

Post Office to Be Erected Soon

After several weeks deliberation on a location and other important details, Dimmitt is now officially in line for a new post office, according to Tom Bice, postmaster.

The new building, originally planned for location on the south side of the square, will be erected on lot 22 of block 98 or the third lot west of Hays Implement Company on the south side of Jones Avenue. The 25 foot by 75 foot structure will be built of brick and tile and will have 1,782 square feet of floor space or 341 more square feet than is in the present building.

Cost of the new building has not been disclosed. However, it is known that Mrs. Laura Cooley of Fort Worth, who owns the location will let contract for the building. A ten-year lease has been given the federal government with an additional five-year option.

The interior of the new building will be somewhat similar to that of the old building with a total of 711 boxes being provided. Additional parking space will also be available at the new location, which will eliminate heavy traffic problems that were prevalent at the old location.

The Dimmitt boys mastered Canyon B, 58-46; Hale Center boys trimmed Bula, 63-36; and Whiteface had it easy with Olton, winning 59-36. In the girls bracket, Whiteface had it the easiest, drawing a bye as Friona's girls failed to show up. The Bula girls on the other hand were pushed to beat Hale Center, 60-54, and the Dimmitt Bobbies were extended as they edged Morton 43-41.

Bula - Hale Center Game Best
The Bula-Hale Center girls game was the best of Wednesday nights action as Susie Jones led Bula to a six-point victory. Jones got 26 points, but Wynell Chapman was high scorer with 34 points for Hale Center. Myrlene Nichols racked up 18 points for Bula. Hale Center took a one-point lead at the end of the third quarter after trailing throughout the first half, but Bula bounced back to wrap up the game in the final minutes of play.

Work Started on Hart Warehouse

\$50,000 Unit to Be Finished Soon

A new unit or second warehouse is under construction by Panhandle Compress and Warehouse Company at Hart and is slated for completion within the next three weeks, according to Bob Cranford, company superintendent at Hart.

The new project, calling for dimensions of 160 feet by 312 feet, will cost approximately \$50,000. The warehouse will be a wood frame, sheet iron structure and will be used to provide additional cotton storage space to supplement present over-crowded facilities.

The new warehouse, started ten days ago, is being erected just east of the present warehouse and in front of the company office. Contract for the asphalt floor of the building went to Elliott Taylor, Lubbock contractor.

The project is indicative of the rapid progress and growth of Panhandle Compress and Warehouse Company and of the town of Hart, which is currently experiencing a wave of land buying also, according to information received by the News this week.

Raids Result in Arrest of Three

In a move to clamp down on law violators and to discourage future violations, Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright, assisted by Deputy Sheriff "Pie" Montgomery, carried out three raids in the county Saturday night and arrested three Negroes.

Taken into custody in a raid near the Dodd Gin in southwest Castro county, were Owen McBride, Harvey Williams and William Norman. All three Negroes were arraigned in Justice Court and pleaded guilty to a charge of gambling before Mrs. Rubye Jones, justice of the peace. Each paid fines of \$19 and were released from jail.

In the other two raids, both of which were carried out at two colored cafes, a small quantity of beer was confiscated. Also seized in the raid near Dodd Gin were gaming devices along with a pistol. Sheriff Cartwright was assisted by a Lamb County deputy in this raid. Both raids here were made in cooperation with city officials.

The Castro County sheriff indicated that Saturday night raids were the forerunner of many more raids to be carried out in the future.

Crop Drive Falls Short of Goal

Castro county's CROP or Christian Rural Overseas Program campaign failed to go over the top, but 13 bales of cotton were donated by county residents and businessmen, according to Elmer Dixon, county CROP chairman.

Some money was donated by county residents and will go into the county CROP fund and applied to the next drive carried out in the county.
The county had set a goal of 16 bales. However, each of the 13 bales donated were matched with 20 bales that were contributed by the federal government. All Castro cotton was delivered to Houston in December and was shipped in January where it will be used by needy Koreans.

