In his hurried quest for more government grain storage he reportedly passed over some more or less basic elevator revenue sources, to the anguish of some others in the business.

From all reports, inflation has finally stopped. In other words, the prices of goods and services are no longer going up. Apparently this halt has happened just in the last six months or so, although the slowdown in inflation started back in 1958. The cap was put on the inflationary spiral last week when United Steelworkers president David J. McDonald heeded President Kennedy's request and signed a labor contract without an increase in wages for the first time since the early 1940's. This has a direct bearing on us here because it will show up in stabilized prices on tractors, refrigerators, lawn mowers, hairpins, nuts and bolts and in the thousands of other steel products in the consumer market. It was disheartening that during the recession which ended last year there was still a slight general rise in prices, despite the fact that sales were down.

Just about every year since the end of OPA just after the war we received notices of ten percent price increases from the Intertype Company. The identical machine that cost us \$7,500 in 1948 sells for about \$15,000 now. In fact this same machine, bought back then, is worth about as much now as it was then, despite fourteen years of wear and tear. The same thing applies to all types of equipment all across the nation. It has been a nerve-wrecking experience at times. There's no telling how many bonded elections had to be supplemented because prices rose so fast between first estimates and building that public projects ran out of money. Inflation shattered home budgets and everything else that required money for operation. Money saved was money lost unless interest being drawn. The inflationary rate for most of the 1950's was about three percent per year, which meant that a savings and loan interest rate of four percent would give the saver only one percent gain in real money.

Inflation is fading out and we're only too glad to see it go.

A Supreme Court ruling last week would force redistricting by state legislatures. Despite the fact that a constitutional amendment has been passed allowing for the reapportionment of legislative districts every ten years (following the federal census) there has been little action taken. As it stands now Texas has much more rural representation than the city cousins. This is to our advantage, but it's not fair. For instance, Harris County (Houston) has one senator to represent almost 1,300,000 people, while District 16 in West Texas has one senator for only 147,500 people. In short, a minority of rural people have considerable more representation in government than a majority of city people.

This will always be a problem. Representation should be based on population and a population plus geographical area basis. City citizens should have a majority, perhaps, but not a massive one. If it were totally on population it is conceivable that all highway money would go to city freeways and not any to farm to market roads and that irrigation farmers could not get their demands for gas price legislation heard.

## Smuggler Revealed by Mexican's Death Here

The case of the Mexican national who died here last week has been cleared up.

It all started when the man died of a heart attack on a farm near Nazareth. From papers on the bo-

dy he was identified as Manuel Polendo, Jr., of Eagle Pass. Later it was learned that the real Polendo was working in California and he reported losing his papers sometime previously in Piedras Negros, just across the border.

After taking routine steps toward identifying the body, Sheriff Jack Cartwright and his deputies began questioning Latin Americans around the farm where the man died. It was learned the dead man had arrived here in company with five other men, one of whom worked on another farm nearby. The sheriff looked the man up and sure enough the Mexican was a wetback. Asked how he got to this country, the bracero said he was brought here by a well-known smuggler from Piedras Negros with the dead man and three others. The smuggler had become frightened when he learned one of his "clients" had died, so he took three of the men and headed home in his late model automobile. He was not able to talk the man Cartwright questioned into going back with him.

The Sheriff learned the dead man's name was Carlos Gonzales, about 55, of Piedras Negros. He had the border patrol notify the man's wife who said she couldn't afford to bring the body back to Old Mexico. Apparently the couple had some children, but Cartwright didn't know how many. The Mexican government refused to return the body so local officials had no other course but to bury the man in Castro Memorial Gardens at county expense.

Castro County has an arrangement with Dennis Funeral Home for burying the deceased of destitute families for \$100 each.

The five braceros were required to pay the smuggler \$5 a week for getting them into Texas. Since he was not caught in the act the smuggler is still free, although he has been positively identified. It is suspected that the papers found on the dead man are forged. There may be many Manuel Polendos working in Texas today if the papers are in reality only copies.

Sheriff Cartwright said also that he learned there were \$23 in the pockets of the dead man and that one of the braceros who fled for home took it and said he would give it to the dead man's wife.

Cartwright entertains serious doubts about the wife ever seeing the \$23, but he says he couldn't extradite the man for punishment if he wanted to. Robbing a corpse is a criminal offense.

So ends the story of Carlos Gonzales, alias Manuel Polendo, Jr., who came to Texas to make his fortune, only to have what little he had saved stolen before being consigned to a simple grave almost a thousand miles from home.

## Don Yarborough Here 1:45 Tuesday

Democrat Don Yarborough will bring his "Make Texas first" gubernatorial campaign to Dimmitt next week in a two-day swing through 12 West Texas cities.

