

Kitchens Delivers First Load of Wheat

Dimmitt's first load of wheat 1959 arrived at Dimmitt Gin Elevator Company at 7 p. m. Tuesday.

It was delivered by Bill Kitchens, who farms five miles east and two miles north of Dimmitt.

The wheat was Early Wichita which had suffered about 35 per cent hail damage and it tested 1 moisture content and 60 pounds per bushel.

According to Dimmitt Elevator manager John E. McCleskey, quality of the wheat was good, although it will need to be dried.

Mr. Kitchens did not know how much wheat he was getting. His load Wednesday weighed 10,840 pounds or about 200 bushels. He sold it for the present market price of \$1.75.

SC Cotton Measurement Started Monday

Farmers wishing to have their cotton remeasured must pay a fee of \$10.00 per farm plus \$4.00 for each additional plot over one within 15 days of the date of notice.

Farmers having any questions about cotton measurement should contact the ASC office.

Late August is Target For New Dial System

Sometime in late August West Texas Telephone Company of Dimmitt hopes to switch over to dial telephones.

The changeover date is contingent entirely on the speed with which technicians can make complex changes in the company's central wiring network.

So far as the private telephone user is concerned, this will be Dimmitt's biggest single telephone advancement since the company switched over from the "crank to get central" system some fifteen years ago.

The new numbers will be assigned as soon as possible. Tentative plans are that each number will be prefixed with Mitchell 7. In other words, some person will probably have the number Mitchell 7-2345. To dial this number the caller first dials the first two letters of the word Mitchell, then dials the number 7, then 2, then 3, then 4, then 5. There will be a total of seven dialings to reach any number on the local exchange. This code prefix was assigned West Texas Telephone Company so that it someday may fit the local system into a national network where long distance numbers may be dialed from a local phone.

The changeover is based upon

the City Commission's permitting a raise in rates by the telephone company. The new rates set are \$10.50 for one-party business; \$5.00 for two-party business; \$4.75 for one-party residence; and \$4.75 for a party line. The rates would be effective after the conversion.

Telephone company technicians will begin soon installing dials on telephones in Dimmitt. The same instruments can be used simply with the addition of a dial. This

operation will take about a month, according to Elton Singer of West Texas Telephone.

Singer said this week that the new dial system will put local telephone service on a par with any city.

Total equipment additions will represent a value of more than \$100,000 when the changeover is completed, Singer said. The company does not expect to cut costs with the dial installation and as

yet there is no indication any fewer operators will be required.

The dial system is the latest move in a modernization of the new building and addition of new facilities three years ago.

A new telephone directory will be delivered each customer shortly before the changeover date. It will be published by the Castro County News and work on the directory will start as soon as number assignments can be made.

Rev. Boles will also be pastor of a new Presbyterian Church at Muleshoe. To be known as Parish developments, he will divide his time about equally between the two churches.

The Dimmitt Presbyterian Church is the result of a long effort on the part of local Presbyterians to organize a new church here. Persons instrumental in the new church organization included Joe Cowen, James Wohlgenant, Blanton Armstrong, Carl Henneman, J. E. White, Mrs. R. W. Scoggins and Mrs. Mary Frances Tardiff.

Total membership is expected to approximate 50 persons during the formative months of the church.

Rev. Boles said this week he is very hopeful for a strong Presbyterian Church here, but that it is difficult to even guess what success the church might have before

The price for the buildings was considered by county officials to be a bargain. The buildings measure 40x100 feet and have concrete five-inch floors and are on property available without cost to the county (Castro County has a long-term lease from the City of Dimmitt on the property for county fair purposes.)

According to county judge Robert Estes this will give more elbow room for the annual county fair and can, if necessary, be used for more or less permanent displays.

Before purchase of the buildings, the only property immediately available to the county fair was the green government-surplus building purchased more than ten years ago for the purpose. The fair rapidly outgrew this building.

Gas Discovery On Boothe farm May Aid Irrigation

Drilling of Amarillo Oil Company's third wildcat in the Palo Duro Basin area is now underway three miles west of Flagg and eight miles south and west of Dimmitt.

The Boothe No. 1, a proposed test of the Mississippian and all shallower formations, is expected to reach a depth of about 9,500 feet before completion.

Though the Palo Duro Basin wells are tests for either gas or oil, a discovery of natural gas by the Boothe well would be particularly profitable to the Dimmitt area for use as a low-cost irrigation fuel.

