Polls will open at 8 a.m. and remain open until 7 p.m. Saturday for the first Democratic Party Primary of 1960 in Castro County.

The second primary will be held June 4 for the run-off races. The results of these two primaries will decide who the Democratic party will put up as

its candidates in the general election in November. Since it is a Democratic Party primary a new requirement in this election will be that voters present their poll tax receipts for

the stamping of the word "Democrat" on them. Exemption certificates for over-age voters will be available at the polling places and may be obtained there before

voting. First-year voter tax exemptions will not be available since they must have been obtained from the county tax assessor-collector 30 days before the election.

Voters may consult last week's issue of the Castro County News for voting places. A sample ballot, presented by the First State Bank of Dimmitt, is inside this

issue of the News. All precinct conventions will be held at 7:30 p.m. with the exception of Precinct 9, Summerfield, which will be held at 4 p.m.

Last Rites for County Pioneer Set for Friday

Funeral services for L. A. Steiert, 66, pioneer Castro County farmer who died at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday in Medical Center Hospital at Plainview after a lengthy illness, will be at 9 a.m. Friday. Father Peter Fersch, pastor, will officiate at the services in the Holy Family Catholic Church at Nazareth. Burial will be in the cemetery there under direction of Wallace Funeral Home of Tulla.

Steiert moved to Castro County in 1906 with his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Ulrich Steiert, who were among the first residents of this area. A community and church worker, he had lived at the same home site more than half a century. He was a native of Chicago.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Maj. Anthony Steiert, Grand Forks, AFB, North Dakota; Pete and Louis, both of Hart; two daughters, Mrs. Charles Steubert, St. Louis, Missouri, and Mrs. Roland Baumhardt, Amarillo; and eight grandchildren.

Tornado Relief By Red Cross Reaches \$11,000

Red Cross expenditures for Sunnyside tornado relief continued to climb this week reaching a total of \$11,185.67.

Most expensive item to date is the medical and nursing account which has risen to \$8,186.90 and which will probably run much higher before the Red Cross closes its books.

Next most expensive has been miscellaneous household furnishings with cost \$1,405.53. Then comes food, clothing and maintenance which amounted to \$1,075.56. Mass Care cost \$263.68 and occupational equipment amounted to \$254.00.

Hospital Election Petitioned

Groundwork for a new Castro County Hospital bond election was laid this week with the circulation of a petition asking the Commissioners Court to hold an election. As yet the petition is not complete, and it will require a total of 270 names before being presented to the Commissioners. This is slightly more than 10 percent of the qualified voters of the county.

Any campaign to actively support or combat the passage of the proposed election is not yet underway. The petition has been left at Castro County Hospital and anyone wishing to sign it should go there and inquire at the desk. The petition calls for a \$225,000 bond election, which is considerably less than the \$290,000 sought by hospital backers in the August, 1957 bond election which failed to carry here. Part of the reason for this difference is that the indebtedness against the old hospital was to be paid off out of the former bond election revenues whereas present-day plans are to keep it separate due to the interest structure and to let it be paid for as originally planned.

Additionally there is considered to be a good chance of the county receiving Hill-Burton assistance in the construction of a new hospital. This is a federal program whereby the government will match any amount the local unit of government chooses to pay toward the construction of new hospital facilities where the old one is inadequate or obsolete or where a hospital does not exist. A definite commitment from the

government on Hill-Burton aid is not obtainable until a bond election is passed, so voters never know for sure whether the hospital they are voting on will receive government aid in construction or not. Reason for this is that the distributing agency for the fund in Austin will not commit the money to a proposition awaiting the outcome of a bond election. If they did this their disbursing procedure would have to be reworked every time a hospital bond election in the state failed to carry.

Hospitals in Texas which have received Hill-Burton Funds include the 40-bed Graham General Hospital in Young County, constructed at a total cost of \$713,000 with \$350,000 of this coming from Hill-Burton Funds. At Alpine, the 37-bed Brewster County Hospital was constructed at a cost of \$442,000 with \$221,000 coming from the government. \$127,330 was paid by the government towards completion of the \$264,660 15-bed Llano County Hospital. Still under construction is the

Chris Birkenfeld Receives Top Conservationist Award

Chris Birkenfeld of the Nazareth Community was selected as the Running Water Soil Conservation District's Conservation Farmer of the Year of 1959. This selection is made annually to the farmer or rancher having done the most in furthering Soil and Water Conservation in Castro County during the year.

Birkenfeld, a firm believer in sound farming, was selected mainly through his application of good sound conservation farming on his own farm as well as on land he rents.

Among the practices carried out on the place owned by Birkenfeld were the construction of nearly six (6) miles of terraces to aid in water conservation as well as control erosion, the construction of a waterway to carry excess water from terraces to native rangeland on his farm, a cropping system of cotton, wheat, and grain sorghum in a sound rotation, management of crop residues to prevent wind erosion, use of barley for winter cover crops and winter grazing, proper use of rangeland, and the reseedling of old cropland to permanent grasses.

