#### **School Students** Get Salk Vaccine In Safety Move

Joe Bob Palmer, 16-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Palmer is in a Plainview hospital, victim of a mild case of paralytic polic. He became ill last Thursday afternoon while working out with the Plains High School football

First indications he was ill were reported to Coach Ed Robertson who advised him to cease his workout activities. He reportedly was alright then until later that night at home. Young Palmer was taken to a Brownfield Hospital where his case was diagnosed and he remained there until the fever

Palmer was paralysed from the waist down and was reportedly gaining some control over his feet and legs Thursday

During the first days of the Palmer illness there were considerable rumors about other youths being ill with the same disease. A check with county health officials reveals that Joe Bob is, according to records, the only case of paraytic polio reported in Yoakum County this year. At this time last year there were no polio cases reported in the county.

School officials, immediately after confirming the diagnosis that Joe Bob had polio, ordered letters sent out to all parents advising them that one student was a polio victim and that Salk vaccine innoculations would be given by the county health nurse and that anyone who had come in direct contact with the victim should be given gamma globulin serum, if the family physician advised it.

Approximately 20 members of the Cowboy football squad received the gamma globulin injection Wednesday.

Gamma globulin is described, by an official source, as being that portion of the blood which collects the polio germ. Medical authorities believe a high percentage of the people at one time or another contract polio and build an imto it. That immunity would be in the globulin reclaimed from the blood and later administrated to potential victims. It is considered an emergency measure and is of short duration. The Salk vaccine is recommended later.

Our source stated, "In no case has it ever been known that gamma globulin gave anyone

Thursday about 250 children, many of them under school age, were given Salk innoculations. Salk shots are recommended by local medical men who cite other instances in the nation where there were polio outbreaks and the fact that very few children The Cowboys marched to score were victims of the polio germ

The grain that has been harvested this year has a high moisture content. Farmers are harvesting as soon as it is ripe enough to hold up over a long ripening period. This high-moisture grain would not be very desirable to put up for storage.

The other reason for not storng grain is the lack of farm storage space. If the grain was dry enough to go in the loan, the farmer could use elevator storage and have a small chance of gettin case the price went up.

Farmers remember the old addage about a bird in the hand being worth two in the bush so they sell their grain while it is a little damp and get their money This practice puts the growing of grain sorghums in the same category as cotton production. It is strictly a cash crop.

In my opinion, grain sorghum should not be considered as a cash crop. To me, it is a feed grain It is used mainly as a livestock feed and it competes with corr When grain sorghum is produced in Yoakum County sold to grain buyers, it is moved to areas where livestock are being fed.
