Lions' 'Rock and Roll' Begins Tonight at 8:30

The big, splashy Lions Club Rock 'n Roll Minstrel and Revue will get underway with its two-night run tonight beginning at 8:30 p.m. in the Dimmitt High School auditorium.

The hottest number on this year's program is expected to be the Rock and Roll Cuties, a singing, dancing group of knotty-kneed Lion thespians whose fan dance, according to director Rosie Bates, "would put Sally Rand to shame." Going through their bumps, grinds, and willow contortions in this number will be Lions B. M. Nelson, G. P. Dyer, O. T. Vardell, Leo Fields, Noel Womble, E. B. Noble, L. G. Manning, Thomas Harrison, and C. W. Walker.

This year's program will take its name from the loose-jointed rhythmic pop music now current throughout the nation, the "Rock and Roll." It will be in an abstract original setting of pink and black.

The original script was made up by members of the Lions Club and will feature all new songs, gags, and faces. A total of 25 Lions and their wives will be in

the chorus, with other local talent presentations. The show will last about an hour and a half.

Music will be furnished by Judith Cleavinger and Jo Ann Elder, with choreography by Keith Taylor.

Lions Club Minstrels are perennially laugh- and entertainment-filled. Last year about 1,000 people attended the two-night stand.

The Saint Louis Blues will be performed by Gail Gladman, La Dawn Kemp, Gayle Buckmaster, Mr. Charlie Pesina of Dimmitt, and the Rock and Roll Quartet will be Bert McCarty, director, Leon Crum, Wilmer Studer, Douglas Moke, and Jerry Jones.

New Elevator Building Begins In North Dimmitt

Fred Bruegel Family To Operate 537,000 Bushel Elevator

Another grain elevator will be seen soon on the skyline of Dimmitt when Fred Bruegel finishes his new Northside Elevator, Inc. Groundwork began on the elevator Friday and Mr. Bruegel hopes to complete it by October 1 in time for the grain sorghum harvest provided the current steel strike does not affect the building.

The new, modern \$250,000 elevator will hold 537,000 bushels of grain and will be located about one-half mile north of the city limits where the Brumley stock pens used to be. The elevator will have all concrete and steel construction and will be all-gravity. Modern 60-foot Fairbanks-Morse Print-o-matic scales will be used.

According to Mr. Bruegel the Northside Elevator and new Dimmitt Wheat Growers Elevator, both under construction, are the only two in this area with the all-gravity principal. Only two others anywhere are known, one in Hamlin, Tex., and another in Kansas.

This elevator will be Mr. Bruegel's first strictly business venture in Dimmitt. The new elevator corporation will be a family enterprise with Mr. Bruegel as president; Juanita Bruegel, vice-president; and Fred Jr. and Carl Bruegel as directors.

Mr. Bruegel first came in contact with elevator management when he moved a former Dimmitt Wheat Growers 25,000-bushel elevator to his farm five miles west of Dimmitt. This elevator has increased its capacity since to about 55,000 bushels since then.

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Lambs to Aid In 4-H Sheep Study Program

Castro County farm 4-H youngsters are gaining practical experience in their study of sheep raising.

Mr. Hart, who is also helping with the lamb feeding program, was a Castro County 4-H member himself until his graduation from high school four years ago.

July 24 last Charter Membership Night For JayCee-Ettes

Dimmitt's JayCee-Ettes chose as their first project the selling of Christmas cards beginning this week.

The decision came at their regular bi-monthly meeting in the District Court Room Tuesday night. Also discussed was a coming installation supper for the JayCee-Ettes and their husbands, members of the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce.

So far there have been 15 paid members of the organization. Mrs. Dick Reinhart, newly elected reporter of the JayCee-Ettes, urged all wives of Dimmitt JayCees who are not already members to attend the meeting Tuesday night, July 24, and become charter members. That is the last night for charter membership.

Wheat Voting Box Places Announced

County wheat farmers will vote to see if marketing quotas will be in effect on the 1957 wheat crop on July 20.

