The sweet sudan grown by Mr. Pyeatt had good growth and yielded a good crop of the characteristic orange colored seed which was very resistant to shattering Mr. Pyeatt was well pleased with the new sweet sudan, however, he did not graze it until after he harvested a seed crop.
