Mr. Amonett operated the plant in its present location for a number of years.

## Electric System Purchased By City

Prewitt, Jones & Ballard of Brownfield were awarded contract for installation of an electric plant for the City of Plains last Thursday night. At the same time Lewis Construction Co., of Tahoka received a contract for the electrical distribution system.

Prewitt, Jones & Ballard bid \$85,690 for the plant. Lewis was low bidder of \$37,709.16 for the distribution system. This makes a

total of \$123,399.16 the city is to spend for an electrical system ready to supply power to customers.

Bids for the plant were opened Sept. 4 and representatives of bidders were heard. Awarding of the contract was delayed until last Thursday in order that City Engineer Cecil Hawk would have time to evaluate all the bids. Before the contract was let a

representative of Ingersoll-Rand, manufacturer of the Prewitt equipment appeared before the councilmen. Also, councilmen heard representatives of the other engine manufacturers.

Prewitt, Jones & Ballard are presently dismantling the plant to be moved to Plains. It is a plant previously operated by Stanolind Oil & Gas Co., in their Cedar Lake operations. The e-

quipment consists of three Ingersoll-Rand engines, generators building, fences, switchboards, plant auxiliary unit, and other materials to provide a complete electrical plant.

The engines are all 172 kilowatt and are gas driven. Mr. Hawk estimates the city's requirements at 250 kilowatt, making the newly purchased engines adequate with one engine held in reserve.

Lewis Construction Co., can begin work on the distribution system, which includes, poles, lines, meters, etc., almost immediately, according to Mr. Hawk.

Clyde Amonett of Lamesa has moved to Plains and will assist Prewitt in dismantling the plant and moving it here. After the plant is erected he will become a city employe and operate it. He was operator of the plant for Stanolind before it was put in "mothballs" some five years ago. The plant is approximately 12 years old and was operated until 1949, or about six years.

The city, when power is turned on, will be in competition with Lea County Electric Cooperative of Lovington. Lea County now supplies power to Plains and has approximately 23 years remaining on their current franchise.

## County Adopts \$750,000 Budget; Minimum Tax Rate Set At \$1.10

Expenditures for the 1957 fiscal year for Yoakum County have been anticipated at \$749,757.56 according to the budget just released this week by County Auditor Bill Moorhead, following adoption by the county commissioner's court.

Overall tax rate for the county has been set at \$1.10 per \$100 of assessed valuation. In addition, residents in Road District 1-A will be levied an extra 18 cents to take care of the \$600,000 road improvement bond issue voted two years ago, bringing their tax rate up to \$1.28. The road dis-

trict includes the biggest portion of Precincts 1 and 2 in the south part of the county.

The Yoakum County budget is based on a nestimate of \$47,000,000 of taxable valuation, an increase of \$2,900,00 over the past year.

Gross taxes levied are anticipated at \$581,453.99, or an increase of \$27,582.21 over the past year. Total anticipated receipts are given at \$832,795.55.

The revenues provided by the 1956 levy are to be used during the 1957 year, although they are largely collected in the fall of the

year assessed, since most large taxpayers take advantage of the prompt payment discounts which are highest in October. It was pointed out that there will be no county discount offered again this fall, but major taxpayers will still receive the benefit of the discount on state taxes.

The reduction in the tax rate, from a basic overall rate of \$1.24 1/2 last year, and a \$1.34 rate for those living in Road Districts 1 and 2, is largely due to the retirement of the 1946 \$600,000 road bond issue, payments on which

## Romain Lets Contract For Last Stage Of New System

Romain Telephone Co., Inc. took another step towards a completely automatic system Tuesday morning and received bids for the system of lines and poles, complete, from the central office to the service poles where customer's connections are made.

Ericson Construction Co., of Muleshoe was apparent low bidder

of \$83,067.60, \$65.60 over the budget allocation for this project. REA Field Engineer Carl A. Dahlgren stated there was enough money in other budget funds to amply cover this amount and that the bid was apparently in line. Since the phone system is being financed by REA, government approval of the bid is necessary before work will begin. E. G. Ericson, representing the company, and P. W. St. Romain, representing the phone company, already have signed contracts for the work.