Coming here from Tulsa Tuesday, he will arrive at 1:45 p.m. and go on a hand-shaking, stump-speaking tour of the downtown area.

Yarborough begins his West Texas visit Monday, winding up the day in Lubbock where he will make a 30-minute address at 8 p.m. over television station KDUB-TV. The speech will be carried at the same time over Abilene-Sweetwater station KPAR-TV and Big Spring station KEDY-TV.

Before his Lubbock visit Monday Yarborough tours Andrews, Seminole, Lamesa, Brownfield and Levelland. Other cities on his Tuesday itinerary include Plainview, Eovina, Muleshoe and Littlefield. He returns to Lubbock again for the evening.

Yarborough has based his campaign on a platform to "make Texas first" in industrial growth, job opportunities, rural development, personal income, education and old age assistance. He has placed particular emphasis on measures to revitalize the economy in small communities and rural areas, and has pledged to fight for abolishment of the sales tax.

This week he proposed a five-point program for progress to stimulate a rebirth of economic prosperity in rural Texas.

Citing the need to halt the population decline in 144 Texas counties, Yarborough said a "Fresh, Imaginative Governor can lead the way to a great new era of productivity in rural areas."

Yarborough proposed the following "five steps to a better life in rural Texas":

(1) A much-needed increase in old age assistance "to lift Texas above its 41st ranking in the way we treat our older citizens."

Yarborough described the \$35 average monthly old age pension check in Texas as "lower than any surrounding state and clearly inadequate to meet rising medical costs."

(2) Repeal of the general sales tax by substituting "long overdue" taxes on interstate gas pipeline companies and out-of-state corporations. "The general sales tax hits family budgets and hurts small businesses everywhere and small communities in particular."

(3) An aggressive industrial development program for rural areas to stimulate job opportunities and halt the loss of rural population. "Texans will not leave their home towns if jobs can be provided through attracting new industry to rural areas," Yarborough said.

(4) Formation of a "Small Business Task Force" to meet monthly with the Governor and develop legislation to end monopolistic practices by big out-of-state corporations. "We must save our hard-pressed small businessmen in Texas and the way to do it is by restoring a fair climate of free enterprise," Yarborough said.

(5) Formation of a rural affairs division in the state government to concentrate on such problems as "protecting our great rural electric cooperatives from being squeezed out by private power monopolies."

More adequate pensions will raise purchasing power and stimulate small business in rural areas," he said.

**1962 FEED GRAIN SIGN-UP**  
Our office received notice March 30 that the final date for signing your intentions to participate on the 1962 feed grain program has been extended through April 16, 1962.

**1962 FEED GRAIN DIVERTED ACRES.** There seems to be some misunderstanding among producers relative to feed grain and wheat stabilization program diverted acreage for 1962. Here are the facts: Minimum diverted, 20 percent of base, maximum permitted, 80 percent of base. Maximum diverted 20 acres plus 20 per cent of base. If more than 20 per cent is diverted the permitted feed grain acreage is the difference between the acreage diverted and the base acreage. New land broken out will not qualify as diverted acreage. Diverted acreage must be cropland that was intensively cultivated in at least one of the years 1959, 1960 or 1961. Diverted acreage plots must be of regular shape, with not less than five acres, except where the total diverted is less than five acres, and there may not be more than three plots per quarter section of land in the farm with the maximum number of plots of eight for any farm. The same acreage diverted for the 1961 program may also be diverted for 1962.

Summer fallowed use on diverted acreage must be approved by the county committee and must be kept free of vegetation and protective measures must be carried out, if necessary, to prevent erosion.

All grain sorghum, classified as such under the official grain standards and mixtures of grain sorghums regardless of the purpose for which grown will be classified as grain sorghum and counted against the permitted acreage. Sweet corn and or sweet sorghums will count against the permitted or base acreage only when harvested for silage. Only the land actually occupied by grain sorghum will count as grain sorghum acreage. This means that two rows of grain sorghum and one row of fallow or another crop will count two furrows grain sorghum, likewise two and two, one-half grain sorghum etc.

Any person who has signed up under the 1962 program and received an advance payment and later for some reason decides not to participate in the program should notify the county office immediately and repay the amount advanced, since in such cases 6 per cent interest will be charged on the money.

**USE OF OTHER LAND.** We have received numerous inquiries as to what crops may be planted on land cannot be utilized by cotton, wheat, grain sorghum and diverted acres. Such land may be planted to any crop, for harvest or conservation, which is not under controls such as vegetables, peas, beans, castor beans, sesame, etc., or, it may be necessary to use part or all of such acreage in meeting the 1959-1960 average of conserving crops and land uses on the farm for 1962 compliance with the feed grain and wheat stabilization programs.