If two-thirds of the farmers vote for the quotas then the price support will be between 75 percent and 90 percent of parity. This support would be available only to farmers planting within their allotment. Farmers not planting within their allotment would not be eligible for price support and would owe a penalty on the excess production on the farm.

If quotas are rejected, then wheat would be supported at 50 percent of parity. This support price would be available only to

farmers planting within their allotments. Farmers not planting within their allotment would not be eligible for the support. However, they would owe no penalty.

The Castro County ASC committee has set up the following voting places in the county: Arney community building, Frio community building, Castro County Courthouse in Dimmitt, Big Square community building, and Hart American Legion building.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. All farmers who will have an interest in more than 15 acres of wheat in 1957 will be eligible to vote. Wives of eligible voters may also vote.

Sandblasting of Court House to Start in Two Weeks

For the first time since it was constructed in 1939, the Castro County Court House in Dimmitt will undergo a general overhaul.

Top on the agenda for things to be done will be a sandblasting for "outer walls. During the past seventeen years much rain has fallen on the limestone walls, causing a slow chemical reaction to stain the walls brown. When the sandblasting is completed it is expected the court house will present a bright, white appearance.

Contract for the work was let by the Commissioner's Court Monday to Thomas L. Crome of Amarillo. He was the low of three bidders with an estimate of \$2,344. Mr. Crome will water-proof the walls, clean and re-strip the windows and make other minor repairs. The work will start in several weeks and should take two to three weeks to complete.

Castro County Court House is one of the most attractive structures in Dimmitt. Although seventeen years old, and in continual use during that period, little or no wear is evident on the floors and finishings and the sandblasting should restore it to a new appearance.

New City Paving Project About 75 per cent Signed Up

Dimmitt's current street paving program took another surge to wards completion Monday when Page and Killingsworth Construction Company began curb and gutter work on the street running north and south along the east side of the new city park.

It was the first construction work done on the project, which is expected to be completed during the next 60 days.

For more than a month, the First of Texas Corporation, a bonding company in charge of paper work on the project, has been working on the project through their representative, Mr. Tom Anderlitch.

"The people of Dimmitt have been very cooperative during this project," Mr. Anderlitch said. "In fact, this project has gone as smoothly as any I've worked on before."

All preparatory work has not been completed as yet, Mr. Anderlitch said. There are still some streets to be completely worked out on paper, but the office work is expected to stay well ahead of construction. An additional four blocks of paving have been picked up since the program started.

These blocks of new pavement were requested and petitioned by citizens along the streets who want paving.

Mr. Anderlitch said that any additional property owners not included in the projected paving and who want a hardtop street along their property, should contact him at the Page Construction Company office on Highway 51 in South Dimmitt. The office will furnish free of charge a petition blank and technical advice. In addition to the four blocks of pavement, at least six property owners have requested that pavement strips in front of their lots be paved. These residents did not participate in the last paving project. These strips are the 50-foot halves of unpaved street sections appearing around town.

Twenty-two blocks of new pavement have been signed up and are ready to go, Mr. Anderlitch said.

"We still need some property owners to come in and sign up," he said. "It will mean skips in front of their property if they don't and could quite possibly mean the elimination of an entire block or unit of paving."

About 75 percent of the originally-scheduled 52 blocks of paving are signed up. With the additions, total cost of the paving program could come to \$185,000, although it is not expected this figure will be reached.

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The pounding of hammers all over Dimmitt next week will not particularly signify a building boom, but instead it will mean the installation of hundreds of house numbers.

To be furnished, designated, and installed by the Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce, the numbers will represent the first real coordinated effort yet at giving a designated position to each home in Dimmitt.

H. B. Thomas, chairman of the JayCee house numbering committee, announced this week that most of the groundwork has been completed and that the project should be ready to roll sometime next week.

Present plans call for door-to-door installation of the numbers. It has been decided by the JayCees to charge only what the tenant can afford to pay. The numbers are costly and represent the largest single investment of this program. But since it was felt some people could not afford even a nominal fee, it was decided to charge on a contributory basis only to make sure money would not stand in the way of every house in town being numbered.