Birkenfeld, who has been a co-operator with the Running Water Soil Conservation District since

November 1950, has used several sources of help available to farmers in applying needed soil and water conservation measures. In addition to the SCD contribution,

these are the County Agent, ACP, Soil Bank, FHA, and Great Plains Conservation Program. These, along with technical aid made

Student Exchange Program Studied

First efforts toward setting up a foreign student exchange program in Dimmitt were made at a meeting Tuesday night.

This beginning was made following appearances here recently of exchange students from Hereford. The program essentially consists of one school abroad sending a student to this country to attend High School for a winter term under the auspices of the city in which he makes his temporary home. After the foreign student has returned the school which he attended in this country may then send a junior student abroad for

a summer term. Elected president of an association for setting up an exchange program here was local optometrist James Wohlgenuth. The organization will be known as the Dimmitt Chapter of American Field Service International Scholarships. Mrs. Thelma Brown is secretary of the organization and Mrs. Sid Sheffy will have the duty of finding families to accept the foreign students into their homes. Ordinarily there will be only one or two a year come to Dimmitt if the program proves successful.

Goldman Dyer and Noble Howard are on the finance committee for arranging funds. The community's participating contribution of \$650 per student is approximately 60 percent of the total cost

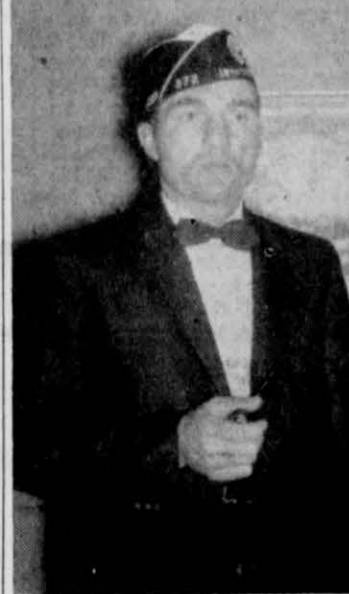

Little League Tryouts Slated At Ball Park Saturday at 1

The 1960 Summer Little League program gets underway Saturday afternoon beginning at 1 o'clock when all former players and new boys wanting to participate meet at the ball park in Southeast Dimmitt.

At this time the teams will be made up. Generally speaking, the boys will keep the same teams they were on last year with additions being made through bidding by newcomers and boys who have reached the minimum players age of 8. The maximum age limit is 11 years.

Jack Miller, local attorney, is Little League Association president this year and Rodney Smith of Hart will be the secretary. On the board of directors besides Miller and Smith are Andy Schumacher, L. C. Brockman and Marvin Jones of Nazareth; Verl Crick and Howie Parker of Hart; and Jim Hays, Fred Dunn and James Bradford of Dimmitt.

Members of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce, active sponsors of the Little League program, have been working at the ball park repairing and rebuilding the park to

Little League Association specifications. To finance the program, which will cost almost \$1,000 this year, the JayCees will work to sell

and resell signs along the south-east fence at the ball park. They will be sold for \$15 for existing signs and for \$25 where new ones have to be painted.

Rodeo Here This Weekend

The annual Dimmitt Rodeo is lined up for this week end with several entries already filled to the limit.

This rodeo is traditionally one of the outstanding small-town rodeos of the Southwest and it will be held at the Dimmitt Rodeo Arena in Southeast Dimmitt.

Scheduled Thursday, Friday and Saturday, the rodeo date was changed from the usual August performance so the Rodeo Association could have enough money to buy roping calves this summer. Events at the rodeo will include

calf riding, bull dogging, saddle bronc riding, bareback bronc riding, bull riding, girl's barrel race and a flag race for children 13 and under.

By late afternoon Thursday 130 men had signed up for the rodeo. There were 14 bulldoggers, 45 bareback bronc riders, 20 saddle bronc riders, 48 bull riders, 40 calf ropers and 7 barrel riders. Most of the performers come from a radius of about 300 miles, although there are several from Colorado. They come from such towns as Texhoma, Portales, (See RODEO, Page 6)

"Preposterous Papa" Mrs. Cleavinger said, "is a hilarious and affectionate portrait by her son, Lewis Meyer."

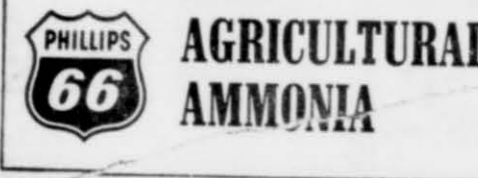

His land, seeing his land could be in no better hands, persuaded Chris to take over another 1/2-section in 1958 and a Conservation Plan is being applied on this place, too.

As well as being a family man and a good conservation farmer, Birkensfeld is also a member of the Dimmitt Wheat Growers, and has served in various capacities as a leader in church affairs at Nazareth, where he and his family attend church at the Holy Family Catholic Church of Nazareth.