Other bidders and their bid were: Alpha Construction Co., Tulsa, Okla., \$103,012.40; Batus Construction Co., of Abilene, \$93,425.87 and Lewis Construction Co. of Tahoka, \$84,922.50.

Ericson will erect approximately 236 miles of poles and lines. Original estimates for Yoakum County called for 180 miles of system but easements could not be secured in some instances and a few homes will be without phone service as a result, according to Mr. St. Romain. Present estimate of Yoakum County mileage is 166 miles.

Since the original estimates were made Mr. St. Romain has secured approval to supply telephone service to approximately 15 subscribers in Southwestern Cochran County and an additional four homes in northwestern Yoakum County. These lines will be on the Plains exchange and there will be approximately 35 miles of lines there.

The telephone company plans to switch over to dial phone operations at midnight Dec. 31, according to Mr. St. Romain. He also announced that new phone directories would be delivered Jan. 1, 1957.

The new system, costing approximately \$300,000, will have the metropolitan numbering system of two letters and five numerals.

Already constructed is a new central office building, just behind the present telephone office. All new Stromberg-Carlson automatic equipment will be used and no operators will be required in Plains. Mr. St. Romain announced that long distance calls and calls to the operator would be handled by the phone operators in Brownfield.

Later the company plans to build a new clerical office which will face the Plains city hall, and be located south of the new central office building. When this is done, Mr. St. Romain plans to remodel the old Telephone building and possibly lease it.

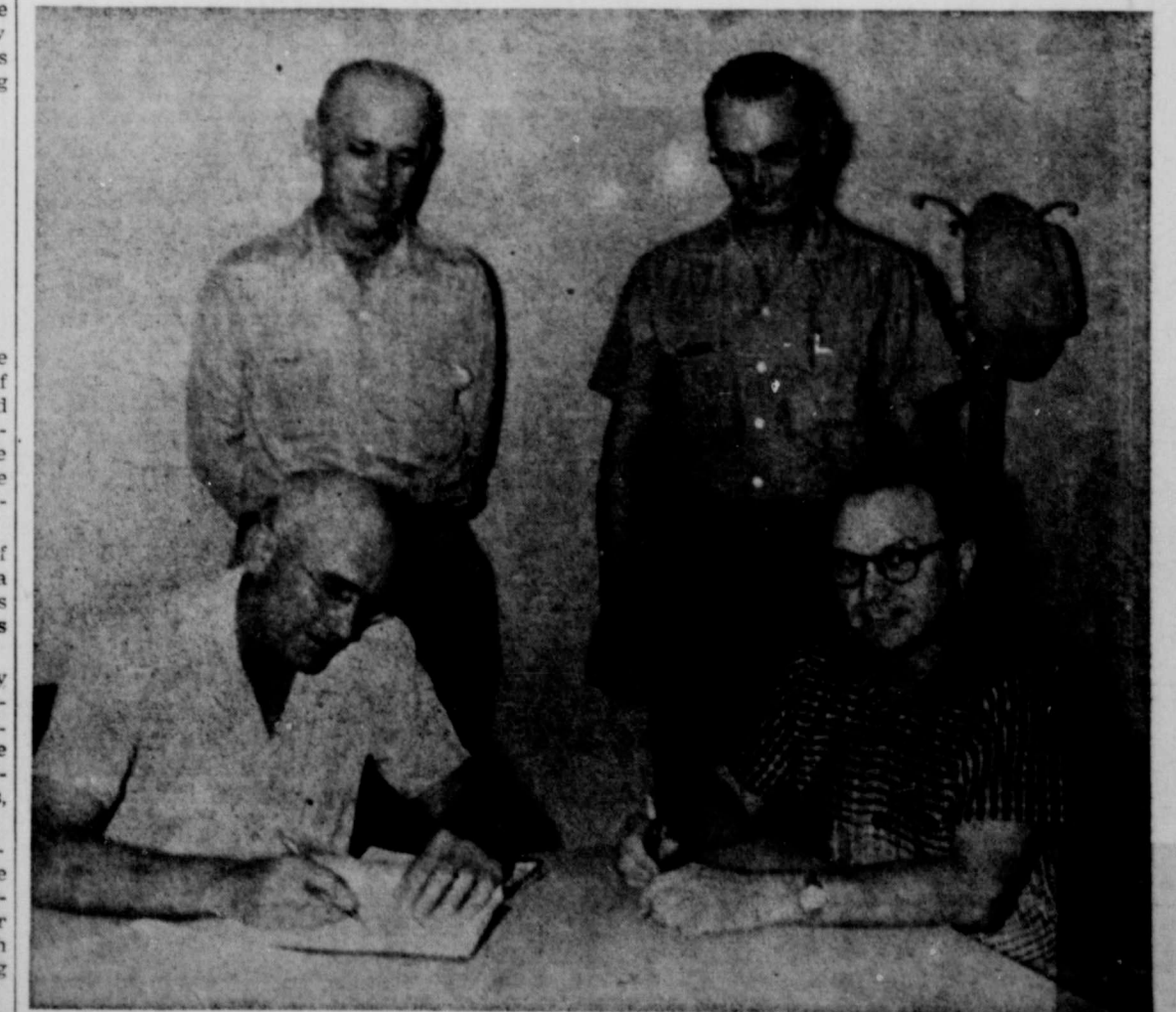
The building constructed of concrete block, is designed for a beauty shop operation. There is ample parking space on all sides of the structure.

