL classification Sunday by the Amarillo Globe-News, after consultation with sportswriters throughout the state. This all-state squad, in Class A, includes Roxane and Karen Birkenfeld of Nazareth, plus other North Texas standouts of all classes who were conspicuous by their absence from the TABC squad. The Texas Girls' Coaches Association does not name an all-state team, Lombard said. We are expecting the Texas Sports Writers' Association to announce its all-state boys' teams at any time, but we don't know whether the TSWA will pick a girls' all-state squad.]

### Why are we so calm over farm depression?

Dear Editor, Friends and Neighbors:

There is something bothering me, and it has been for some time now. I am completely amazed at the calm and quiet that prevails in Castro County, Texas. I can't believe it.

Several years ago, when the farm economy was REALLY bad, you all paid good money to bring people (myself included) to Dimmitt to put on meetings, rallies, tractor-cades, etc., in an effort to alleviate the problem.

Hundreds went to Lubbock and made national news by surrounding the Avalanche-Journal in protest of the way they treated the farmer in their paper.

You went to Washington. You took your problems to the source in search of solutions. You captured the nation's attention.

I was proud of your activities. In fact, I was so proud of your commitment to right injustices, and I so admired your concern for our future, that I moved here. I was convinced that the spirit that settled this country was truly alive and well.

I also had the feeling that whether or not you supported the activities of the AAM, whether it lived or died, you were the kind of people who wouldn't quit when injustices persisted.

I can't believe the calm and quiet. What has happened to your spirit?

Help me retrace the past six months in Castro County. By and large, we haven't pumped enough water to keep Energas in business. There have been fewer farm hands on the job than there have been in years. Just like Midwest grain farmers, we got to take the winter off.

Well, what did we do for the past six months, now that the farm economy has REALLY, REALLY, gotten bad?

Let me see if I can remember. Carl King held a good Corn Growers Association meeting here. He had all the right people here, too — congressmen, an ambassador, state commissioner of agriculture and others. They told us many things and they certainly heard the problems firsthand. But there should have been 10,000 people there. It was the only show in town.

Now here's where you need to help me again. What else happened? Let's see . . . I can't tell you of the second effort in behalf of alleviating a depression that clouds Castro County.

Now let me ask another question: Whose job is it to alleviate this farm depression?

Let's see now, the Republican Party is at bat for a change, and Reaganomics are in place. They aren't working folks. And what has the "organized Republican Party" in Castro County done this winter? They toured homes and admired Christmas trees. Where have all the Republicans gone?

As I recall, in the last Presidential election, the Farm Bureau supported these new economic trends. Now they promised us they would widen the roads, deal with animal rights and abolish all else (farm income too, I guess). Needless to say, that's not enough, but I didn't expect much.

You could also surmise the local Chamber of Commerce would add its influence to an

all-out effort to help agriculture through a depression. I'm disappointed again. I read they are going to mail out new brochures in hopes of attracting new industries to Castro County to "improve the standard of living." Just what we need when we are ALL dependent on the farmer, or do we want to chant that too?

One might also expect that our local "G Men" might be fed up with seeing their clients go broke while they are asked to dismantle the very agencies that were created to assist farmers in their time of need. Woops . . . sorry again. Just more hassle and less money. Sound familiar?

Let's not leave out my favorites. I happen to be partial to the thinking of Farmers Union. I think parity pricing would not only be neat, but now it's a necessity. We've done darn little, too, this winter of substance. Just can't seem to get people stirred up.

I can understand just one thing. I was hoping the Democrats would tour Christmas trees. I was really looking forward to that. But, alas, we're so broke we didn't even have a tree. Doesn't look like we'll have one next year, either.

Well, once again, I want someone to tell me why the calm. If you aren't just mad as can be, I'm really worried this time. Where there is no spirit, no fight, no desire, all is lost.

Anybody care to tell me why?

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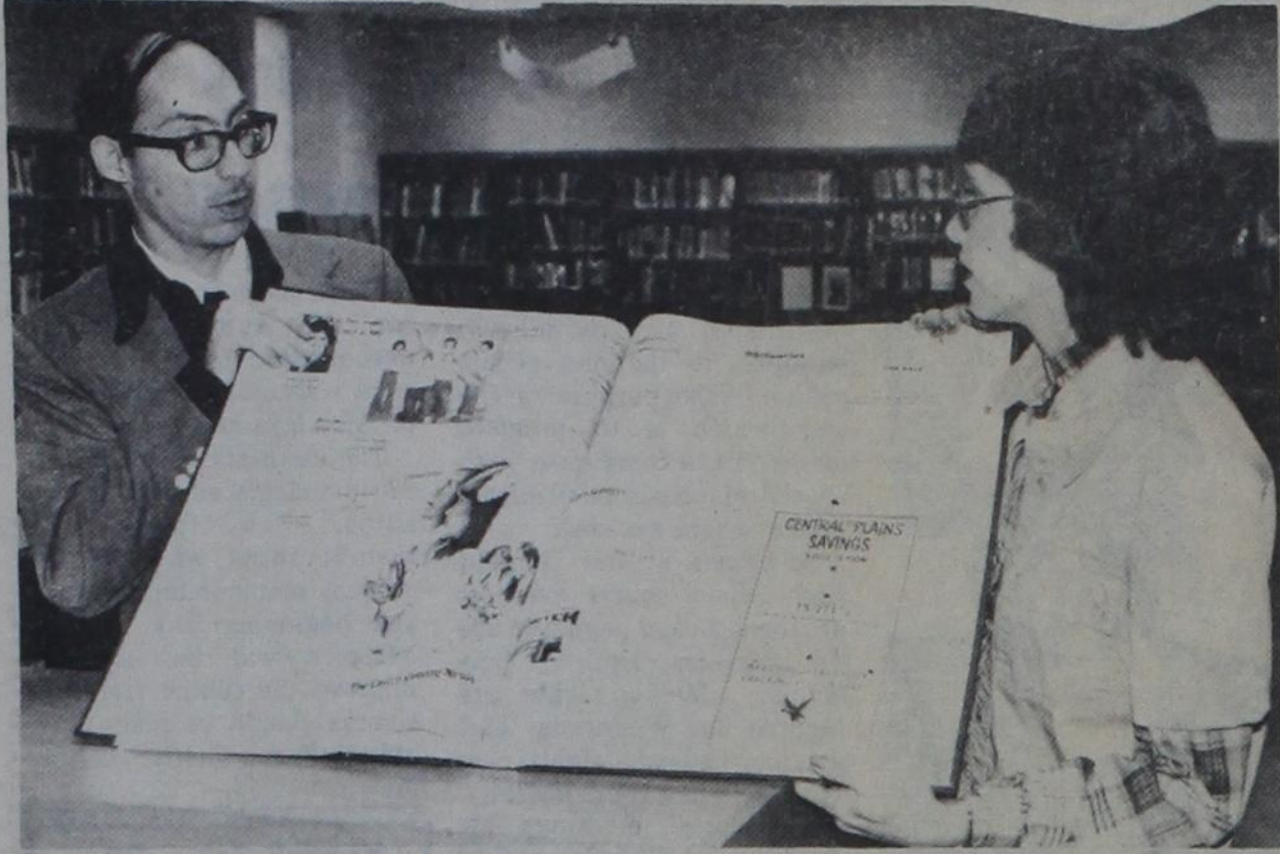