**1961 FEED GRAIN PAYMENTS.** Any person who received a feed grain certificate under the 1961 Feed Grain Program and who has not endorsed such certificate to CCC for cash or grain is reminded

## USDA Announces Details Of Wheat Sedimentary Test

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced some of the operating details of the wheat sedimentation test for determining hard red spring, hard red winter and hard white wheat quality under the 1962 wheat price-support operation.

The sedimentation test is a part of the Department's effort in cooperation with wheat producers and their organizations to increase markets for U.S. wheat and to increase returns to producers on the basis of quality.

Last Aug. 23 USDA announced that premiums for wheat quality based on sedimentation tests would replace protein premiums that have been included in the wheat price-support loan rate schedule in prior years.

While protein tests show the protein content in a specific lot of wheat, the sedimentation test better reveals the quality of wheat gluten. This latter factor is more reliable in identifying wheat for production of better flour for commercial bread baking.

Objective of this new premium program is to more nearly reflect the value of quality wheat in support in prices to producers, thus providing an incentive for producers to grow higher quality wheat varieties.

Quality premiums for producer price-support loans on 1962-crop hard red winter, hard red spring and hard white wheat will be on the basis of sedimentation value only.

Sedimentation tests will be made on all farm-stored wheat of these classes put under price-support loan from this year's crop. Tests on farm-stored wheat will be made by USDA through State and county ASCS offices. Settlement with farmers on 1962-crop farm-stored wheat delivered to the Commodity Credit Corporation under the price-support program also will be on the basis of sedimentation value.

Producers who take out loans on warehouse-stored wheat will be offered price-support loans on the basis of sedimentation value recorded on storage documents by the warehousemen.

Because it may be difficult for the storage industry to shift to this new basis of determining wheat quality this year, warehousemen will be offered the option of delivering price-support take-over wheat to CCC on the basis of either sedimentation or protein tests.

If the warehouseman elects sedi-

mentation, the sedimentation value will establish the basis on which he will be accountable to CCC. In this case the value will be established on a basis mutually agreeable to the producer and the warehouseman and will be shown on the storage document.

In instances where the warehouseman elects protein as the basis for delivery to CCC, any wheat put under price support in that warehouse on the basis of sedimentation tests must have both the sedimentation value and protein content determined by designated laboratories. The loan will be made to the producer on the basis of sedimentation value and the warehouseman will be held accountable for the wheat for delivery purposes to CCC on a protein content basis. In this alternative the storage document will show both sedimentation value and protein content.

If delivery is made to CCC on the basis of sedimentation values, warehousemen will be permitted a tolerance of three units below the stated test value without discount. This is similar to quality settlements on a protein basis. There will be no change in the existing method of settling where delivery is made to CCC on a protein basis. Protein content will be valued at the prevailing market price and sedimentation on the basis of the price-support premium schedule.

The Uniform Grain Storage Agreement under which CCC contracts with commercial warehouses for the storage of wheat will be modified soon by an amendment setting forth the required changes.

The schedule of premiums for wheat sedimentation values under the wheat price-support program has been modified from the schedule as announced last Sept. 29. Premiums generally will go up 1 cent per point of sedimentation value instead of in brackets of 5 points as under the previously announced schedule. The schedule continues to provide premiums on hard wheats with sedimentation values of 40 or above on the quality scale.

(Wheat with a value of 40 or higher is preferred for commercial bread baking. However, wheat testing on the high side of the sedimentation scale is used generally for blending with wheat of less strength to produce the most desirable flour for bread baking.)

The revised schedule provides a premium of 3 cents per bushel for

wheats testing 40, 41, and 42, the same as under the previous schedule. However, for wheat testing higher, the premium will be 1 cent per bushel for each additional point of sedimentation value up to a maximum of 25 cents per bushel which will apply to wheats with a sedimentation test of 64 or above.

The change in the premium schedule was made because the point-by-point increase was found to be a more practical method than the bracket system.

Under the revised schedule, premiums for any given sedimentation tests will be as high or higher than under the previously-announced premiums which ranged from 3 to 24 cents per bushel in five point steps from a value of 40 to 65, and over.

On wheats tested at a sedimentation level of 40 or more, premiums as indicated above will be added to the basic county loan rate to determine the specific 1962 support loan rate on these lots. Hard wheat testing below 40 will be supported at the basic loan for the county with discounts or premiums for other factors.

In the absence of the Minister and Mrs. Smith last Sunday a fine group of people were out to hear Garry Huntingford, exchange student in Dimmitt High School from Australia. Mrs. B. Campbell gave "The Sermon on the Mount" to an exceptionally receptive audience at the 6:00 o'clock worship hour.

