Bobcats Look For Second Victory After Defeating Abernathy 18 to 6

Dimmitt's 1960 Bobcats opened their season Friday night with an unspectacular—but effective—defeat of the Abernathy Antelopes, 18 to 6.

Dimmitt owned the game all the way and Abernathy's lone score came in the closing seconds of the game when quarterback Mike Ritchey passed to Tom Ritchey for 17 yards and a touchdown.

About 1,500 fans saw the game that placed Dimmitt again in the ranks of the stronger Panhandle teams. Whether the Bobcats will have the winning power for a Conference 1-AA championship depends on how they develop during the next few games, but this season has all the earmarks of the

toughest yet faced by Coach J. D. Covington and his charges. For instance, Canyon defeated Slaton 26-0; Tulla dropped Memphis 47-6 and Muleshoe tied Clovis 22-22. Hereford and Dalhart did not play. Of the teams on the Bobcat schedule which opened their seasons Friday night, only one lost.

The first Dimmitt home game will be Friday night against Lockney, a traditionally potent enemy. The game will be broadcast over KGNC radio, Amarillo. Game time will be at 8:00 p.m.

In the game Friday night against Abernathy, Junior Coffey scored two touchdowns to pace the Bobcat attack which chewed 248 and 37 yard runs. Halfback James Cowell jumped over on the fourth down from the one-yard line in the fourth quarter.

Kelton Cates intercepted an Abernathy pass and set up the first touchdown on the Antelope 30. Coffey scored three plays later.

Nail Driving, Pole Climbing Set For Fair

A nail-driving contest will again be held on the final night of the Castro County Fair, according to a fair entertainment committee.

This popular contest last year decided the "World's Champion Woman Nail Driver".

There will be a \$10 first prize, \$5 second prize and \$3 third prize. First place winner will also receive an engraved cup for her efforts.

This contest consists of each woman contestant being handed a hammer and a thick plank. When the nail driving starts, each woman begins hammering and the first one through becomes the world's champion. Any woman from 16 to 90 can participate.

Also on the final night of the fair (Saturday, September 17) there will be a greased pole climbing contest for youngsters 12 years old or under. First Area Polio Death Thursday

The first polio death for this area this year occurred Thursday afternoon when little 6-year-old Nancy Vigil died in a Lubbock hospital of paralytic bulbar polio.

She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tony Vigil, who had lived in Dimmitt until about four months ago. Now a resident of Hereford, Mr. Vigil had taken the girl to Dr. Carl Page of Dimmitt, the family physician, she was kept in Castro County Hospital Monday night and a complete diagnosis was made Tuesday morning and the girl was rushed to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where an iron lung was available.

No polio vaccine had ever been administered to the girl.

Dogs to Have Place In Fair Parade; Judged at 2:30 p.m.

"Every dog has his day," and in Dimmitt and Castro County that day will be September 17, when everyone turns out for the annual fair and parade. The dogs will have their spot in the parade as in years past. They and their owners should come to the front of the Methodist Church where they will join the parade which starts at 2:00 p.m. and when the parade is over the dogs will stop on the east side of the courthouse square where they will be judged. No dog can enter the show who has an owner who is over 16 years of age. Each dog must bring his owner with him and the owner must hold the dog's leash at all times. There will be no discrimination because of fleas, color, creed, pedigree, or lack of pedigree, or political affiliations. There are no pre-entry requirements, though a dog who defiles himself before the show would be considered to be a very discrete dog, according to Ed C. McLeroy, who will be in charge of the dog show again this year.

The dogs will be judged at 2:30 right after the parade. The categories this year are as follows:

1. Best dog and child combination.
2. Cutest puppy
3. Smallest dog over one year of age.
4. Dog with most unknown ancestry.
5. Dog with the most spots
6. Best purebred
7. Best dressed

No dog should plan to enter more than two of the classifications above. Each dog should do his best to get his owner to groom him well and make sure he has a leash for the big day. According to Mr. McLeroy, each dog stands a good chance of winning a prize or a ribbon and should do his best to get his owner to enter him.

Hospital Building Awaits Water System Approval

The earliest possible date the new proposed \$450,000 Castro County Hospital could be approved for federal assistance is probably next March.

Castro County Judge Raymond Wilson announced this week that he had talked with Kenneth Nuhn, director of the Division of Hospital Services, State Department of Health. Judge Wilson said the only thing keeping the Castro County Hospital from earlier consideration was not having a state-approved water supply in Dimmitt.

Judge Wilson further added that Mr. Nuhn indicated that the Castro County Hospital was in a "very favorable" position to receive Hill-Burton construction assistance funds once the local water supply was approved.

The recent Castro County Hospital bond election stipulated that the county would put up \$225,000 if the federal assistance program would match it for construction of a new county hospital building here. The hospital is not to be constructed without this assistance.

City manager E. B. Noble said that another five months would have to elapse before the local water supply could be approved. "We had to have the reservoir which we've just completed to qualify for approval," he said, "and we must maintain our standards and send in samples for six months before we receive final approval. It was impossible for us to get this done before now." The city has been fulfilling the requirements for a month now, but still lack five more to go.