## New Wildcat Staked in Central Yoakum County

Frontier Drilling and Production Company and Robert B. Holt of Midland No. 1 David S. Goggins is a new 5,500-foot wildcat four miles north of Plains, in Central Yoakum County.

Site is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 275, block D, J. H. Gibson survey.

Cities Service Oil Company No. 9 Proctor, prospective Devonian discovery in West Gaines County, is bottomed at 11,275 feet, running wash over pipe.

It is 10 miles northwest of Seminole, and 2,040 feet from north and 1,880 feet from west lines of section 355, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey.

BBM Drilling Company No. 1-25 Jones, prospective lower Permian discovery in Northwest Gaines County, was swabbing to test through perforations at 8,300-20, and 8,350-63 feet.

Operator washed those perforations with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Location is 14 miles southwest of Denver City, 1,980 feet from south and east lines of section 25, block A-7, psi survey.

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1-C Corrigan, 12 miles northwest of Seminole, in Northwest Gaines County, and one-half mile south of the West Seminole (Leonard field) has perforated 5 1-2-inch casing at 8,750-8,770 feet and is

swabbing to test.

Location is 660 feet from south and west lines of section 390, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey.

Jake L. Hamon and U. S. Smelting, Refining, & Mining Company No. 1 Randolph is shut in, installing a pumping unit to test perforations in the Mississippian at 11,580-98 and 11,614-24 feet.

Site is 660 feet from south and west lines of labor 12, league 285, Schleicher CSL survey, seven miles southwest of the Chilton field.

Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1 Strong, Southeast Yoakum County wildcat, is progressing below 11,095 feet in lime.

It is 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east line of section 882, block D, John H. Gibsons survey, 14 miles east of Denver City.

The Texas Company No. 1 Iva Hudson, Northwest Gaines County wildcat, 12 miles southwest of Denver City, is cutting hole below 8,826 feet in lime and shale.

Drill site is 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 3, block C-32, psi survey, and four miles west of the Adair (San Andres and Wolfcamp) field.

Shell Oil Company No. 1 D. S. Goggins, 12,600-foot wildcat in Northwest Yoakum County, continues to drill below 10,960 feet in lime and shale lime.