The Church Board will have their April meeting just after services Sunday evening. Wednesday services are at 7:30 p.m.

Col. Jack Howell will auction the boxes. All girls and ladies are urged to bring boxes and all gentlemen are urged to attend to buy the boxes which will be filled with mighty good food.

Proceeds will be used to buy equipment for the homemaking departments.

**Farmers Repay More Than \$38,000,000 In FHA Loans**

Texas farm families repaid \$39,146,268 in principal and interest on U. S. Farmers Home Administration loans last year, L. J. Cappleman, the agency's State Director, announced in Temple today. This was 19.9 percent above collections of the previous year in the State.

A total of 3,078 Texas families completely repaid their homes in 1961. Mr. Cappleman said the Farmers Home Administration loan program is an outstanding example of those USDA activities producing large returns to the U.S. Treasury which nearly balance out initial cost.

Mr. Cappleman said the repayment record of Texas farm families demonstrates their willingness to make sacrifices now in order to develop sound and efficient farms

for the future. Farmers Home Administration makes loans to young farmers, small farmers attempting to improve their operations, farmers whose equities have been wiped out by low returns of recent years, and those hard hit by natural disaster. Loans are made to both part-time and full-time farmers. Before these borrowers come to the Farmers Home Administration, they were unable to obtain credit from any other sources.

During the past 25 years, nationally, about two million farm families have borrowed \$5.5 billion from the Farmers Home Administration and its predecessors. To date they've repaid more than \$4 billion of this. Most of the amount outstanding has not fallen due. Interest collections far exceed losses on principal.

A major reason for the excellent repayment performance of FHA borrowers in Texas, Mr. Cappleman said, is the management aid supplied by the agency to all of its borrowers.

"The Farmers Home Administration programs include guidance and technical aid as well as credit. The aim is not only to produce better farmers but also to provide the entire farm family greater opportunities to develop their ability to manage farm and home resources, including capital available to them," Mr. Cappleman said.

He reported that in 1961 Farmers Home Administration advanced over \$40 million in supervised loans to Texas families. Following are some highlights of the agency's lending program last year in the state.

Operating loans for equipment, livestock and other expenses totaled \$40,301,000 to 3,531 farmers. 140 farmers received a total of \$2,631,940 to buy, develop or en-

**Farm Bureau Will Sponsor Talks By Office-Seekers**

Farmers and ranchers in Castro County will be given an opportunity soon to meet the candidates running for the Texas Legislature, according to Guy Walser of Dimmitt, president of the local county Farm Bureau.

The "Measure the Candidates" Meeting, which is open to the public, will be held April 19 at the Dimmitt High School in Dimmitt, the farm leader said. The meeting will begin at 8:00 p.m. He is urging all Farm Bureau members to be present.

Each candidate will be given an opportunity to state his position, or opinion, on a number of legislative issues on which Farm Bureau has adopted policies. Information on how each candidate stands on each issue will be released to the press.

All of the local and area candidates will be asked to state their positions on: taxes (general, sales and income), welfare programs, state budget, school problems, right to work laws, farm labor and other issues.

Mr. Walser emphasized that Farm Bureau does not endorse any candidate for any political office. The meeting is being held only for the purpose of permitting the voters to learn more about all the candidates, he said.

The county Farm Bureau president said that strict ground rules would govern the conduct of the meeting to avoid discriminating against any candidate. A state Farm Bureau field representative will act as moderator for the meeting. Tally clerks or secretaries will be appointed by the county organization to record the candidates' answer which will later be made public.

The candidates will be given 3 minutes each to state any personal qualifications, such as age, experience, etc. The moderator will then direct questions to each candidate for a negative or affirmative answer with one minute to qualify the answer given. Candidates will then be given 3 minutes each for a closing statement.

When all of the specified issues have been considered, the meeting will be opened for a brief question-and-answer session. At this time members of the audience may direct questions on any campaign issue to the candidates.

Due to the increased number of requests from farmers and eligible applicants for Operating Loans and Rural Housing Loans, all of these funds for the fiscal year of 1962, ending June 30, 1962, have been obligated. There are funds, however, for Emergency Loans; Farm Ownership Loans; Soil and Water Loans, for individuals and associations; as well as Watershed Loans.

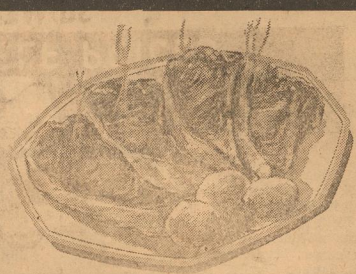