The JayCees took the house numbering program over two months ago from the Castro County Chamber of Commerce. Since that time, many committee meetings and consultations have been necessary before the program could be put under way.

Some JayCee officials expect the cost per house numbered to reach as high as three or four dollars before the program is over.

"We will absorb this cost with whatever we can collect from the sign installation and from our general fund," Thomas said. "The biggest job was compiling the maps, numbering the lots, and arriving at a system. The City of Dimmitt and Mr. Hatfield, the city engineer, have been very helpful in this undertaking."

Present plans call for the JayCees to work in teams of two to five men each. A master map has been carefully numbered and assignments will be made from this map. Then each team, in charge of one particular area of town, will visit each house and tell the resident what his official number is, ask him where he wants it placed, and another team member will nail it up. The resident will be asked to pay what he feels he can afford for the number, and if he is unable to pay anything the team will leave the number anyway and go on to the next house. It is hoped by JayCee officials this will guarantee that every home in Dimmitt will be numbered.

The numerals are yellow against a black background and are designed to reflectance similar to a reflector to make for easy night reading.

While no official starting date can be set as yet, the JayCees have set August 1 as the deadline for completing the project. Anytime between now and August 1 city residents may phone No. 3 and have their designated number delivered to their home.

Doyle Thomas, president of the Dimmitt JayCees, said, "We would appreciate it very much if everyone who could would call No. 3 and leave their name sometime next week. This will give us an idea as to how the city is receiving the house numbering idea and it will help us to speed things up when we do our house-to-house canvassing."

"Anyone who calls need give us only their name since we will use official tax files to get city block and lot locations. Of course, we will have to know the owner of the home and its location if the resident is a tenant, but all of the number assignments will be made by us to assure continuity."

"This is actually a big project—much bigger than would appear on the surface—and it will take lots of work to get it across. Anything the citizens of Dimmitt can do to help us will be greatly appreciated."

After the house numbering is completed, the JayCees will place the remaining numbers at a central point here in town, probably at the City Hall, as a convenience to numbering future homes.

To Claim Federal Farmers Warned Gas Tax Refund

COLLEGE STATION, July 12 (Sp.)—Farmers are entitled to claim a refund of the federal tax on all gasoline bought and used for farming during the six-month period of January 1 through June 30, 1956. C. H. Bates, extension farm management specialist, reminds Texas producers. Any owner, tenant, or farm operator who buys gasoline for use on a farm may file a claim, says Bates. A farmer may also request a refund of the tax on any gasoline used on his farm by a custom operator or a neighbor in connection with cultivating the soil, or raising or harvesting a crop. Under the law enacted April 2, 1956, the amount claimable this year is two cents on each gallon of gasoline purchased and used on a farm for farming purposes during the first six months of 1956. In future years claims will be filed for a full 12-month period from July 1 through June 30. Claims must be filed on Internal Revenue Service Form 2240. It may be obtained from the county agent or the District Director of Internal Revenue. Date for filing for this year's refund is after June 30, but not later than October 1, 1956. The law does not permit payment of claims filed late. Refund claims must not be made for gasoline used off the farm, according to the specialist, or for gasoline used for other than actual farming purposes, as described in Form 2240. This applies to gasoline used on the highway, for personal use such as mowing the lawn, or for processing, packaging, freezing, or canning operations. Sufficient records should be kept to enable the Internal Revenue Service to verify the accuracy of the refund claimed.

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What will happen if you should die without executing a legal will? Who will inherit your property? Your husband, wife, mother, father, children, your wife's relatives? The best way you can say who will have it is to provide a will which will protect your rightful beneficiaries and dispose of your property in accordance with your wishes.

When a deceased has no will, or dies "intestate" as the law calls it, the property of that person is distributed according to a detailed formula fixed by law. In some cases this may be the way you yourself would divide it—but in many cases it is not.

The provisions of the law concerning the distribution of the property of a person who dies without a will are rather complicated, and all of the possibilities cannot be covered by a general statement.