The 1954 drive, according to Dixon, was more successful than the 1953 drive in as much as only nine bales were collected in the county in '53.

100 Stock Show Entries Seen

At least 100 animals will be entered in the first annual Castro County Fat Stock and Project Show scheduled here for February 10-11-12 and sponsored by the Castro County Chamber of Commerce. 4-H and FFA youths from every town and community in the

county will be represented at the three-day event to be held at the local fair grounds.
At this writing, 22 fat calves, 32 lambs and 40 hogs have already been guaranteed by county youths as show entries. Youths are spending this week grooming their ani-

mals and making final preparations for the forthcoming show. Although project shows have been held here in past years, this will be the first year that a fat stock show and project show combined has been undertaken. Current indications point to a very successful show from every standpoint as county girls are enthusiastic over their baking projects and 4-H and FFA boys are eagerly putting the finishing touches on their poultry and livestock entries.

Castro county's new county agent, Marvin Sims, who took office only Tuesday, will serve as superintendent of the county wide show.
Named as division superintendents are: fat calf division—J. O. Seale, to be assisted by Joe Nelson; sheep division—J. B. Westcott, to be assisted by Alfred Gon-

zales; hog division—J. B. Westcott assisted by Gayland Anderson; and poultry division—J. O. Seale, assisted by Dorr Howell.

Stanley Anderson, Texas Tech livestock judging team coach, will judge all calves, hogs and sheep entered in the show. Kenneth Smith, Kress ag teacher, will judge poultry.

The show sale will get underway Saturday at 2:00 p. m. with Loyd Otten, Clovis auctioneer, handling this phase of the event. Ester Noble of the local bank will clerk the sale.

This year awards will be presented for the first time by the chamber of commerce in the hog, calf and lamb divisions. A \$5 cash award will go to first place winners and \$3 to those placing second. Ribbons will also be presented the first five in each division for showmanship.

All animals to be exhibited at the show must be in place by 8 a. m. on Friday, the second day of the show.

Retiring County Agent Charles Hudson, J. O. Seale and J. B. Westcott have been instrumental in making plans for the show and have been very cooperative with the chamber of commerce in establishing the county's first fat stock and achievement show, according to Chamber Manager Glen Youts.

The forthcoming show is expected to set new records both in sales and number of entries.

Ralph Cleveland of Rupert, Idaho, this week joined the staff of the Running Water Soil Conservation District office and will serve as soil scientist for this area.

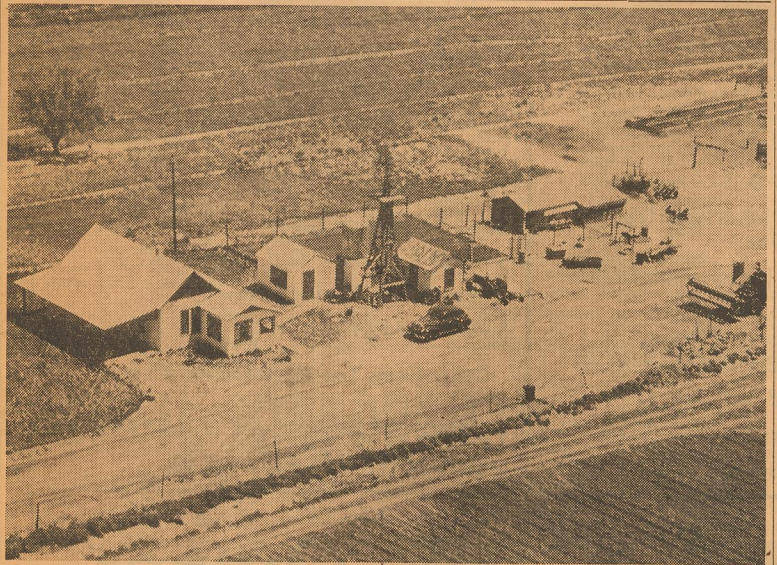
