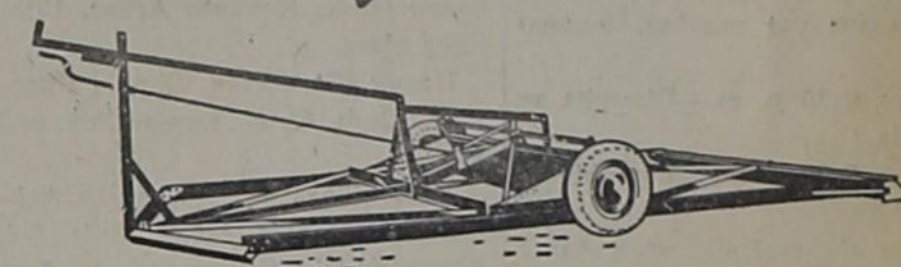

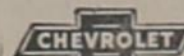

The Bobcat Tales

BLAINE'S COACHING CAREER

Mr. John Blaine got his coaching training in West Texas State College, Colorado State College, and various coaching schools. He has coached for 8 successful and eventful years.

His first ball teams were at Friona in 1935-36. His basketball and baseball teams were undefeated and his track team was second in the conference. He didn't coach football. (These were Junior High School teams.)

Six of his eight years of coaching have been at Dimmitt. During this time his teams have won five District Championships, two Bi-Districts, one Regional and one Bi-Regional.

Some happenings and records of the teams are as follows: During the past four seasons at Dimmitt the boy's teams have won 156 games and lost 17.

(1936-37 Season) The Bobcats won 26 games while losing 6. They beat the Amarillo Sandies 40-32.

Wilbert Johnson, Elbert Summers, Bill Summers, Jack Boren, and Earl Stagner were starting.

Earl Stagner went through college on an athletic scholarship. (1942-43 Season) Won 30 lost 2.

Both of these were one point losses. A 15-16 loss to Hereford and a 23-22 loss to Levelland, regional champions.

(1943-44 Season) Won 45—lost 4. Two of these losses were to state champions, Nacona and Sidney Lanier of San Antonio. Beat Amarillo 31-30.

(1939-40 Season) Won 40—lost 4. Won the District Championship over a large field including Amarillo. This was the first boy's Championship in Dimmitt School history.

Some odd or unusual happenings are:

1. Walter Shipley, 1940 all-District Center played a full game in the Regional Tournament five days after having his tonsils removed.

2. Dimmitt won 26 games in a row in 1939-40.

3. Jack Boren (1940) was first all-regional player for Dimmitt—Carl Jowell (1947) was the last.

4. Trellis Summers, 1940 guard, will long be remembered for his great defensive work.

Mr. Blaine's first girls' team is the Dimmitt Bobbies 47-48 and he says, "In my opinion they are as good as any team I have coached, measured by the advancement made during the season. The 33-27 loss to Vega and the 34-32 loss to Canyon are the only blots on an otherwise perfect season. The most optimistic could not have expected victories over Friona or Stratford. When asked what his main objective was in coaching a team he said, "My main idea is to find out if possible what the strongest points I have on my squad and stress them. I am very strong for good physical conditions and a wholesome mental attitude. As many drills and exercises as possible are used to develop true game conditions.

The things which I consider in ball players are: (1) reaction, (2) temperament, (3) habits, (4) intelligence, (5) size. In addition to these any boy or girl who will excel in sports must have a desire and will to win."

NEWS OF THE "FARM BOYS"
The Dimmitt F. P. A. entered the Pampa Livestock Judging contest Monday, February 23. The team placed 6th out of 16 teams that were entered. The members of the team were Roy Henderson, Bobby Warren and Wade Thompson. Wade was high man in the sheep division and in the swine division and also 2nd high man in the entire contest. Bobby Warren placed 5th in the contest for high individual.

High man of the contest's score was 411; Wade Thompson scored 410 and Bobby Warren 402 points. Dimmitt's team was just 26 points behind the winning team.

Mr. Seal, the sponsor and instructor of the team, did not get to go with them.

SHE'S HIS FAVORITE
Thursday, Dimmitt High was impressed with a chapel program. Ten boys participated, electioneering for their candidates for annual queen. This program was unusual, as the boys were dressed as hillbillies, and they all had their favorite candidate, to whom each in his turn gave a big boost.

BOBCATS TO ATTEND REGIONAL TOURNAMENT NEXT WEEK-END

The Dimmitt Bobcats, after winning second place in district, go to the Regional Tournament next Friday in the Burton Gym at Canyon.

The Bobcats play Floydada at 2:30 P. M. Friday. The winner of this game plays the winner of the Levelland-Memphis game Friday night. If they succeed in winning these games they will go to the finals.

There are eight teams entered in this tournament. They are: Canyon, Sudan, Perryton, Memphis, Ralls, Floydada, Levelland, and Dimmitt. The winner of this tournament goes to Austin for the State Championship playoffs.

During the season just past the Bobcats have scored a total of 1523 points to their opponents 1050 this is an average of 45 points a game for the Bobcats and 30 points for their opponents.

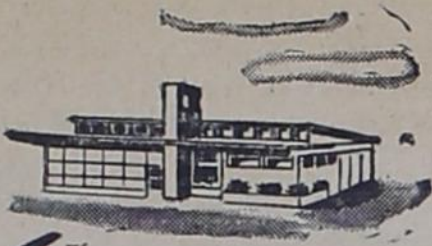