There are different rules for real estate and for personal property, for community property and for separate property, for homestead property, and for all of the many possible combinations of surviving relatives. Each situation must be carefully studied to determine the correct distribution of the property.

For example, here is a general idea of how the community property which you and your spouse have accumulated will be divided if you do not make a will prior to your death.

If your husband or wife survives and there are no children, the surviving spouse receives all the property.

If, in addition, there are surviving children or descendants of deceased children, they would divide one-half of the property, while the surviving spouse would receive the other one-half.

Of course, grandchildren do not share in the estate unless their parent who would inherit is deceased. And when descendants of previously deceased children do inherit, they receive only the portion that the child would have received, regardless of the number of such descendants.

An odd note, perhaps, is that the surviving spouse already owns one-half of the community estate prior to your death, and the law adds nothing to this share where there are children surviving.

When there are only children and their descendants surviving, they divide the entire community estate between them.

Farm Bureau Urges Relief For Ranchers

WACO, July 12 (Spl.)—Texas Farm Bureau President J. Walter Hammond has urged Governor Allan Shivers to request an emergency federal hay program for drought-stricken Texas livestock producers.

In a telegram to the governor, Hammond said the present federal feed grain assistance program is inadequate to meet the existing need for roughage for cattle.

"I strongly urge that you request Secretary of Agriculture Benson to institute adequate direct subsidy payments to eligible producers in Texas drought-designated counties," Hammond wired the governor. He suggested that county ASC committees could determine eligibility of producers.

"Direct payments would permit purchasing of hay on the open market," Hammond said. "This would expedite the hay program and reduce administrative costs."

The Texas Farm Bureau president said that his organization "deems immediate action necessary to enable producers to retain foundation stock and to prevent a disastrous run on the market."

Eligible producers in drought-designated counties are able to buy feed concentrates under the present emergency feed program. Livestock producers and dairymen can get \$1 per 100 pounds reduction for feed fed to foundation herds. Feeds eligible for payment include corn, maize, barley, and rye.

Hammond said that such feed concentrates did not meet needs of livestock for a "filler" feed such as hay.

Sports Afield

This is your first summer as a boatman? If so, Willard Crandall, boats and motors editor for Sports Afield magazine, has a few words of wisdom for you:

The first fundamental the novice should get hold of is that not only does a boat not ride on four wheels, but that there are innumerable other differences between auto and boat riding. Nearly everything about an automobile should be forgotten—start from scratch. Safety in boating does not consist of "driving slowly" and reducing speed for corners—collisions are one of your less frequent hazards.

What takes place before the boat leaves the dock is almost half the story of safe boating. Tools, gas, oil, and life preservers—life vests are better—must be aboard. Clothes should be light and not entangling. Oars or paddles are required and an anchor is recommended. Weather must be considered, and wind is the most important part of weather as far as boating is concerned.

One of the first things to learn about small boats, particularly those under cruiser size, is that swamping or upsetting due to high waves is the most frequent cause of accidents.

Never load a small boat to capacity. And filling every seat of a small, open boat, particularly rowboats, is going well beyond capacity. Loading a small boat is important. Underway, the boat must not lean to one side or the other. Too much weight in either bow or stern will not only slow the boat under power but may result in swamping.

Passengers should always climb into a small boat one at a time, and sit down before the next one even puts a tentative foot on the bottom. Never have anything in your hands while boarding—put gas cans, tackle box, and so forth, aboard first.

A newcomer must learn how to avoid collisions with underwater objects. Start the motor where there is at least six inches of water under boat and motor, and start in neutral. If the engine has no neutral, be sure the

free water before pulling the starter, and that no wind will suddenly catch a light bow and swing it before the motor can be adjusted and full attention given to steering.

The most common mistake in landing, the final step in boat operation, is coming in too fast or too slow. Always allow for wind or current in landing; they have a more potent effect once the boat is slowed up. Landing against the wind or tide gives you better control. If a beginner must err in landing, it is better to be on the slow side, for too fast might damage the boat.