The project is 670 feet from west lines of section 217, block D, John H. Gibson survey, and five miles north of the Henard (San Andres) field, 25 miles northwest of Denver City.

Ashmun & Hilliard No. 1 E. H. Jones Estate, Northwest Gaines County wildcat, 20 miles north west of Seminole, is cutting hole below 4,825 feet in lime.

Location is 660 feet from south and 1,987 feet from east lines of section 8, block A-7, psi survey.

Price Production Company and Texas Crude Oil Company, Midland, staked location to drill No.

## Petitions Are Circulated for County Libraries

Petitions are being circulated this week for the building and equipping of libraries in both Denver City and Plains.

Those circulating the petitions said a total of 119 signatures of property holders in the county would be needed before the action could be presented to the commissioner's court for a mandatory election. The hope was expressed that required signatures could be obtained by at least Monday or Tuesday, so that the election could be held in conjunction with the November general election, and save the expense of calling a special election.

The petition reads: Shall the Commissioners Court of Yoakum County be authorized to issue bonds of said county in the principal sum of \$90,000 to mature serially within any given number of years to exceed 10 years from date thereof to bear interest at the rate not to exceed 3 per cent per annum, and to levy a tax sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to pay the principal thereof at maturity for the purpose of purchasing, constructing, equipping and improving buildings and other permanent improvements to be used for county library purposes. . . one library to be located at Plains and one at Denver City."

As plans now stand, the Denver City library will be located on property already set aside for this purpose just west of the City Hall. The Plains library would be constructed on the northwest corner of the block on which the courthouse is located.

At least one of the petitions, it was learned, has been turned back by a Plains club group without signatures "because the Plains library as planned is not as large as the Denver City library."

