



gen to the soil. Since nitrogen is the expensive element in commercial fertilizers, this is another way of cutting costs of preduction. And since almost all of the land in this part of the country is deficient in nitrogen this is something which every farmer can use to a good advantage

Many times nitrogen deficiency is mistaken for dry weather, especially in grain sorghums. Many times when the basal leaves start turning yellow or burning, it's due at the Allred church. Also sending to a lack of nitrogen rather than her regrets was Mrs. Helen a lack of moisture. Or it may be combination of the two.

Mung Beans definitely have place in Yoakum County agriculture. They may have a place in your farming operation. 