Safe Driving Practice Habits Could Save Your Life Some Day

"Don't turn your vacation dream into a nightmare." E. C. McFadden of Dallas, president of the Texas Safety Association, gave this warning to motorists in outlining the goals of the vacation safe driving program being sponsored this month in Texas by the Texas Safety Association, the Department of Public Safety, and the National Safety Council.

"A dream of a vacation can become a nightmare in just a matter of seconds for a driver who sets out to cover too much territory in too little time," he said.

McFadden pointed out that the motorist who is trying to drive an unwise schedule is too prone to take chances, to set aside caution and press down on the accelerator without regard for prevailing traffic, weather, roadway, or even his own fatigued physical condition.

He advised vacationers to start early in the day and to stop in time in the evening for a good night's rest before beginning the next lap of their journey.

"It's also wise," he said, "to provide time for frequent rest stops along the route—periodic coffee breaks or a walk in the open air to relax taut nerves and tired muscles."

Motorists were urged to take a tip from safety-minded commercial trucking companies, which insist that their drivers stop occasionally for coffee, and, if sleepy, for a brisk walk around the truck before continuing.

McFadden also emphasized the following rules:

1. Before starting out, be sure your car is in perfect mechanical condition.
2. Space driving with adequate rest periods—always be alert at the wheel.
3. Know what to expect. Learn the driving regulations of the states you'll be driving through before you start your trip.
4. Load your car carefully. Be sure baggage and equipment is

loaded so that it cannot shift dangerously, or obstruct vision in any way. "And," said McFadden, "we hope that all our drivers will keep their real goal constantly in mind—to arrive back home again alive."