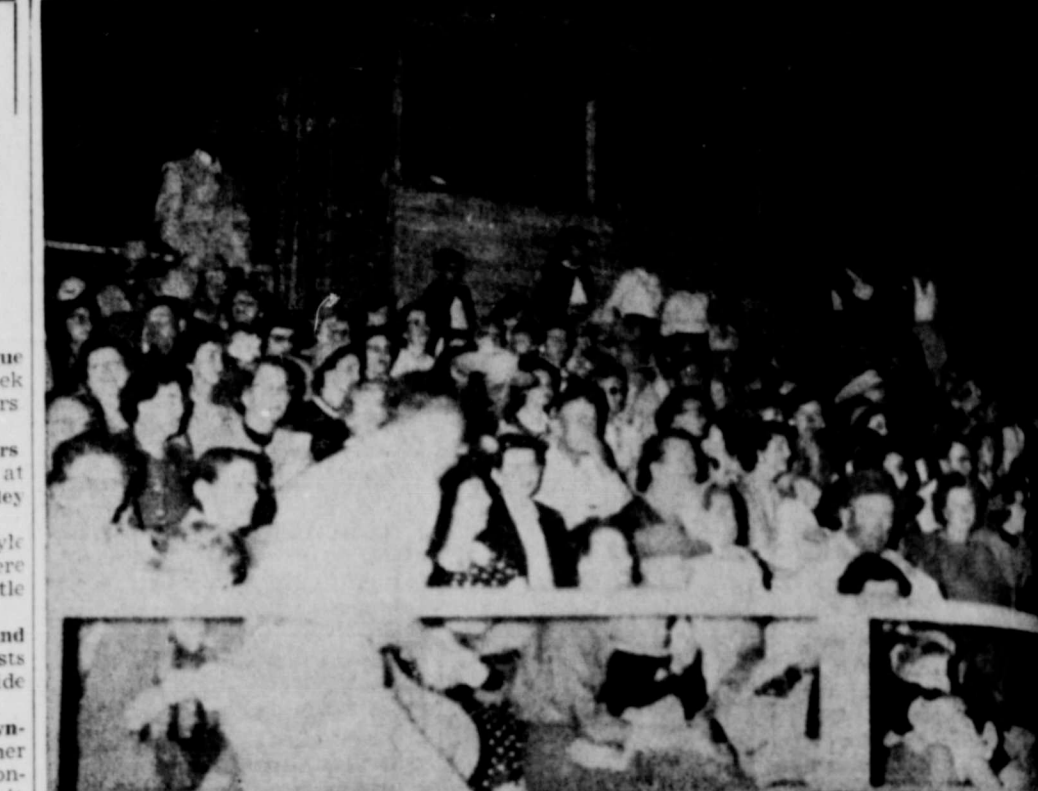

### ACROSS THE CATTLE GUARD

By LEO W. WHITE  
County Agent

Last Saturday morning I went out to the Chesley Bedford Ranch to see a couple of new herd sires that Chesley has out there. I was really pleased with what I saw; however, the two Hereford bulls were not a great deal more than I was expecting to see.

Rusty McGinty and I were out at Chesley's place last November looking for some feeder calves and we saw some yearlings and two year old heifers and bulls that were really nice. They were the kind of cattle that would look good in any Hereford herd in the country. Chesley had raised them and he was keeping them as breeding animals, so, it stood to reason, he had to find some males to go with them that were far above average. When a man has an ordinary male running with some top females, it is likely that his herd improvement plan will go backwards with him.

That is why my expectations were up even before I saw the new bulls. One thing Chesley is trying to do is to have a more uniform bunch of calves to sell in the fall. His plan to get this uniformity centers around one animal.

About four years ago he bought an outstanding Hereford bull from Charley Mapes at Dimmitt. He got three crops of calves from this bull so he will eventually have 55 or 60 head of his daughters in the breeding herd. He had 14 yearling and two year old bulls that were his sons.

These young bulls will be mated with the older cows and the two new bulls will be mated with the daughters of the Dimmitt bull. Every calf that is born on the ranch in 1958 will have the old Dimmitt Bull as its grandsire. The 1958 crop of calves should have a lot of uniformity.

One of the new bulls were bred by J. P. Calliham at Conway and the other came from the Coca-naurgh Ranch at Hereford. They are both large animals with lots of bone and good fleshing qualities. They look like the kind of animals that many of our beef cattle breeders and commercial cowherd owners like in order to sell a lot of pounds.

Other cattlemen in Yoakum County are continually on the lookout for a good bull that will improve their herd of cattle by improving the type and conform-

ation or the offspring. They want increased uniformity and a heavier calf crop at the same time. Mr. Bedford is not the only Yoakum County rancher who is taking a long look into the future. Almost every cowman realizes that beef cattle must be improved to the extent that they can constantly compete with other types of meat. Most of the cowmen are looking out for their own survival and they are in the business as a means of making a living and not just a hobby. They are forced to consider the economics of an improvement program. They want every chance that is made to be a profitable change. That is why we have heard so much about progeny and performance testing of beef cattle. It is my opinion that beef cattle breeders will soon be forced into a program of progeny and performance testing.

I do not believe it will be many years before a large majority of the owners of commercial cowherds will require that their bulls are tested or that they are the offspring of tested animals. It is hoped that the breeders will not wait about adopting a testing

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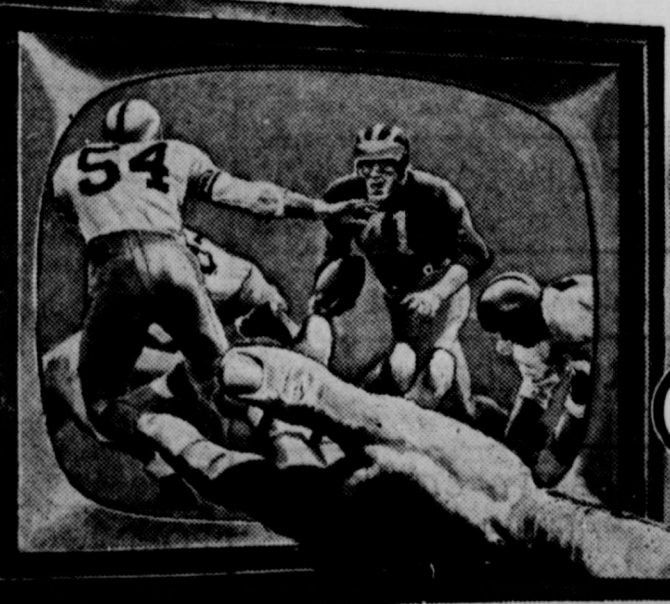