The Division of Hospital Services board meets quarterly. Their next meeting after this month will be in December, but the water supply will still be unapproved by that time so the matter will have to wait until the March board meeting before it can be considered—and it may not be approved then. However everything else is in order, Mr. Nuhn indicated, and the Castro County Hospital has apparently a very good chance of tentative approval. Permanent approval comes only when the hospital is almost completed. Tentative approval, however, is sufficient to let the contracts and begin construction.

As soon as the State Water Sanitation Department approves the Dimmitt water supply, it will notify the Division of Hospital Services who will in turn bring up the Dimmitt application at the following quarterly meeting, probably next March.

If approval does come in March it will be almost a year after the bond election was approved. While there is a considerable delay in going the federal government assistance route, the county actually receives a hospital at half price.

Judge Wilson also said that any information the Commissioners Court could receive on the request for federal aid would be passed along to the people of the county.

"Savings Bonds sales for the first seven months of 1960 totaled \$64,673.00," Mr. Raymond Wilson, Chairman of Castro County's Bond Committee, reported today. "Our county has now reached 71.9 per cent of its 1960 goal of \$90,000.00. July sales were \$4,272.00."

Sales in Texas for July 1960 were \$12,204,662 which was 6 per cent greater than the same period in 1959.

"A part of every American's savings should be invested in Savings Bonds, to provide for his future and to add strength to the National economy," stated Mr. Wilson, county chairman.

The annual Field Day at the High Plains Research Foundation farm at Halfway will be held Wednesday, September 14 at the location some forty miles from Dimmitt.

Two busses leaving Dimmitt for the field day will load at 1 p.m. Wednesday (Sept. 14) on the south side of the court house square. Reserve seats on the busses may be obtained by calling the Taylor-Harrison Insurance Agency at MI 7-3333.

There will be no charge for persons riding these busses. Both busses will leave Dimmitt at 1:30 p.m. and one will return at 6:30 p.m. and the other at 8 p.m.

Sponsoring the trip are twenty-five local business firms.

Tours of the research plots will be conducted from 1:30 to 5:00 p.m.

Several new research projects have been added to the Foundation's program this year as a means of better serving the agricultural and business interests of the High Plains. Cotton research has been increased 34 per cent over previous years as a result of cooperative experiments that are being conducted with state and federal farm research agencies. The Foundation is conducting the only basic plant breeding program with soybeans in this area and their work is aimed at producing a variety adapted especially to this area. They are also studying some 895 strains of sesame, seven new varieties of safflower, seventeen new castorbean hybrids and methods of flame cultivation.

Chemist to be at Fair To Answer Questions On Wheat Varieties

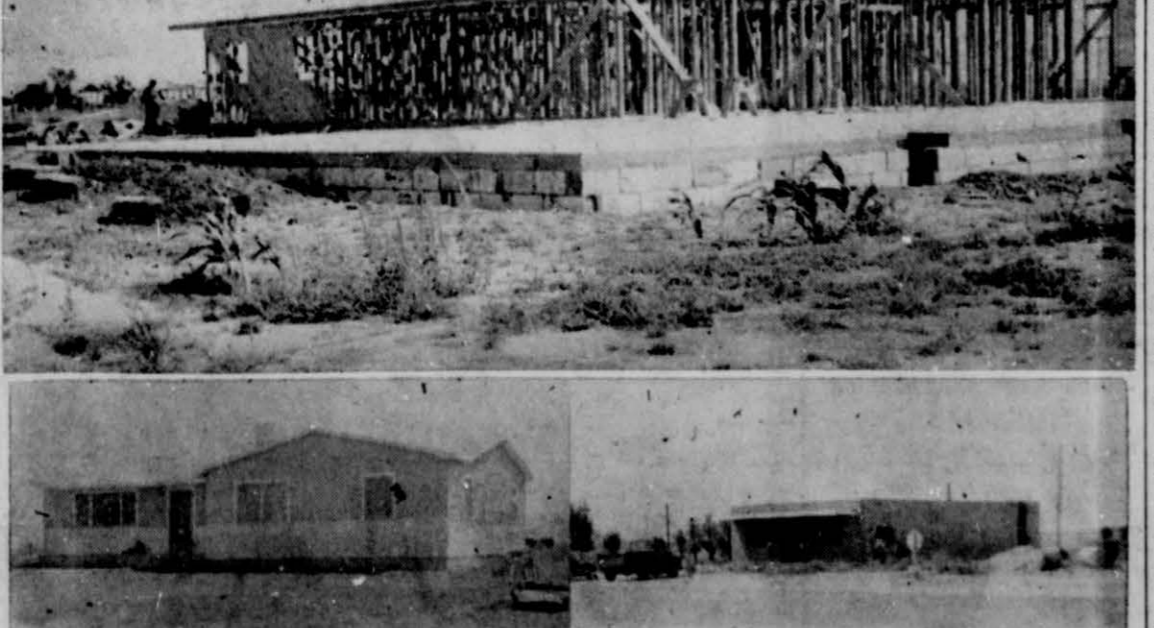


