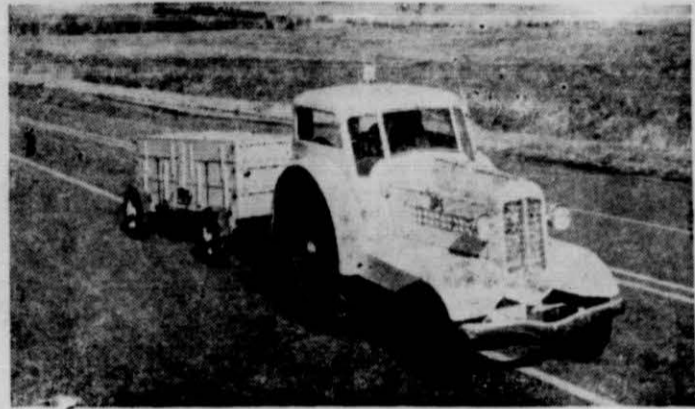

Winter Greens Can Be Reality On Texas Farms

College Station, Dec. 7.—Texas farm and ranch families over a large part of the state can grow winter greens and prepare them for fullest benefit and enjoyment by following the simple directions contained in a leaflet, C-128 "Starring Winter Greens", recently placed in the hands of county agricultural and home demonstration agents.

The leaflet is one of a series issued by the Texas A & M College Extension Service dealing with the production, preservation, and use of common vegetables.

Winter greens, including such quick maturing vegetables as mustard, tender greens, rape and kale, the slower growing spinach, turnips, swiss chard, romain, lettuce, and endive, and the slow maturing cabbage, collards, cauliflower and broccoli, may be grown in the open in many cases or in frame gardens in the more wintry sections.

Extension agents have up-to-the-minute information on the construction and use of frame gardens.

Included in the leaflet are directions for cooking greens and a number of recipes for salads and special sauces.

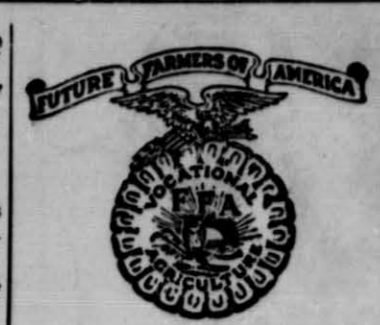

FRAGG H. D. CLUB SHOW DEMONSTRATIONS AT ACHIEVEMENT PROGRAM

The Fragg Home Demonstration club held their achievement program on Wednesday afternoon Nov. 23, in the home of Mrs. Bill Booher, kitchen demonstrator and Mrs. R. L. Krilling home food supply demonstrator.

"If you could have seen my kitchen before I did anything to it, you could appreciate better the improvement I've made in my kitchen," said Mrs. Booher to the women attending her kitchen achievement. "The walls were smoked black and my storage was inadequate and inconvenient. With my husband's help we papered the walls, rebuilt my cabinet and storage space and painted it white; and I added new shades, I made from oil cloth, and new curtains I also made; we made a garage-can from an old oil can and painted it, we made a work stool that I enjoy very much. I rearranged the equipment in my kitchen so that it is much easier for me to do my work and I save so many steps. If my husband hadn't helped me as much as he did, I would never have finished my demonstration," concluded Mrs. Booher.

"I have always tried to give my family a well balanced diet by providing a good supply," said Mrs. Krilling as she talked to the group of women attending her achievement program. "Too provided this food supply I have a garden, raise chickens, have dairy cows, and meat animals, (both beef and pork), all of which help to fill my pantry so that I may serve well balanced meals," continued Mrs. Krilling. "Of course I have to supplement this with food I buy in order to fulfill our daily food requirements."

"My husband built my cellar, which I am very proud of. It is all cemented with plenty of shelves for my canned foods. I have a vegetable rack for storing potatoes, onions, etc., as these vegetables need the air to circulate freely around them. I have jars and cans in which I store turnips, cabbage and kraut in sand," continued Mrs. Krilling.

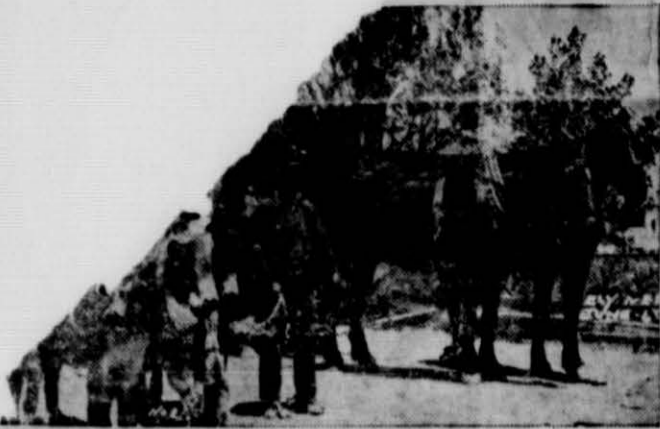

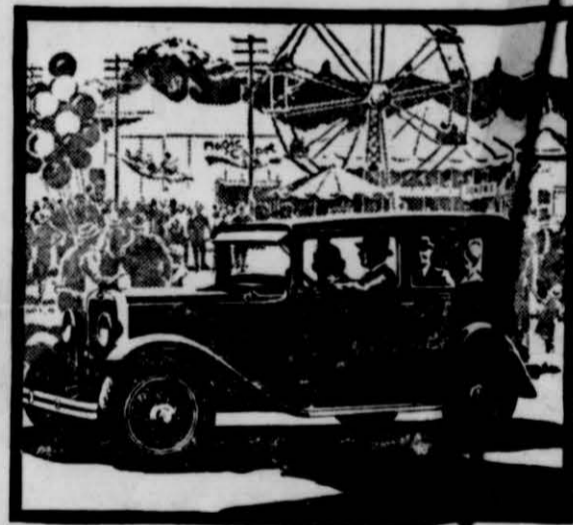