Not too many years ago the experts thought that blue panic grass was adapted only to fertilize clay soils. Experts, too, can be mistaken.

Murphy Luna, Plains rancher, has proved that blue panic is well adapted for reclaiming old eroded fields in this area. Mr. Luna, who was one of the first in the county to join the Yoakum Soil Conservation District, and Wyatt Lipscomb, of the Soil Conservation Service, took a critical look at an old field on the ranch. It had been cultivated for a number of years. The topsoil was gone and all that remained was unproductive subsoil and worthless weeds. This was in 1953. Mr. Luna and Wyatt decided to plant blue panic grass on the old field. Not having a tractor available, they pulled a grass drill behind a pickup truck to plant the grass. The place is now covered with an abundant growth of good quality forage up the soil, but it also furnishes

Not only will this grass build much supplemental grazing. The cost of planting this grass has been paid for many times by the additional number of pounds of beef sold.

Mr. Luna is especially proud of the way the grass has withstood the drought. Even though grass on native pastures have stopped growing, the blue panic is still furnishing good grazing.

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**Applications Now Open for State Highway Patrolmen**

Applications for appointment as Texas Highway Patrolmen will be accepted from the present time until Oct. 15.

Salary of Patrolmen is \$315 monthly, plus longevity. They are also paid during training. Other benefits include annual leave and benefits of the state retirement system and federal social security.

General requirements for appointment to the Texas Highway Patrol include: 21 to 35 years of age, inclusive; minimum height of five feet, eight inches; weight in proportion to height; good physical condition; and high school education or equivalent; must be citizen of the United States and resident of Texas for at least one year immediately prior to making application. They are also subject to a rigid character investigation.

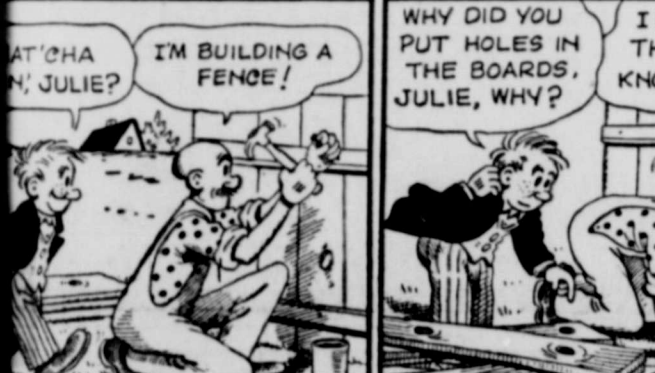

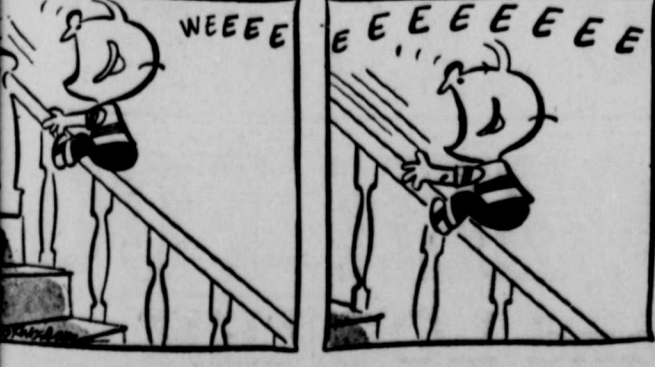