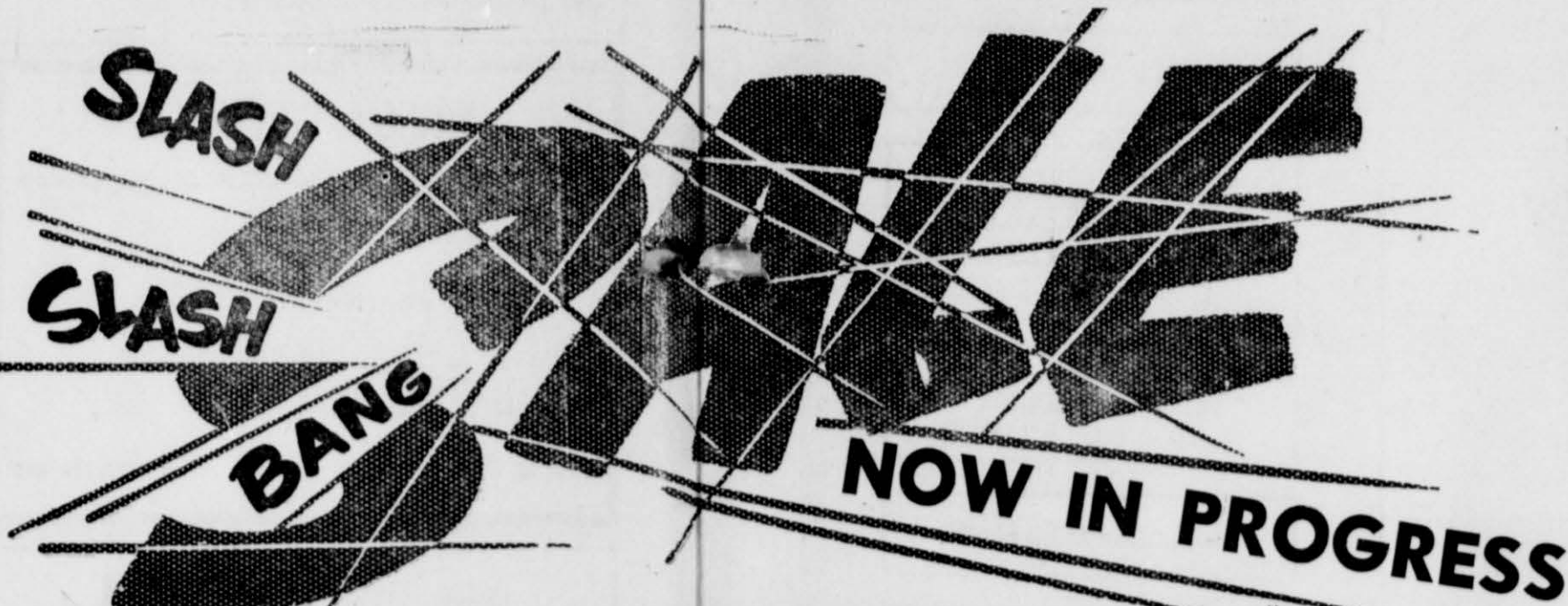

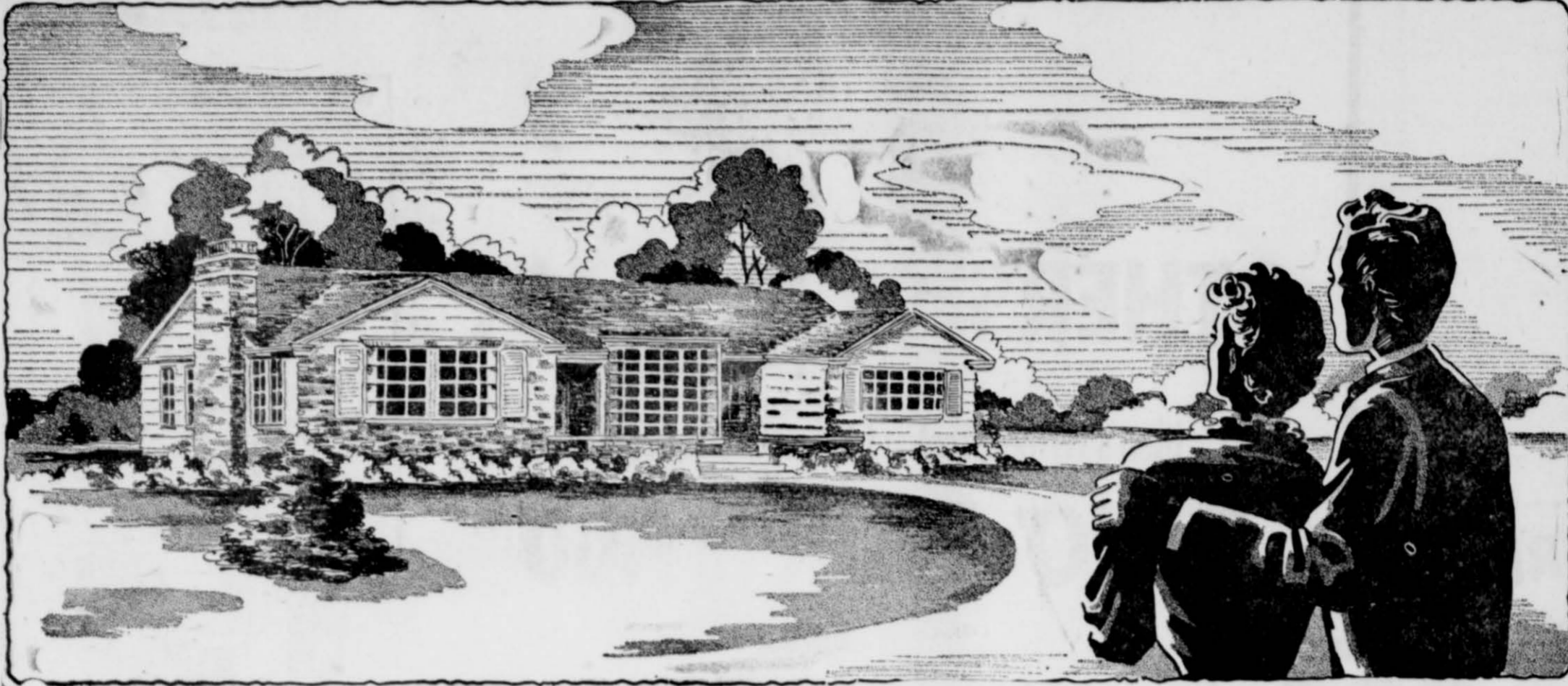
