The Amarillo Bi-County-City Health Department will give immunizations at the Hart Schools Monday. Vaccinations for diphtheria, tetanus, polio, red measles and rubella (three-day measles) will be available free of charge to students and pre-schoolers.

The immunizations will be given at the Hart Elementary School from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Parents are urged to bring all pre-school children during these hours. All school children will have to have all the immunizations listed before enrollment in school next year.

# Industrial commission approves rules for new revenue-bond plan

The Texas Industrial Commission has approved a series of rules and regulations necessary

to bring about the creation of the Industrial Revenue Bond program passed by the 62nd Texas Legislature.

THE guidelines apply to local governmental authorities wishing to utilize industrial revenue bonds for construction of industrial or medical facilities.

Under the act, the commission must grant tentative and final approval to all issues.

The legislation, sponsored by Sen. Bill Patman of Gano and Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake, will enable cities to issue bonds to help new industries open plants in their community.

A MAJOR benefit in the use of industrial revenue bonds is an interest rate savings which for the first half of 1971 ranged from 2.07 percent to 2.65 percent below the average interest rate on comparable corporate bonds.

The industrial revenue bond program was developed in Texas after studies by a management consultant firm showed that the state was at a competitive disadvantage with more than 40 other states which already had such a program.

## Tutors allowed under GI Bill

Veterans Administration recommended veterans studying under the GI Bill that they can hire a tutor at VA expense, if needed, and still get the full educational allowance.

ABOUT 4,000 veterans received more than 60,000 hours of tutorial help in connection with their GI Bill educational studies, the VA reported.

VA officials noted that to be eligible for this benefit (established by the Veterans Education and Training Act of 1970), the veteran must be enrolled

under the GI Bill above the high school level on a half time or more basis.

If the veteran needs tutoring to pass a required course, VA allows up to \$50 monthly for a maximum of nine months to pay for it.

THESE tutorial fees are in addition to the regular monthly education check the veteran receives, and are not chargeable to his basic entitlement, officials pointed out.

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake has been appointed by Texas House Speaker Gus F. Mutscher to membership on the House Interim Committee on Oil and Gas Regulation.

### Animal health conference set for March 18-19

Seminars on beef cattle, horses, poultry, swine, dairy cattle and feedlot management will highlight the fourth annual Southwestern Animal Health Conference, March 18-19, at the new convention center in Waco.

The conference is sponsored by the Texas Veterinary Medical Association and Texas A&M University for Livestock producers in a five-state area.

A general session on March 18 will open the conference. Earl Butz, US Secretary of Agriculture, has been invited to be the keynote speaker. A demonstration on how to gentle a wild horse in 30 minutes will also be featured at the opening session.

The beef cattle seminar will feature discussions on crossbreeding and genetics, soil, pasture, pollution, new trends towards exotic breeds and how they affect the livestock producer, and sound management systems.

TOPICS to be discussed at the session on horses include immunization, lameness problems, preparation and care of brood mares, and sound nutritional practices.

A special presentation on African Swine Fever will highlight the seminar on swine. Other topics will include reproductive problems, feed additives and nutrition, preventive medicine, management.

The seminar on poultry will revolve around preventive medicine and will include such topics as Asiatic Newcastle, vaccine programs, broiler rearing systems, and how to reduce condemnation from both sides of the processing line.

FOR DAIRY producers, special seminar discussions will include nutrition and immunization programs, practical fertility programs and the straw method of artificial insemination, milk fever and downer syndromes of cattle, and training of new dairy hands.

Chemists with the USDA have developed a new powdered milk product that tastes good and keeps its flavor. "When first reconstituted, the powdered milk tastes like fresh milk," said Karen Kreipke, Extension foods and nutrition specialist for Texas A&M University. The processing method involves deodorizing the milk fat and then combining it with pasteurized skim milk, all the time protecting the fat from exposure to air. Then the milk fluid is concentrated and dried by a foam spray process.

**"TWO EGGS** supply satisfactory protein in lieu of meat. Buying and serving more eggs could result in a savings worthy of your consideration," Mrs. Clyatt said. "Grade A large eggs offer the best combination of quality and economy for your money."

"In general, the best values on the vegetable counter will be green cabbage, split peas, potatoes, bulk turnips, carrots, bell peppers, dry yellow onions and rutabagas. Broccoli, eggplant, sweet potatoes and cauliflower remain moderate in price."

Apples, oranges, grapefruit, bananas, pears, tangerines and tangelos dominate the fruit counter.