Amarillo Oil Company and its associates have approximately 4,800 acres under lease in the area if the test proves successful.

Two similar wildcats in the Palo Duro Basin area the Cochran No. 1 in Hall County and the Hicks No. 1 in Randall County, were both dry holes. Regardless of the outcome of the Boothe well, however, additional wildcat tests will be drilled in the area.

Amarillo Oil Company, operator of the Boothe well, is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Pioneer Natural Gas Company with general offices in Amarillo.

J. M. Johnson Drilling Company Pampa, is the contract driller of the well. Completion will probably take place within the next 60 days.

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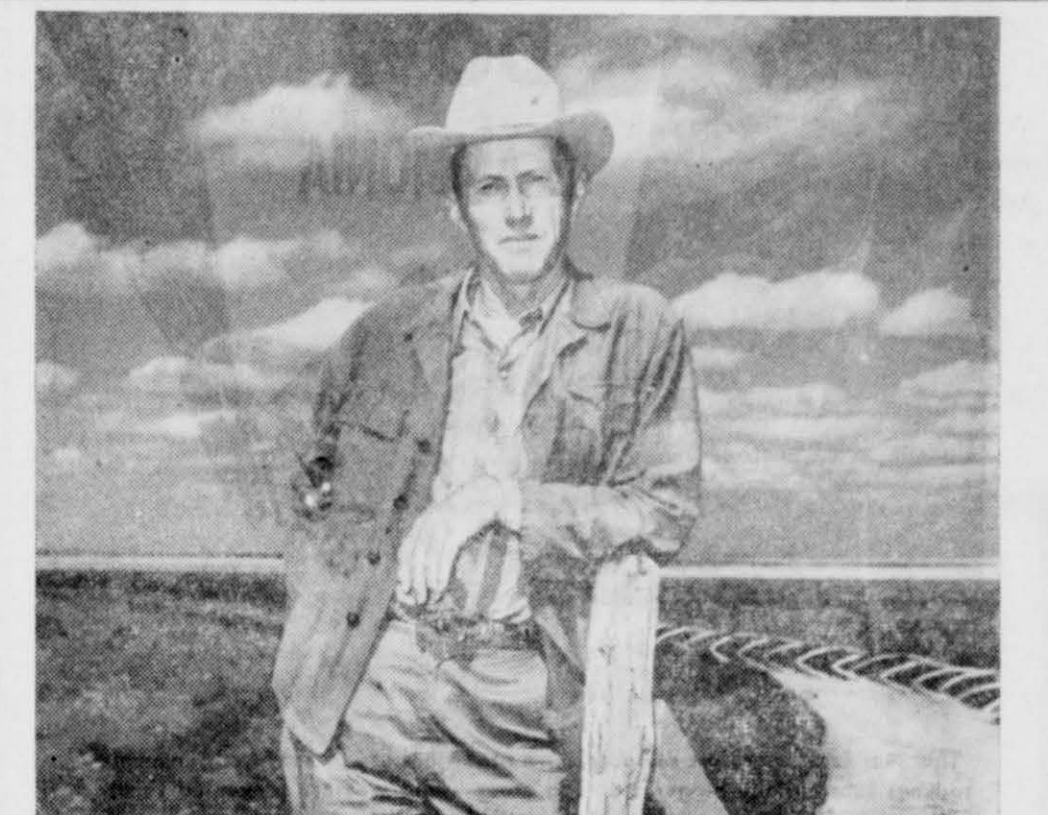

CHURCH HISTORY

"Before the time of Constantine the bishops, enjoyed an ever-increasing influence. Yet the clergy had been with the laity in a true Christian brotherhood course of the fourth and fifth centuries a chasm developed between clergy and the view prevailed that only the clergy were Church proper.

The country bishops disappeared as their duties were taken over by the city bishops, the presbyters continued in office, but were entirely dependent upon the will of the bishop in office, that of arch-presbyter, was created. The sub-deacons and the deacons also continued to function as a superior clergy. Their activities were supervised by the arch-deacon. The sub-deacons and the deacons constituted the lowest orders of the clergy.

The clergy of a city, territory, or diocese by a bishop who had complete control of affairs. He decided all legal matters, finances, arranged for the transfer of the new places, and sanctioned their worldly goods often caused the bishops to take an active part in politics. They surrounded with a court, a body-guard, and a host. Quite different from the shepherd bishops of the past. (Or a "cook-in" party will be held at the church on June 14, 1954.)
